Back-to-School: An Invitation to Learn and Grow in Faith

In September, St. Luke's begins a new year of Christian Education, and you are invited to explore what these programs offer. This year, you will find more ways than ever to study and nurture spiritual growth, and to connect with others in a community of faith.

This issue provides a glimpse of the educational line-up at St. Luke's. Maybe you have in mind an engaging Sunday morning program for your children. Perhaps you are looking for an in-depth study of the Bible. It could be a small discussion group or

a leadership workshop will meet your needs. Whatever your educational focus, chances are, there is something just right for you here.

Christian Education is an important way St. Luke's reaches out to us as we reach for deeper understanding of our lives and our faith. Look at some of the opportunities for learning—they are within your reach.

A PEAK Adventure

That's what's in store for children in preschool through 6th grade when St. Luke's embarks on a completely new approach to Sunday school. PEAK—Purposeful Experiences and Activities for Kids will make Sunday morning learning an exciting journey for your children.

The new program is based on a Workshop Rotation Model that is gaining momentum across the country. It brings to life one Bible story at a time for 4 to 6 weeks. "We're trying something new and different," explains Jenita Rhodes, Director of Children's Ministries. "It's engaging because children experience the story through hands-on learning. And by using multi-sensory techniques, the message reaches all learning styles."

Each week is a new adventure, and children take in the story through age-appropriate music, drama, storytelling, videos, computers, arts and crafts, puppetry, and cooking workshops.

The first rotation, from Sept. 8 through Oct. 13, in a series of 8 rotations throughout the year, reveals the story of Joseph Living in a Land of Many Colors. Register your child anytime this month and be ready for the program kick-off on September 8.

"The program is as much a growth opportunity for youth and adults as for children," reminds Jenita. Lend your passion and talents to the program by teaching, guiding, coordinating, creating an atmosphere, or leading music. 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John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church, once received a note that said: "The Lord has told me to tell you that He doesn't need your book-learning, your Greek and your Hebrew." Wesley answered, "Thank you, sir. Your letter was superfluous, however, as I already knew the Lord has no need for my 'book-learning,' as you put it. However, although the Lord has not directed me to say so, on my own responsibility, I would like to say to you that the Lord does not need your ignorance either."

Maybe John's response was a little acerbic, but I'm glad to know our founder could "dish it out" when he needed to. This 'Pastor's Notes' isn't about dishing it out, or about ignorance. It is about learning. We don't have classes on Greek or Hebrew right now, but we do offer a variety of learning opportunities. Some use books; some are experiential; some involve an hour; some involve several hours; some are on-going; some are local; some are international; some are small groups; some are large groups; some are supportive; some are challenging; some are personal; some are social; some are Bible-oriented; some are issue-oriented; some are... well, you get the point. They all try to be Invitational, Relational and Missional.

Philosopher Alfred North Whitehead once suggested that people usually approach life with routine, but sometimes need to draw upon understanding. It saves time to tie my shoes without reflection. But if I hurt my hand, I may have to reflect—how do I do this? Get a friend to tie my shoes? Get some slip-ons?

If we thought we could live routinely before, after 9/11/01 we find that we can't. There is much we need to understand. Part of being a community of faith is seeking to address the questions of our lives, in our time, with the resources of faith.

Our Adult Education Ministry Team is developing some wonderful opportunities for our learning together. I hope you will be a part of them.

About Kidz Prayz I & II

The Kidz Prayz program is designed to enhance each child's cognitive development through musical learning within a Christian environment. Cognitive development is achieved in a variety of means with music making. It is primarily recognized when the child creates music through synthesis of previous learning, consequently one of the highest forms of learning. In addition, the child will also continually expand and advance their gross motor skills by playing a variety of instruments. It is our sincere desire not only to foster this philosophy of musical education within the community of St. Luke's for the benefit of each young participant but also to recognize the importance of music's role in educating the young mind.

- Prayer/Joys and Concerns: Sharing our faith provides the central theme for the activities. Praying together fosters this faith relationship with God and the children. In addition, it also teaches compassion by sharing joys and concerns.
- Movement: Creating activities that use movement as a means to incorporate many developmental skills such as body awareness and gross motor skills are also key to the program. Structured movement activities develop cognitive skills such as mirroring which enhances literacy.
- Music: Singing, playing instruments, learning about patterns in music, and creating their own music are only some of the opportunities they will have in the Kidz Prayz program. Children will participate in a variety of musical activities.

