March 24th, 2006, a team of 22 people left for Lemoa, Guatemala. We left with open hearts and minds, ready for whatever was before us. At one point during the week, Ken Fong requested a moment to video each one of us, sharing what touched us the most during this mission trip. When it was my turn to be interviewed, it took me a while to think about what I really wanted to share. Sharing can be hard enough, let alone on video! There were so many things I wanted to tell about... but what spoke to me the loudest? It might have been how touched I was with this special group of people, who willing left their comfort zones to share life with the beautiful people of Guatemala,

or was it getting reacquainted and playing outdoor games with the children in the Hogar del Nino Orphanage? It could have been visiting the 6th grade classroom at the Lemoa public school, an adobe hut separated from the main school, in the back of a corn field. I recalled the hard physical labor of hauling sand, gravel, cement powder, and concrete blocks for the orphanage classroom and the retreat bathroom. Maybe I would talk about the heart

ST. LUKE'S DIVERSITY REFLECTED IN SPIRITUALITY STYLES

What a delight to listen to your reflections on our "Searching for Spirituality" worship series! Your responses to learning about spirituality are as diverse as the faith backgrounds and spiritual

pathways that we bring to our life together.

The "Searching for Spirituality" experiences were based on research by Corinne Ware on spiritual typologies or preferences. Knowing how we are spirituality different from or the same as other people can help us understand our strengths. Such knowledge may suggest new ways in which we can grow together so that spiritual experience becomes richer. You may review the **Spirituality Wheel** and the spiritual styles of Head, Heart, Mystic, and Kingdom on the St. Luke's website at www.stlukeshr.com

According to our survey results in discerning our PRIMARY SPIRITUAL STYLES, 38% of St. Luke's relate to God out of a HEAD spirituality, a thinking spirituality that values study, reflection, and living the faith congruently with one's vocation, beliefs, and values. The second strength of St. Luke's congregation is HEART spirituality at 26%. This spiritual style embraces the "affect" of worship, feeling the presence of God through word, music, and community. Both of these spiritual styles experience God as immanent and personal.

The third spiritual strength of St. Luke's is MYSTIC spirituality at 23%. Mystics enjoy contemplative worship with a blending of prayer, silence, ritual, music, and scripture. The fourth spiritual strength of our congregation is KINGDOM spirituality. At 13%, this spirituality reflects our deep commitment

to missions and social justice. Many KINGDOM seekers live their spirituality in the world, acting as prophets and change agents so that the Kingdom of God many be realized in the social structures of the culture. Our KINGDOM people push us, teach us, and lead us into the world to make a difference.

Our secondary preferences affirm a pattern which reveals a congregational leaning toward both Head and Heart, but name our growing edges toward mysticism and justice ministries. The secondary strengths were 39% HEART, 28% HEAD, 19% MYSTIC, and 19% KINGDOM.

Again, these percentages reflect our diversity and our commitments, our richness and our depth. What an exciting opportunity we have as a community of faith to learn from one another, to engage God from the multiple facts of the Holy One, and to stretch our experience to invite growth. The statements of feedback affirm a variety of worship experiences, the giftedness of our music and drama ministers, the hope of expanding into more contemplative, mystic settings for worship, the use to worship elements from our Christian tradition, the desire for reasoned engagement with theological thought and social issues, and the hope that worship connects in relevant ways to daily life.

Growing our spiritual life as a congregation is the hope of increasing the vitality of God's Spirit in us, as individuals and as a community of faith. The work of the Holy Spirit is to conform us to the image of Christ. Our worship leadership will continue to listen to the congregation and to God so that we might grow into full humanity by living the life of Christ.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The Social Principles, The Nuturing Community

This is the third in a series of articles to help members and constituents of St. Luke's learn a little more about the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church.

In the past months, I've given an overview of what the Social Principles are and a summary of the section on "The Natural World." This month's topic is "The Nurturing Community." Following Wesley's emphasis on grace, the UM Church indicates that "all persons are important – because they are human beings created by God and loved through and by Jesus Christ and not because they have merited significance." No matter who you are, where you are on your spiritual journey, or what struggles you may have experienced, you are important. We all, as a community, can "nurture human beings into the fullness of their humanity." At St. Luke's, we promise to do this each time we join together in baptism.

