A MESSAGE FROM REV. JANET Retirement from St. Luke's

Nearly twelve years ago, on May 16, 2004, I began my appointment as Senior Minister of St. Luke's United Methodist Church. In the intervening years, you have blessed me and Bob with your spiritual tenacity, leadership for change, and creative energy! Thank you for opening your homes and hearts to us, for partnering in our mission to live the teachings of Jesus, and for sharing in the richness of God's grace.

After satisfying some of these yearnings for recreation and rest, I'll offer myself for transitional leadership in changing, conflicted congregations.


GIFTS OF THE DARK WOOD: LENT AND EASTER AT ST. LUKE'S

conference in good standing) never goes without a setting for ministry. The primary goal of the appointment system is to match the gifts and graces of a particular pastor to the ministry needs of a particular congregation at a particular time. This itinerant system dates back to American frontier days when circuit riding preachers traveled on horseback from town to town. At that time, bishops matched preachers to circuits four times a year. Now bishops typically fix appointments once a year at the meeting of the annual conference in June. Most clergy move to their new appointment on July 1 each year.

To understand the appointive process, it helps to know a little about how the United Methodist Church is organized. We are a connectional church. That means individual congregations are part of a larger network known as an annual conference under the leadership of a bishop. Most annual conferences consist of several districts. Ordained clergy are members of an annual conference rather than a local church. Our St. Luke's clergy are members of the Rocky Mountain Conference, which includes Colorado, Utah, and the southeastern half of Wyoming. Bishops are responsible for assigning pastors to churches. Ordinarily, district superintendents assist the bishop in prayerfully making appointments. They generally meet with pastors and representatives of local churches every year to assess the effectiveness of ministry there. The superintendent of the Mile High - Pikes Peak District is Rev. Dr. Melanie Rosa.

The staff-parish relations committee represents the congregation officially in this process. With the announcement of the retirement of Rev. Janet Forbes, the staff-parish relations committee will be in conversation with the superintendent through a church profile and position description. The process always involves consultation.

If you have questions about the appointment process of the United Methodist Church, direct your inquiry to the chairperson of the Staff Parish Relations Team, Rachael Owens, or any of the clergy team.

How Do United Methodist Congregations Get Their Pastors?

The United Methodist Church has a unique way of matching pastors and congregations. Rather than local churches hiring and firing their own pastors-as in some denominations-United Methodist bishops appoint pastors to serve in local churches and other ministry settings. One advantage to this process is that a local church never has to go without a pastor. Likewise, a pastor (specifically, a full member of an annual

THE TURNING OF THE YEAR

Fat Tuesday to Ash Wednesday

The Christian calendar tells the story of Jesus in two cycles of time. The year begins with the Christmas cycle of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany as we celebrate Jesus' birth. The story culminates in the Easter cycle of Lent, Easter, and Pentecost with the wonder of resurrection.

The turning of the year from one cycle to the next is marked by two very different holidays...just 24 hours apart. Mardi Gras, or Fat Tuesday, on Feb. 9, is the last day of the season of Epiphany. Another name for Mardi Gras is Shrove Tuesday, a day to confess our sins and have them shriven or forgiven. After confession, everyone eats a meal of pancakes, using up all the eggs and butter in the house.

When we wake up on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 10, the Christian year turns 180 degrees. We turn from watching a manger in Bethlehem to a cross on Calvary. The Bible tells us that before Jesus began his ministry he prepared himself by spending forty days praying in the wilderness. We call these forty days Lent, and Lent is the time when Christians prepare for the celebration of Easter. The word, Lent, is from the Anglo-Saxon word, lencten, meaning the lengthening of the days or the coming of spring.

Some people still give up something during Lent, maybe a favorite food. In the Middle Ages, everyone had to go without eating meat or fat or eggs for the whole forty days. Other persons take on something new during Lent. They honor their bodies. They eat well. They exercise daily. They lose weight. Or they reconcile a relationship. They spend time with their children. They reconnect with their spouse. They settle an old fight. Or they decide to do something for other people. They fast one meal a week and give the money to relieve hunger. They ride a bicycle to limit global warming. They practice acts of kindness.