Consistent attendance and being on time is paramount for the success of this program as each activity builds upon previous experiences which inherently builds self esteem for each child.

Doing Something Meaningful for God By Dennis Becker

Betsy Keyack is passionate about missions. Her greatest joy in life is "to do something meaningful and important for God." When Betsy was pursuing a career, she found that a lot of what she did was just earning a pay check. That's important, but is it meaningful? Now that she is retired with her husband, Ken Fong, you can find both of them all over St. Luke's doing what is meaningful and important.

Betsy and Ken came to St. Luke's in 1999. They had retired, had family in the Denver area and decided to move here. Ken came to Denver to look for a house. While here he also looked for a church. Betsy and Ken attended a United Methodist Church in New Jersey, so Ken attended St. Luke's as part of his house hunting. The sermon was good and the people were friendly that Sunday so the search for a church ended almost as soon as it started.

Betsy immediately inquired about the mission program at St. Luke's, went to a missions committee meeting to check it out and now finds herself co-chairing the missions program with Laurie Gilbert and Andrea Mezger, dreaming about and planning missions activities.

But Betsy is more than a dreamer and planner. She is also a doer. She is involved in the DenUM Outreach Volunteer Experience, better known as DOVE Days, sponsored by Denver Urban Ministries. One of the DOVE Days was at Grant Avenue Street Reach at a downtown Baptist church. Every Monday afternoon a spaghetti dinner is offered to people who are homeless or poor. Betsy greatly enjoyed chatting with the diners and learning a little about their lives. Betsy also tutors young people in Math at Denver Inner City Parish La Academia School. The students and the Math are fun. She has taken her two daughters Kristine, age 13, and Kara, age 8, to nursing homes to do skits and visit with the residents. To see their smiles is reward enough. As an active member of St. Luke's Caring Connection, she has made some wonderful older friends.

Betsy's most recent mission experience was the mission trip to Muscatine, Iowa to work with the San Pablo UMC in reaching out to a large and growing Latino and Hispanic immigrant population. She and her family, together with other people from St. Luke's, conducted a Bible Day Camp for the neighborhood children. They played games, made craft projects and told Bible stories. Then on Saturday the church sponsored a carnival for

the neighborhood. "I just fell in love with the kids," says Betsy. Iowa was Betsy's first mission trip from St. Luke's. Ken was on the earlier trip to Cambodia. This winter both Ken and Betsy will be going to Cambodia. Betsy says of the Iowa experience, "It was exciting to understand what the needs were and being a part of what the church is trying to do."

Betsy is excited about missions and she joyfully shares that excitement. She hopes that people of all ages can become involved in missions, especially families with their children. She says,

"You can do missions even if you have small children and are working full time. Sometimes I took a day off of work to do missions projects. Even if you're a busy family with little kids, you can do something. The rewards of reaching out and sharing life with others are great. There is a lot of satisfaction in filling a need in people's lives, of seeing a smile, of sharing an interest or skill, of following in Jesus' footsteps. It may be difficult, but it can be done." Her advice is, "Start small with a doable project. Do something for an hour or half a day. Just get involved."

Betsy's last word, "If everyone does something once a year, we can make quite an impact."

I would like to share a personal story about hope in what seemed to have been a hopeless situation. From 1975-1979, Pol Pot, a fellow Cambodian, was the most wicked ruler of Cambodia. He imposed the most horrendous government upon the citizens of Cambodia. Under his leadership, he forced all Cambodians to move out of their homes into long-houses in the countryside to take up farming. Cambodians would work 14-18 hours a day, every day in the year, and were given only 2 tiny and unhealthy meals per day. If a Cambodian was sick and could not go to work, the soldiers would accuse them that they were lazy and would kill them. Cambodians had no freedom, not even the freedom of speech. Each morning. parents were separated from their children. They reported to the field for work for about 14 hours of hard laboring work in the hot sun. The children were given other kinds of job to do, for example, watching cattle, or feeding chicken. The children were taught to spy on their parents and report anything that their parents said or did about the government to the soldiers. Many times the parents were killed because of the report that their own children made. Pol Pot regime was designed to destroy not only the individual, but the family relationship.

