The reason that we are that way and the way we approach being invitational comes from our Wesleyan Tradition.

Through his study of scripture, the writings of the church fathers, and his experience of God in his life, John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, believed that God loved all people. Refugee family getting settled

Thank you to everyone who has helped, asked about, welcomed and prayed for the Sharon Jargba family. The Jargbas are our sponsored refugee family from Liberia. Sharon is a single mom with four children – Comfort, age 11; Roland, age 9; Darlington, age 6; and Grace, age 13 months.

In Liberia, Sharon and her family worked as farmers of rice, peppers and other crops in a village called Puto. Neither Sharon nor her children ever went to school to learn to read and write.

Then their peaceful lives were broken by turmoil in Liberia, which started in the early 1990's. When the rebels came to Puto in 2003, the Jargbas and others had to flee. The rebels burned down the village. The refugees walked for one month, one week and one day to the Peace Camp in the Ivory Coast.

On the way, the travelers still feared for their lives. When it was time to sleep, one person would keep watch while the others rested. If they heard a threatening noise, they would move on. Sharon carried Grace and sometimes Darlington during the journey.

Sharon's parents, Elizabeth and Henry Jargba, were killed by the rebels at some point in time. Sharon's common law husband, Garlo Pyne, may have been at some distant location working during the raid on Puto. She lost track of him during the upheaval. He is the father of all four children. He may still be alive. Sharon also has several brothers and sisters she is hoping to find.

Now Sharon is experiencing the ups and downs of adjusting to life in America. Often Sharon is depressed and tired. She is worried about how she will take care of her children on her own. She wants to see her husband again. However, she has truly been uplifted by the company of people from St. Luke's.

Much progress has been made since the Jargbas arrived on November 25, 2003. We have a group of about 8 tutors/mentors for Sharon. Her conversational English is improving quite rapidly. The three older children are all in school and are learning quickly. People from St. Luke's have demonstrated to Sharon numerous American foods and how to cook them.

The two youngest children are on medication to prevent them from developing tuberculosis, to which they were exposed. The family has the basic material comforts – food, a sunny (but cramped) apartment, clothing, furniture and toys for the children.

Sharon and/or her children have been to St. Luke's, various restaurants, the refugee health clinic, the dentist, the local park, Social Security, Medicare and Food Stamp office, homes of St. Luke's members and the Denver Museum of Nature and Science. Sharon has also met several people from Liberia and other countries. Sharon is getting comfortable with the bus system.

Looking to the future, we are working with Ecumenical Refugee Services (ERS) in Denver to develop a plan for selfsufficiency. It may take some time for Sharon to achieve this because she is a single mom and needs to get an education. Sharon currently receives a monthly check from ERS, which will continue through July 1, 2004. All but about \$160 goes for rent, local phone service and electricity.

In addition to this, she has Food Stamps, Medicaid and the generosity of the people of St. Luke's. We are pursuing the availability of low-income housing, in which the tenant pays just 30% of what they earn. We might have Sharon to move into a county, such as Arapahoe, which provides child care assistance. In August, the TANF (U.S. government program) will kick in if Sharon does not yet have a job; we don't know exactly what TANF will provide.
