Celebrating Seasons in Ministry

I was ordained an Elder in the United Methodist Church in 1989. This year celebrates twenty years in ordained ministry. In those twenty years, I have served congregations in Grand Junction, Cheyenne, and Highlands Ranch. For a season, I was on the staff of Bishop Mary Ann Swenson as the program coordinator for Colorado, Utah, and Wyoming in mission, camping, youth, new church starts, media, and congregational consulting. Prior to my ordination, I served as a Christian educator in Nashville, Tennessee, and Colorado Springs. I actually started serving congregations in full-time ministry in 1980.

In the midst of the celebration, I am reflecting on the changes that have been required of those who lead communities of faith. In *A Hidden Wholeness*, Parker Palmer speaks of the tragic gap in which we stand today. The tragic gap can be described as holding the tension between two opposites, or the gap between the way things are and the way we know things ought to be. In these days of epochal change, leaders are asked to stand in this gap every day facing issues of scarce resources with increasing global needs, of demands for accountability while companionship the journeys of diverse generations and cultures, of providing motivation and support to congregations while deeply drained personally.

How do leaders lead in the gap? **Congruence. Convergence. Community.**

Leaders live authentically “as servants of Christ and stewards of God’s mysteries” (1 Corinthians 4:1), claiming the integrity that comes from being what you are.

Our leadership is convergent, grafting different relationships, backgrounds, and resources into the story. Control and celebrity are fading banners. The convergent church will be marked with new C signposts: **connect, coalesce, converge, collaborate, and commune.** The counter-balance for the speed and complexity of the digital environment will be a radically, generous heart.

The tasks of congruence and convergence are challenges that cannot be embraced alone, at least, not for long. Leaders need trustworthy relationships, tenacious communities of support, if life is to be sustained in the gap. Every journey has solitary passages and prophetic moments, to be sure. Yet, the gap is simply too arduous to survive without the companionship of others. Gap leadership opens hospitable space across difference. It surprises, breaks open, and disarms. As Ellen Glasgow comments, “*Nothing would astonish me, after all these years, except to be understood.*”

Leaders are called to see the sacredness of the gap, the place where wisdom is bread, all voices are honored, and young men and women dream dreams.

In every part of the church, leaders help people see! They see and season leaders of all kinds, releasing the ministry of God’s people. Peter Drucker says that a leader is one who has followers. However, in the church, a good leader has leaders who replicate congruence, convergence, and community... everywhere!

We share a story founded in the hope that sustained Jesus’ followers through the gap, those first three days until news of the resurrection forged what would become a new community. We share that ancient hope, rooted in God’s constant activity in the world, rooted in God’s constant meddling in our affairs, rooted in God’s call to make love perfect.

What an exciting time to be alive and leading!

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other in offering more complete ministry to our community, a new vision emerged.

Common Table Explores **RETHINKCHURCH**

The Common Table of St. Luke's met on Monday evening, July 20. Sixty-seven leaders, members, and friends gathered to participate in the picnic supper and meeting.

From 6:30 to 8:00pm, we built our community, explored possibilities in re-thinking church and envisioning our future, took the next steps in the discernment process for the Kings Service on Epiphany Sunday, and got an update on calendaring processes. Audrey Elling served as our facilitator.

St. Luke's is living into a new model of organic organization called the Common Table – a model in which relationships are the ties that bind us together as a congregation, not our denominational heritage, or our doctrine, or our beliefs. We are a people who live “tied together” by our belonging to the body of Christ at St. Luke's.

Our congregational governance now reflects the flexibility of our decision-making and ministry oversight. The image of a net provides the symbol of persons of different ages, meeting in groups and classes of differing interests, worshiping in different services, gathering from different backgrounds, longing for different spiritual journeys who are all linked together in the fullness of Christ's body.

Certain persons have the responsibility to keep the net strong, connected, and repaired if there is a lapse in communication. The Executive Team and the St. Luke's staff carry this primary task. The Common Table is an open gathering of the Executive Team, ministry team leaders, and persons from the congregation to share a meal, and to learn and discern, and to communicate and calendar.

