

United Methodists Respond to Earthquakes

RELATIONSHIPS AFFIRMED IN CHILE: United Methodists were scrambling to respond to a massive earthquake that struck Chile early on

Feb. 27 and prompted tsunami warnings across the Pacific region. The magnitude

Senior Pastor 8.8 earthquake, which hit about 60 miles northwest of the town of Chillán, left more than 700 people dead, according to news reports, including at least three people swept into a large wave on an island 400 miles off the coast of Chile. Santiago, the capital, is 200 miles northeast of the epicenter. President Michelle Bachelet declared a "state of catastrophe" in central Chile, and the quake was felt in neighboring countries as far away as Brazil, according to news reports.

The Rev. Tom Hazelwood, a UM Committee on Relief (UMCOR) emergency response executive, said the agency had exchanged e-mails with Juan Salazar, president of Ministerio Social Methodista in Chile, to offer assistance. He also was in touch with Bishop Mary Ann Swenson of the California-Pacific Annual Conference regarding the tsunami warnings for Hawaii.

The earthquake struck at 3:34am and reports of damage continued to come in all day. The force of the earthquake was enough to jolt the 94-year-old mother of the Rev. Oscar Carrasco, a district superintendent in the Northern Illinois Conference, from her bed in Curacautín. A UM volunteer-in-mission group from Wisconsin was in Chile when the earthquake occurred and were reported safe as of Sunday, Feb. 28.

The Methodist Church in Chile, an autonomous denomination, has some 15,000 members. About 20 church members, representing different districts, participated in a three-day disaster preparedness and emergency response training conducted by UMCOR in October, which also allowed for networking with local authorities and emergency response partners. "We have a great relationship with the people in Chile and the church in Chile," Hazelwood added.

HAITIANS MOURN LOSSES FROM QUAKE: Emile Belorne, who works at the Methodist Guest House in Port-au-Prince, like millions of others in Haiti, is still coming to terms with her memories of Jan. 12, when a massive earthquake struck her country, killing more than 200,000 people. "I felt it was the last day of my life," she said. "It felt like the end of the world."

The people of Haiti took three days of remembrance, Feb. 12-14, to mourn their losses, including family and friends as well as their homes and livelihoods. During the three days, people dressed in white and usually spent from 6:00am until 1:00 or 2:00pm at church singing and praying, said Kathryn J. Paik, executive with the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), who has been in Haiti helping set up a field office. "It wasn't what I expected at all—wailing and angry toward God for allowing this to happen—but rather a time to gather their strength from God to go on still once more," Paik said. "Of course, I'm sure there are isolated cases of tension, frustration mainly toward their own government for not acting fast enough or that aid isn't getting to them quickly enough. But around where I was, streets were quiet and crowds getting in and out of churches were peaceful... Haitians are such resilient people. They pick up after themselves and life must continue," Paik said.

This Holy Mystery

I had a very special opportunity to talk about Communion this month. On March 3rd, St. Luke's

ciate Minister Children's Ministries hosted an info night

on "Kids and Communion". This night talked about more than just kids, it really was a look into

what Communion means to St. Luke's. In case you couldn't make it (even if you did and you forgot to take notes) I wanted to share some of the information from our evening together.

The most important point, and you hear us say this all the time, is that at St. Luke's Communion is open to all people, regardless of age or background. The reason for this is that in the United Methodist tradition, we understand the bread and juice to be symbols of God's grace and love... and God's grace and love is for all people. We don't get to pick who God loves, we don't get to pick who can have communion.

Now there are plenty of folks at St. Luke's who come from different spiritual and religious backgrounds that may see communion differently, and thus have different understandings of who can take communion and when. Each person, and where appropriate each parent, is really the only person who can decide when it is appropriate for them and their children to receive Communion. Also, recognizing the backgrounds and traditions that many people bring with them to St. Luke's we as a your pastors are always available to meet with you and your children to talk about Communion. If that conversation leads to what might be a child's "first communion" we are comfortable with that. Part of Communion being open to everyone is that we are willing to accommodate what you and your family need to receive it... in fact we already do that in many ways.

