Bill Easum, a national church consultant, has a theory about the United Methodist Church. Over the past couple of years we have developed an engaging vision of who we are as a church. We are Invitational, Relational and Missional. Living out those core values is the foundation for our "growing toward full humanity as we see it in Jesus Christ."

The Gallup organization has done extensive research on congregational effectiveness, and identified four variables: Serving and helping others; inviting others to participate; financial support; and life satisfaction. Their research, reversing conventional wisdom about congregational effectiveness, suggests that spiritual commitment follow congregational engagement. Your staff is working on an action document to address ways we will deepen both our congregational engagement and spiritual commitment, through being IRM. This document will be circulated among your elected leadership, and will be available to any others who want to contribute to the discussion.

We are not munching ourselves onto a highway. We are looking in, up, around and out, living as God's people, being Invitational, Relational and Missional.

Music Notes: Requiem by Gabriel Fauré A Message of Hope by James Ramsey

During the season of Lent on March 17th during the 9:30 and 11:00 services, the Chancel Choir along with members of St. Luke's Chamber Orchestra will perform in Latin the Requiem Mass or Mass for the dead by French composer Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924). Fauré's work is a small gem in the genre of Latin masses consisting of only seven short movements. However, the original version of his mass composed of five movements rather than the traditional seven movements known in present day editions. The Chancel Choir will present the work in an historic manner by performing the original intended version by the composer: Introit and Kyrie, Sanctus, Pie Jesu, Agnus Dei, In Paradisum.

The work was first heard at a funeral in 1888 under the composer's direction. In later years until 1901, there were three additions by the composer, which led to two additional movements: Offertory and Libera Me. In the Requiem, Fauré chose not to focus on the wonder, fear, and threat of torture and damnation that are so powerfully evoked in other well-known works such as Verdi's Requiem or Mozart's Requiem. He attempts to create an intimate work that focuses on warmth and deep emotion, which allows for peace and solace to enter into one's soul. Fauré's Requiem is considered a contemplative work that strives to comfort and assuage the grief of the mourners while holding out the promise or hope of eternal rest in heaven.

Performing a requiem during the season of Lent is a very appropriate musical observance that has occurred in the church for many centuries. My desire during this season of Lent is that you not only enjoy listening to the Chancel Choir on March 17th but more that you listen for the message of hope interwoven into the musical fabric of Gabriel Fauré's *Requiem*.

In the United States of America, daylight saving time ends the last week of October, giving all of us an extra hour. Most people happily set their clocks back an hour. Sadly, the same was not true in Cambodia when Cambodians had to set their clocks back in April 1975. This was not to have an extra hour, but to set it back to year zero. It was when Pol Pot took control of Cambodia and brought about the most notorious bloodshed in all human history. For the next three years, eight months and twenty days, the Khmer Rouge, led by Pol Pot, murdered, worked to death, or killed by starvation approximately three million Cambodians, maybe more. We just do not know. Millions of other Cambodians were forced to relocate, were deprived of food, were tortured, or were sent into forced labor. II. How My Parents Met:

During and following the Pol Pot Regime, life was not easy for most Cambodians. This produced a Cambodian saying, "Life is like a Cambodian road," which is either muddy and slippery, or dusty, rugged, and bumpy. My life, and that of my family, was no different. When Pol Pot came to power, people were forced to move to the countryside to take up agricultural tasks. At that time, my father was a freshman in a business school in Phnom Penh, the capital of Cambodia, and my mother was a nurse trainee in Kompong Cham, a province in the east, about eighty miles away from Phnom Penh. They both were forced to move to Koh Soten, a countryside district in Kompong Cham, where they met and married. Their wedding, held with hundreds of other couples, was just a gathering of the villagers to see them vow to take care of one another.

Soon after they married, my parents were forced to move again, this time to mountainous and isolated Mondulkiri, a province in the northeast, where varied tribes called the Khmer Leuo, meaning the Cambodians of the hills, lived. My older brother, David, was born there on January 28, 1977. Tears always come when my mother talks about her three days trying to give birth to David with no hospital available. She also cries when she talks about how everyone in her family, one after the other, was killed. I grew up hearing all those tragic stories. In fact, both my parents were in lines to be killed quite a number of times, but something always happened that spared their lives.

Seeking Social Justice - Homelessness and Affordable Housing

Homelessness is on the rise. The fastestgrowing segment of

the homeless population are families who can't afford housing, have wages that aren't adequate and are facing unemployment. Domestic violence is also a key factor. There are about 10,000 homeless people in Denver (up 25% from a year ago), of which 3500 are children. According to an October 2001 survey, there were 1800 homeless families in Denver (up 48.5% from a year ago).