The next Common Table is on Monday, October 19.

Monty's Methodism Musings: The World is our Parish

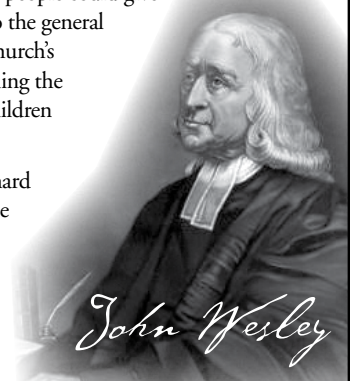
In 1725, John Wesley was ordained a priest in the Church of England. Despite being a leader in the religious revival called the First Great Awakening, this was the only office he held in the Church of England until his death in 1791.

As the leader, of the Methodist movement, Wesley was quite often at odds with the secular and religious leaders of England. From 1739 onward Wesley and the Methodists were persecuted by clergymen and magistrates. They were attacked in sermons and in print and at times attacked by mobs. They remained always at work among the neglected and needy. They were denounced as promulgators of strange doctrines, fomenters of religious disturbances; as blind fanatics, leading people astray, claiming miraculous gifts, attacking the clergy of the Church of England, and trying to reestablish Catholicism. Through it all Wesley remained a priest in the Church of England.

During one of his arguments with clerical authorities in the Church of England, one of the clergy suggested that Wesley, a lowly parish priest, should return to his duties in his parish and stay there. Wesley's reply to this was, "The world is my parish." Methodists have taken up this statement as a call to pursue social justice the world over.

Early on in St. Luke's history, there were many financial difficulties and at times the church's survival was in question. It would have been easy to look inward and take the attitude that the survival of the church was the first priority. To the credit on the members at that time, the decision was made that the reason for St. Luke's existence lay outside its front doors. Missions giving was established as "extra dollar" giving so that people could give to the missions program above their pledge to the general budget. This missions emphasis despite the church's financial problems was a key part of determining the commitment of St. Luke's to helping God's children wherever we sense a need.

I'm proud of our missions program and our hard working missions committee. They help shape who we are as a congregation. I invite your continued support the the mission committee and its program. I hope we can always say, "The world is our parish."

Just Faith: A Journey into the Gospel Invitation to be a People of Justice and Compassion *by Betsy Keyack*

There is an exciting new class coming to St. Luke’s this Fall – Just Faith! This nationally-recognized course will help you discern how you can live the words of the prophet Micah “*What does the Lord require of you? To seek justice, to love kindness, to walk humbly with your God.*”

I took the class last year at St. Andrew UMC and loved it. This year Just Faith at St. Luke’s will be co-facilitated by me, Laurie Gilbert and Rev. Doug McKinney, Director of Love, Inc. of Littleton.

The course is not only informative but very spiritual. The weekly prayers and devotions are beautiful and inspiring. We will also spend time reflecting on what the Old and New Testaments say about compassion and justice. Just Faith will reach our hearts.

There are 11 wonderful books, 11 videos that will make an impact on you, 7 guest speakers and four “border crossings” in which we go to talk with people who are affected by poverty.

The class addresses domestic and global poverty – in the Denver area, the US and around the world. You will read a book called “*Amazing Grace*,” a powerful first-hand account of life in the Bronx. Another book takes you to slums in countries such as Kenya, Mexico and the Philippines. The book “*Rich Christians in an Age of Hunger*” promotes awareness of the injustices in our world.

The books and videos provide inspiring stories of people who have promoted social justice, such as Ghandi and Dorothy Day. In addition, we will learn about and discuss the activities and policies of US corporations and the US government, immigration, the environment, living simply, racism, government advocacy, and the power of one person to make a difference.

