Janet's Column

Hello from Pensacola, Florida!

Every second week of October, I meet with a group of 45 pastors from United Methodist Churches around the country

for mutual support and learning. "The Gathering" has been meeting for over 30 years with the intent of enhancing the ministry of large membership churches. New pastors join each year. We celebrate the retirement of others. This event marks my 7<sup>th</sup> year of participation.

We take turns hosting. This year, Henry Roberts, First United Methodist Church of Pensacola, Florida, has invited us to Pensacola Beach on the turquoise Gulf of Mexico. In his last messages with transportation arrangements and weather reports, he expressed his gratitude that we were "still" coming. Now I understand his thanksgiving and restraint.

Hurricane Ivan hit Pensacola on September 16, 2004; Hurricane Dennis retraced Ivan's path on July 10, 2005. I am stunned at the devastation that remains. Due to slow insurance claims, the lack of enough construction professionals, and the shortage of construction materials, only about 20% of the homes, businesses, and hotels are under reconstruction. Most sit empty, stripped of roofs, siding, windows, many with gaping holes. The sand dunes washed over the island. Sand is piled against buildings and covering the roadways. Mountains of debris line, what used to be, a scenic roadway. The city of Pensacola lost about 50% of its trees. This barrier island is almost treeless.

I've spoken to hotel staff, volunteers at the Gulf Shores National Seashore, wait personnel in restaurants, and members of First UMC. People are grateful to tell their stories. Indeed, they are appreciative that we remember them and have come to share in the efforts of recovery, even by bring-

ing business to the lost tourism industry. Most express concern about the short term memory of the country. When Katrina and Rita moved on shore in Mississippi, Alabama, and Louisiana, Florida's losses become yesterday's news.

I am grateful for your commitment to make a difference in the lives of people who hurt. I am proud of our Senior High Youth for their decision to re-direct their



2006 summer mission trip to Hurricane relief on the Gulf Coast. (The Pumpkin Patch will fund that initiative as well as our Junior High youth trip to United Methodist Camp Buckhorn's ministry with persons with disabilities.) You have responded with school kits and flood buckets and health kits for shipment to the United Methodist Committee on Relief.

Our efforts do not go un-noticed by the persons who continue to live in the midst of devastation, upheaval, and loss. First United Methodist Church of Pensacola expresses its thanksgiving for the connection of the "cross and flame". I do, too!

We are planning to follow last year's mission trip to Lemoa with another trip to the same area in March, 2006. Guatemala was recently devastated by Hurricane Stan and we expect there will be requests for many volunteer teams to help the people rebuild their lives.

#### The following is a report from Mark Ely, our Guatemala mission trip leader:

You have probably heard about recent problems in Guatemala due to Tropical Storm Stan. Mudslides have wiped out entire villages, with some covered too deeply to be dug out. The poorest residents of Guatemala were affected the most, since they live in areas that are precarious even in dry weather. More than 420 communities were affected; there are currently 90,000 people living in government shelters. Most major highways have been cut off; there have been landslides in many towns.

The most urgent need right now is for funds for buying relief supplies. Pura Vida is now collecting and sending donations to the Methodist Church of Guatemala. Headquartered in Quetzaltenango, one of the hardest-hit areas, the church is ideally situated to respond to this disaster. Church leadership is currently working out a long term plan for recovery including health care and prevention, rebuilding of homes, recovery of crops, family counseling and spiritual support. **PEAK Adventures, Elementary Sunday School at 9:30.** Last month Lynne told you a little about Joy Trek, our Sunday School program for preschoolers at both 9:30 and 11:00. This month I'd like to reintroduce **PEAK** Adventures, St. Luke's Workshop Rotation Program. The workshop concept for

Sunday School is cutting edge in Sunday morning programming supported by studies of learning styles and information pretension. It provides our children an opportunity to experience one Bible story through six different activities or workshops. Our six workshops are **Storytelling, Art, Computer, Science, Cooking** (really it should be called Eating) **Games and Video**. The classrooms are transformed into multi-dimensional learning environments that allows variety and addresses every different learning style.