The United Methodist Church uses grape juice instead of wine for the purposes of inclusivity; that is also why we offer a gluten-free alternative to the traditional bread we use. No person should have to not take communion because of a history with alcohol, a medical issue or allergy, or any other reason. With growing allergy types in our children, we use gluten, egg, and dairy free wafers in Sunday School when they receive communion (which is every Sunday we receive Communion in worship for those of you who may not know that).

The other thing that often comes up when discussing Communion, especially Communion and children, is the topic of understanding. There are many who wonder if our children can understand what Communion is about. My short answer to this is that none of us ever fully and truly understand what Communion is all about. That is what is so special about it. It expresses something bigger than our own comprehension. But we do our best, whatever our age, to understand. That is why every time Communion is served we tell the story Jesus asked us to remember about this life and love- the story that the bread and juice represent. When children come forward for Communion in worship, we make our way to their level and instead of "the bread of life" we offer phrases like "This is to remind you that God loves you" or "This is a gift from Jesus". The story and the personal connection of God's love for them is how they grow into an understanding of not only Communion, but God's love.

There is so much to Communion that it takes a life time to engage it- much more than a single class or Chronicle article. If you have questions about Communion, or any part of our worship life, please let one of the clergy know... we not only LOVE this stuff, we love helping you love it even more.

OUR COMMUNITY

Discover Your Spiritual Type

There is a hunger abroad in our time, haunting us. Like an empty stomach aching beneath the sleek coat of the well-fed, it reveals that something is missing. The diet of secular culture does not satisfy. A hunger for spiritual food is gaining momentum.

What is spirituality? I prefer to use a more biblical phrase, "the spiritual life." Scripturally speaking, the spiritual life is simply the increasing vitality of God's Spirit in us. It is the choreography of the Holy Spirit in the human spirit, moving us toward communion with both Creator and creation. It has to do with God's way of relating to us and our way of responding to God.

This simple approach to assessing spiritual type delineates differences among us; it does not rank the content of faith. There are no right or wrong answers, just preferences. This Assessment Tool (www.stlukeshr.com) will help each of us to answer two questions: *Who am I as a spiritual person? And, what is the best way for me to grow in my spiritual life?* Knowing how we are spiritually different from or the same as other people can help us understand where our strengths are and possibly acknowledge the strengths of others. Such knowledge may suggest new ways in which we can grow so that spiritual experience becomes richer.

Notice that within the SPIRITUALITY WHEEL the lines intersect forming separate quadrants. The quadrants identify the types of spirituality. The vertical axis of the circle is labeled thinking-feeling (or intellectual-affective) with "thinking" being at the top of the circle. These two poles pose the question of how one goes about knowing - through the activity of the rational mind, "Head", or by accessing feelings, "Heart". People are inclined to gain their information about God through (1) emphasizing logic and accumulated facts or (2) emphasizing instinct and intuitive feeling. The horizontal axis raises the question of how one conceptualizes God. The left pole presents an emptying way of praying. It refers to the tendency of a person to think of God in non-concrete ways; that is, to think of God as mystery or transcendence. The opposite end of this scale refers to imaging God as revealed and knowable, immanent. The Christian hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus", is a natural expression of the tendency to think of God in human images, in concrete terms, experiencing God both as friend and as incarnate in the person of Jesus.

REACHING OUT

My name is Peter Reif. And I am a member of the "Justfaith Class" here at St. Luke's, being led by Betsy Keyack, Laurie Gilbert and Doug McKinney .

I wanted to take a moment and share with you some insights we, myself and other members of the class, have derived while attending this class.

We have all mentioned and agreed that with very little effort we as individuals can make a huge difference in someone's life. I recently read the book "Ending Hunger Now", by George McGovern, Bob Dole and Donald Messer. I would like to quote some statistics from this book.

- 25 cents will provide a day's supply of emergency food to a malnourished child in the Sudan
- \$2 will provide one Rwandan child dinner for four weeks
- \$5 will supply a day's supply of emergency food for twenty five children
- \$10 will provide enough maize, beans, and peanut seeds for a subsistence farm to start over
- \$25 can help a mother in Bangladesh stock a little store with items her neighbors are sure to buy. With the profit she will be able to satisfy the needs of her hungry family
- \$34 will provide basic food for one family for two months (rice, corn, oil, sugar, and salt) in Mozambique, Africa and
- \$150 will purchase one ton of nutritious beans for emergency feeding after a disaster

Pretty amazing, huh!!! So what can we do?

