Family Camp Inspirations: Where Have You Experienced God This Summer?


My family and I were blessed to experience St. Luke's Family Camp for the first time this year. This was the 19th year church members joined for a week of camping. In my first two years at St. Luke's, I've heard stories about Family Camp, but had no idea what we were getting into.

Each day, families gather together for breakfast and dinner, along with scheduled activities. Everything from tubing, to swimming, to night hiking, to tie dying, to banner making, to roller skating, to campfires, to making ice cream, to kickball games... just to name a few. The level of organization and coordination is amazing, thanks to a great leadership team.

I've learned over time, that there is a different level of connection that occurs when we step out of our normal routines and patterns, and spend time with others. A different level of connection when we cook and clean side by side with people we wouldn't normally spend this kind of time with. A different level of connection when we step outside our comfort zones and build trust and friendship. A different level of connection when take time to pause, and simply be present with those around us.

Not only was it meaningful to spend a few days at Family Camp this summer, but it was even more meaningful watching and experiencing the community that has been formed by the families that participate. What a great opportunity this week offers to the individuals and families in our faith community.

On the last morning I led a brief worship, based on the simple question, "Where have you experienced God this

As we move into a new school year and a new season, I hope we might all remember to make time for moments of connection – connect with God and with others.

cont. from pg. 1 This transition year helped us reassess why we facilitate this food drive each fall and how we want to move forward with it over the upcoming years. We have discerned to partner with the Food Exchange Resource Network (FERN), whose vision is a collaborative, coordinated hunger relief system that supplies those in need with adequate, timely, and healthy supplies of food. FERN has 13 partner and member organizations, who serve as the food pantries, distributing the food to families in need throughout the south metro community. In 2017, the combined efforts of the food pantries supplied 165,991 individuals with fresh produce, dairy, meat, and bakery items, as well as non-perishable goods.

Along with the transition to the FERN partnership, the structure of the weekend will be a little different: the drive will be held Friday, September 28-Sunday the 30th. We will be filling stores with volunteers on Friday and Saturday, then Sunday will be gathering food at St. Luke's and loading up the semi-trailer following the last service (no stores on Sunday). The 5K Run/Walk will be held on Saturday morning the 29th. Our goal is to raise 50K lbs of food to support these many families in need right in our community and \$15K in financial donations to help FERN purchase a new forklift for their warehouse.

Soundtrack Reflections

We are in the last few weeks of our "Soundtrack: Songs That Help Us Find God In Everyday Life" worship series. We have covered various genres of music—everything from classic rock to contemporary

rap to old church hymns. We have

put these songs in conversation with some well-known (and some not so well-known) biblical stories as we pointed to where God is active in our lives and in the world. What a fun series this has been!



You might remember, we began with a story from the Old Testament book of 1 Kings 19. Elijah is in a tough spot. He's angry and exhausted and hungry and, he's paranoid that people are after him. God tells Elijah to go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by. Elijah was ready and waiting for his big moment when God was going to give him all the answers, give him his path, tell him exactly what he was supposed to do with his life. And big things happen strong winds, an earthquake, fire:

> but Yahweh was not in the wind. but Yahweh was not in the earthquake. but Yahweh was not in the fire. then came a gentle whisper. (The ancient Hebrew translates it as "a thin blowing sound.")

God was found in the thin blowing sound—the stillness, the quiet, the whisper, the ordinary. It's such a true story, isn't it? I mean, how often are we like Elijah? We look for the neon sign, the thunder, for it to be written in the sky, "Someone just tell me what to do here!" But it's not found in that. It's found in the... the ordinary.

As the summer days are coming to a close, as our series is wrapping up, take time to reflect on your life and the world around you. Take a seat. Take a breath. Turn on your favorite tunes. Push play on one of your most beloved songs... then play it again. Maybe you've been looking for God everywhere, you've been trying really hard: "God, if you'd just show up..." But are you taking time to listen? Are you finding the stillness? Perhaps God is whispering back: "I'm right here and I've been here the whole time." Keep sitting—don't get up just yet. Take another breath. Go ahead, hit play again. Look around you. Isn't God everywhere?

I don't know about you but I tend to have the deepest experiences with God on the most ordinary days and in the most unremarkable moments. But these days are good and these moments are sustaining.