Advocates say that Denver has not kept up with the demand for affordable housing in the past 15 years. One way to help with this issue is to join the Colorado Homeless/Housing Action Network (CHAN), organized by the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless. Every year, from January through May, the Coalition works on housing and homeless issues in

the Colorado State Legislature. Occasionally they work on federal housing

and homeless legislation. They need people to participate in the CHAN by writing letters and making telephone calls to state legislators and congressional representatives. Application forms are available at the Missions Table in the Fellowship Hall.

If you would like to help with homelessness and affordable housing in other ways you can contact the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless (303-293-2217) or Denver Urban Ministries (303-355-4896). This is one area in which we can truly "seek justice and love kindness" in our lives!

Insights from Dalai Dy

On Valentine's Day, one of my younger brother's friends sent me a surprise note. In his note, he confessed, as he put in it, one of the most secret things in his life. After all these years, being like a big sister to him, I find it hard to believe when he said, "I LOVE YOU."

"Love" is a beautiful word, isn't it? When I open the Bible and want to read about love, my fingers always guide me to 1 Corinthians 13. I just love reading the love Saint Paul described. Feelings can lead us up on a mountain one day and down in a valley the next. Oftentimes, I wonder where we could find love that is patient, that is kind, that is not jealous, that not boastful, that is not arrogant, that is not rude, that not self-seeking, that is not easily angered, that does not hold grudges, that does not delight in evil, that rejoices in the truth, that protects, that trusts, that hopes, and, finally, that preserves.

I have some good news! But let me starting by asking you, "Have you taken the first step of finding love in the Person and actions of Jesus Christ?" "Have you entrusted yourself to Him?" "Have you believed the Bible when it says Christ died for your sins?" This is the starting point. Acknowledge your sin, and your need of Christ, who came "to seek and to save that which was lost" (Luke 19:10). It is in Christ that we find the love of God, and it is in Him that we see what it means to live in the kind of love Saint Paul described. He is the One who calls us not merely to a higher standard but to let Him live His life through us.

Let me end with 1 Corinthians 13:13, "These three things continue forever: faith, hope, and love. And the greatest of these is love." May love be with you and your family.

Dalai..... Continued from Page 3 III. The Second Birthday:

The end of the Pol Pot Regime finally came. January 7, 1979 is known as the second birthday to all Cambodians who could get through and survive the Pol Pot Regime. The Cambodians, however, had to start life all over again from year zero, this time with nothing but two empty hands.

VI. Time To Be Born:

About a year after the end of the Pol Pot Regime, still in Mondulkiri, my mother was about to give birth to her second child. I was going to be born into a world of darkness, suffering, and pain left behind by the Pol Pot Regime. When it was nearly time for me to be born, my parents traveled back to Kompong Cham to unite with the family members that survived the Pot Pot Regime. They had to travel across the miles of hot and dusty road in Vietnam. This reminds me of the time that Jesus was about to be born. Joseph and Mary had to travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem. When my parents entered Vietnam, for the first time in four years, my mother who had always eaten rice and salt, ate good food. Consequently, she thought to herself and told my father that this child would be born clever. A few days after their arrival in Koh Soten where they first met, on a cold, windy day while people in the West were still celebrating their new year, on January 2, 1980, I was born.

V. In Kompong Cham:

My parents settled down in Koh Soten and worked as farmers. On July 14, 1983, my mother gave birth to her third child. That was my younger brother, Socheat. Though I was only about three and a half years old, I knew that life was a very hard struggle. This time we were not fighting to free ourselves from the Pol Pot Regime, but from hunger and poverty left behind by that regime. Although both my parents worked day and night in the fields, out in the rain or in the hot sun, they hardly earned enough money to provide three meals for us each day.

Being in such harsh conditions for almost four years, they decided to move to Kompong Cham town, hoping that life would get better. In that town, my father found a job in the governmental Business Department, and my mother worked as a nurse in the Kompong Cham Hospital.

Life did get better for our family. At least we all had enough to eat and the food was much better. But, life was still hard on my mother. The civil war was still going on so there were always hundreds and hundreds of patients at the hospital, causing her to have to work endless hours. In addition, my father was asked to go to work in Vietnam, leaving three little kids in my mother's care. The three of us spent a lot of time at the hospital with her. Being at the hospital was a sad experience for me. Every day, I saw people with unhappy faces, crying, suffering, and dying. All resulted from war, a war of Cambodians against ourselves, a war for power, ambition, and greed. In the midst of all of those challenges, Sihab, my youngest brother, was born on October 5,

VI: School Years and How My Christian Life Began:

1988, making us a family of six.

My formal education began in September 1986, and I loved it. I always walked to school with my older brother, David, until junior high school when I was given an old bicycle. Each year from primary to high school, I had only two skirts, a few blouses, and one pair of shoes to wear. My mother always told me that was all we could afford.

