The Fleas of Faith: Any Questions?

Faith without questions is weak. Afraid. Faith that is willing to engage its questions is stronger. We are all involved with questions about things that seem to matter a lot at the time, but by this time tomorrow, we may have forgotten them—all the immediate wheres and whens and hows of daily life. And we sometimes lose track of the questions about things that always matter—questions about meaning, purpose, value, life and death.

Sir Francis Galton, a 19th century English scientist, wrote: "Well-washed and well-combed domestic dogs grow dull; they miss the stimulus of fleas." We need 'fleas' to nip at our conscience, to irritate our assumptions, and to disturb our expectations—to ask questions. One of the primary areas of our lives that should be flea-bitten is our faith. Too often we are content to let our faith become a matter of an hour on Sunday morning, with the rest of the week dissolving into job deadlines, kids' schedules, and household demands.

So why is it that we need the annoyance of fleas/questions? Because the fleas in our faith, or as Frederick Buechner calls "ants in our pants of faith," are the itches and twitches of doubts that keep our faith awake and moving and growing. Questions grow naturally out of true faith. Questions call us into action, not just agitation. Questions call us to wrestle with our faith. Questions help us grow in our faith.

As a part of our "New Life in Christ: Live the Journey" theme for Lent this year, I will be leading a class on Questions of Faith, a video-based discussion of some basic questions of the Christian Faith. What is God like? What good is prayer? Who is Jesus? Do you believe in miracles? And others. We will study and wrestle together with passages from the Bible which open up deeper reflections on these questions of faith.

This group will meet from 6:30-7:15 p.m., following the community dinner, beginning February 20th. You may sign up in the Narthex.

However you choose to do so, I invite you to Live the Journey.



In addition, the child will also continually expand and advance their gross motor skills by playing a variety of instruments as well as movement. It is our sincere desire not only to foster

this philosophy of musical education with Christian values at St. Luke's but also to recognize the importance of music's role in educating the young mind. Last fall, each child had an opportunity to play a variety of instruments both pitched (xylophones) and non-pitched (drums). In addition, they sang in solfege (a system of learning musical pitch) and applied the system to songs of the Christmas musical; and further develop their gross motor skills through rhythmic body percussion (clap, snap and pat) and movement for the Christmas musical taught by Heather Harding.

The focus of each session is obviously based on the musical learning but there are other valuable aspects of the program, as well. Before and after each Kidz Prayz session, we have a prayer. Before the opening prayer, I've found something



Steve Riley, Executive Administrator by Joyce Rovetta

Steve Riley makes it look easy, but if he volunteered to leap a tall building in a single bound, I wouldn't bet against him. He has been an active member of the St Luke's congregation since 1989. In September 2001, he joined the staff as the first full-time Executive Administrator.

"I was lucky to be in the right place at the right time to take it on," he said. "And it's been everything I expected and more."

Riley knew what he was getting into. In his 12 years with the church he has been involved in the areas the Executive Administrator executes, from programs such as music to raising a million dollars for our last capital campaign.

His interest in guitar led him to found the Sonrise Band that plays contemporary songs the 8 a.m. services. As co-chairman of the Capital Stewardship program, he helped raise a million dollars to enable the construction of building Phase 3, our Sanctuary, at last. On the Staff Parish Relations Committee, he dealt with growing staff needs in a growing church.

Two or three times a year, he said, the Ad Council and staff would face a problem and see the solution in a business/operations manager who would pay attention to the details and crunch the numbers, co-ordinate vendors and trouble shoot, take the day to day detail work off the shoulders of the pastors and program heads and give continuity to the instructions of the part-time staff and volunteer members of the Administrative Council and the Trustees.

When the idea finally came to be, Riley leaped at the chance. Working in the insurance industry for 20 years as a commercial underwriter, manager, agent and team leader most recently for Fireman's Fund Insurance Co., he knows his numbers. But what he discovered when he began a Master's program to advance, was that the human side of business is his favorite thing.

