
There will be a dinner before the show and it is all free. There will not be childcare but most children around 6 and up will be able to handle it. I hope to see you there!

It's Mine, all Mine !!!

Not having the slightest hint of child psychology, I don't know at what age children pass through what stages. Joan was the primary "knower" of those things in our family. But I remember that at some time in a child's growth the idea of possessing becomes very important. That's when children might say, "It's mine, all mine," if they get to the verbal phase first. If "possessing" comes before "verbal" they might just hit you over the head with it.

We all go into this stage, and fortunately most of us also come out of it. We learn to share. But in some of us, even though we come through the sharing stage as a social necessity, the "Mine, all mine" attitude still has a secure spot in our psychological makeup. For some it can be dominant.

In Idaho, Joan and I took a drive down to Murphy, the seat of Owyhee County. We went because a few miles from Murphy is a rustic restaurant on the banks of the Snake River. Meals are by reservation only, with only one item on the menu each evening. Deciding is easy.

Murphy is located on a country road with a general store (one gas pump), county court house with one parking meter out front, half a dozen homes all on one side of the road, and a dirt air strip on the other.

We went into the general store and I asked where the neurosurgeon's office was. The clerk looked at me as if I was dumber than a neurosurgeon would be if he had an office in Murphy. Why not? The air was clear, rent would be cheap, space for his plane across the road, and a terrific eating place just down the road.

But having the skills of a neurosurgeon are worthless without people, so neurosurgeons have offices in places with lots of people, who just might need those skills. When I make money from my job, is it "mine, all mine," or do I owe something back for "the common good" of the people without whom I would make NO money.

As children we are taught to share. Let's take that into our adulthood, and learn to "Share The Abundance." It is not ALL ours. A portion of it is for the "common good," like supporting the church from which we all benefit. Remember, Pledge Sunday is November 9, which will be a flop without you.

In any case, it is my sincere hope that these recommendations will aid in our worship experience at St. Luke's.





St. Luke's: Part of a larger picture by Rev. Dave Money,

"Do all the good you can, in all the places you can, to all the people you can."

That was a ringing call to Christian ministry sounded by the Rev. John Wesley, founder of the Methodist church, some 250 years ago. Members and constituents of St. Luke's enthusiastically respond to this call by undertaking mission work here in the Denver area, in other U.S. communities, and even in far-flung places like Zimbabwe and Cambodia.

But did you know that we also answer Christ's call to mission and ministry in literally hundreds of other ways on a world-wide basis? We do this through the connectional structure of the United Methodist Church. That structure links St. Luke's to approximately 42,500 other UMC churches throughout the United States and the world.

By pooling the talents and resources of its nearly ten million members, the United Methodist Church provides disaster relief in the U.S. and many other countries, supports a national network of colleges and seminaries, pursues a wide variety of charitable activities both in the U.S. and abroad, and undertakes mission and ministry in countless other ways

Well, what kind of progress? Specifically, our progress in finding our new pastor.

To this date (15 Oct), there is not a whole lot to jump up and shout about, however some inching forward is being made. Have you ever heard anyone say, "The church should be run like a business?" I always wonder, "Which business?" 'cause many I've heard about have closed down. I just read this morning that Cub is closing all their Denver stores.

Good news or not, much of our church IS run like a business, a big business. We have precedents and procedures to follow. Guidelines to bow down to. Here is a review of the players in this game. In St. Luke's we have the Staff-Parish Relations Committee, made up of nine persons with Sean McCurdy as chair. They represent the interests of St. Luke's. One thing they cannot do; they cannot go out on their own and find our new pastor.

He / she will be found by the Cabinet, made up of the bishop and his seven district superintendents; they do all appointments of pastors in the Rocky Mountain Conference of the United Methodist Church. Sound like a business? They have two arenas from which to find our pastor; the conference itself, and not finding one there, any of the other conferences in the country. When the Cabinet finds or pastor our SPRC will interview and vote yes or no. On a "yes" vote the bishop will appoint. On a "no" vote, it is back to the drawing board.

What is our

throughout the world.

And that's not all. The United Methodist Church provides the administrative structure necessary to appoint clergy to local churches like St. Luke's, and to maintain necessary health insurance, retirement, and continuing education programs for clergy and lay employees.

It would be impossible for St. Luke's, or any individual church, to undertake many of these critically important programs and activities on its own. Yet, St. Luke's plays an active role in the connectional structure that makes them happen.

How? Based on the number of St. Luke's members and other factors, a small part of our budget is apportioned to Wider Mission giving through the United Methodist Church. By responding to God's grace through your financial support of St. Luke's, you are truly helping to share God's gifts with many people, in many places, in many ways. You are answering Christ's call to:

"Do all the good you can, in all the places you can, to all the people you can."


The Cabinet already knows any possibilities in our conference, and at this moment, no obvious one has surfaced. Now it is looking across the other conferences, and that is done mainly through "networking." Sound like a business? Unluckily, we don't have any "headhunters," and there is no advertising. The bishop and superintendents do a lot of traveling, and attending meetings, so they know a lot of people.

Our new pastor must arise in an "ah ha" moment in one of the Cabinet member contacts. Sound indefinite and risky? You bet. However, there is more. We will work through the system as outlined, but the ingredient I'm believing firmly is that God (I could also use the term "Universe") is unfolding in our favor and will identify our "person," regardless of system or mechanism. Therefore, our task is to throw out to the Universe who and what we are so that God can identify the proper person.

So what do we "throw out?" Our prayers, our character, our vitality, our energy, our vision, our commitment, our enthusiasm, our spirit, our zeal, our liveliness, and our health as a congregation.

And who does this? Each one of us, for each of us IS St. Luke's. Don't want to scare you, but our new pastor is YOUR responsibility. You be all you can be to embody St. Luke's, and our new pastor will at the correct time appear, as if by a miracle. I'll repeat what I said the first Sunday I was interim pastor: "We will

Sunday Meal has been the only meal resource available to the hungry and homeless in the Denver area on Sunday. It began about 15 years ago with cold sandwiches being taken to street people on Colfax. Now it is a major meal which nourishes thousands each year. Some members of St. Luke's are involved in serving that meal and even more are needed.

The Center for Pastoral

Effectiveness was created by Rev. Selby for the Rocky Mountain Conference to help maintain ministers in ministry. Ministry if done well is one of the most demanding callings. Soon, St. Luke's will be welcoming a refugee family from Liberia, Africa, and helping them get settled in their new home. The family is a single mother with four children, ages 10 months to 10 years. Liberia is a war-torn country from which many people have fled their homes due to the fighting there.

We will be working through Ecumenical Refugee Services in Denver to help the family get set up in an apartment and provide transportation for appointments.

Donations of household items are needed and would be greatly appreciated. These include furniture, kitchen supplies, cleaning supplies, linens, hygiene products and school supplies. A detailed list is provided in the Missions area in the Fellowship Hall.
