GROWING OUR HEARTS FOR MINISTRY – PLANS FOR 2008

St. Luke's will celebrate our Hearts for Ministry in 2008. We continue to grow our ministries with attention to the wise use of our gifts and God's bounty. Let us join in prayer for these opportunities to grow in faithfulness and future.

- The largest single request for 2008 comes from Staff Parish Relations in support of our gifted staff. The Bold Venture capital campaign allowed us to fund the first year of a full-time Associate Minister serving ministry development (small group ministry), adult education, men's ministries, and young adult ministries. In 2008, we will assume one-half of that portfolio in the operating budget. After no raises in 2007, SPRC is committed to honoring our staff for their excellence.
- We plan to continue increasing our growth toward wider mission giving by 3%. We currently meet only half of our apportionments to the United Methodist Church.
- The Board of Trustees are projecting increases in the cost of utilities and snow removal.

The annual St. Luke's Church Conference is scheduled for Wednesday evening, November 28, at 6:30pm in the sanctuary. Rev. Olon Lindemood, Mile High-Pikes Peak District Superintendent, will be present to preside. We will review the Bold Venture building plans, review membership statistics, elect leadership, approve the pastoral compensations, and receive candidates for the ordained ministry. All members of St. Luke's have voice and vote at this annual business session.

MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR

Thanksgiving is a Way of Life

I remember it as if it were yesterday. My brother and I are visiting a cousin during summer vacation. Granny Brown calls us to dinner. After washing up,

we storm the kitchen and slide into our seats. Our ravenous appetites are thwarted for a moment when Granny silences us and says, "Before you can eat, you must share one thing you are grateful for." At best, it is an unfair interruption. At worst, it is a gross violation of the rhythm of the day. We play hard in those days. We are hungry. It is time to eat. We squirm as each of us gives an answer, then dig into our meal. I do not remember how my sibling and cousin respond to the question. I do remember my muttering something about being grateful for Granny Brown!

Every now and then, when my brother and I are together as adults, one of us will say in memory of our moment with Granny Brown, "What are you grateful for?" While our childhood answers have faded, the question stuck. It is a part of our family formation.

We express gratitude in lots of ways. Sometimes our offering of appreciation centers on that which pleases us. When something we consider good happens, we give thanks. At other times, our thanksgiving is set in sharp relief to those who are not as materially blessed as we.

Thanksgiving takes a curious turn when it is put in the Christian context. The author of I Thessalonians (5:14-18) says, "And we urge you, beloved, to... encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with all of them... Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Iesus for you." Giving thanks in all conditions of life is quite different from thanksgiving for that which is pleasing to us or better than what others might have.

In the Christian scheme of things, thanksgiving is a way of life. It is an attitude toward life. It assumes that all of life is a gift. When we live as if we deserve what we have been given, we live from the notion that we are creator. We place ourselves over life in an arrogant way. G.K. Chesterton, when asked to write one sentence that describes what life is about, said, "The critical thing is whether we take life for granted or whether we take it with gratitude."

Thanksgiving is rooted in the experience of God's radical love for each of us, no matter what. When we come face to face with God's mercy, all we can do is give thanks, even when it is in the midst of consternation, despair, grief, or confusion. Thanksgiving assumes a "receiving" rather than a "taking" posture to life. It extends hands wide open rather than fists clenched tightly.

Ponder your own thanksgiving. For what are you grateful?

BUILDING COMMITTEE RECEIVES FIRST DRAFT OF CONSTRUCTION PLANS

Building Committee Chairperson, Scott Kohrs, reports that our architect, Jim Morgan, is ready to review a draft of the construction plans. Once reviewed by the Committee, there will be opportunities to share the plans with the staff and congregation, District Committee on Church Building and Location, and Douglas County Planning Commission. Our team continues to plan for breaking ground in the spring and opening the new addition in September 2008.

Elected to lead us in the planning and construction of the new youth/ education/chapel addition off the west side of the current facility were: Scott Kohrs, David Rhodes, Randy Larson, Joyce Carnes, Dee Duncan, Ken Fong, Sandi Miyaki, Marge Harper, Peter Waldheim, Tim Krening, Terri Ary. Dave Cupp and Janet Forbes will serve as staff liaison.

The other projects of the Bold Venture Campaign have been prioritized for approval by the Executive Board, once we have determined the final cost of the construction. The Staff Parish Relations Committee is preparing their requests for compensation and benefit plans for our staff team. The Board of Trustees is determining exact costs for the refurbishment projects, especially carpeting, air conditioning, and additional security measures.

Willard and Anna were from Florida and were part of a Princess Cruise tour group that had just arrived in Anchorage after leaving their ship in Seward and riding the train to Anchorage. They were not enjoying themselves. They weren't particularly impressed with the weather, they were getting tired of seeing the trees, snowy mountains, glaciers and expanses of water day after day, they hadn't been able to get a decent night's sleep on the ship; they were eating too much on the ship and on-board telephone calls were just too expensive!

They were tired! And now they were getting cold and wet waiting for a train to depart on the Alaska Railroad from the Anchorage rail station for a two day side tour to Denali National Park. Travel in Alaska does require flexibility and except, for the cruise ships, where everything is planned carefully and controlled exactly, changes are common and often nothing will go as expected. Those who live in the state know that contingency plans are the order of the day.

Distances are long between stopping places, the weather, particularly in August and September, can be alternatively warm and cloudy or cold and rainy, with some snow occasionally mixed in.

