But Dave Money has been active in the Methodist church for a long time as a layman and is delighted to accept this assignment for his first appointment as a licensed local pastor, which allows him to participate in all the sacraments at St Luke's. He plans to work on a Master of Divinity degree at Iliff sometime in the future.

"I was appointed to St Luke's by Bishop Warner Brown on September 9, 2001. What a momentous time to enter the ministry," he paused.

He and his wife Jana and two daughters, Andrea (12) and Erica (5), moved from Salt Lake City to Denver in 1998. His second day in Colorado at the Annual Conference in Ft Collins, he introduced himself to those at lunch and said he was looking for a church. Sitting next to him was Dick Evans who happily announced, "I have a church for you." The commute from Ken Caryl began.

Dave still practices law as a corporate attorney for the First Data Corp, the world's largest processors of credit and debit card transactions. The Money's called Salt Lake City home until 1998. He and Jana were high school sweethearts in Salt Lake City and he went to the University of Utah for a degree as a wildlife biologist. Then he learned that PhD's in wildlife biology were still looking for jobs. So he pursued a Master of Business Administration to have more marketable skills.

His courses in business law lead him to continue on into Law School at the University of

The "Lay" test News: One Does What One Can A Message from our Lay Leaders - By Monty Hoffman

Last month I attended, along with many other members of St. Luke's, the funeral of our friend and long time member, Bill Fethke.We mourned his death and celebrated his life. The many people who attended the funeral witnessed his impact on St. Luke's and the Highlands Ranch community.

Many people recalled stories of Bill's involvement in musical groups at St. Luke's and in Highlands Ranch, but my best memory of Bill involved a time when he was the chair of the finance committee at St. Luke's. When I first joined St. Luke's, the finances of the church were tenuous. At the end of one month, we didn't have the money in the bank to pay our pastor. Bill made an appeal from the pulpit to give a little extra that month.

In that appeal, Bill told a story that I don't remember, but the punch line has always stuck with me as some of the best advice I have ever gotten. It was, "One does what one can". At that time at St. Luke's, it was easy to look at all the obstacles that we had to over come and become despondent. Bill's point was that all we had to do was what we could and God would take care of the rest. He was right. If you look at St. Luke's today, it functions not because one or two people do everything, but because many people do what they can and let God take care of the rest.

It has also been good advice in my personal life. My faith tells me that I don't have to save the world, someone else has that job. All I have to do is what I can. Whenever I feel overwhelmed by life, I just remind myself to do what I can and that God will take care of the rest. Whenever I remember that, I think of Bill and smile.