This section in the Social Principles then discusses several issues that can best be addressed within a nurturing community:

- The Family
- Other Christian Communities
- Marriage
- Divorce
- Single Persons
- Women and Men
- Human Sexuality
- Family Violence and Abuse
- Abortion
- Ministry to those who have experienced an abortion
- Adoption
- Faithful Care for Dying Persons
- Suicide

Most of us likely agree on some of these issues ("People who have experienced abuse and violence in their family should be loved and supported." "Single people are just as important as those who are married.") However, at various times in the church's history, disagreement on some issues seem more widespread than agreement. Reading the Social Principles shows a community that nurtures, despite disagreement. The current tough issues of abortion and human sexuality contain language reflecting the struggle in identifying a common statement, and have wording carefully shaped in light of these struggles. The struggle to find balance is evidence of the importance of all voices, and the continuing sentiment throughout is that every person is a creation of God's, and every person is important.

As in many churches, issues around homosexuality are friction points in the United Methodist Church. The discussion of human sexuality states that

"homosexual persons no less than heterosexual persons are individuals of sacred worth," that the "practice of homosexuality" is "incompatible with Christian teaching," and that "families and churches" should not "reject or condemn lesbian and gay members and friends." The clear tension between the phrases reflects the diversity of traditions, experiences, reasoning, and understandings of scripture of the many members of the church. This language – the church's official position – is part of the growing, communal nature of the Social Principles. As part of the Book of Discipline, sections of the Social Principles can be changed every four years, based on proposals brought to the General Conference. Like each of us, and like the church, the Social Principles are works in progress; with God's grace, they move more or less closer to God's vision for us as they grow and change.

The church believes that by listening to each other, we can hear God's call in the community. Through these articles, I hope that all of us will able to listen to others' perspectives and try to understand how that person came to that place. As we talk and listen to God's voice in each other, our beliefs can grow, we can journey together in faith, nurturing each other's growth to full humanity along the way.

in the evening. Then again, listening to the stories of Sister Helen and Sister Connie, telling us about the war that so many Guatemalan's lost their lives in, really hit home. All of these thoughts have strong and meaningful messages, but I found what I wanted to share the most, was something I hadn't felt on a mission trip before. It probably isn't the most earth shattering or dramatic event, but it's what touched my heart. I have a feeling what I'm about to share, probably didn't really happen the way I remember it, but here it goes. At the beginning of one of our Bible Day Camps, after the bible story had been told, after the songs were song, we lined all the 300+ children up into 4 lines. On this one particular day we handed out small paper hearts out to each one of the children. One by one. As we handed them a heart, Laura Richards and I took turns saying, "Jesus te ama" or "Jesus loves you." What I remember is everything being so quiet and still, and as I said the words I looked into each one of those beautiful brown eyes, on their small, moist, dust covered faces and realized that the most important thing I could do on this trip, at this time, was to share those 3 beautiful words, "Jesus te ama." If Ken was videoing at that time, it probably was anything but quiet and still, but this moment filled me with peace that I can barely describe. Now, granted, a lot of these children are probably Catholic and have heard these words before, but what was different this time for me, was I said the words... out loud. Their little nods of the head or quiet voices saying "Gracias" just made everything seem so complete. So many times on mission trips I see and feel the physical needs, and it can overwhelm me, but this time it was different. It's then that I remembered that some where in the Bible, it talks about listening for the whisper. Thank you, Jesus, I think I heard it.

Travel With a Purpose: My Trip to Guatemala

Hola! After weeks of preparation and anticipation, our church group of 22 arrived in Guatemala City at 8:30pm on Friday, March 24. We stayed the night at the largest Methodist Seminary in Latin America. The following morning we traveled the curvy road by way of the "chicken bus" for 3 hours to Chichicastenango. Our afternoon was spent playing with the orphanage children in Lemoa. The highlight of the day for me was seeing their happy, eager faces as they ran across the field to greet us and play with the new toys we'd brought to them. Their animated, grateful, smiling faces touched me deeply. Language was no barrier and we found that to be true with all the Guatemalan people the entire week. I found them a very warm and gracious people. On Sunday we went to the Market where among other things we purchased a brightly colored altar cloth for St. Luke's. That evening we attended the "God With Us" Methodist Church, where the pastor spoke to us in both Spanish and English. Pastor Dave was invited to speak a few words of greeting, also.

