## **Changing Lives for GOOD:** Celebrate Making a Difference





## The Christmas Present: Surviving the Holidays After Loss

In our Celebration of All-Saints, we remembered nearly eighty loved ones whose loss will dramatically impact the holiday season for their grieving friends and families. This year, as we seek to be present to the surprising moments of Advent and Christmas, I want to encourage care and attentiveness to these days of sadness and remembrance.

### Take care of yourself physically

Allow yourself to get rest. Your body will tell you what you need. Loss drains the body of energy and strength. Don't try to do what you have done at previous Christmases. If you want baking and decorating to be done, ask someone to help you. Don't be afraid to admit your physical weakness. Remember, at holiday time your emotions will play a large part of your everyday schedule. Take time to sit down and weep, if necessary. Let the tears come; they are important. You and your family are the most important consideration. Remember, it is okay to put yourself first! It is okay to do things differently this year.

#### Celebrate Christmas in a simple manner

Christmas had its beginnings in the simple surroundings of a stable. This may not be the year to put up all the extra decorations and lights—perhaps just a tree and some trimmings, with the family joining in to help. A simple nativity scene on a table can help bring your attention to the meaning of the holiday. Don't do all the time-consuming Christmas baking you usuallydo. Your family will

be okay! Allow yourself to buy cookies from the bakery. Christmas dinner can be special. It may be better this year to have dinner at another person's home. Let a relative or close friend host dinner at his or her home. Don't feel responsible to bring anything. Or, go out to a restaurant for dinner; you might want to invite a friend who might be alone this Christmas.

#### Remember your loved one

At Christmas, you usually want to do something to remember your loved one. Perhaps going to the cemetery and placing new flowers or a small tree will help you. Sometimes it helps to see how others have remembered their loved ones. Some people donate time or money to people in need as a memorial. Others help those who have lost loved ones by contributing money to the family. It seems to help a grieving heart to do something tangible to remember the loved one. Many families can sit around the dinner table or Christmas tree and talk about their loved one. Sharing good memories brings healing to everyone. Remember, though, to let all the family members grieve in their own way.

#### Next year will be better

Always keep in mind through the holiday that this season will soon be past. Life will heal with time. Also remember that there are many people like you who are walking through this season just as you are doing. You may think that most families are having a wonderful holiday season, but that is not always the real story. You are not alone in your grieving. This thought may not comfort you now, but later God will show you opportunities to help others who grieve as you have grieved.

# Tree Lighting Sunday Nov. 27 6:34pm!

This holiday season, we are inviting our community to share in the joy of Christmas Present. Not past,

not future, but right here and now—and to treat it as the gift it is. I cannot think of a more appropriate way to begin the Christmas season in the moment than our Tree Lighting (Sunday, November 27, 6:34pm). The tree lighting is about engaging us in a moment—and I hope it is a moment you will create in your home as well.

The Christmas tree is a symbol of life (yes, even the twelve inch artificial one from my first apartment), green even amidst the cold of the winter. We bring this symbol of life into our homes, and into our church home, to center our focus on the life we have been given and that we continue to live.

The lights that encircle our trees shine bring us twinkling reminders of the Light of the World, shining right now on our tree and in each one of our hearts, just as it shown that first Christmas. Layering upon the branches and lights are the ornaments. ## Planning for Severe Weather

In the event of inclement weather, the pastors and staff of St. Luke's have adopted these procedures:

### During the week:

• The church staff and group leaders will determine whether classes, meetings, and events will be held.

These closures will be posted on the St. Luke's website (www. stlukeshr.com) as soon as a decision is made. The closure of the St. Luke's Little School will also be given to local television and radio stations.

## Continuing our Journey toward Wholeness by Jane Staller

The 2011/2012 Spirituality and Wellness Series launched on October 4 with Chasing Happiness, led by Dr. Andi Pusavat. Dr. Pusavat (Andi) led the well-received Stress Management workshop for the 2010/2011 Spirituality and Wellness Series, and she is back by popular demand. In Chasing Happiness, Andi tackled the common, but less-than-satisfying quest for happiness. She grounded her talk in some universal questions: How can I be happy? How can we be present in the moment? How can I quiet myself and be content with where I am now? What if I don't have access to the things that I thought defined happiness? What does spirituality mean in the midst of all these questions?

Andi introduced the ancient concept of "Dayeinu," which she described as the ability to claim, or to recognize, that what has been, is good enough. Dayeinu comes from the celebration of God's deliverance of the Hebrew people through their exodus from Egypt.

