

# What Are You Looking For?

In Carey Nieuwhof's recent article "5 *Things Millennials Are Looking For In a Church*", he explores the conversation about spirituality and the church with younger people. Here's a summary of his five observations:

Character over competency. Authenticity matters.

"An authentic experience in a church with B+ worship experience beats a hollow experience in a church with A+ programming."

**Discipleship over programs.** "If you live in a space where you think 'we can't reach the next generation because we have no money,' think again."

**Relationship matters most.** "What do young adults want? Your time. Your heart. Your attention. And a chance to actually connect with people."

**Mission over model.** "Every church has a model of ministry... churches that love their model more than their mission will die."

**Be Real and Keep Doing.** "This is, after all, a generation that has been marketed to more than any generation in human history. They can smell incompetence a mile away. But they can also smell fake a mile away. Being real matters more than doing. But doing still matters... continue to make your ministry better, but still, work harder on your character than you do on your competency."

I think Niehwhof's conclusions are spot on—who we are matters! Authenticity, deep relationships, transparency, these things matter! However, I am not convinced that this is a "generational thing". In my experience, previous generations also long for these attributes in the

# **Holy Land Reflections**

In February, I had an opportunity to travel to Israel with a group of United Methodist clergy from the Rocky Mountain Conference. I serve on the Design Team for the 'Clergy Young in Ministry Academy' in our conference – this academy is designed to offer continuing education experiences to clergy recently ordained and in the early years of their ministry careers.

As part of the Academy, we planned a 10-day immersion experience in the Holy Land, led by Bishop Karen Oliveto. This was my first trip to the Holy Land, and I was very excited to go. As preparation for the trip, Bishop Karen invited the group to read the Gospels repeatedly – to delve into the stories of Jesus and his community with intentionality and prayer.

It was an amazing trip. We started our week with a Reaffirmation of Baptism in the Jordan River. Jesus began his ministry with his own baptism in the Jordan River, and so beginning our trip in this same river was inspirational. Over ten days we visited Qumran and saw the caves where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered. We visited the towns of Jericho, Capernum, Cana, Nazareth, and Samaria. We visited the traditional Holy Sites – the birth place of Jesus, the Western Wall, the Garden Tomb, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the Upper Room, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Holocaust Museum, and various other sites. We had a boat ride on the Sea of Galiliee and floated in the Dead Sea. We stayed in Bethlehem, Tiberias, and Jerusalem. I took over 2,000 pictures – which might have been a bit excessive.

I describe the trip as two separate, yet connected, experiences. The first is the experience I prepared for. There is a sacredness to walking the same land as Jesus walked, and to immersing

church experience. Perhaps Millennials are simply the first to clearly articulate it, and demand it. I realize this barely touches the tip of the iceberg regarding the discussion of "what are you looking in a church"? So, let's keep this conversation going.



We'll be starting a new 6-week worship series on Sunday April 15 "WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FOR?"

What are you looking for? It is the question Jesus asks of the disciples in the

first chapter of John's Gospel. They never really answer Jesus, instead asking their own question: "Rabbi, where are you staying?" Jesus doesn't really answer their question either, instead inviting them deeper into the questions.

Aren't we confronted with the same question? When it comes to your spiritual journey, what are you looking for? When it comes to being a part of this St. Luke's community, what are you looking for? In this series we will explore this question through six themes: **questions, grace, belonging, change, inclusive relationship, home.** These themes point to who we are and where we're headed; they help us better engage the question: What are you looking for?

Join the conversation. And let's keep in mind Niehwhof's overarching conclusion-because who we are and our authentic engagement matters! See you around!

experience of the Holy Land was moving and meaningful.

The second experience was related to the current conflict between Israel and Palestine. I thought I had an understanding of the situation, but it was a superficial understanding. After having dinner in the home of a Palestinian Christian in Bethlehem, spending time at the Separation Wall, and hearing stories from those living under occupation, I have a new level of awareness and understanding.

This second experience of the current climate in Israel and Palestine was not unrelated to the first experience of walking the steps of Jesus. Jesus lived under Roman occupation. His movements were limited and his life was shaped by a culture and religion not his own. Two thousand years after the death of Jesus, there is still conflict over the Holy Land, and conflict in the Holy Land. There is still occupation in a land connected to three major world religions who all work for peace.

The trip to the Holy Land reminded me of how much work we still have to do as people of faith. This trip to the Holy Land reminded me how relevant the Gospels remain to this day. This trip reaffirmed my faith in unexpected ways, and I am grateful for the experience.



