Stephen Ministers are Ready to Care

On January 8th St. Luke's commissioned a class of 19 new Stephen Ministers, bringing our total active ministers up to 21. Each person attended 50 hours of training to better listen, care, encourage, pray, and walk alongside hurting persons during difficult times. This distinctively Christian care is confidential, free, and has proven helpful in a wide variety of situations dealing with crisis or challenge, such as divorce, grief, loss of job, hospitalization, relocation, or loneliness.

So, what happens now? How do we match our trained Stephen Ministers with those needing care? Each of our members or constituents can speak with a pastor or Stephen Leader about receiving care themselves, or learn how to refer a friend, neighbor, coworker, or relative. The problem is that most people are more open to giving care than to receiving it.

But God created us to be interdependent rather than tough it out on our own. The New Testament underscores this theme with more than 50 verses that contain the words "one another". These verses include admonitions such as "love one another", "encourage one another", "build one another up", and "pray for one another". The "one another" wording gives them a reciprocal meaning – we are also to allow others to love, encourage, build up, and pray for us!

Our Stephen Ministers know all about receiving care. Many of them have been on the receiving end of care at an earlier point in their lives – something that has motivated them to give care now. They know how difficult it can be to ask for help, but they also know the great personal and spiritual growth and healing that follows. They know how to respond in a loving, caring, and nonjudgmental manner.

If you find yourself now or in the future facing difficulties in life, don't succumb to society's norm of remaining strong and suffering alone. Take the courageous step of seeking help. Open your heart to receiving God's love and grace through another person. Our Stephen Ministry offers the opportunity of a very confidential relationship with someone who will listen to you and provide you with the care and encouragement you need, while Christ works inside to bring rest and healing in your heart.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR



DAY BY DAY ALONG THE WAY: CELEBRATING LENT AND EASTER - REV. JANET FORBES

Day by day, Oh, dear Lord, Three things I pray: To see Thee more clearly, Love Thee more dearly, Follow Thee more nearly, Day by day.

To speak of the way is to seek a path, or to point to a road, or to make a journey.

In the Bible, Jesus is identified as "the Way" to a new relationship with God, which issues in a new quality of life and a new way of living in the new community of companions.

Our Lenten worship will celebrate the community of people that Jesus gathers and the journey that we share. We will explore what it means to be a spiritual friend of Jesus and a follower of the Way, day by day. Using the lyrics from the musical, *Godspell*, which will be presented in worship on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, April 13 and 14, we will explore some of the central teachings of Jesus.

The Chancel Choir will honor the depth of love that grows between persons on the Way and anticipate

the grief and loss among Jesus' friends as they sing Mozart's *Requiem*.

The Bible tells us that before Jesus began to teach the people on the way he prepared himself by spending forty days praying in the wilderness. We call these forty days Lent, and Lent is the time when Christians prepare for the celebration of Easter. Some people still give up a favorite food during Lent, but in the Middle Ages, everyone had to go without eating meat or lard or eggs for the whole forty days.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Our Service of Ashes will be on Wednesday, March 1, at 7:00pm in the sanctuary. We will burn the palm branches from the celebration of Palm Sunday last year and use the ashes to mark a cross on our palms or foreheads. This brief service will be experiential and family friendly.

On Tuesday, February 28, everyone makes a good start by confessing their sins and having them shriven – in other words, forgiven. That is why the day is called Shrove Tuesday. After confession, they cook a meal of pancakes, using up all the eggs and lard in the house. Shrove Tuesday is still called, "mardi gras", which means "greasy Tuesday", when all the grease and fat in the house have to be used up. At St. Luke's, we will celebrate Mardi Gras at a Dinner Dance with the Ministers of Swing on Saturday, March 4.

Plan to join with other companions of the Way during the Sundays of Lent.

FINANCE UPDATE: New Convenience For YOU-Electronic Funds Transfer:

You are encouraged to sign up for the new Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) program we now have for your convenience in paying your pledge. Enjoy the convenience of having your pledge deducted from your account without the hassle of having to write a check. It's easy. You fill out the form indicating monthly or semi-monthly withdrawals, the date(s) you want withdrawals to happen and get the form along with a voided check to me. We currently have about 20 enrollees with more enrolling weekly. Forms are always available in the Narthex.