If you go the state with a sense of adventure, with an expectation that you will have a good time no matter what comes, and with a willingness to adjust with the weather changes and other circumstances, you will have a good time. But if you go **expecting** trouble, you will have plenty of opportunities to have those expectations fulfilled.

There is in this a profound truth about life.

As Dr. Roy Smith puts it, "Life usually comes out to meet us in about the form we expect it. We usually find what we look for."

Maybe that was what Jesus meant when he said, "seek and ye shall find."

If we start out in the morning confident that something **bad** will happen, chances are that we **shall** end the day quite satisfied that we have met disasters aplenty; self-fulfilling prophesies!

On the other hand, If we start out assuring ourselves that all is going to go well, the majority of the day is apt to fit pretty well into that pattern.

Life has a way of rewarding us with the things we expect, for our **expectations** become the lenses through which we look at life. These lenses color everything we perceive.

Will Rogers exhibited this attitude with his famous quote, "I never met a man I didn't like!" He also said "There is no bad weather; only different kinds of good weather."

Face a thunderstorm or a blizzard with that attitude and you will discover beauty in it. Face it with fear and its threat increases.

There's an old, simple poem:

Twixt the optimist and pessimist

The difference is droll,

The optimist sees the doughnut,

And the pessimist the hole.

Life has its fair share of holes, and it also offers a good many doughnuts.

We cannot control the things that may happen to us, but we can control how we respond.

Don't let your reaction to the irritating stuff blind you to the glorious stuff right beside you!





Emergency Evacuation

Do you know what to do if St. Luke's ever had to evacuate the building in an emergency? Do your children?

On October 28th, we provided answers to these questions and tested our evacuation procedures with our first-ever evacuation drills at the end of all 3 worship services. The evacuations were announced over our paging system. Sunday School teachers escorted their students to designated spots on the west and north sides of the building. Worshippers in the Sanctuary were directed to leave by 3 different routes: those in the northwest part of the Sanctuary go down the stairs and exit through the northwest exit doors, those in the northeast part of the Sanctuary go out the exit by the Choir Loft, and those in the south part of the Sanctuary go through the Narthex to leave through the main (west) doors. Those in Classrooms A and B and the Fellowship hall exit via the deck, and those in the Conference Room and Brad's Office (Classroom C) leave by the South exit.

Parents should NOT go downstairs to retrieve their children; their children will already be outside. Parents should meet their children at their designated spots; the children will not be released by their teachers until parents meet them. Also, please do not leave the parking lot until after emergency equipment has arrived (otherwise, exiting vehicles may block their arrival).

Our goal was to clear the building in 3 minutes or less. The evacuation at the 9:30 service took the longest – 1.5 minutes. So the drill was a success! We also learned we needed to clarify our instructions for those on the main floor who might have trouble going down stairs: these people should leave by the main exit.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Another Good Month!

September was another good offering month. We exceeded our collections goal by about \$8,000 for the month of September. That makes three months in a row with positive results. If we continue at this pace or improve just a little, we will be able to finish the year at breakeven. My projections at the end of September indicated we will be about \$20-25,000 short at the end of the year unless we

continue to increase our collections or find some way to decrease the expected expenses between now and the end of the year. I've worked with the staff in trying to keep our expenses at a minimum for the entire year and for the remainder of the year. At this point, I believe our best approach is to have good collections for the remainder of the year—and hope we don't have to be in competition with the snow. I can't overstress the importance of all of us working collectively to make sure we have a breakeven year.

This would be a great time for everyone to consider giving just a little more than planned between now and the end of the year. If our collections increased about 8% for October, November and December it would make up the \$20-25,000 projected gap between expected income and expected expenses.

So Many Choices Makes Giving Easy And Convenient. Cash, check, card (and card holder) present credit card transactions, scheduled automatic withdrawals from checking or credit card accounts and online credit card transactions are all available to you for doing transactions with St Luke's. The following is a general summary:

- General Fund and Capital Campaign: All methods except card present credit card transactions.
- Grocery Cards: Cash, Check, Scheduled automatic withdrawal from checking accounts.
- Special Events: Depending on the type of event may include cash, check, card present credit card and credit card online transactions. The method(s) available at each event will be announced at the time of the event and are at the discretion of the sponsor. i.e., *Music Man* methods included cash, check, online credit card reservations and credit cards for the silent auction. It appears about 40% of the reservations were made online.

Have You Started Your Financial Planning For The Year End? Shame on me for mentioning "year end." We haven't even celebrated Thanksgiving and Christmas. However, it is less than 60 days away. Here are some things you may want to consider:

- 1. You may want to pay the remainder of your pledges to the general fund and the capital campaign fund by transferring securities to the church and taking the advantages of the tax benefits of doing that. You could include your future year(s) pledges in the one transfer. The amounts for the future year(s) would be put in prepaid and applied in the appropriate time period. Contact me for assistance and to get the routing information your broker will need to make the transfer.
- If you need more deductions in 2007, you might consider prepaying future pledges. The amounts for the future would be put in prepaid and applied in the appropriate time period. Just mark your checks accordingly.
- 3. Make plans to get your last minute giving to the church on or before December 31. We will consider all collections received during 2007 as 2007 contributions unless instructed to apply them to a future year. Contributions received in the mail after December 31 will be posted to 2007 only if they are post marked on or before December 31 and we are not instructed to apply them as 2008 giving.
- 4. If you are 70 ½ years of age, you may be able to roll some of your IRA funds to the church and reduce your taxable income. Check with your tax adviser for this one. Also, as of now, 2007 is your last opportunity to take advantage of this benefit.