Always practical in her approach to the tough questions, Andi walked us through strategies to help us focus on what really matters in life. Andi's workshop handout, *Chasing Happiness: Strategies for Focusing on What Really Matters*, is a self-study guide that we can use to bring clarity to our own Dayeinu experiences. The handout contains questions (with room to record our thoughts and reflections) to guide us through the processes of:

# More from Les: Transformation #3 The Palmer, Alaska, Fellowship – Changed for Good!

This is the third installment of a three-part series of the story of transformation during the three years I served as pastor of a very small, rural United Methodist congregation in Alaska. I believe this story has an important message about how we recognize a "call" in our own lives, whatever it may be, how we respond to that call, and how God uses people around us to affirm and support us as we move forward. I hope you enjoy the story. It's not just mine, but a story of the people who traveled with me and helped me on this sometimes confusing and circuitous path.

Palmer UM Fellowship was small but it mirrored a larger congregation. We looked, sounded and acted like a church – we *were* a church! I preached, Betty ran the Sunday school.

This engineer, newly reformatted as a minister, found that the task went far beyond preaching on Sunday morning. There were pastoral care issues to be dealt with and I knew that I was not qualified to deal with these issues alone. A technological background was virtually useless in this arena of human relationships.

My regular meetings with Rev. Billy Still provided time for reflecting on what was happening at Palmer and my role in it. I thought I was beginning to get it. Then, on April 24, Good Friday, 1989, the supertanker, "Exxon Valdez" struck Bligh Reef in Prince William Sound, Alaska. My first response was disbelief, then shock, and then dismay. I was devastated! How could this happen?

Members of the Palmer Fellowship, however, became a resource for me as we all dealt with this horrible tragedy! I felt responsible as an employee of the industry that had developed the huge North Slope oil fields and built the pipeline and marine terminal now delivering that crude oil to ships that coursed Prince William Sound.

I shared my feelings with the congregation on several Sundays. They too, were grieving over the loss! "We hate what has happened, but we don't hate you," said one member, "and the best way to do our grief work is to talk about it and do something constructive."

I told them I had volunteered to work on a multi-company task force to develop a new Oil Spill Prevention and Response Plan and promised to keep them informed as much as I could. It became a shared experience for all of us and tended to build more trust within the congregation.

Over the years the Palmer Fellowship became an effective community of faith. It held its own financially and was not in immediate danger of fading away. With effort and commitment, members of this community of faith were beginning to reach out and serve some of the human needs in the community of Palmer. I was proud of them but in no way could claim credit for their success.

I served the Fellowship for three years and was profoundly changed by the experience. My initial attitude had been that ministry would be a "good second-career choice," but during this time it evolved into a true passion for ministry, a deep love for each member of the congregation and a sense that I was following a path that fit God's intention.

With 30 ½ years of tenure with the company, I officially retired from Atlantic Richfield Company on Dec. 31, 1992. The company had implemented an early retirement program and my company job was eliminated. This, and my experience with the Palmer Fellowship, convinced me that this was the time to move toward full-time ministry. I decided to switch from the Local Pastor candidacy path to the Seminary and Board of Ordained Ministry supervision path to Ordination and local church appointment. Late in the fall of 1992, I applied for

admission to Iliff and prepared to leave the Palmer Congregation.

On our last Sunday with Palmer, Betty and I were treated to a departure dinner at a local restaurant. During the meal Keith said some things that touched me deeply. "Les," he began, "We have come to know that you have certainly been called to be a minister. We are sad that you are going, but rejoice in where God is taking you. We feel that God has called us too, to become a church, and just as importantly, to help teach you what it takes to become a pastor. God has done some amazing things with ordinary people." We cried. Betty and I completed our move from Anchorage to Denver in November 1992. In January '93, I began Winter Quarter classes at Iliff School of Theology.

We found a United Methodist church, "St. Luke's," a few miles from the house we were buying, so we began attending worship services. After a couple of visits, the minister, Rev. Bill Selby, stopped us after worship and invited us to sit and talk. "Tell me your story;" he said, "everyone here has a story about how they came to be here." He listened intently as Betty and I told him of our Alaskan experiences, the Palmer Fellowship, and our move to Colorado to begin Seminary studies at Iliff. "We are buying a home in Highlands Ranch because I feel we might need to sell it rapidly once Seminary is finished and the Candidacy process is completed," I commented, "We have no specific plans beyond that for the moment." Bill leaned back, thought for a moment and then turned to me, "Les, don't make any commitments for the moment; I think we could use someone like you right here.