How's Your Gas Bill Doing?: Ken Fong and Dan Kuhl are to be congratulated for doing an outstanding job of managing our energy bill here at St Luke's. Through their efforts, our January payment was only \$132.00 more than January 2004. The actual bill was \$2,809.94. Ken and Dan, keep up the good work!

Thank You For Your Response: In December, the Stewardship Team announced that we need about \$140,000 more in pledges to cover the 2006 budget. As of February 1, we were within \$34,000 of meeting that need. The responses included additional responses on the initial blue pledge cards and \$51,000 in new pledges on the green cards. Finance Team and Ministry Council are encouraged by the response and have decided to work through the first four months of the year before making any cuts to the budget. However, the goal remains to end the year with a balanced budget for the first time in the past few years. Their decision is based in part on the fact that our preliminary January giving performance appears to be up from our projection. It is not too late for you to express your support. If you have not responded, you are encouraged to find one of the green cards located in the Narthex and respond as soon as possible. With the momentum I've seen in our giving since last July, I'm confident we will be able to cover the \$35,000 and continue to provide the basic programming we have become accustomed to and expect.

Many of you have indicated that if we would just let you know then the congregation will respond to the need. In 2006, we plan to let you know. Plus, you are encouraged to visit with me anytime you have questions about our finances. -Dave Cupp, Director of Finance

CHURCH AND SOCIETY

Where does the United Methodist Church stand on economic issues? What about the environment?

I'm pretty sure that most people at St. Luke's don't lie awake nights with these questions in their heads, but if you were ever wondering, I have the answer for you.

The General Board of Church and Society (GBCS) is a large group (kind of like a committee on the global level), that helps the UM Church as a whole stay focused on issues of the community, resources, and world relationships. The Discipline (the set of rules and agreements that are maintained every four years at General Conference) states that this group is responsible for implementing the Social Principles (a part of the Discipline specifically aimed at social issues) and responding to other social concerns of the General Conference.

We have Social Principles?

You bet we do! Stemming from John Wesley's understanding of the importance of addressing social issues, the UM Church has long had Social Principles that speak to how we should treat the earth, and one another, from family members to distant fellow humans. They address ideals for economic and political relations as well. Throughout, they express the unity of voice that is sometimes found in the church, as well as the diversity of opinion that is expressed when we struggle with finding a common solution. The Principles are ever changing. Paragraphs and phrases are added, deleted, or modified every four years at General Conference (the next world gathering will be in 2008).

Do we have a group at St. Luke's?

We are just starting a committee of "Church and Society" (sometimes called Social Concerns) at St. Luke's. Some of our goals include providing information about the Social Principles, and encouraging conversation about the role of church in society–thus this article. We also hope to help everyone in our church family become active in working towards the parts of these principles that speak to them.

In a church as diverse as the United Methodist church and St. Luke's, not everyone will agree with all parts of the Social Principles. One of the nice things about being a United Methodist is not only that we don't have to agree, but also that we can talk and work together to make these principles closer reflections of how God calls each of us to be active in the world. We also know that each of us can grow by talking and worshipping in Christian community with those who disagree.

How can I learn more about these principles?

Look for more information about the principles in upcoming issues of *The Chronicle*. We hope to provide an overview of each of the following sections in the coming months:

- 1. The Natural World
- 2. The Nurturing Community
- 3. The Social Community
- 4. The Economic Community
- 5. The Political Community
- 6. The World Community

For now, feel free to examine more information about the Social Principles in the small booklets available in the church office or in the Book of Discipline (your friendly pastor may loan you a copy). Additional information about the General Board of Church and Society can be found at their website: www.umc-gbcs.org. I'll leave you for now with the Social Creed, the last piece of the Social Principles:

Our Social Creed

We believe in God, Creator of the world; and in Jesus Christ, the Redeemer of creation. We believe in the Holy Spirit, through whom we acknowledge God's gifts, and we repent of our sin in misusing these gifts to idolatrous ends.

