The Elevator Campaign at St. Luke's

"St. Luke's is an inclusive community of faith, seeking to meet people where they are..." This is, in part, the mission statement of St. Luke's. But experiencing all that St. Luke's has to offer is harder for some of us than it is for others. Differently abled members and visitors face very real barriers in experiencing the fullness of Christ at St. Luke's.

Choosing between worship service and Sunday School because it's just too difficult to do both is a reality for some of our members. Did you know that people in wheelchairs have to go outside St. Luke's in order to get from the sanctuary to Sunday School? Did you know that they have to fight traffic, traveling through the parking lot to get from one floor to another, because the sidewalks aren't fully accessible? These scenarios don't even take into account the elderly, or people who come here with knee injuries and the like.

John Mann believes that building an elevator will change all of that. Part of the plan for our new sanctuary, building the elevator was postponed while some electrical issues were sorted out with Douglas County. And now it's time to get started.

Deb came to St. Luke's in 1993 because, "I was looking for a good youth group to work with." Simultaneously, St. Luke's was looking for someone to help with Jr. High. What a match! She volunteered until 1995, when she took six months off after Margaret was born. She returned to her volunteer work with youth, then in the fall of 1996 came on our staff part-time, as director of Jr. High ministries.

In 1995, Deb began the process to become a diaconal minister, a service ministry with a focus on youth. One of my clearest memories is her interview with SPRC, as she began that process. Her joy in working with middle school youth came bubbling out. She reported that after the hiatus to have a baby, as she was driving to the church for a youth function, she was so excited, and thought to herself, "Oh my gosh, this is a sickness! I didn't know how much I missed it."

Among other things, Deb has lead confirmation for several years. One of her delights has been helping the youth write their faith statements, and watching them grow in their faith. She also involved our youth in the Special Olympics, and was part of the planning for our "special needs" worship service earlier this year.

Deb finished her educational requirements for the diaconal ministry, and was consecrated in June of 1999. Part of her career goals has been to expand her ministry, while keeping her focus on youth. She has recently accepted a position with Hope United Methodist, where she will be Minister to Youth, as well as begin a young adult ministry, and be involved in the worship services there.

Thank you, Deb, for your ministry to St. Luke's, through your work with youth, leaders and staff; with relationships, retreats, "Columbine" and confirmation. We will miss you, but trust your "sickness" will be contagious with the people at Hope.

we've already raised more than \$25,000 (of the \$65,000 needed) towards the cost of the elevator," says Mann.

The "Not Under Construction Zone" near the church office is the work of an anonymous elevator fairy. Elevator signs throughout the church are helping to raise awareness about the accessibility issue.

St. Luke's Youth (SLY) made a video from the perspective of someone in a wheelchair getting from the sanctuary to Sunday school. The video will be shown during August services to help raise awareness about the elevator campaign.

"If people understand about the need for an elevator and pray about it, the right things are going to happen," says Mann, who hopes that the congregation will be able to celebrate having enough money for our elevator at the Fall kickoff on September 9.

The Conveners

What are Conveners, and why would you want to meet them? St. Luke's ministry structure is designed to support and facilitate all our small groups to work toward their goals and to be Invitational, Relational, and Missional. All small groups (e.g., a fellowship group, adult Christian education class, a working team) will be supported by one of six Ministry Support Teams. These Teams are contacts and supporters for all the ministries in their area; the Conveners head the Ministry Support Teams. Conveners bring together representatives from all small groups in their domain to decide how the needs of each small group can be met, and how the groups can best work together to further the ministries and missions of St. Luke's. On page 5 in *The Chronicle*, the six Ministry Support Teams and their areas of concentration are described. The Conveners will play important roles in helping all the member-ministers of St. Luke's focus on whatever St. Luke's ministry they are passionate about. Each brings experiences and passion for St. Luke's to their position. They also are a few examples of the many volunteers who are the ministers of our church. Below, the Conveners are listed by Support Team, with what they told *The Chronicle* they were passionate about.

Education: Dave Money

Passion: Dave is an attorney but is working on being licensed to serve as a local pastor. He especially enjoys preaching when Dick Evans is away. You might remember his appearance in costume last year as Rev. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism.

Fellowship: Heather Harding

Passion: "Helping people discover their faith."