"This opportunity at St Luke's gives me a chance to work with people. I like the day-today challenge and it's about as diverse a day as you can imagine. I could start with a clogged sink and move right into a visioning session trying to project St. Luke's mission into the future."

For Human Resources, he will attend a meeting to decide what kind of staff we most need, then conduct interviews to hire them and direct the Human Resource manage-


ment such as training, benefits and reviews. Financially, he helps the Finance and Stewardship teams set their goals, create and monitor budgets, co-ordinate goals and number trends. Operationally, he follows the lead to the Trustees in building management from construction of the new elevators to keeping the place clean and the drains flowing.

"It takes lots of cooperation from staff and our many capable committee members, but I am the one who must pay attention to the details and answer the questions so the pastors and the program staff can concentrate on their special missions."

In trying to reach Steve for this article, I found him off for the weekend with the church youth in Alamosa where they were erecting drywall and stuce walls for Habitat for Humanity. Not a part of the job, just Steve supporting Aaron Shipman, the youth director, and Steve's son, David, on the project.

Worthy to Play the Part By Dennis Becker

"The man who played Jesus" in "Godspell", performed by the St. Luke's Wesley Players is how many children at St. Luke's know Judson Byrn. Judson says, "Participation in 'Godspell' helped me become integrated in church life at St. Luke's more than any other thing."

How does it feel to play the role of Jesus? Listen to Judson. "Years ago I saw the movie, 'Godspell'. The role of Christ impacted me significantly. I felt that

Christ was a person who could be sitting next to me. I said that if I ever got a chance to play that role, I would try to do my best to play the part well and to be deserving of the part. Then the opportunity came at St. Luke's. I thought, 'Am I deserving to play the part with my human frailties and inadequacies?' The role is incredibly challenging theatrically, musically and emotionally. I could not have gotten through it without the prayers of many people. It is clear that God touched the lives of many people including my own."

Coming from experience in community theater in the Chicago area, Judson has performed in other Wesley Players productions including "Mary and Joe 4ever" and a performance for the children about Noah's ark. Judson also sings in the Chancel Choir. He joined the choir after hearing the choir sing "For the Beauty of the Earth" with Carrie Mallery accompanying on the piano. Feeling a spirit of worship, Judson said, "I belong in that choir." He is constantly amazed at the talent and unconditional commitment of the choir members, and music ministers (Carrie for her behind-the-scenes contribution and Jim Ramsey for directing). "They sing for the love of music, for each other and for Christ, and deserve recognition for providing a worshipful atmosphere," Judson said.

Judson has been singing in church choirs since the second grade. He loves to sing and has sung the "Messiah" at least five times. He played guitar in the youth group of a Kentucky church. One summer he and some friends took two months to play in churches across Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York. They played in the evening, slept in church basements and traveled to their next engagement.

How did Judson find his way to St. Luke's? He came to Denver from Chicago. Some of his friends in Chicago had attended Littleton United Methodist Church and knew Dick Evans. They encouraged Judson to try "Dick's church." Judson made the connection and has been here ever since. (Thanks, Dick)

Judson came to Denver in the summer of 1993 and joined St. Luke's in December, 2000. He negotiates telecommunications contracts for Cendant, a Galileo subsidiary. And whenever there is music or drama, you'll likely see him around St. Luke's.

The "Lay" test News: Wesley on the Web A Message from our Lay Leaders - By Monty Hoffman

Want to learn more about John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, or read some of his writings? There are several places on the Web to access this information, but one of the easiest to use is the Wesley Center for Applied Theology, supported by the Northwest Nazarene University. It can be found at http://wesley.nnu.edu.

There are two biographies here and I would urge you to read one of them, particularly about Wesley's early years. Wesley spent his early years believing that the ability to perfect himself to make himself worthy of God's love lay within him. Because of this, he felt only a sense of failure in his relationship with God. Only after he accepted that his faith in God through Christ and God's grace in his life, not anything he did or believed, were the way to a new relationship with God did Wesley feel the assurance of God's love. The humility that he gained through this experience led him to understand that if God loved him, God's love and grace were available to all people. This applies as much to us today as it did to Wesley in the 18th century.