Our 2016 Lenten worship series, GIFTS OF THE DARK WOOD, is a forty-day, intensely focused period of personal reflection and community discernment through prayer, scripture reading, holy conversation, and fasting. We make a commitment sacrificially to lay aside things we ordinarily enjoy and to re-evaluate our faith journey by asking some hard questions. What do I need to let go of so I may be more faithful or whole in my relationship with God? What spiritual practice might I take up to bring me closer to the person God is calling me to be?

Following Jesus in the way of the cross means giving ourselves fully and sacrificially for the concerns of God's heart. In saying yes to Jesus, it is his cross we are lifting, his cause we are embracing, and his life mission we are supporting. Saying yes to Jesus is an all-out, all-in commitment to go where Jesus goes, be who Jesus is, do what Jesus does, and give what Jesus gives for the life of the world that God loves.

Why Worship Redesign?

Allow me to speak personally for just a moment... So many people are longing for an authentic connection to God and one another. The "one another" part is the kicker. People haven't given up on God or the spiritual, but we don't want to walk through it alone. This God stuff, this spiritual stuff is too big—the questions are too big. We have a longing not just to experience authentic connection with God, but we desire this same connection with other people. We want to journey through the spiritual together. We need one another.

But we have to be honest with the current religious [particularly Christian] landscape here in the United States. Sociologists of Religion and Church Historians tell us that we are living in a post-Christian world, that Christianity and the Church have been in a long term trend of decline. The recent [May 2015] Pew Research Center report confirms this decline. 35,000 Americans were surveyed. The percentage of adults who describe themselves as Christian dropped eight percentage points in seven years—from 78% to 70%. That's significant. Every Christian denomination has experienced decline. Mainline Protestants have been no exception. In 2007, there were 41 million of us. Today, 36 million. That's a big drop. The Pew report also revealed to us the number of "nones"—those who don't affiliate with any religious tradition—in the U.S. This number is on the rise. This number has increased by 19 million since 2007. The "nones" are the fasting growing group in America. Today there are approximately 56 million religiously unaffiliated adults in the U.S. Stunning!

The headlines capitalized these statistics. The headlines were clear:

Christianity is in decline. Indeed, the entire religious landscape of America doesn't have a very bright future. But here's what we didn't see if we just read the headlines—and it's fascinating!

When we read further in the Pew report, we see that 49% of Americans report to have had some sort of spiritual or mystical experience that has transformed their life. That's nearly half of all Americans! In 1962 Gallup asked the same question—only 22% answered 'yes.' Later in the Pew report, they asked, "Have you experienced deep peace and well-being in the past week?" 65% of the people said yes. "Have you had a sense of awe and wonder at creation or the universe in the past week?" 52% said yes. That's huge!

Navigating Change & Transition

The most predictable thing in life is change. We've all heard this phrase and we've all experienced change many times. But if we experience

change so often, why does it bring so many unexpected emotions? Can't we simply become proficient with change and move through it with intentionality and ease? From a psychological perspective, the answer is no, we can't. We can, however, learn how to make sense of change and the emotions that go with it. Change of any kind can often be accompanied by unexpected feelings of anger, disorientation, joy, sadness, excitement, uneasiness, and anticipation, to name just a few.

We recently experienced a change when we sent our youngest daughter off to college (well, actually it was 18 months ago, but this fact will help to make my point!). We planned for it, we were excited for her new opportunity, we were proud of all she had accomplished and we were, and still are, very proud of who she is. She was ready to go. Now, 18 months later, I still keep a nightlight on in her room and find that our home feels just a little too quiet. I also got teary the other night when we were watching an episode of Modern Family; Claire and Phil Dunphey's daughter was dealing with the adjustments of college life. Keep in mind that Modern Family continued on page 5 is a comedy!

And get this: 75% of those surveyed said they are looking for a sense of purpose and meaning and they see that as having something to do with their spiritual life. That statistic didn't make the headlines.

These numbers are just as important as all of the statistics on decline. They tell us something so important. People are experiencing God, the Divine, the Spirit, the Meaningful. And people are looking to make sense of it all. We want to journey with others through the spiritual. We don't want all the answers or better explanations of particular doctrines. No, we want to journey with a tribe.

So, back to my original question. Why worship re-design?