Ministry Development: Martha Boon

Passion: "I am passionate about people. People being connected in some way with our St. Luke's community. By being connected we develop deeper relationships with each other and God. I love being involved, working with others and exploring the potential of our church!"

Missions: Laurie Gilbert

Passion: "I've always been interested in mission work. I can't think of a better way to share my God, my faith and my love for all of God's people. I've always liked the 'hands on' experience missions offers. Also, meeting people one on one enhances the sharing life experience for me. I've noticed through out the past years, that if I just push out of my comfort zone even a little, enough to put God's love into action, he always takes care of the details."

Worship: Kay Coryell

Passion: "I am passionate about letting the children of St. Luke's know they are an important part of our congregation, and by their participation in the many activities provided them such as music/theatre ministry, missions or even being a greeter or acolyte, they will learn and grow in Christ."

Ministry Council: Monty Hoffman

(Helps coordination and mutual support of cross-area programs and ministries)

Executive Board: Dave Laurvick

(Provides church-wide policy and administrative functions)

Passion: "The church family and their sense of mission."

The "Lay"test News: St. Luke's: A Growing Place, A Place to Grow

A Message from our Lay Leaders - By Monty Hoffman

St. Luke's is a fast growing church and much of our effort and money over the last ten years have gone to building the infrastructure and space that this required. Since the new sanctuary has been finished, the leadership of the church has tried to shift the focus to another type of growth, your growth in your relationship with God. Over the last year, St. Luke's members have been working on a new vision and a new structure of ministry to implement it. The primary goal of being invitational, relational, and missional is not just to connect you with St. Luke's, but to help you connect with God.

Look around you as you walk into St. Luke's on a Sunday morning and you will see the challenge that is faced in accomplishing this. You will see people who have been members for over fifteen years and people who are there for the first time. There are people there that are life long Methodists, people who come from other religious traditions, and people who have never had a church home before. Our diversity creates a very dynamic church but it makes planning a program very difficult.

How are we trying to deal with this problem? By pushing the control and decision-making on what program we will have down as far as we can, to each individual member. We are trying to create a system that evolves program out of the passion, desires, commitment, and needs of every one of you. We are trusting in you and in God to create a program at St. Luke's that keeps us connected with each other and keeps each of us connected to God.

How can you become involved in this? If you are a long time member, you should keep asking what do I need and what do I need to do? In her book, *The Battle for God*, Karen Armstrong makes the point that how we are religious and spiritual and what we need from a church and from God changes as the world changes around us. A recent Newsweek article stated that we process more information in a week than our grandparents did in their lifetimes. Our world is changing very quickly. If you feel like it is just not the same church it was when you joined, you are right. I would also suggest that you are not the same person that you were when you joined. Your needs and what you do to stay connected have also changed. The leadership at St. Luke's is trying to give you the power to create the solutions to your needs and to give you the opportunity to do what you need to stay connected to St. Luke's and to God. You need to make a commitment to continually look for your place at St. Luke's; no matter how often that place changes.

If you are new to St. Luke's or new to the church experience, I urge you to find another hour a week for church. Use that hour to look around at St. Luke's to find out what your passion is and what you feel God is calling you to do. You may find your call singing in the choir, attending an adult education class, playing softball, serving people at DenUM or at Safe at St. Paul's, or changing a light bulb in the sanctuary. Church is about a lot of different things for different people and at different times in our lives. When you find your call, make every effort to become involved in or create a program that connects you to St. Luke's and to God.

Whether you have been here 15 years or 15 minutes, we want you to help us create a program that serves the needs of St. Luke's and the world around us. We want you to help us create a program that keeps everyone of us connected to each other and to God. We want you to help us create a program that will allow you to grow in your relationship with God.

interested in being part of Little School, please call.