We began with the story about Elijah and finding God and our true self in the ordinary. We also began with the song "Home" by Justin Furstenfeld. It's a song about finding God and the essence of life in the most everyday lifeness of life. We play this song often in the Canaday kitchen—as we're getting ready for school or making dinner (or doing something completely random.) It reminds me to stay grateful, to look for God and joy and beauty in the most ordinary. In fact, I'm gonna hit "play" again right now. The chorus goes like this:

> Like dancing in the kitchen in the pale moonlight Only care in the world is that our kids are alright Daddy loves mama, mama loves him Tomorrow we get to do it over again Smile at me baby take my breath away With the good Lord willing I'll be happy to say Daddy loves mama, mama loves him Tomorrow we get to do it over again



In 1892 identical twins from Scotland made one of the most important scriptural discoveries of modern times. As wealthy widows they funded an expedition that took them to St. Catherine's Monastery at Mount Sinai where they literally uncovered an ancient Syriac version of the Gospels, one of the oldest known to date. It was written in the language spoken by Jesus. Their

self-study and connection to the scholarly world brought those texts to light in a dramatic way! Come hear their story and see what the manuscript revealed about the lost ending of the book of Mark.

Collecting Kit Supplies for UMCOR - Be Part of our Mission Experience!

In the aftermath of a hurricane or tornado, UMCOR (the United Methodist Committee on Relief) sends hygiene kits, cleanup buckets and school supply kits to disaster survivors to bring them support and comfort. These kits and buckets are assembled and stored at two major warehouses, one of which is the UMCOR West Depot in Salt Lake City. On behalf of St. Luke's, a team of 10 members will go to Salt Lake City September 9-15 to volunteer at the Depot. We will be assembling kits and working in the community. If you would like to be part of this mission, we invite you to donate supplies for hygiene kits, which we will take with us to the Depot.

The list of needed supplies, which is on the home page of stlukeshr.com, is very specific. A donation bin is in the missions closet. Come join us by donating any of the items on the list!

Hygiene Kit Materials

- One hand towel (15 x 25 17 x 27 inches)
 - No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels
- One washcloth
- One comb
 - Must be sturdy with at least 6 inches of teeth
 - No pocket combs or picks
 - Rattail and combs without handles are acceptable but must have at least 6 inches of teeth
- · One toenail or fingernail clipper
 - » No emery boards or metal nail files
- Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger)
 - » No Ivory or Jergen's soap
 - » Do not remove from packaging
- One adult toothbrush
 - » Do not remove from packaging
 - Personal advertising not acceptable
- 10 adhesive bandages (34 by 3 inches)
 - » Common household bandages acceptable
- One one-gallon size re-sealable bag

Post Modern Methodism

Methodism does not have a creedal statement. Instead we are called to try and live our lives for the love of God and our neighbors. Different groups of Methodists have found different ways of living this call that fit the time and place that they were in. As times and places change, so did the way Methodists express their faith.

The St Luke's community is asking itself, how do we live meaningful lives that express our faith in the 21st century? Fortunately, we have a 300-year tradition that helps guide us. During the next several months, I'll try and highlight the parts of the tradition that our community has used to guide it on our faith journey into the 21st century. —Monty Hoffman

That led me to reflect on my own school years and how school supplies, as well as school in general, have changed. Today, kids' supplies are more tech-oriented, and as technology has changed so rapidly, many of the supplies that you and I might have used, have fallen by the wayside.

Test your memory with these pictures. Which do you remember? Do you think of them fondly? Are there some that you're glad you don't have to deal with anymore.



How about the Big Chief Tablet? Got mine each fall for the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grades.

To go along with the tablet, were lead pencils, #2 lead. Some things never change, even if the brand and box changes, Typical classrooms for elementary schools tended to follow a standard format during my school years. This classroom has the usual features: A blackboard with eraser tray, Cursive alphabet on the wall showing both capital and lower cast letter letters. And individual desks lined up in rows.



Metal Lunch Boxes with thermos bottles were the rage in the late 1950's and '60's. I lived only a few blocks from the school and if I didn't eat at the school lunchroom, I would walk home for the midday meal.

Something else now gone from schools is the Ditto machine used for making multiple copies of exams, announcements or any other document intended for distribution to a large group. I can still remember the characteristic smell of the copies! They were usually located at the school office, a place many of us tried to avoid as much as possible.

As we grew older and began taking more advanced classes in school, the supplies become more complex. Geek that I am, I really liked Geometry and the Compass & Protractor sets in High School. They have been replaced by computer aided digital drawing.

Then came the premier status symbol for any student who was into math and science, the Slide Rule! Mine was a Keuffel & Esser K&E 4081-3 Duplex Slide Rule with leather case.

Gone, replaced with newer technology or methods but not forgotten. And I have a longer list!

SLY MISSION TRIP SUMMER!

2018 SLY Guatemala Team Outruns Volcano to Cap Off Another Amazing Experience in Lemoa!



The team of 32 arrived to continue work on homes for 2 families and a kitchen for another. The week was filled with adventure (bus rides, market day, and early AM mortar fireworks), blessings (Sisters Helen and Connie, 19 student visits, and time with our local Guatemala team members), and... well, WORK.

After early morning breakfast and "60 second Devo" time, the three teams headed out to the work sites and to begin to meet their families - in each case single parent families headed by the

mom. It was a blessing to work with the families and just a little bit of play time, too!