About halfway through the quarter at Iliff, I began working part-time at St. Luke's as Lay Pastor. I would quickly learn that members of St. Luke's were strong supporters of candidates for Ministry. Later, I would serve as an Iliff Seminary Intern at St. Luke's. Strong support came from St. Luke's Staff Parish Committee and others in the church. When it was discovered that my candidacy file and documentation of Certified Candidacy by the Alaska Missionary Conference Board of Ordained Ministry had been lost and I would have to redo some of the candidacy work, St. Luke's members helped me get all the necessary documentation together to start over. I was elected to "Probationary" membership in the Annual Conference and appointed to St. Luke's as Associate Minister from 1995–1997.

I learned from all this that *St. Luke's is a teaching church* and happy to see today the same enthusiastic support for ordained ministry candidates that I enjoyed from 1993 to 1997. Thank you for what you have been and continue to be for those who have responded to God's call.

Keep up the blessed work, you are changing the world for good! *God bless us all! Rev. Les*



# Care, Counseling and Spiritual Growth Ministries: Connecting to God's Healing and Transforming Grace

Would you love to feel more intentional about how you live your life? Are you in the midst of some difficult life transitions? Would you feel more at peace knowing someone is praying for you and for your loved ones? Are you grieving a loss or coping with illness? Would you welcome a safe place where someone listens and is present to you? Would you appreciate some new approaches for working through personal or professional challenges?

In our recent Wellness Inventory, many of you named emotional and spiritual health as top priorities. St. Luke's has many ministries to encourage your emotional, mental, and spiritual health. Often we become more aware of God's healing and transforming grace through intentional connection with others. We invite you to let us know about your interests or needs and we'll help connect you with one of the following ministries or with other resources. Confidentiality is highly respected. We welcome your calls, emails, and conversations. You may reach me at 303-791-0659 x32 or sallie©stlukeshr.com or Brenda Schafer at the church office at 303-791-0659.

**Pastoral Counseling and Care –** Rev. Sallie, Rev. Janet, and Rev. Brad offer short-term, faith-based counseling, pastoral care, and referrals for individuals, couples, and families seeking support.

**Stephen Ministry –** provides confidential, one-on-one care to individuals in our congregation and community who are experiencing difficulties in their lives. Stephen Ministers provide the emotional and spiritual care we often need when faced with a difficult or challenging time such as loss of a loved one, divorce or separation, loneliness, parenting struggles, care giving challenges, unemployment or work-related challenges, aging, relocation, illness, life transitions, birth, adoption, miscarriage, or infertility, and challenging life circumstances. Stephen Ministers are lay persons who have specialized training in providing emotional and spiritual care.

**The Caring Connection –** provides support to members of St. Luke's and the community by making companion visits, taking meals to families in need, running errands or providing transportation.

**Care/Prayer Team** – is a small group of individuals that gather regularly to pray for concerns of individuals, the congregation, and the community. Requests for prayers may be called in to the church office, sent through the website, written on a prayer request card or shared with a member of the staff team. The Care/Prayer team ministers together with The Caring Connection, Pastoral Team, and Stephen Ministers.

**Support Groups and Classes –** St Luke's offers support groups and classes focused on a variety of topics including 12-step programs, divorce recovery classes, grief support groups, and parenting classes. Information about current groups is available on St. Luke's website and in the Care Ministries brochures in the church entry. Watch for upcoming announcements of new classes and groups.

**Individual or Group Spiritual Direction –** is intended to provide a place where you can experience what it means to be listened to by others so that you can listen to God more attentively in your daily life. Spiritual Direction supports those who are discerning life decisions, embracing change, negotiating challenges, celebrating important insights, enhancing self-awareness and being attentive to what is sacred in all aspects of life. This ministry is offered by individuals who have completed specialized, professional training as Spiritual Directors.

**Spirituality and Wellness Series –** an annual series to help us integrate faith into our daily lives. The interactive workshops, featuring excellent guest facilitators, engage participants in learning new skills and practices that contribute to health and wholeness. Upcoming sessions are on January 17, and March 6, from 6:30-8:30pm.