What if we saw Sunday morning worship as an opportunity to start signing "YES" on all the permission slips? The sunset last night, it did something to me, it filled me with a sense of awe...YES, of course it did—that's God moving in our midst. Playing with my kids in the park last week, all of the sudden I was filled with a sense of gratitude...YES, of course you were—that's God and the ongoingness of creation. In my suffering, the community prayed, and I could actually feel their prayers...YES, of course you did—the Divine energy was present in that moment. This is what it means to proclaim the God who is with us, not a God who is "up there somewhere," but a God who is with us—with us in all of it. Mountains, sunsets, laughter of children, the sense of not being alone in our struggle...these things reveal to us the God who is with us. It's written in creation. How might this transform the way we think about worship?

One more word on the why of worship re-design. The "nones" [and the "dones" who we didn't even mention in this article...but another fast growing group. These are the folks who were once active in the Church, but no longer participate] have spoken clearly. There's lots of research that could be mentioned here, but simply put: the church experience has been shallow, irrelevant, and exclusive for so many—the deep questions and doubts have largely been dismissed. Remember, we want to journey together...even when it's really messy and uncertain. The worship experience can't just be about coming to church and getting the "feel-goods" about our favorite song or hymn, a nice sermon, or a soothing prayer. Nothing wrong with this, but it can't stop there. If our Sunday morning worship services don't engage the real questions, the questions that people are actually asking, then what are we doing? If our worship isn't inspiring us to live a better story and go out into the world to make a difference, then what are we doing? If our worship services aren't inspiring us toward our mission of living the teachings of Jesus: love, acceptance, justice, and hope, then seriously, what in the heck are we doing?

Speaking of "what"...in this article we dealt with many of the "whys" of worship re-design. In the next one, we'll deal with the "whats." Let's continue to do this together. Let's continue to journey together. It's what we do best.

Thankfully my patient husband, surprised by my tears, quickly figured out my emotional state and just let me be. (Good call, Tom!)

While my mind is settled with our youngest daughter being in college, my emotions are clearly not. Even though the change happened months ago, it appears I am still in transition. *Change is situational.*Transition is psychological and includes an ending, a neutral zone, and then a new beginning that happens over time (Bridges, 2004). Whether a change is anticipated and positive (having a baby, sending a child to college, starting a new job, retiring, etc.) or unanticipated and painful (the loss of a loved one, health issues, job loss, etc.) we're likely to experience a wide range of emotions that sometimes surprise us.

With the hope of offering some new ways to navigate transition as we are in the midst of change at St. Luke's and as we all experience transitions in our own lives, Rev. Janet, Rev. Ryan and I recommend a terrific book: *Transitions - Making Sense of Life's Changes* by William Bridges. 



Under the leadership of Pastor Tonya, our Trustees, Pastoral Staff, Ushers, and Boy Scout Troop team members are working to document and update Accessibility for all who spend time at St. Luke's. You may have already noticed temporary signage on seats in past drama performances. Now we're moving ahead with providing similar improvements to our Sanctuary to facilitate movement in and out of the space with ease for all for our worship services.

Past improvements completed include the push button operated front door entrance, and putting entrance and parking lot lights on timers. We've got large print hymnals and



Bibles, and amplifiers to loan to individuals who would benefit during services or performances in the Sanctuary – please connect with an usher or one of our

sound booth techs if you would like to learn more about these options.

Outside we've increased the number of parking spaces for those with the ADA hang tag, and guest spaces for anyone who would benefit from a shorter walk into our main front doors. You may not realize that we also have additional ADA marked spaces at the lower level, NW entrance. From this location, on Sundays during worship hours, you can enter the church at the lower level at the double doors, go through the open Goliath children's space, up the ramp, and take the elevator on your left to the main level for services and classes.

Once we've finalized Sanctuary ADA seating signage placement, we'll order more permanent markers for seating, providing space for anyone who uses accessible seating including walkers, wheelchairs, or motor scooters, as well as for their family or friends so that everyone feels more welcome at St. Luke's.