Under these horrible circumstances, my father reached a point in his life where he considered committing suicide. He, like most Cambodians, felt so hopeless. He decided that it would be better to die by suicide rather than starvation, or being murdered by the soldiers because he was unable to work. He attempted suicide several times, but each time God spared his life. After one of his suicide attempts, my mother asked him why he wanted to leave her and the children behind. My father's response to my mother was, "I love you, I love our children, I want to spend the rest of my life with all of you, but I just have no more hope to go on."

None of my father's suicide attempts was successful. It was because of my mother who helped him to restore his hope to live on. If my father had completely given up hope to live, he would have missed seeing his children growing up to be a blessing to him. He would have missed seeing my older brother get married. He would have missed enjoying a beautiful marriage to my mother and growing old together. He would have missed the freedom that he now has and the joy of being a pastor. He would have missed all of these blessings that God had in store for him.

So when you face a difficult time, remember to allow someone or something to give you hope, otherwise you may miss some of God's most precious blessings in life.

Youth Mission T rip, July, 2002 The St. Luke's Youth left for a 10-day mission trip on Friday, July 12. The group consisted of 25 youth and 4 adults. The first stop was Albuquerque, New Mexico. There, on Saturday, they visited the Southwest Organizing Project, or SWOP, to see the work they are doing for people living in the South Valley of Albuqueque. One of the projects visited was Intel, where Ravi and Lolita show how they monitor the air quality. We were also fortunate to visit the Maher's (former St. Luke's members), who graciously hosted a pool party for us. On Sunday, July 14, they cleared trash on the road to the Pajarito Mesa (see the after and before pictures, below). This road is the primary access for many people on the Mesa, which provides low cost housing; for example, school children walk this road to get to school. 42 large trash bags were filled by the mission team.

The group arrived in Flagstaff, Arizona, Sunday evening. Monday, the team worked all day on a duplex for married students at the Indian Bible College. The work consisted of painting the outside of the house and excavating the basement to allow the installation of new support columns. A great deal was accomplished during a satisfying work day. The culinary event of the evening was Laura Boon's now infamous "disinfectant pot" chili mac.

Tuesday, Aaron made a fantastic breakfast of pancakes, bacon and eggs for everyone. The team then left for Las Vegas, a rest stop on the way to Salt Lake City. We had a rest stop at Bullhead City, on the Colorado River and the Nevada border, for lunch, and then visited the Labyrinth at St. Andrew's Catholic Church in Boulder City, Nevada.

On Wednesday, we had a wonderful, but unplanned, lunch in the Cafe at the Bellaggio on the Strip and then drove to Salt Lake City. On Thursday, we had a long but very productive day. 2/3 of the team worked outside at the new Mountain Vista UMC, working on their landscaping and

cleaning up their vacant lot. We filled a very large dumpster with overgrowth and trash from the lot. The rest of the group cleaned, painted, and sorted at the Crossroads Urban Center Thrift Store.

The Friday morning schedule contained a workshop led by the Crossroads group, and then driving to Glenwood Springs for rafting.

Bananas, Spaghetti and Ham: DenUM DOVE Days Are Rewarding

During this past Spring, several people from St. Luke's participated in Denver Urban Ministries' Outreach Volunteer Experience (DOVE) Days.

In March, Theresa LaRock, Kim and Roger Young (who got a babysitter for the little ones) and I went to Metro Care Ring, a food bank in downtown Denver. When we arrived, we attended the staff meeting, which ended with devotions and prayer. Then we got to work "shopping" with big carts in the food bank to make customized food packages for each of the clients who came. We were trained for our tasks by an 8-year old volunteer Zack, who made sure we gave out the correct amount of bananas! We all thought that Metro Care Ring is a terrific organization – Theresa has been back to volunteer there four times.

In April, a St. Luke's group went to Grant Avenue Street Reach in downtown Denver. Participants included Roger Young, J. Forrest Marsh, Tyler Marsh, Diane Tolleson and her three young children, Carolyn McIntosh and Kara Fong. There we helped to serve a weekly spaghetti dinner for people who are homeless or poor. The children poured Kool-Aid and served bread. The best part was talking with the people who came to eat. One man was an avid chess player, who had a string of games going at his table. There was a family with two very young children. What a wonderful ministry the Street Reach is! Subsequent to our DOVE Day, the St. Luke's ministers and staff also went there to volunteer as a group.