It is also interesting to read some of his writings, including his sermons, but you need to read them for the spirit of Methodism that is contained in them, not for their literal meaning. They were written to reach out to people in a newly industrialized England in the middle of the 18th century and not all of what Wesley says applies literally today, but the spirit does. You also need to be aware that the meaning of some words has changed in the last 250 years and translate things properly. For example, the sermon called "Nature of Enthusiasm" was not written to encourage excitement in religion, but to caution against extremism in religion. In Wesley's time, enthusiasm meant extremism.

As I tell new member classes, the beliefs of St. Luke's and other Methodist churches are grounded in the Wesleyan Tradition. Understanding Wesley and the spirit of his writings helps you to understand the theology of what you hear preached every week and helps you to live it in your life.

Be Watching For Handcrafted Items from Zimbabwe

As many of you know, we have been sending new and gently used clothing for the children in the orphanages and the women in Zimbabwe for the last 4 years. We also have helped financially to supported the St. John's UMC in Zimbabwe over the last couple of years.

I'm excited to share that we will be selling handcrafted candle sticks and sugar bowls made in Zimbabwe, specific to the Chegutu area. The crafts were made by a bicycle powered lathe. 100% of the profits will be sent to St. John's UMC in Zimbabwe. The Pastor of this church is Rev. David Mucherera, who is our former Missionary-in-Residence Dr. Tapiwa Mucherera's brother. We are currently waiting for the second shipment to arrive and then sales will begin.

Zimbabwe has been under political oppression for years and is barely surviving the horrific AIDS epidemic. The people we met in 1997 during our Zimbabwe mission are remarkable in every way. They have had to learn to be resourceful in everyday living and survival. I think you will find these crafts not only beautiful, but even more meaningful when you see how this items are made.

Cambodia: Mission Possible II - Bells of Hope

Recently, at the 2001 Crop Walk, one of the leaders shared this information with us.

Shells into bells...In 1975,the Khmer Rouge seized power in Cambodia, beginning a fouryear reign of terror which killed on million Cambodians. The nation's infrastructure, agricultural base, and spirit were broken. Cambodia now lives with the plague of eight million landmines-roughly one for every person in the country. These landmines are planted throughout the countryside in fields where families tend their crops and beasts of burden.Because land is scarce, they have

no choice but to work in these mine-filled fields. Often they are fatal and crippling accidents. As Cambodian people go about their daily activities in the fields, many gather scrap metal to add to their family income (estimated at below \$400 per person per year). For years these scraps of war- spent shell casings, old artillery shells, electrical wire, and soda cans-have been sold to village foundries where they are melted and recast into little bells. The bells are used to adorn the harnesses of cows, oxen and water buffalo,an indispensable cornerstone of Cambodia's agriculture.

Today, the Cambodian people are beginning to reconstruct their lives and their villages.

Insights from Dalai Dy

Laura, an Iliff friend, was driving me back to Iliff from St. Luke's, when I noticed all the dead trees along the road as winter was dawning. I then told her what I was feeling. All these trees look like they have no more life. In Cambodia, because of its closeness to the equator, our two seasons are the dry season and the rainy season, and the temperature is always warm all year round. When the trees ever look like this in Cambodia, it means the trees have died and could never ever turn to life again. But here in Denver, Colorado when winter gives way to spring all the deadlooking trees come back to life again with the most beautiful leaves and flowers.

This thought reminded me of bad times in my life. When I feel like life is slowly leaving me. Life is slowly being drained from me. There is no more hope to move on. How true it was with most Cambodians when Pol Pot ruled the country from 1975-1979, killing millions by murder, starvation and extremely cruel working conditions.

Like a Cambodian saying, "Once the rains have stopped, the sky is clear," when the winter gives way to spring, trees are happily back to life. We can overcome bad times and bring ourselves back to life if we give way to God. Let us sing to the Lord with King David in Psalm 18:3, "I call upon the Lord, who is worthy to be praised, so I shall be saved..." What a wonderful promise of victory to live on!