Our next item on the plan is an accessible bathroom. This includes adding a push button door opener to provide easier entry into our larger Family Restroom on the main level. United Methodist Ministers:

Elders and Deacons - What's the Difference?

by Rev. Dr. Sallie Suby-Long, Ph.D., Lead Minister of Spiritual Life About a decade ago, I shared with Rev. Janet that I was experiencing a call to further ministry but that I didn't picture myself in the usual role of a Church Minister and Preacher. She said, "You could be a Deacon!" And I said, "What's a Deacon?" Some of you might be wondering as well. So, let me try to answer a few

simple questions. As you may know, Rev. Janet and Rev. Ryan are Ordained Elders in the United Methodist Church. I am an Ordained Deacon in the United Methodist Church. In short, Deacons are Ordained United Methodist specialist clergy. The diaconate, (the function of diakonos meaning servant or steward, ambassador or representative), is traced to Acts 6 & 7 in which Stephen, Philip, and others were called to administer charitable functions of the faith community.

Are Deacons Ordained Ministers? Yes. Like Elders, Deacons are fully Ordained Ministers in the United Methodist Church. Deacons are specialized clergy with expertise in a particular field or fields. For example, Deacons may specialize in counseling, teaching, health care, community organizing, nonprofit management, administration, children's ministries, information technology, chaplaincy, or any number of other specialties.

Are Deacons Appointed by the Bishop? Yes. Like Elders, Deacons are appointed by the Bishop, however, unlike Elders, they are responsible for finding their own employment. Once a Deacon finds a position, the Bishop is asked to officially make and bless the appointment. Deacons are not part of the UMC itinerancy process. In simple language, itinerancy in the UMC means Elders are appointed by the Bishop and often move from church to church as needed several times throughout their Ministry career. Since Deacons have professional specializations and find their own employment, itinerancy generally does not apply to UMC ministers who are ordained as Deacons.

Do Deacons Serve in Churches? Deacons may be engaged in ministries inside or outside the church setting. The purpose of a Deacon's ministry is to connect the church with the world. This "bridging" responsibility means Deacons can serve in a variety of professional and community settings including churches, schools, universities, hospitals, and community organizations, to name a few. For example, UMC Ministers who are ordained as Deacons may be professors, nurses, teachers, administrators, counselors, videographers, IT specialists, musicians, principals, doctors, lawyers, missionaries, and the list goes on and on. They often hold joint appointments in a faith community and in another settings. Deacons are ordained to ministries inside and outside the church that address a variety of the needs of God's people.

Do Deacons Complete Seminary Training? Yes. Deacons complete seminary training. Like Elders, they may complete the Master of Divinity degree, or Deacons may choose a different seminary degree that aligns with their area of ministry. Often, Deacons have specialized training in another field as well.

How Do I Fit Into This? Here's my personal example of what it means to be in ministry as an Ordained Deacon! Prior to joining the clergy team at St. Luke's, I held leadership positions in university settings, nonprofits, and businesses for over 22 years. I traveled frequently working with leadership teams across the country. My responsibilities included leadership, teaching, marketing, human development and management. I've earned a Ph.D. in Education with an emphasis in Psychology and Leadership and a Master of Science degree in Higher Education/ Human Development. I have certifications in a variety of human development tools such as the Myers Briggs Type Indicator, Appreciative Coaching, Spiritual Direction and Brain Technologies Assessment Tools. I am also certified in Conflict Resolution and Negotiation through studies with the Conflict Management Institute. In the midst of engaging in a career I loved, I became aware that many of my clients and students were seeking additional opportunities for spiritual growth. This was compelling to me. So, with a desire to deepen my capacity to offer spiritual and psychological support to others, I completed a Master of Arts degree in Pastoral and Spiritual Care at Iliff School of Theology. To make a long story at least a little shorter, I was ordained as a United Methodist Minister and I have had the honor of serving at St. Luke's for nearly 7 years. My primary areas of specialty as a United Methodist Minister include leadership, counseling/ psychology, spiritual formation, and development. In addition, I am presently on Creighton University's dissertation faculty and I teach doctoral students in their Interdisciplinary Leadership Program. I also do occasional consulting work with the leadership development company Ki ThoughtBridge and I'm engaged in research with colleagues through the International Leadership Association.

God invites all of us to minister in many different ways. While the primary Ministry of an Ordained Elder in the United Methodist Church is to extend excellent leadership within the Church setting, the primary Ministry of an Ordained Deacon is to create faith connections in the world and to lead in a variety of professional settings.