# Meet **Missionary Donna Pewo**



The United Methodist denomination has hundreds of missionaries serving in the US and around the world. They come from everywhere (not just the United States) and go just about everywhere. They serve in a variety of areas, including children's ministries, education, medicine, sustainable agriculture and development and local church support.

One of these missionaries is Donna Pewo, who is the director of the Clinton Indian Church and Community Center in Oklahoma. She ministers with Cheyenne and Arapaho Native American children and youth. This ministry is helping to rebuild a relationship between the United Methodist Church and these tribes, with whom we have had a tragic

The Community Center helps children and families with their needs for school. It also provides a warm, caring place for the children and youth to have a meal together, pray and study the Bible, play games, work on computers, watch movies and do crafts. Special programs are held for holidays and the youth go on field trips and mission trips. Donna encourages the children and youth to do well in school.

St. Luke's has a special, so-called "Covenant" relationship with Donna. One of our members donates yearly to the United Methodist Missionary fund in Donna's honor and in return, we have a wonderful connection with her. She has visited St. Luke's and we have gone to visit her. UMW and Seasoned Voyagers have supported her ministry. It is interesting to see her postings on Facebook and receive her newsletters.

We plan to continue this connection with Donna in the years to come!

# **Mission Opportunities** for Small Groups or Families

Dorothy Day, the world-renowned founder of the Catholic Worker Movement and an advocate with poor people, was asked by someone how to live the gospel. She replied, "Stay close to the poor." She could have said "help" the poor, instead said a more challenging "stay close." By being close to people in need we are in turn spiritually fed and learn so much about people's life stories and the workings of our community and the world. St. Luke's small groups have provided Thursday night dinners for LoveINC clients, which they always appreciate. Here are four more local opportunities for your family or small groups to have encounters with people who are struggling economically or socially:

- **Urban Peak:** Groups of 2-6 people ages 12 and up are invited to donate and prepare either breakfast or lunch for 40-45 homeless youth the Urban Peak shelter, 1630 South Acoma (near Evans and Broadway). - Denver Inner City Parish Senior **Program, Denver:** Bring and prepare a meal to eat with the Seniors at Denver Inner City Parish. Hear their stories and play bingo. See http://dicp.org/community-support/seniors/ or call Evelyn at 303-629-0636.



# Mindful Travel – Adventure with a Purpose CULTURE & CONNECTIONS IN HONDURAS



In the early morning hours of February 2, thirteen St. Luke's sojourners gathered to begin our journey to Honduras. We traveled with excitement, with 300 books, and with the hope for connection with one another and with the people of Honduras. The St. Luke's community contributed generously to purchase books and school supplies, and they blessed both the books and the travelers on this journey.

We landed in San Pedro Sula, Honduras, exchanged American dollars for the local Lempira, and loaded our small bus for a journey through tropical lowlands and high


cloud forests. We spent our first night in a hotel along the beautiful shores of Lake Yojoa. Raindrops drummed us to sleep, and we awoke to beautiful birdsong. We continued our journey on to the Abundant Life Christian School in Yamaranguila, where we arrived in time for their annual Cultural Festival. Parents had constructed lovely "champas," (huts) that displayed the unique foods, crafts, and traditions of different areas within Honduras. The school children, beautifully outfitted in colorful costumes, entertained us with traditional music and dance. Exploring the champas, tasting the foods, and connecting with parents and children provided a welcome introduction to Honduras. It was clear that ALCS is deeply connected to the families and communities it serves.

The ALCS is part of a network of schools that provide a high quality, bilingual, Christian education to children in rural Honduras. The school in Yamaranguila was started by Rachel Suby-Long Compaan and her husband Jake. Rachel's journey to Honduras began with her experiences on St. Luke's mission trips to Guatemala. Rachel and Jake launched the school with 30 students in early 2015, and the school now serves more than 350 students, from kindergarten through seventh grade. A new grade is added each year to support students through high school graduation. Many of the students will be the first in their families to graduate from high school. The Abundant Life network has a solid track record for students moving on to college, including colleges in the United States, with scholarship support. We were all inspired by the transformational work in which Rachel and Jake and their staff are engaged

During our visit to the Abundant Life Christian School in Yamaranguila, we set up a new library and introduced students to the new books. We also planned, plotted, and planted a hummingbird garden. The garden was built with funds from a memorial to David Johnston of St. Luke's; David's wife Janet was a member of our travel group. We dedicated the garden to the children of the ALCS of Yamaranguila in a simple and moving service.

