What has two thousand legs; lives in fifty states, Africa, Europe and the Philippines; and for ten days will stay in Cleveland, Ohio? Give up?

The delegates to the United Methodist General Conference.

These delegates, half clergy, half laity, represent almost ten million members and over forty thousand churches. They are elected by representatives to Annual Conferences (typically, part of a state, or in our case, three states.) Annual Conferences meet every year (annually!), and General Conferences meet every four years. In 1996 the conference met in Denver. This year they will meet in Cleveland, from May 2-12. The General Conference is the legislative body of The United Methodist Church, and is the only body that can speak "officially" for our denomination. Both conferences reflect our version of participatory democracy. Esther will be there for part of the sessions, to present a report on Korean-American ministries.

The General Conference revises The Book of Discipline (a book which outlines church law, doctrine, administration, organization, etc.) and "Social Principles" and adopts resolutions on various current moral, social, public policy and economic issues. It also approves plans and budgets for church-wide programs for the next four years. The delegates can propose amendments to the church's Constitution but those must be ratified later in the annual conferences. (Any member may petition the General Conference through a process outlined in our Discipline.) General Conference also elects members of the Judicial Council, the church's "supreme court," and some members of church-wide agencies.

There will be, as always, some hot topics, and some boring topics. As a United Methodist, you are not obliged to agree necessarily with the outcome of any particular vote. I don't. But the votes, however divided, represent our collective struggle with who we are, and where we are going, at this time.



### The Sermon

Early last month, a sermon was delivered that bothered me a bit. Actually, it bothered me a lot. Part of the message was in direct conflict with one of my deepest and strongest beliefs. I left the church feeling slightly offended. Throughout the remainder of the day, as I continued to think about it, I managed to get myself more and more worked up. I quickly went from being slightly offended, to perturbed, and moved right into being torked off. At that point, I vowed to write about the injustice. Throughout the next week, I did my research. I was bent on supporting my opinion with all the latest information available through private and governmental studies. I pulled facts from Newsweek magazine, the local newspapers, and the Internet. I was hot. Venom was running through my veins. Never had I worked so hard and agonized so much over an article. It was going to be nothing short of a masterpiece. I would have my day! Then, about a week before the press date, it hit me like a freight train. I had been tricked! It was a con! The sermon that had gotten me so worked up had actually accomplished the desired results. It stimulated additional thought and deliberation, forcing me to think through the issue and thoroughly analyze my attitudes and feelings.

I remembered reading about some of the harshly critical and judgmental letters an agitated Abraham Lincoln occasionally wrote to his generals, most of which were never sent. After releasing his anger, he would typically come to his good senses and set the letter aside, acknowledging the existence of more than one valid view or perspective. It was then I realized I needed to set my article aside.

In our church where diversity is embraced with love, acceptance, and justice, it would be easily justifiable for our leadership to avoid controversial issues. I applaud Dr. Evans and Esther Miyahara-Cho for having the courage to toe the line and deliver energetic, thought-provoking sermons and sometimes even getting the followers worked up, although it'll be okay with me if they pick someone else next time. I hope and trust they will continue down this path.

Q: How did the books of the Bible come together and what other books might be considered sacred writings?

• A: The sacred writings for Jesus, John the Baptist, Paul, the Disciples, and all the Early Christians were the Jewish Scriptures. The word "Scriptures" in the New Testament refers only to this body of literature. Christians now call

this the "Old Testament" of the Christian Bible. The canon of the "Old Testament", that is, the books considered "Scripture" in the Jewish community, was already established by the time of Jesus' life, through a long history of collection and editing.

The earliest Christian texts (Paul's letters) were written 20 years after Jesus' life, the Gospels at least 40 years, and other books in the New Testament about 60 to 80 years after Jesus' resurrection. From the mid-first to mid-second century A.D., many varieties of writings about Jesus circulated among different Christian communities, reflecting a diversity of theological opinion.

The early church in the second and third centuries made decisions about which writings should be considered authoritative, first in local councils of elders, and later, after Constantine adopted Christianity as the state religion of the Roman Empire in 313 A.D, through institutional councils of Bishops. Criteria used for the selection of texts included "orthodoxy" ("right opinion" according to doctrine determined by councils of Bishops), "apostolic origin" (source of teaching going back to an Apostle), general acceptance by churches, and whether they had been cited by bishops. By 400 A.D., the 27 books in our New Testament today were generally accepted as Christian Scripture.

Works that were not in line with these criteria were discarded or destroyed. Archaeological discoveries in the last 50 years have produced some of these writings previously lost to us. The most significant discovery is a collection of writings called the Nag Hammadi Texts, found buried in Egypt in 1948. Among such recent finds are The Gospel of Mary, The Gospel of Thomas, and the Gospel of Peter.

Even Christians today differ about what exactly is included in its canon. For example, in addition to the 27 books in our New Testament, a collection of books known as the Apocrypha is included in some Christian Bibles (including the Roman Catholic Bible), and another collection, called the Pseudepigrapha, while never considered canonical in any tradition, has long been considered worth reading by many, though not necessary for salvation.

If you are interested in exploring this question further, you might consider joining an adult education class studying these topics at St. Luke's!

The woman also requested to be buried with her favorite Bible. Everything was in order and the pastor was preparing to leave when the woman suddenly remembered something very important to her.

"There's one more thing," she said excitedly. "What's that?" came the pastor's reply. "This is very important," the woman continued. "I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand."

The pastor stood looking at the woman, puzzled by the request. The woman explained. "In all my years of attending church socials and potluck dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, 'Keep your fork.' It was my favorite part because I knew that something better was coming...like velvety chocolate cake or deep-dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance! ## Cambodia: Far Away and Close to Home

You can be part of a unique outreach opportunity to Cambodia—whether you stay right here in the U.S., or choose to take a challenging and rewarding trip to the Far East. Over the next nine months, the St. Luke's community will have the opportunity to make a difference in the lives of people from a rural village in Cambodia.

As a nation, the Cambodian people have suffered tremendous social, political and humanitarian injustices in the very recent past. In fact, organized religion was officially outlawed by the government until the early 1990's. However, now that restrictions regarding religion have been loosened, St. Luke's has an opportunity to support mission work that will strengthen the community of Siam Reap and help provide a brighter, more promising future for the children of the region.

Our work as a church will really consist of two phases. In the first phase, Dalay Dy, a Cambodian woman from the village of Siam Reap will be "adopted" by our church family for a period of 2-3 weeks between July 22 and August 20. During her stay she will live with Esther Miyahara-Cho and Dick Evans. Dalay is interested in learning what it means to be part of a Methodist church in the United States, and hopes to learn more about pursuing a career in ministry. While the details of her stay are not yet final, she will become a familiar presence around the church during her visit, and hopefully many people will take the time to get to know her and include her in activities that make her feel welcome in our church community.

The second phase of our church's involvement will be a mission work trip to the village of Siam Reap in January 2001. A group from St. Luke's will work and live among Dalay's friends and family for two weeks, and will offer whatever assistance is most needed at the time. The current expectation is that the mission group will help build a community center as part of the village's larger efforts to improve opportunities for education, healthcare, agricultural development, etc.



Heather Bomberger will graduate with the first class of seniors at Thunder Ridge High School on May 27. After graduation she


plans on playing, rafting, traveling with her family and working with her dad at Public Service Company. Heather will major in Elementary Education at Western State College.