Studies have shown that we retain information better when we experience it through more than <u>one</u> process. For example, we retain;

> 10% of what we **READ** 20% of what we **HEAR** 30% of what we **SEE** 50% of what we **SEE** and **HEAR** 70% of what we **SAY** 90% of what we **SAY** and **DO** 100% of what we **EXPERIENCE!**

#### The PEAK Team: Workshop Leaders and Guides

Workshop <u>leaders</u> are responsible for the lessons each week. A curriculum is provided to the workshop team for each rotation. This team reviews the lesson, makes any creative adjustments they feel would benefit the activity and collects the necessary supplies. One or two individuals volunteer to lead the activity for every week in the rotation. Consistency is the key for several reasons. Only one lesson needs to be planned for the entire rotation with minor adjustments being made for the different age levels each week. As the leader repeats the lesson each week improvements can be made, the leader becomes more relaxed with the process and can focus on the content. This provides a richer, more interesting and meaningful learning

experience for the children. With the same leader repeating the same lesson each week, they know what supplies are needed, where they are stored and what needs to be set up decreasing preparation time. The team is always available to substitute when necessary and for creative advice when determining what adjustment might help the flow of the lesson.

Gradelevel <u>guides</u> provide the relational part of out adult team. They are there early to retrieve and set up the attendance box, greet the children as they come to the classroom and welcome visitors. During the lesson they assist the workshop leader and help keep the kids engaged and actively involved. At the end of Sunday School it is the Guides who make sure our children are safely released to their parents and the attendance box stored for the next Sunday. The Guide Team provides the consistency of a familiar adult in the classroom that is so important to our children's comfort level.

If you haven't had an opportunity to see PEAK Adventures in action, please come down any Sunday at 9:30 and check it out. You will be amazed!

Our second rotation, **<u>David</u>**; <u>The Boy</u>, will begin October 23 and continue five weeks to November 20.

This unit uses the Bible story from 1 Samuel 16:1-23, 17:20; 2 Samuel 5:1-12; and Psalm 23.

Children will have the opportunity to: learn and retell:

- the boyhood stories of David & recognize that the stories of David are found in the book of 1 Samuel in the Old Testament;
- realize that God saw something in David that no one else could see;
- identify stories from David's childhood that reveal the characteristics that helped him become a great king;
- discover that everyone has God-given gifts, and that God cares more about what is on the inside than how we appear on the outside;
- study ways God uses ordinary men and women to accomplish God's work in the world.

### Thoughts from Fred

I have lived in Colorado longer than any other state, even more than my first eighteen years in Alabama. So I can say I'm a Coloradoan, and glad for it. I did live an interesting eight years in Oregon. Loved metro Portland, the trees, and the coast, even the rain. One particular thing I'm glad for is that I got to vote for the "right to die" amendment in '94. It passed, then was overturned, but later was voted in again with an even greater margin. It is now before the Supreme Court, and I have some fear they will throw it out. I have doubts that I'll have a chance to vote in Colorado for the same issue. At least there have been a sizeable number of people in Oregon who have used the law so their lives could end with choice and dignity.

Why did I vote for it in '94, and would again? For one thing, the arguments against such a law are highly dubious. "We mustn't play God." "God alone can determine the time to die." Remember Terri Shiavo? The cry was that removing the tubes and letting her die was playing God. No !! "Playing God was when the tubes were inserted in the first place. "Playing God" is done

every day in every hospital in the metro Denver area. How do we know but that God "is calling this person home today" only to have some physician insert some tubes which gives "this person" another twenty years of life?

If it is my choice that someone should play God and give me more years of life, then I should also have the right, when my life gets to a certain point, not to try to prolong life, but to help life end with less pain and more dignity.

I didn't just pull my thoughts on this out of the air. In forty-plus years of ministry I watched a number of people, who if I had been in their situation, I would have wanted the freedom to "pull the plug." I hope we'll get to the time in Colorado when we'll face this issue.

By the way, I don't need to have anyone agree with me on this. It is very personal and individual.