We affirm the natural world as God's handiwork and dedicate ourselves to its preservation, enhancement, and faithful use by humankind.

We joyfully receive for ourselves and others the blessings of community, sexuality, marriage, and the family.

We commit ourselves to the rights of men, women, children, youth, young adults, the aging, and people with disabilities; to improvement of the quality of life; and to the rights and dignity of all persons.

We believe in the right and duty of persons to work for the glory of God and the good of themselves and others and in the protection of their welfare in so doing; in the rights to property as a trust from God, collective bargaining, and responsible consumption; and in the elimination of economic and social distress.

We dedicate ourselves to peace throughout the world, to the rule of justice and law among nations, and to individual freedom for all people of the world.

We believe in the present and final triumph of God's Word in human affairs and gladly accept our commission to manifest the life of the gospel in the world. Amen.

Mission Trips to Mississippi Helping with Hurricane Katrina recovery and rebuilding

St. Luke's will be taking two back-to-back teams to Mississippi in June to help with hurricane recovery and rebuilding. I (Betsy Keyack) am planning to lead a team June 4-10. Chris Wilterdink will be leading the Senior High youth to Mississippi the following week. Both teams will be hosted by Wesley UMC in Ocean Springs, Mississippi. Work will involve cleanup and renovation of houses flooded by the hurricanes last year. We will also be listening to the residents talk about their experience and feelings about the disaster. To perform work at a site, volunteers must be age 14 or older. However, if families with children younger than 14 are interested, I will talk to the pastor at Wesley UMC about working something out.

We will be flying into Gulfport, Mississippi and then renting minivans to travel to Ocean Springs, about 30 minutes away. Cost of round-trip plane tickets right now is in the \$350-400 range. I would like to receive applications and at least past of the cost of the travel by March 15, in order to get good plane fares from the travel agent. We are still awaiting details from the church about food and transportation. When I went to Mississippi last October, we were hosted by St. Paul's UMC in Ocean Springs. They provided all the food, lodging and tools we needed.

Reaching Out and Making a Difference: The Sekhars

Marie and Maima Sekhar, our Liberian family, want to send a heartfelt "Thanks" to their friends at St. Luke's for contributing the lovely items needed for their new apartment. They also say thanks to Bill Lee, Susanne and Ron Humphries, Jan and Charlie Rufien, for giving up their Saturday to help with the move.

This past week, their application for political asylum was filed with the U.S. Immigration Service. In the next 8-10 weeks, they should know if they have been granted asylum. Doctors at Children's Hospital have determined that Maima's fragile health prevents her from returning to Liberia and "It would be a death sentence" for Maima.

Once their status is settled, they will be eligible for State and Federal aid; TANF (for rent), food stamps and LEAP, to help with utility bills. FACE the Challenge, a group of doctors that travel to 3rd world countries to perform facial reconstructive surgery, have paid the Sehkar's rent for 3 months. The Missions Board is asking for your help to meet other expenses for the next 2-3 months. The basic needs are food, utilities and phone in the amount of \$300 a month. Again, this is temporary help.

Marie does beautiful ethnic braiding and we all feel she will be able to support herself and Maima once word of her incredible work spreads. She is also cleaning houses.

Dave Cupp has set up a fund for the Sehkars. Anyone wanting to help, should make checks out to St. Luke's and note it is for the Sehkar's Fund. -Thank you!

This unit uses the Bible story included in Mark 14:32-38 where Jesus goes to the Garden to contemplate his fate and pray. Jesus struggled with the best way to be faithful to God and he received strength from trusting God. It's not always easy to be faithful to God, but we too can be strengthened when we trust God.