In Yamaranguila we also visited the Talitha Cumi home for young girls, where approximately 20 girls (2-17 years) live in a safe, nurturing cottage environment. "Talitha Cumi" is Aramaic, roughly translates "Little girl, rise up," and comes

from a story in the Gospel of Mark. We attended church services with the children, who also gave us a tour of their beautiful property, introducing us to the chickens, pigs, goats, and other animals that live there.



hotel hosted Rachel and Jake's wedding four years ago. Its beautiful location along a tumbling river and proximity to Pico Celaque, Honduras's tallest mountain, encouraged our thoughts of return visits.

We spent three days in Copan visiting the Mayan ruins, a beautiful coffee plantation, a restorative hot springs, a Tea and Chocolate shop, and a bird sanctuary. We also explored the streets and businesses of this delightful small city. Our experiences connected us with local Hondurans, who spoke passionately of their commitment to restoring the land, which has suffered from deforestation and soil-depleting agricultural practices.

As we traveled through Honduras, we stayed in small hotels that offered opportunities to connect with their gracious staffs. We ate deliciously prepared, locally sourced food in restaurants catering to local Hondurans. We were, more often than not, the only Americans around, and we were blessed by the warmth and generous spirit of the Honduran people. Daily group reflection experiences provided the time and space to consider deeply our experiences in the context of pilgrimage, connection, and God's grace. — Jane Staller

Four times a year the Board of Trustees sponsors "Service Saturday." This is a church wide work day - a type of 'spring cleaning' once every season - and all church members are invited to help. Our last Service Saturday was March 30, and we want to thank the families and individuals who came out to help us get the church building and property ready for Easter.

The Board of Trustees is a group of about 15 volunteers whose

job is to make sure our church property is safe, clean, heated/ cooled, and ready for the many ministry programs and events that happen at St. Luke's. These 15 individuals work hard throughout the year, but they can't do it alone.

Did you know - our church building has over 1,000 light bulbs, and there is always at least one bulb needing replaced (this doesn't include the 22 parking lot lights). And,

# More with Les: Stephen Hawking

During the last supper with his disciples, Jesus says. "I will not leave you fatherless. I will come to you. Yet a little while and the world will see me no more. But you will see me." (John 4:18-19)

Jesus knows his arrest is imminent and he may be killed soon; he offers his disciples encouragement to carry on his ministry after he is gone.

I thought about this passage as I read the obituary notice on Stephen Hawking in *The Denver Post* last week. Hawking's death did not leave us without his help; we continue to know him and learn from him in his writings and revelations about the physical world where we live.

He produced a masterwork of popular science, one that guided a generation of enthusiasts through the esoteric world of anti-particles, quarks and quantum theory. His success in turn transformed him into a massively popular scientist, one as familiar to the wider world through his appearances on prime time television as his work on cosmology and black holes.

Hawking was a hero for me on two levels, first he made the complex mechanics of the working of the Universe more understandable and exciting, for me and other Physics nerds, in his book, "A Brief History of Time;" and second, he did all this while dealing with a progressive disease that usually kills people at a relatively young age.

Hawking died Wednesday, March 14, at age 70 from ALS, "Lou Gehrig's Disease," leaving behind an understanding of the universe that opened up many paths of inquiry in Physics that had not existed before. His influence will continue for a very long time.

As Professor of Mathematics at Cambridge University, Hawking was involved in the search for the great goal of physics – a "unified theory." Such a theory would resolve the contradictions between Einstein's General Theory of Relativity, which describes the laws of gravity that govern the motion of large objects such as planets, and the Theory of Quantum Mechanics, which deals with the world of subatomic particles.

For Hawking, the search was almost a religious quest. He wrote, "A complete, consistent unified theory is only the first step: our goal is a complete understanding of the events around us, and of our own existence." Finding a "theory of everything," he said, would allow mankind to "know the mind of God."

He followed up his first book with a sequel, "The Universe in a Nutshell," which updated readers on concepts such as supergravity, naked singularities and the possibility of an 11-dimensional universe.

But if you are working to put together your grocery shopping list, or figuring out how much fertilizer the lawn needs this spring, you probably have not put much thought into the theories of Relativity or Quantum Mechanics. You may not really care about whether or not the universe has eleven dimensions. And that's okay; you don't need to know how a clock works to tell the time.

But it is important that we see Hawking's achievements as guides to our thinking about our own relationship to this physical world, it's inhabitants and it's creation. On another level, it's equally important to see his amazing longevity as proof that even the most severe disabilities need not stop people from achieving great things. *God bless us all! Les*


## **Seasoned Voyagers Spring into Action**
