Living the catholic spirit

If your heart is true, as mine is with yours, then take my hand. II Kings 10:15

St. Luke's United Methodist Church

If Methodists don't all agree with each other about doctrine and beliefs, how do we live in community with each other and solve our differences? We do it by living something called the catholic spirit. That's little "c" for universal, not big "C" for Roman Catholic.

In 1749, John Wesley preached a sermon entitled "The catholic Spirit" and for his text he took the verse from II Kings. Wesley made the point that we don't have to agree on everything to love each other as brothers and sisters in Christ. It is more important to reflect God's love for each of us in our relationship with each other than it is to agree on everything.

If we disagree, how do we convince each other who is right? We don't. Wesley stated, "I do not mean, "Be of my opinion." You need not. I do not expect or desire it. Neither do I mean, "I will be of your opinion." I cannot; it does not depend on my choice. I can no more think than I can see or hear as I will. Keep you your opinion; I, mine, and that as steadily as ever. You need not even endeavor to come over to me or bring me over to you. I do not desire you to dispute those points or to hear or speak one word concerning them. Let all opinions alone on one side and the other: only, "give me your hand."

The way we solve our disagreements in a community of faith is not always the same as it is in other aspects of our lives. When people of faith are on different sides of an issue, we solve our differences by being together. As we live in community, we partake of the means of grace together. We take communion, study scripture, pray, fast, and perform acts of mercy together. Through God's grace, we will eventually be able to discern God's will on the issues that we disagree on.

differences by living the catholic spirit is a difficult thing to do. It requires tremendous patience and trust in God, something that Methodists need more of, just like everybody else. The discernment process can be a long process and we often would rather just get it over with by another means instead of having to live with the uncertainty of not knowing. We choose up sides, split, and go our separate ways.

Living the catholic spirit does not look like we are doing anything to directly solve the problem. Wesley tells us that we understand God through grace and that we understand grace through means of grace. We must trust that as we partake of the means of grace God will reveal his will. We often lack that trust and we choose up sides, split, and go our separate ways.

The Methodist Church had a chance to live the catholic spirit and use it to discern God's will on an issue of great importance, slavery. We failed miserably. Although none of us would argue now what God's will on this issue is, it divided us in the 19th century and the rupture did not heal until 1935. We, like everybody else, are all too human.

Methodism is still faced with issues that threaten to split us. There are people of faith on both sides of the issues and it does not appear that the political process will close the gaps. I think that we need to listen to John Wesley and join hands as brothers and sisters in Christ. Let's patiently partake of the means of grace together and trust that God will reveal his will. If your heart is true, as mine is with yours, then take my hand. Join me in living the catholic spirit.

You are conservative and progressive, socially and politically. You are interfaith. You are being shaped by the Bible. Many of you are striving to live, as I am, out of the radical discipleship of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), letting those commitments inform your relationships, your ethics, your spiritual practice. Indeed, if we are a congregation that strives to "grow together toward full humanity through living the teachings of Jesus" as our mission attests, then we have to attend to the Jesus' proclamation of the kingdom of God.

I discover that most of you have worshipped in faith traditions other than Methodist. Yet you are drawn to this brand name and to the compelling nature of its core belief, "grace".

Many of you appreciate our worship style, especially our music ministers! Many of you would like to see a more formal, traditional option; others want to embrace EPIC worship (experiential, participatory, image-based, and connective) with a creative use of music, drama, art, media, and sacred dance.





Letter from El Salvador

Hello, Marcia!

We had a particularly worthwhile trip to El Salvador with many objectives accomplished. The one downer was that on our first day, my husband was robbed, so we had to cancel all credit cards, close our bank account, ad infinitum. Since we came home, I have spent too many hours with reorganizing our automatic debits and deposits, and the like. In the past we have survived many attempted thefts without loss, so this was a disagreeable "first" for us—but we are glad that he did not suffer any injury and that I had enough cash squirreled away in various secret places that we could make it through the rest of the trip without any problems. On to brighter topics: I think I mentioned before

we left that our trip leader was very eager for me to bring all of your donated medical supplies, even though it meant having to leave behind part of the clothing and toys for a subsequent trip. On our first day, we went to an orthopedic clinic with the supplies, and negotiated a trade of your exam and surgical latex gloves for a club foot surgery. I have an inkling that this would not have amounted to a guid pro quo in the US, but it worked very nicely in the San Salvador clinic! :-) At some point, I should be able to e-mail photos to you of the pretty little girl with the sad eyes and the club foot. Her foot is not as severely deformed as many are, so she should come out of this with a foot that will hopefully brighten up

We delivered a Braille typewriter to a young man who lost his eyesight to River Blindness, and has other horrifying symptoms from the disease. The poor fellow is so bright and pleasant despite the terrible pain he suffers, and it was wrenching to see that he seems to be approaching death without effective medical treatment. My husband George has been researching this problem on the Internet since we came home, and made a connection through the Carter Center with a group that they sponsor which is trying to eliminate this disease in Central and South America. If indeed there will be the hopedfor follow-up, and if it is not too late to kill off the worms which apparently infest the young man's body before they can kill him, that would be very gratifying, indeed. We will see how this works out.

Thanks to you and your generous friends at St. Luke's UMC, George and I were able to transport

the maximum quota of baggage that Continental will allow us to check. Actually, our big duffle bags slightly exceed the 62" total of height/width/length allowed, but after hearing what the intended purpose of our trip was, and understanding that personal baggage for us both was in one rolling carry-on, they let us get by with stretching the rule a bit. We made sure that each bag was slightly under the 70 pound limit. When I packed the bags before our departure, I kept the categories of goods separate by packing them in labeled plastic bags, and filled all the space in between these bags by stuffing in as many toys as possible. Most of the other volunteers who participated in this mission had filled one box or suitcase with supplies that they had purchased from thrift shops. There was no way in the world that I could ever have afforded to purchase, even from thrift shops, the wonderful quantity of supplies that we were able to take with us! Thank you, thank you, St. Luke's United Methodist! :-)

We went to two orphanages and two refugee camps to distribute our goods. By the time we finished at the last refugee camp, all of our bags were empty. At the orphanages, we put together a couple of complete outfits for each child, and gave each one a small and a large toy. Some children would get so excited over their clothing that they dropped their toys and some children were vice versa—more excited over they toys. By the time we left, some had an armload of clothing and no toys while others had lost all clothing but had gleefully cadged onto every loose toy they could find. One can only wonder how this all worked out after our departure! The Beanie Babies nearly caused a riot at one of the refugee camps, so apparently there was enough familiarity with such things to make them a source of an alarming amount of gleeful

George and I are departing for another trip on Friday, but after we get back, I will try to collect my wits with playing catch-up at home, and will see to it that you get some photos of the distribution of the goods which you kindly supplied for this trip. I iust want you and your church friends to know that there are some places in this world where misery has been diminished by your generosity! I try not to be discouraged by the fact that our offerings sometimes seem like a drop in the bucket—if not a drop in the ocean—because for those who benefit, it really does make a difference! Just think about that little girl