By the end of the unit children will have:

- heard and explored the story of Jesus praying at the garden
- · offered their own prayers to God
- depicted in various ways their understanding of Jesus' act of prayer
- explored a variety of tools to help them pray
- focused through various means on the power and importance of prayer
- created ways to remind themselves of the story of Jesus praying in the garden

SPOTLIGHT ON ST. LUKE'S MISSIONS: DENUM

Denver Urban Ministries

St Luke's has had a supportive relationship with Denver Urban Ministries, known as "DenUM", for years. DenUM was created in 1981 by a group of Methodist ministers who saw many unmet community needs that could not be met by any individual church. DenUM began its operation out of the basement of the Epworth Methodist Church, on High Street in Denver. It now has the ongoing support of 40 or so churches in Colorado and as many as 80 churches for special events, and is located in a "new" building at 1717 E. Colfax, in the Park West area of the city. Members of St. Luke's congregation regularly donate clothes, food and time to DenUM. You may have seen the blue barrels with DenUM's logo around the church, and noticed that the mission closet is often brimming with bags of donations. These donations are used to

serve DenUM's 55,000 clients and are also distributed through a nonprofit network to other agencies when appropriate.

Six days a week, people come to DenUM because they are hungry and refrigerators and cupboards

are empty. Neighborhood residents on fixed or low incomes stretch their food budgets by coming to DenUM for free produce, bread and dairy items. Homeless workers waiting for day-labor assignments come for sack lunches. DenUM has a staff of 10 or so fulltime and part-time people, with an additional 10 or so staff funded by various programs, and an additional 60 to 90 volunteers at any given time. Volunteers and staff are well-trained and supervised and every effort is made to stretch the almighty dollar to aid those in need.

Generally speaking, the agency meets emergency needs, but also tries to assist clients with long-term needs, by offering job services, legal counseling and referral, visiting nurses for referral, information on housing and shelter, free or very inexpensive clothing to meet immediate needs or job search needs, baby layettes, hygiene packets and of course, food. The food bank allows people to come four times a year. Each full grocery bag of food provides quite a bit of food for a family that has nothing at the time, because they are carefully planned to include essential and complementary items. All people coming for food are asked to meet with a worker, who assesses the person or family's needs and then makes use of the resources and connections DenUM has. Often people using the clothing bank are also referred to the case workers. DenUM tries to give people the most compassionate care possible, and above all maintains an attitude of respect and dignity for its clients. DenUM is trusted and appreciated by its clients and has a good relationship with other service providers. Our contributions to DenUM are put to good use.

And who does DenUM actually serve? The "homeless" as the expression goes. The homeless are actually divided into three categories by the city, and their numbers and situation are researched by a once a year "point-in-time" survey. About 10,000 surveys are conducted by various agencies, asking information about the "homeless" person's actual status on one particular date. Results of this year's survey will tell us how and where people lived on January 23, 2006. Results from previous surveys tell us that, generally speaking, about 100 people a night become transitional, first-time homeless people, and those people make up about 80% of the residents of the shelters. They stay in the shelter system briefly and do not return. On any given night there are 900 or so "episodic" homeless persons, who are shuttling between jail, detox, treatment and hospitals. They tend to be younger people, who require "enriched" transitional housing providing treatment for substance abuse, medical needs and mental health. Also on any given night, Denver cares for 900 or so of the "chronic" homeless, people who tend to be older, with special needs and who average two or more episodes of shelter use, for long periods of time. Of all of these people, 50% are members of a family unit, 22% have permanent work, 10% panhandle, 24% are day laborers, and 21% are children. Fifty percent indicate they are living with "family or friends", and 17% are living in motels. Children who are homeless are twice as likely to repeat a grade, have often changed schools as much as three times in a given year, are diagnosed as having learning

disabilities and language impediments twice as often as other children, and as having three times as many emotional and behavioral problems.

The root causes of homelessness are many, as we

all know, but St. Luke's role as it relates to DenUM is simply to assist in providing support for the many emergency services DenUM provides. We are proud of the job we do for DenUM, and the DenUM staff has expressed its thanks many times. If you are interested in assisting as a volunteer or an advisor to DenUM, you should simply call and leave a message (at 303-355-4896 (extension 310), and the staff will get back to you. If you want to make donations, feel free to bring them in any time to the church. Our church members make sure they get there. Thanks to all who have helped in the past, and thank you in advance for all future assistance.

Also, if you want to join the missions committee, please do so. You will be welcomed with open arms and put to work. Notices of missions meetings and activities are listed in the church bulletin every week. A quick call to the church office can help you too. The missions committee works with many missions. You can choose your interest and contribute as much as you feel you can... we invite you.