In May, we had a DOVE morning at Project Angel Heart. This ministry prepares and delivers hundreds of meals each week to people who have HIV/AIDS and terminal illnesses, such as cancer. I was very impressed with how organized the operation is and how much the chef cares about the quality of the food. The food was highly nutritious and there was attention to detail in making the food visually appealing. Our volunteer jobs were to package salad bowls, cut croutons from fresh bread and serve the meal foods into containers, which were then covered by a special sealing machine.

Project Angel Heart also welcomes volunteers to deliver the meals. One day last year, Laurie Gilbert, her daughter Alaina, Dalai Dv and I did just that. It was fun to drive around together and meet new people.

Mission Trip to San Pablo Church, Muscatine, Iowa

revitalize the San Pablo church.

In June, nine members of St. Luke's traveled on a Mission Trip to the San Pablo church in Muscatine, Iowa. The mission team, who went on behalf of everyone at St. Luke's, consisted of Betsy Keyack and Ken Fong and their daughters, Kristine (age 13) and Kara (age 8); Diane Kevack and her foster child Revna (age 2): Linda Harris: Dalai Dv: and our pastor. Dick Evans.

Muscatine is a small industrial town on the Mississippi River. The surrounding area is spacious green countryside - farms with fields of corn and soybeans bordered by country dirt roads. The San Pablo Church is part of a group of five connected United Methodist Churches in the Muscatine area.

Together these churches are called Fellowship United Methodist Church. They share resources and work together to accomplish what the individual churches alone could not.

There is a growing Latino immigrant population in Muscatine and nearby towns. Many of the immigrants work in dangerous jobs in the local meat packing industry and need help and support in becoming settled in the United States. In 2001, United Methodist missionaries Ron and Cathy Whitatch were assigned to the Muscatine District to lead an effort to reach out in hospitality and inclusion to the local Latino community. One

Currently San Pablo has only two member families and on a typical Sunday less than a dozen people come to the service. Yet there are many Latino families in the neighborhood. To help San Pablo reach out to the local community, St. Luke's was invited to design and conduct a 4-day Bible Day Camp for the neighborhood children as well as a Saturday carnival for families.

When we arrived in Iowa, we were given a warm welcome with a pot luck dinner at the Musserville worship center. The next day we got started on the Day Camp. It was held in the basement of the San Pablo church, which had just been refurbished by another mission team (and, thankfully, had air conditioning!) At the Day Camp,

we provided Bible stories and skits, indoor games, activities at a nearby park, crafts, music and food. About 25 wonderful and lovable children showed up each day. On the last day of the Camp, the children walked to the home of Ruth, a church member who had helped us during the week. There they sang the songs they had learned over the past few days. The favorites were "Allelu, Allelu -Praise Ye the Lord" and "I've Got Joy, Joy, Joy, Joy Down in my Heart."

During our week we also visited the Diversity Center in Muscatine, which is very busy providing help to immigrants and senior citizens in the area. Many immigrants need help with paperwork and logistics. Some are tricked by acquaintances into coming into the US without proper documentation. Then they go to work in the meat packing plant. When they get hurt on the job, they are in a bind because they are not properly documented – they cannot collect insurance and their jobs are in jeopardy. On Friday evening, we took a wonderful dinner cruise on the Mississippi River. On Saturday, we provided games and prizes, along with lunch, facepainting, balloon animals and crafts for the carnival. After the carnival, we were treated to a memorable dinner at the farm of one of the local church members. On Sunday, we had a beautiful bilingual service and a good-bye Pot Luck lunch at the countryside High Prairie worship center.

Our mission trip to Iowa was very rewarding – it felt good to be participating in such an important mission for God. Interacting with the children was heart-warming (although we were very tired each day). We learned a lot about industry in the Muscatine area and some of the issues facing immigrants. Our hearts and prayers remain with the children of San Pablo along with the Ron and Cathy and the pastors of Fellowship UMC as they work to build a supportive community of faith and loving fellowship with the members of God's family in Muscatine.