On Monday our work week began. We divided into two teams – one worked at the orphanage building on a second story addition and one at the Methodist Retreat Center on a bathroom. We hauled blocks, mixed concrete, built walls, dug trenches, etc. You should have seen those youth go to work! Interacting with the Guatemalan workers was a great experience and respect and admiration grew between us as the week progressed.

Bible Camp began on Wednesday afternoon and started with 100 village children the first day to 400 the last day. Again, this was

a highlight for me. As the little ones came – some even with their mothers and older sisters carrying them – I was touched deeply. When Pastor Dave had the Opening Ceremony on Jesus Loves Me, the children were so reverent and attentive, you could truly feel God's presence as we all sang the song in Spanish, "Cristo me Ama." Every afternoon we also prayed in Spanish, Padre Nuestro (Lord's Prayer). It was awesome.

At night Pastor Dave led us in devotions and we reflected on the day's events. We laughed and we cried, as we told our stories and shared with one another around the fireplace. One night we decided how to allocate the money between the orphanage and John Wesley School, which St. Luke's so generously had raised. Another evening we discussed ways we could continue our involvement with Guatemala, which we'll let you know at a later date.

What I've written above is only a factual summary of what happened in Guatemala and much is missing. I can't begin to express all that the mission trip meant personally. I only know it was a life changing event for me and I would recommend this or a similar trip for anyone.

To be immersed in a culture, interacting with the people, being the hands and feet of Christ is totally different than just visiting a country as a tourist. It's "travel with a purpose" and building relationships. Talk to any of the other team members who went to Guatemala and catch their enthusiasm, too!

Servant Spotlight: Susan Hooke

St. Luke's has no shortage of meaningful service opportunities. With so many important volunteer-driven programs and events, some may find it difficult to choose where to lend their talents, or which opportunity is in most need of their help. Some jump

right in and immediately find their comfort zone. Others may try on many different hats until they find the right fit.

In Susan Hooke's case, she didn't find her true calling – it found her! We'll explain that later. First, let's meet Susan and see how her journey led to that event.

Susan Hooke is a Colorado native, born and raised in Arvada. Her mother owned an antique shop and her father was a well-known attorney. Susan attended Catholic primary and secondary schools and studied recreational, travel and hospitality management at Colorado State and Metro State. She has worked as a flight attendant, a travel agent, a retail store assistant manager and even had a stint in the financial services industry. She and her husband Rob, an attorney, have been married since 1991 and have two children, Ryan, 11, and Samantha, 6. The Hooke Family lives in west Highlands Ranch.

Susan began attending St. Luke's about eight years ago on the recommendation of her neighbor, Michelle Krug. She joined St. Luke's about four years later.

"For the first few months attending St. Luke's, I often cried during services. Raised as a Catholic, I felt tremendous guilt for not attending a Catholic church, but I felt so drawn to St. Luke's, and I felt so welcomed here. I truly believe that God led me to St. Luke's to help me with rough roads that laid ahead," Susan shares.

"My family at St. Luke's was always there for me as we dealt with my own depression and other issues affecting my family," Susan says. "I couldn't have gotten through it without that support."

"Working with these kids energizes me, they inspire me to be a better person. I get so much more out of it than I put into it... I feel that these kids help me as much as – if not more than – I help them." -Susan Hooke Susan and Rob Hooke's personal experiences led them to help start EMPOWER Colorado, an organization dedicated to families of children and youth with brain disorders. (Visit www.empowercolorado.com for more information.)

Despite those trying years, and her involvement with EMPOWER Colorado, Susan still felt compelled to serve St. Luke's.

"I started volunteering at St. Luke's because I believe it is something we should all do for our community, in some way, at some time. There are times in our lives when we can give and there are times in our life when we need to take," Susan says.

For a few years Susan was involved with St. Luke's Caring Connection, the group that,

among many things, organizes and sends meals to new mothers, persons recovering from surgeries or illnesses, and funerals. She was also active with what was formerly called the Family Ministries Team, which organized hayrides, the Christmas "hanging of the greens," and other events.

"Through my involvement with those activities I got to know a lot of St. Luke's youth. I was in awe of their depth and talents. They are such a great group of kids – so much more spiritual than I was at their age!"

About five years ago, then-Youth Director Aaron Shipman called Susan. He told her that SLY (St. Luke's Youth Group for junior- and senior-high school students) needed an adult advisor and that several of St. Luke's teens had specifically requested Susan.

And that is how Susan's true calling found her!