What if we as individuals, skipped one meal a week and used that money to help feed the over eight million starving people in the world. Or, if we as a, family, skipped going out to eat and instead stayed home and had a bowl of soup once a week and then used this money to feed the hungry. What a great way to teach our children about sharing.

I would like to end with one further quote from this book. This is from a second century church document offering a very practical approach of linking personal involvement with spiritual faith:

On the day of your fast... compute the total expense of the food you would have eaten on the day on which you intended to keep a fast and give it to a widow, an orphan or someone in need... If you perform your fast, then, in the way I have just commanded, your sacrifice will be acceptable in the sight of God... A service so performed is beautiful, joyous and acceptable in the sight of the Lord. (Shepherd of Hermas 5.3, 7-8)

Final Greetings, 2 Corinthians 13:14. May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

More from Les: Murphy's Law in Action

Not long after Betty and I had moved to Long Beach, California, my father, mother and grandmother came for a visit for the first time since we had

been married. They were coming to our home for dinner. This was a really big deal for us! We began to think about the meal.

What to fix? What would they like? What do we know how to prepare?

Preparation of food and eating it with someone else can be a metaphor of sharing God's grace with each other. Food satisfies a hunger, a basic bodily need.

Preparing a meal is a concrete action. As we take our time, extend effort, and use our knowledge as we prepare something for someone else to eat with another person, we do not focus on ourselves, we are thinking about them.

What do they like, do they have any allergies, is this too fattening for them?

Recalling that my aunt and uncle had given us a nice barbecue with a built-in rotisserie for the wedding, I offered a suggestion.

"Let's do chicken on the rotisserie! It won't be too greasy if we cook it that way and it will be good for Grandma."

After some thought, Betty agreed.

"If you do the chicken on the barbecue, I'll have more time to prepare the salad and side dishes and get the dessert ready, but just be careful, don't burn it!"

So, without thinking, I picked up the can of charcoal lighter and began squirting fluid on the unlighted briquettes.

Whoosh! The lighter fluid, evaporating as it hit the hot coals, erupted into a spectacular ball of flame!

I jumped back!

But we don't stop then, we cannot!

Once we have started the process of serving another, we have made a commitment to fulfill the need, to satisfy the hunger. We may recognize that our own resources alone may not be sufficient to allow us to accomplish our self-assigned task.

When this happens we must look for help.

I quenched the fire, made sure the house was safe, but the chicken..."Ugh!" Not only was it still pink on the inside, it was also blackened on the outside!

Betty looked at me with a face that is hard to forget! Then she said softly, "The deli down the street is still open, take some of the grocery money and go buy a rotisserie-cooked chicken from them. I'll put this mess in the trash!"

Our parents arrived a little late, but the dinner went very well.

And Grandma loved the chicken!

The Great New Bulletin Experiment

In December, the Executive Team approved a recommendation by the Communications Team to run a trial of an updated Sunday Morning Worship bulletin. The objectives of the new bulletin are: to be more green by wasting less paper, to modernize the look, to make the most important information more visible, and to provide information to visitors and new members about how to get connected at St. Luke's. The new bulletin includes a monthly shell that graphically presents events of the next few weeks, shows how people with various interests can find the right contacts at St. Luke's, and includes a monthly calendar. These monthly shells are meant to be either taken home for reference or recycled in the baskets at the back of the Sanctuary and in the Narthex. The new bulletin also includes a weekly insert with the latest announcements. We originally omitted the Order of Worship to save paper, placing the information on the screen instead.

We have received a lot of feedback, both informally during the trial and formally through a survey conducted the week of February 28. The main feedback we received was that people missed the Order of Worship, so we added that to the weekly insert. Over one hundred people responded to the survey. About two-thirds of the respondents preferred the new bulletin; they found it attractive, liked the color, found it concise and easy to read, and they liked the idea of recycling. About one-third of the respondents preferred the old bulletin; they found it easier to read and didn't like inserts. Based on these results, we will continue with the new format and work on addressing some of the suggestions received, such as making the recycling baskets more visible. Your input is always welcome.