There will be plenty of time for discussion of the issues. As those of you who have taken our Disciple classes know, there are no given answers to the questions. This is a class for learning, sharing ideas and drawing one’s own conclusions. We hope to have a class with a rich variety of perspectives and opinions!

Just Faith will also provide you with a thought process and time to reflect and discern the path you want to take in putting your faith into action with compassion and promotion of social justice. I came out of the class with a set of “next steps” for me. I was helped tremendously in terms of inspiration and increased awareness. I realized that the more I know, the more I want to know.

Just Faith is a 30-week class that will be offered on Wednesday nights from 6:00-8:30pm. Childcare will be provided. Participants pay for the cost of the books, but we can provide help with that. To register or for more information, you can contact me at 303-346-7057, bkeyack@att.net.

Centering Prayer: Is God inviting you into a deeper relationship?

Join us here at St. Luke’s, for an experiential workshop and 8-week course on *Centering Prayer*, a prayer method where we sit in silence with God, or, as Gregory the Great expressed it we “rest in God.” Though we often think of prayer as thoughts or feelings expressed in words, this is only one expression. Centering prayer facilitates the movement from more active forms of prayer into a receptive prayer of resting in God where we experience God’s presence. This is traditionally called contemplative prayer. Thomas Keating says contemplative prayer is “the opening of mind and heart, body and emotions – our whole being – to God, the Ultimate Mystery, beyond thoughts, words and emotions.”

The method of Centering Prayer draws from ancient prayer practices in the Christian Contemplative Tradition. In the 1970’s three Trappist monks, William Meninger, Basil Pennington and Thomas Keating, distilled centering Prayer into a simple method of prayer that helps to quiet our faculties so we can cooperate with the gift of God’s presence. Thomas Keating says, “In this resting or stillness the mind and heart are not actively seeking God, but are beginning to experience, to taste, what they have been seeking.”

The Introductory Workshop will be held on **Saturday, September 19, 2009, from 9:00am-1:00pm.** Registration will begin at 8:30am. Two long-time centering prayer practitioners, Julie Saad and Bob Albrecht, will present the workshop. They are both on the staff of Contemplative Outreach. The workshop will include instruction on the method of Centering Prayer and two sessions of actual practice of the prayer. **The eight-week course will then begin on September 24, 2009, Thursday evenings from 6:30-8:45pm.**

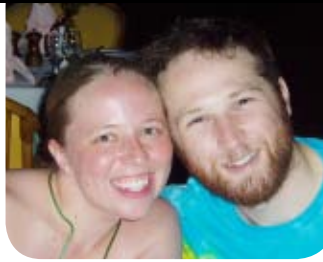

Servant Spotlight:

Bret & Jenna Wilcox *by Katie Newell*

Act One for creative pair Bret and Jenna Wilcox was somewhat of a romantic comedy, set on an indoor soccer field. Jenna thoughtfully described her athletic audition for her leading man as “really bad,” but it didn’t seem to matter and they’ve

been making beautiful music (and all kinds of productions) ever since. Having both worked at CYT, they “know what each other knows”, complimenting each other’s skills sets, and they choose to give these gifts back in the many productions that the church offers. Giving tirelessly to St. Luke’s of their artistic abilities, Bret (he’s the techie behind the scenes) and Jenna (she’s more of the director) bring St. Luke’s their passion, their expertise, and their love of theatre. Plus, they’ve had a side production newly premiered - a baby boy, Coley Reed, born July 20.

About their background: Jenna has a Musical Theatre Degree from Friends University in Wichita, KS. She’s currently serving as Assistant Producer for the Performing Arts Academy. They are looking to expand the program into a year round type of opportunity with voice, piano, dancing, acting, etc. Bret was educated at the Colorado School of Mines, and was the president of an environmental group called Earthworks. He worked with Brad at the Apple Store. He considers himself “a utility player!”