My father converted to Christianity in 1970, and was able to convert my mother shortly after they married. So, I was born into a Christian family. My being a Christian was hard on me as I was growing up. At school, other kids, especially boys, often picked on me as I was probably the only Christian in the entire school. They would say something bad about Jesus and accuse me of abandoning Cambodian religion and culture. Because life was hard, I read the Bible and questioned God a lot in my prayers. And I always prayed for acceptance, understanding, and love. I always dreamed of having a world where everyone is welcome, regardless of who they are, where they come from and what they do.

Religious freedom finally came to Cambodia in 1988. Before then, my family worshiped at home in secret. In late 1989, my father quit his job to become a pastor. This gave birth to my church life. The Kompong Cham Methodist Church was very small, but we were very strong. We encouraged and praved for one another to keep and live our faith. I experienced so much love and care at church. In early 1995, while still a child, I started teaching smaller children in a Sunday school class at my father's church. I loved teaching then as much as I do today.

College Life in Phnom Penh: VII. Years passed by. In August 1997, I graduated from high school with good grades. I was happy then, but I had to face the reality of the economic circumstances of my family. My older brother David did not go to college. Instead, he decided to work to help support the family. This is true with most Cambodian families. The children drop out of school or never go to college because they need to work to support the family. Yet, I still wanted to go to college. It took a lot of courage for me to ask my parents a question to which I already knew the answer. I asked if I could move to Phnom Penh to go to college. In response, they said, "We know that you are a good kid and that you like studying very much. We know that you have always dreamed of going to college. But we simply do not have enough money for you to do that."

Thank God, my parents rethought the idea of my wanting to go to college and, finally, decided to support me even though it would mean having to skip lunch or dinner as long as I could pass the entrance exam, which I did. For four years in Phnom Penh, I was completing my bachelor degree in education. God's blessings came one by one. First, the first few months in Phnom Penh were hard because I was just a country girl, and had never left my family before. But, gradually Phnom Penh became home. My church in Phnom Penh was playing an important role in that transition. I continued teaching Sunday school classes in Phnom Penh. Second, after being in Phnom Penh for a few months, I got my first job. I worked part-time, teaching English beginners' level in a non-governmental organization. Third, after working there for about a year, I found a new job, translating Sunday school children's literature. I completed five books published by General Board of Global Ministries and General Board of Discipleship of the United Methodist Church in cooperation with the United Methodist Publishing House. These five publications are used by all the Methodist churches in Cambodia.

Seminary in America: XI. Following my graduation, I was accepted into the Iliff School of Theology and became the first Cambodian Methodist student in a Divinity school in America. To my mom and dad, David, Socheat and Sihab and the rest of my family and friends in Cambodia: I will always be grateful for your constant love and prayers. Although we are materially poor, I have the greatest wealth of all. It is through all of you, I have learned the real meaning of love and how to share it with my fellow human beings, especially when we do not have much to live on.

In addition, I will always be grateful and thankful for all the support, prayers, and unconditional love from so many people from so many places. All of you have helped me grow mature, and made it possible for me to be here at Iliff. To Rev. Esther Eileen Cho, and Dr. Rev. Richard Orson Evans: thanks for introducing and recommending me to Iliff. Also thanks for all your support, prayers, and love. It was a very hard process to come to Iliff because I had absolutely no money to come to America, but Rev. Cho and Mrs. Laurie Gilbert encouraged me constantly that everything would be fine.

To the St. Luke's Cambodia Mission Team and to the entire St. Luke's congregation: thanks for accepting me into your inclusive community of faith, for helping to

make me feel at home, and for your continual support for my studies. It has been a wonderful experience to be a member at St. Luke's and to be serving on staff as a missionary in residence. Thanks for including me. I know I can never ever thank you enough.

X. Goals For The Future: Since my early childhood, I have always had a desire to serve others. My country is very poor physically and spiritually. Therefore, it is my hope and dream to be a part of the development of my home country. After graduation from Iliff, I plan to be ordained in the United Methodist Church. I then plan to return to Cambodia and serve with the United Methodist Church in Cambodia. I am looking forward to be serving as an ordained minister and to be a faculty member of the Methodist Bible School in Phnom Penh. Perhaps I will also work with young children, helping them succeed in school, and motivate them to be better citizens. Or perhaps I will work with hang-out youth, encouraging them to get an education and find a good job. Or maybe I will work with women and their issues of survival. Whatever I do, I plan to work hard developing and supporting my community.

Last but not least, I would like to thank you (yeah you!) the one reading this right now. God's blessings be with you!

The "Lay" test News: Tend a Tree

Most of us have heard the saying, "You can't see the forest for the trees", but I think that there are times that we can't see the trees for the forest. We live in a world where we get information from all over the world quickly. At times, like last fall, when the news is bad, it can overwhelm our ability to cope with it.