"I have definitely found my niche working with SLY," Susan says. "I get to be a teenager again and have so much fun. Some nights we are silly, playing games like Red Rover, and other nights we are very spiritual. Chris Wilterdink (current Youth Director) recently led a very moving Holy Week exercise involving loaves of bread. I was moved to tears. It is so wonderful to get to be a kid again, acting carefree and silly while also growing spiritually."

As SLY Youth Leader, Susan helps with the Sunday SLY group, drives youth to events and outings, assists with confirmation classes and performs other missions. "Last year I chaperoned SLY at the 'Up With Youth' weekend in Estes Park. I didn't get a whole lot of sleep that weekend!" Susan joked.

"Working with these kids energizes me, they inspire me to be a better person. I get so much more out of it than I put into it," Susan continues. "I have formed so many great friendships, and I feel that these kids help me as much as – if not more than – I help them."



TRUSTEES CORNER

Improving Building Security

One of the primary roles of St. Luke's Trustees organization is to make sure we're doing everything we can to maintain the investment of our church home. While St. Luke's is very blessed to host so very many small and large teams throughout all hours of the day and night, one challenge we must solve together is managing building security.

Based on our past experiences and input from different people within St. Luke's and other similar organizations, beginning in April, the Trustees are launching a four-pronged approach to improving building security.

First, as you may have noticed on signs posted around our building, operations notes in our weekly bulletin and preliminary information shared within some groups, we're changing all of our exterior door locks. There have been so very many keys issued and later reported lost since the launch of our newest building that it's the only way we can reliably implement the new security policy and procedures.

The second aspect of improving security is to introduce a more disciplined process to the management of these new keys. If you need access to St. Luke's outside of business or worship hours, please get a new key from Bonnie in our office. She'll explain our policy and procedures, sign a key out to you and collect a \$25 non-refundable charge per outside key.

Third, as people are entrusted with keys, they're also entrusted with being accountable to check with others in the building before they leave to verify if they're the last one out that evening and to lock the front door. We're implementing a more formal sign-out process using a log book both as a reminder and a record.

Lastly, we're directing all traffic in and out the front door; the routing will minimize the numbers of locks and expense if keys are lost in the future.

Thank you in advance for your understanding and support as we work together to keep St. Luke's and our visitors secure. FINANCIAL UPDATE


First Quarter Financial Results: I'm pleased that the accounting system conversion is now close enough to completion that up-to-date financial reports can be provided for your information and management purposes. The two charts included in this issue of *The Chronicle* will give you information about our performance for the first three months.

Unfortunately, you will note that our income is about \$40,000 short of what we had budgeted. It is my hope that providing you with this information periodically as we go through the year will serve as a reminder

for you to make sure you are current with your giving. This should work much better than waiting until Fall and getting in the panic catch-up mode. We have worked the budget to the point that we should be very close to meeting our goal of breaking even at the end of the year. This will happen if everyone provides the support promised.

After nine months of work, I've learned there is no way to be exactly correct in income projection. However, that is no reason not to try. A procedural approach is much more accurate than no approach. The best we can do is to use our giving history to determine what percent of our annual income we can historically expect each month. The budget this year includes that monthly percentage distribution using the last three years. This approach did work pretty good for the last months of last year.

The chart for the expenses is showing we spent about \$25,000 less than budgeted. That is great. However, I'm not sure if the money was not spent because the budgeted amount was too high or if the timing in the budget was incorrect. I'm working on a report that will allow me to address the timing issue better for future reporting.



First Quarter Giving Statements Mailed: You should have received your first quarter giving statement by now. They were mailed on April 10. Please review your statement and let me know if corrections are needed.

Check Writing Policy: My policy is to write checks on Wednesdays for signatures and disbursement on Thursdays or Fridays unless some type of true emergency occurs. If you spend personal funds for which you are to be reimbursed, keep it mind the process may take 7 to 10 days from the time you get your reimbursement approved and delivered to me. Also, keep in mind that I'm only allowed to sign small checks in true emergency situations. Otherwise, the checks are signed by the Treasurer or Finance Team Leaders.

Vacation Time Is Near – Don't Forget to Sign Up For Electronic Funds Transfer: Why worry about getting your checks to the Church while your away on vacation or business? Give yourself some relief. Sign up for the Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) program that will automatically do the paperwork for you. It's easy. You fill out the form indicating monthly or semi-monthly withdrawals, the date(s) you want withdrawals to happen and get the form along with a voided check to me.
