St. Luke's was officially chartered as a congregation of the United Methodist Church on March 13, 1983 with 76 families! On Sunday, March 9, 2008, our 800 families will remember and celebrate 25 years of faithfulness.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR



of Lent: Turn Rev. Janet Forbes Senior Pastor Year with the Imposition of Ashes

The Season

The Christian year tells the story of Jesus in two cycles of time. The year begins with the Christmas cycle of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany as we celebrate Jesus' birth. The story culminates in the Easter cycle of Lent, Easter, and Pentecost with the wonder of resurrection. The turning of the year from one cycle to the next is marked by the tension of two very different holidays... just 24 hours apart.

The Bible tells us that before Jesus began to teach the people he prepared himself by spending forty days praying in the wilderness. We call these forty days Lent, and Lent is the time when Christians prepare for the celebration of Easter. Some people still give up a favorite food during Lent, but in the Middle Ages, everyone had to go without eating meat or lard or eggs for the whole forty days.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, so on Tuesday everyone makes a good start by confessing their sins and having them shriven or shrove — in other words, forgiven. That is why the day is called Shrove Tuesday. After confession, they cook a meal of pancakes, using up all the eggs and lard in the house. Shrove Tuesday is still called, "mardi gras", which means "greasy Tuesday", when all the grease and fat in the house have to be used up.

After your family feasts on pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, our church family will mark the first day of Lent with the observation of Ash Wednesday, February 6, at 7:00pm. All Shrovetide jollity is now over, and people show their sorrow for their past sins by putting ashes on their heads. We prepare ourselves to journey with Jesus through Holy Week to the crucifixion.

Come and worship... observe the turning of the Christian year.



On Tuesday, February 5, St. Luke's will celebrate the end of the season of Epiphany on Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday) or Shrove Tuesday with a traditional pancake supper. Since it was the habit during the season of Lent to abstain from all dairy and butter products, families would eat all the remaining milk and butter (all the fat) with a feast of pancakes. The Tuesday gets its name from the tradition of going to church to have your sins shriven, or forgiven, before taking the mark of ashes.

Our feast will start at 5:30 and serve until 7:00pm, \$5 for each adult and \$3 for each child with a maximum of \$15.00 per family. Our youth ministries will be hosting the meal.

Since this was the last party of Epiphany before the more penitent season of Lent, the evening is marked with fun, silly games, and masquerading. Decorate Mardi Gras masks and crowns, share beads and doubloons, and participate in pancake flipping races.

A SERVICE OF Fire Ashes ON WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 6

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Lenten Season for Christians all over the world. Ashes are placed upon the forehead of those who choose the new life of Christ, confessing the old by fire so that the new may rise from the ashes. The oil represents the anointing of God's Holy Spirit which leads us through the forty days of the Lenten journey.

A Service of Fire and Ashes will be held in the sanctuary on Ash Wednesday, February 6 at 7:00pm. Everyone will be invited to write or draw a confession or a commitment to growth and give it to the flash of the fire! Then, everyone will receive the mark of the ashes and oil on the hand or forehead. This is a 45 minutes family-friendly service in which school-age children can participate fully. Very young children will enjoy the help of a parent.

Catch us, O God, in our aimless scurrying from you and others and hold us in this Lenten season. Hold our hearts to the beat of you grace and create in us a resting place, a kneeling place, a tiptoe place where we can listen for your whispered summons and be attentive to your healing love. In the name of the Holy One of Nazareth. Amen.



More from Les: Change is good! But.....

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea; though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble with its tumult."—Psalm. 46:1-3

"Change is good, change is important in helping keep us strong, flexible and able to adjust to unexpected events in life."

I learned the physical reality and truth of this statement from Rev. Bill Selby in 1992 as I began serving St. Luke's as a part-time lay pastor here,

I had just retired from working, in a variety of positions, for more than 30 years as an engineer and manager for a major oil company. Betty and I had just moved from Alaska to Colorado and I was beginning my seminary studies.