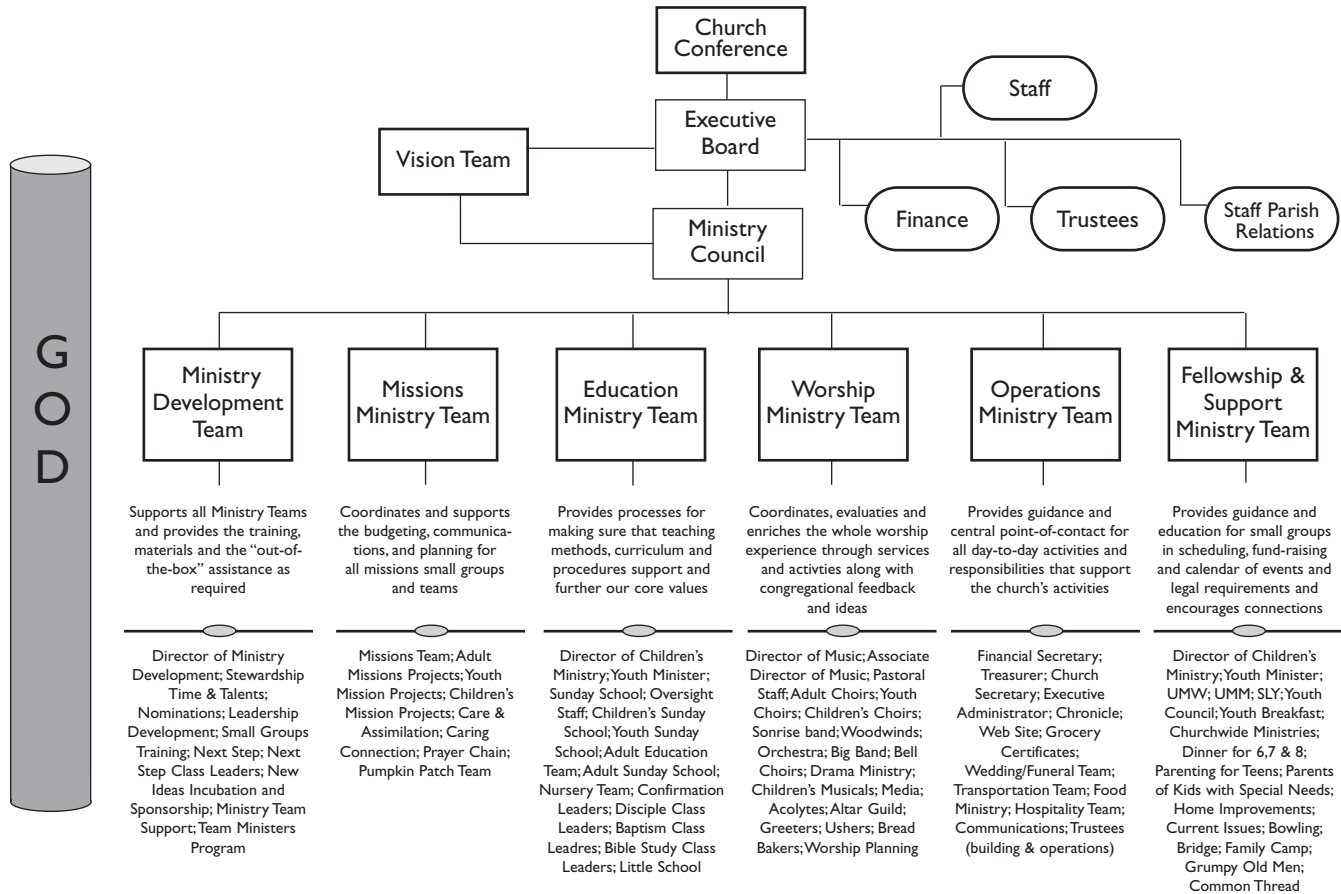

Sharing and Learning at DenUM *By Dennis Becker*

At St. Luke's "Invitational, Relational, Missional" are not only core values on paper. People actually believe and live by these core values. St. Luke's provides invitational, relational, and missional opportunities for its members and constituents.

Anne Necker volunteers with Denver Urban Ministries, or as it is more commonly known, DenUM, one of the missional opportunities at St. Luke's. DenUM is supported primarily by area United Methodist Churches. DenUM's Outreach Service Center at 1717 E. Colfax provides emergency services such as staple, non-perishable food; clothing for men, women and children; funds for utilities and rent and infant supplies of formula, food, diapers and clothing. Furniture is also available. DenUM provides all of these items free or at a very small cost. Other services include job listings and training clients in job application and interviewing skills. Computer training and tutoring clients working on their GED is also available.

Anne has been volunteering at DenUM for over eight years. She currently volunteers two mornings a week. She has worked in job readiness and counseling. Currently she works in Outreach Services doing data entry on the services people receive and greeting people as they come in and help determine what they need.