With MANY thanks to Children's Ministry through the amazing cast of the St. Luke's Children's Dinner Theater, their donations enabled us to add another 107 families to the water filter project started by our own SavannahAnne Carlson in 2014. This brings our total to 460 families, and according to our partner EcoFiltro, improving the lives and health of over 14,720 people. Our goal for 2019 is another 100 plus families!!!

About that volcano - Fuego erupted less than 10 minutes after we went airborne, and closed the airport less than an hour after we took off. While all our Guatemalan teammates and their families have let us know they were safe, we were saddened to hear that at least 109 others lost their lives.

We will be returning to Lemoa in May of 2019 to continue our work with the beautiful people of Guatemala. – Dave Laurvick

Jr. High Mission Builds Relationships in Crownpoint

On July 8th at 4:35am, 32 youth and 12 adults from our church and Northglenn United Methodist headed to Crownpoint, NM. Crownpoint, which is approximately 570 miles from Highlands Ranch, has a demographic very different than the south Denver community. Not only was the population around 2,300 people, but 90% of the population is Native Americans with a median



income of \$30,000. For this particular mission trip, our church partnered with Next Step ministries. Next Step's motto is "where short mission trips collide with long-term community development" and our group of 44 experienced this during our week there. In addition to making our meals and a schedule that keeps us occupied, they set up construction projects and offered opportunities of devotion and worship throughout the day to discuss and think about our relationships with God. Each morning after breakfast and devotion, our group which was divided into 4 work teams headed to their assigned building project. Two of the teams remained at the Lighthouse church where we stayed for the week. One of those two

groups built a wheelchair ramp and the other group disassembled palates and then put them on the ceiling of the outdoor pavilion. Of the groups that went off-site, one group built a lean to and redid a section of dry wall on the ceiling. The other group built a shed. Owen Metz said that his favorite part of the trip was "getting to meet new friends and having fun while working for a good cause."

Upon finishing our day's work and thankfully almost always under sunny skies, everyone took a 5-minute shower, had some free time, and headed off to a yummy dinner in which some of the church's community would attend. The evening was filled with devotions that had videos, singing, and a time of reflection. We would follow this with dessert and time for smaller prayer groups.

On Thursday, the members of the community set up stands for those visiting to purchase jewelry and made tacos for dinner on incredible fry bread. Tessa Smith, one of the youth on the trip, said that her favorite part was "...getting to know members of the community. In the beginning they told us that the people may not talk to them or have eye contact, so it made me feel good that I was able to talk with them and get to know them." Our group headed to Arizona on Friday to hike Window Rock, go to the Navajo Nation Museum and Zoo. Later that night, the entire group hopped in the car and drove to a grocery store parking lot where we had a fantastic community barbecue with lots of burgers, football, and fun. As we departed on Saturday after saying goodbye to the amazing staff at Next Step, we headed to Durango, CO where we took a mild rafting trip down the Animas River. We were fortunate to be able to stay at Durango High School that evening where the adults and other students imparted knowledge to our 18 outgoing 8th graders about how to be successful as they are soon to head into high school. Sunday morning came early with departure time of 6:00am to head back home. We arrived home at 1:15pm and were greeted by family and friends. —Ann Metz

Meaningful Work in NM on Sr. High Trip

June 17-23, 73 adults & youth of the SLY community went to the Crownpoint, New Mexico Native American Reservation, for the annual senior high mission trip. This is the largest group we've ever had! Many of the youth and adult sponsors (myself included) look forward to the mission trip each year as a time to get away from their daily routines, make new friends, and serve God.



We stayed with a group called Next Step: an organization that sets up centers all over the world for teams to come and complete short

term mission work. The group of people in Crownpoint this year were very welcoming and kind, and they even made us dessert every night! Since there were so many of us, we were split into 8 work teams of between 8-10 people. My group worked on building a wheelchair ramp for a family home, while others did projects such as painting, flooring,



drywall, and building a ramp at the church where we were staying. The youth on my team worked so hard; they even had to dig post holes for the ramp through solid rock in the hot sun, and they hardly complained at all! Although the dogs on the reservation

are essentially wild and we are told not to touch them, our site had two small puppies that kept everyone entertained from afar.

On one evening, the members of the church cooked us Navajo tacos, and several of the locals came and sold their handmade jewelry. On our last night, we held a community cookout in the parking lot of the grocery store and got to meet the people we were helping. It is events like these that make the work we're doing so meaningful. It is such a cool experience for our youth to get to step outside of their everyday environments and get to know people from different backgrounds and life experiences. On our way back to Colorado, we spent the night in Durango for our fun day. We did river tubing, which was a lot of fun, but left several people quite sun burnt!

This mission trip was a great way to witness the amazing work that youth can do, and I already can't wait for next summer! —*Liza Nolder*