**The Samaritan Fund** – provides financial support and assistance for those who are part of our St. Luke's family. If you or someone you love is in need of some extra financial support to make it through a difficult stretch, please contact one of the pastors.

**Benevolence Fund –** provides support for those in need who are not directly connected with the St. Luke's family.

If St. Luke's does not offer the type of support you need, the pastoral team will make every effort to connect you to additional resources, support networks, and care providers within our community.

Gracious Space is a philosophy that was initially advocated by the Center for Ethical Leadership. Gracious Space is a simple yet powerful approach for people to work better together. By creating interactions that prioritize honest dialogue, deep listening, and creativity around challenges, Gracious Space helps individuals and groups experience enhanced understanding, resolution of conflict and solid problem-solving.

The philosophy of Gracious Space aligns with our St. Luke's commitment to seek justice, to love kindness and to walk humbly with God. The foundation is grace reflecting the abundant grace God offers us. Gracious Space highlights simple ways to practice our faith in any setting. The core elements include:

Offering a Spirit of Compassion and Curiosity. When we bring compassion, curiosity, and humor to relationships and conversations, communication naturally becomes more effective.

*Creating Settings that Reflect Hospitality.* Intentionally creating an atmosphere that is welcoming invites more meaningful dialogue and extends respect to others even in the midst of tension or conflict.

**Welcoming Different Ideas and Perspectives.** Openness to considering new voices and new ideas so that our actions are inclusive, respectful, and well-informed.

*Honoring a Commitment to Learn More and Judge Less.* In Gracious Space, people listen more, remain open to possibilities, discover transformative solutions, and develop innovations for change.

A commitment to these elements builds trust and sets the tone for honest and engaged exchange whether at home, at St. Luke's, at work or in our community. I invite all of us to continue practicing Gracious Space and to continue learning with each other. Gracious Space is a framework for practicing faith that can guide conflict toward transformation, shape meaningful conversations, and create a path toward peace.

To give you credit for your donations in 2011, we must receive them on or before December 31 or they must be postmarked on or before December 31. Keep in mind that some of the methods you may choose to use for your donations may take a considerable amount of time for processing and getting them to the church before the December 31 deadline.

If you need assistance or information for getting your transaction processed, please give Lisé or me a call. We will be glad to assist you.

**IRA Charitable Rollover Reminder.** The IRA Charitable Rollover expires on December 31, 2011, unless congress acts to change the law. If you own an IRA and are over age 70 ½, you may transfer any amount up to \$100,000 directly from your IRA as a donation to St. Luke's because we are a qualified 501 (c) (3) charity. This gift will count toward your 2011 Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) and will not count toward taxable income on the IRA RMD.

In the past, some of our members have elected to take advantage of this opportunity to pay their current year pledge and to prepay one or more future years at the same time—before the law expires. We're happy to receive your prepay for future years. We hold those funds in reserve and apply them to the income for the applicable future year(s).

Keep in mind that Financial Advisors get very busy near the end of the year. It would be a good idea to get the process started now to avoid missing the December 31 cutoff date.

**Free King Soopers Grocery Cards Available at Grocery Card Table.** *Yep–FREE.* If you are a King's shopper and do not currently participate in our grocery card program, it's easy to get started. Just stop by the grocery card table on Sunday mornings and pick-up your free Kings Soopers \$5.00 reloadable gift card. St Luke's will receive a 5% rebate for every purchase you do with this reloadable card. You can load the card at Kings with any dollar amount you need and as often as you like by going to the Kings service desk or at the cashier using cash, check or your regular credit card. What a great way to build up points on your credit card.

The grocery card rebates from Kings, Safeway and Tony's contribute approximately \$12,000 to our general budget each year. This is a considerable amount that can grow significantly if more of our members and constituents will use the Kings reloadable cards that you obtain at our grocery card table. *Give it a try.* 

**Pick and Choose Your Method Of Giving to SLUMC.** We have many ways for you to make your giving to SLUMC easy and convenient. You may want to consider one of these convenient methods for your contributions. In addition to cash and checks, we offer online credit card transactions, stock transfers and scheduled automatic withdrawals from checking or credit card accounts. The following is a general summary:

- I. General Fund and Capital Campaign: All methods.
- **2. Grocery Cards:** Cash, check, scheduled eft from checking accounts.
- **3. Special Events:** Depending on the type of event may include cash, check, PayPal and online credit card transactions.
- **4. Plus:** We'd consider any reasonable method you know about that we haven't adopted.