Certainly the service that DenUM provides to those in need is very important and a way that people can walk in the path of Jesus. But what's in it for Anne? She says the volunteering at DenUM "Grounds me and roots me in reality. We deal with life at its most basic level—food, clothing, shelter—the absolute necessities." A self-confessed "dumpster diver", Anne scrounges in trash cans on her daily walks. She is appalled at what people throw away. "We who have so much are so careless." Anne tells a story of rescuing a small panda bear holding a beach ball from a trash can. Before she could even get it on the shelf at the Outreach Services Center, a client spotted it as a birthday gift for her daughter and was grateful to have this discarded toy to give away.

Anne also sees the joy of generous sharing. Clothing is available at DenUM for 25 cents per item. When one client had only 50 cents to pay for three items of clothing, another client gave him the last 25 cents to make the purchase. One person with very little gladly shared with another.

What can you share at DenUM? At the very least, remember to bring your donations each month and place them in the DenUM bins at the back of the fellowship hall. Or if you'd like to become more missional, call Paris Dunning, Volunteer Coordinator at (303) 355-4896. Paris will match your interests and skills with DenUM's needs and plan a schedule that works for you. You too can learn while you serve.

Planning for **Sunday School 2001-2002** is underway. Please consider being a part of St. Luke's Children's Ministries – **TEACHERS AND VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED!** There are opportunities to serve available in the nursery, preschool, elementary, junior high and high school to share the teaching responsibilities or just help out. We are also looking for individuals to be part of a team of Sunday School superintendents that help each Sunday by directing visitors to their child's classroom, answering general questions, and collecting attendance and offering from the classrooms. Substitutes are also needed to help fill in for illnesses and vacations on an occasional basis.

Curriculum and supplies are provided. Each classroom has a **TEAM** of 4 to 12 individuals that share on a rotating basis the planning, teaching and assisting duties each Sunday. We recruit our teams for a full calendar year, August to August, but because of the size of our teams and the rotating schedule you are only in the classroom 2 or 3 times each month.

We have a great group of teachers and volunteers returning, but we are always looking for good people who want to grow and learn as they help nurture our children in God's word. Having children in Sunday School is not a requirement.

DenUM "DOVE Days" Are Rewarding *By Betsy Keyack*

During May and June, several people from St. Luke's had some rewarding adventures through DenUM's Outreach Volunteer Experience (DOVE) Program. In May, my husband (Ken Fong) and I, along with our daughters, age 7 and 12, spent a day at the Delaney Farm of Denver Urban Gardens. This farm provides space for many families to grow organic produce but it also aids in feeding those in need in Denver. We worked at the farm on behalf of Project Angel Heart, which provides meals to people with HIV/AIDS and terminal illnesses. Delaney Farm is located in the Aurora countryside. On this mild, sunny day, we were responsible for weeding the sugar snap peas garden. It was overrun with weeds, so we really got a sense of accomplishment from our work. The girls also enjoyed finding numerous ladybugs and other insects, as well as, of course, playing in the dirt!

In June, Ken and I, along with Christy Hudson from DenUM, delivered meals for Project Angel Heart. In 2001, this agency will deliver the equivalent of 184,000 meals to an estimated 500 clients. Project Angel Heart depends on more than 225 volunteers per week to serve their clients, and they welcome additional help. On our DOVE Day, Ken, Christy and I delivered about 20 nutritious lunches to people in the Capital Hill area, greatly helping the recipients. I also spent a day with two energetic members of our youth group, Cassie Johnson and Emmy Bauer, at the Food Assistance Program in Denver. At "lightning speed" we packed over 230 food assistance boxes with juice, canned meat, cereal, fruit, vegetables, pasta and peanut butter. We all thought it was fun and it was satisfying to know that we helped feed that many families!

On the same day we were at the Food Assistance Program, Lisa Heaton and Sharon Zavacki, along with their children, went to a holistic elder care center in Denver. The center is a pleasant-looking house in a nice neighborhood near City Park. The DOVE participants had a great experience. Lisa's kids asked "When are we going back?" and they plan to do so. While at the elder care center they did things such as working outside in the garden, folding laundry and carrying groceries into the house.

I highly recommend DenUM's DOVE Program. It is very satisfying to go out and help people. DenUM is aware of the needs of the local community. Through DOVE, one can have a fun and rewarding outreach experience that could be for 1 day or 1 week, with your interests in mind. DenUM can be reached at (303) 355-4896.