What Serving at St. Lukes Means: “Being part of St. Lukes gives me the outlet for my creative abilities,” explains Jenna. “It makes me a whole person. If I didn’t have the opportunity to be creative, I wouldn’t be the person I’m supposed to be.” She adds that St. Lukes has given her the chance to be fully supported and to explore and expand her creative abilities. She knows that she is fulfilling “a greater purpose, not just arts for sake of arts.”

For Bret, it’s a chance to use his creative thinking skills. He also says being on the technical sides of things you work with individuals on a rough outer experience to start, and then you see a complete transformation. “You get to know people on a different level, the kind soul underneath, all going towards a common goal.” His favorite production to date was *Requiem for a Superstar*, and he was proud of the lighting in particular. Bret also manages the St. Luke’s Communication Team.

Why They Chose St. Luke’s: “Jen and I came from completely opposite ends of the spectrum when it came to church. She regularly went to church as a child and always had a strong faith. I had limited exposure, and maybe went to a bible camp or two with friends. I definitely came into faith later in life,” Bret explains. And both Jenna and Bret acknowledge that’s one area where St. Luke’s thrives – taking you where you are in your faith journey and letting you be part of the experience in whatever way you can be.

Involving Others: Jenna wants everyone to know they are always looking for volunteers. If you like to be a scavenger, they always need more props. If you can work with wood, desktop publishing, or other creative skills, let them know! If you are a seamstress, or a painter – they need you! Bret adds that you don’t even have to be a good painter – you just need a steady hand! “I always thought that you had a certain level of expertise to be involved in productions, but there is no barrier to entry here.” If you have an open mind and are willing to learn, you are welcome to be a part of things.

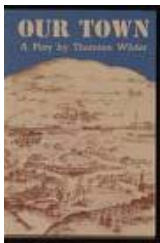

CHRIS'S CORNER Rethink It All

When I was 12, my mom gave me my first taste of grapefruit. I had never tasted such a mouth-puckering, acidic, super-sour citrus taste in all of my life. Of course mom said "But it's good for you, baby!" and I hated it. It didn't matter if it was in slices, cut in half, covered in spoonfuls of sugar, completely liquefied, or even if she let me use the cool little grapefruit knifey-spoon thing, I didn't like grapefruit when

I was 12. Didn't taste like a fruit, and certainly didn't taste anything like a grape!!! After a month of trying, my mom gave up, and I didn't have grapefruit (the fruit or the juice) until my senior year of high school...

I don't remember the exact circumstances that got me to try grapefruit juice again, but I manned up, twisted off the cap to the juice bottle, took a sniff (just in case), and took a swig... In this vein, we are rethinking what church looks like on Sunday nights. SLY will open the meal time (5:30pm - after Off Notes practice) to the whole church (including SLY Jr. twice a month.) GEMs Finale!

On Aug. 5 at 6:00pm we will meet at the church for our last GEMs event of the summer. I invite everyone to participate in our very own GEMs style *Iron Chef* potluck. The secrete ingredient is oranges. You can make an appetizer, salad or entre as long as it contains oranges of some sort. We will sample all the entrees and declare a winner. After our meal, we will welcome Carrie A. Brown, a speaker on relational aggression in girls or "mean girl" syndrome. Relational Aggression is manipulation calculated to hurt or control another child's ability to maintain rapport with peers. She will help us discuss our own experiences and brain storm resolution steps.

There is a hidden culture of girls aggression in which bullying is epidemic, distinctive and destructive. It is not marked by the direct physical and verbal behavior that is primarily the province of boys. Our culture refuses girls access to open conflict and it forces their aggression into nonphysical, indirect and covert forms. Girls use backbiting, exclusion, rumors, name-calling and manipulation to inflict psychological pain on targeted victims. Unlike boys, who tend to bully acquaintances or strangers, girls frequently attack within tightly knit networks of friends, making aggression harder to identify and intensifying the damage to the victims.

Within (this) culture, girls fight with body language and relationships instead of fists and knives. In this world, friendship is a weapon and the sting of a shout pales in comparison to a day of someone's silence. There is no gesture more devastating than the back turning away.