It would be an understatement to say Betty and I were no strangers to change! We had purchased a home in Highlands Ranch because the area was growing and selling a home following graduation and (hopefully) ordination should be relatively easy.

Bill had learned that I had been a licensed local pastor in Alaska and had asked me if I would consider a part time lay pastor's job at St. Luke's. I had agreed and began showing up at the church on days when I didn't have classes at Iliff.

One morning, I walked into the sanctuary (now our fellowship hall) to see Bill tipping one of the many large risers we had up on end! "What are you doing?" I asked, with my face showing confusion and amazement.

Bill smiled, "Here give me a hand as we put these dowels under the edge of the riser." The riser, looking particularly unstable as it stood on end was now mobile!

Bill showed me how to move the riser by pushing as the dowels rolled and acted as wheels. At the riser moved in the intended direction, the back dowel would be picked up and placed at the front of the riser in the direction we intended to move it. Two people could move a lot of risers in a relatively short time..... and we did!

"We are relocating the altar area." Bill said. "These four risers go to the west wall of the room. Then we will move the choir risers to the south wall." He smiled at my amazement. "The organ will be down here next to the choir.

By the end of the morning the sanctuary was completely transformed. "We will need to leave signs and tell the ushers to guide parishioners into the new seating arrangement."

"I don't understand, Bill, why are we doing this?" He replied, "The congregation has grown so much that we need to rearrange the seating so that worshippers can be as close to the altar as possible. The old system, with the altar on the south wall, tends to separate too many of the people from the altar area.

"Change is good," he said, it keeps us from growing stale in our attitude toward worship.

I discovered that this riser moving was not a one-time exercise; we would move the location of the altar area several times over the following months. When there was a theatrical production, everything moved! On one Sunday the risers were aligned in a "T" shaped formation, providing a runway into the seating area. Then a clown service was done in full makeup and costume and all the parts of the ritual were done in pantomime with a lot of audience participation! (The clown service is a topic for some other month!)

In all seating arrangements or situations where changes were made, there was, however, one element that did not change. Regardless of the seating, all faced the altar and Cross. "Keep that focus" Bill said, "Keep you eye on God, regardless of where the encounter may occur." We need to stay flexible in our faith journeys so that our eyes and ears are open to God's presence in even the most unfamiliar and challenging situations."

We change, our lives change, almost continuously; we may move the furniture in our lives, we may suddenly find ourselves standing in unfamiliar ground, but God does not change.

Nuba Water Project brings water and life to a place in Sudan that is suffering from chronic shortages of water and decades of war – the Nuba Mountains. News about Darfur in western Sudan is in the media nearly every day. The Nuba Mountains are only a few hundred miles to the east of Darfur and, from 1980 until 2002, experienced genocide and civil war just like Darfur is today. The images we see in the media about Darfur are

indistinguishable from the images of war in the Nuba Mountains. And while the war in Darfur has been raging for 4 long years, the Nuba suffered for more than twenty years.

In spite of the destruction of war and the shortage of clean water, there is hope. The fact is – there is enough water. The rainy season drops the same amount of water on the Nuba Mountains as Colorado receives each year. We get snow in the winter to fill our reservoirs, they get rain during their four-month rainy season – but they don't have any means to hang onto this water. Most of it just runs off downstream.

Nuba Water Project uses donor capital to build water infrastructure that captures, holds and distributes seasonal rains. Locally governed water boards then manage the water works. They operate as a water board would here in the US; charging customers for water so there is money to maintain and repair the water infrastructure. Nuba Water Project trains and advises these water boards and provides financial oversight and accountability.



Martha and Steve Riley, St. Luke's members met the co-founders of Nuba Water Project at a dinner party. George Tuto and Ibrahim Agor (pictured with Steve Riley at left) were hosting a party to thank the people that had helped

George's family settle into their new home in Lakewood. The Tuto's had to move from Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina. Martha was sharing about her upcoming trip to South Sudan where she was helping build a school for girls. George and Ibrahim wanted to do something similar for their homeland, the Nuba Mountains in central Sudan. The greatest need for the people in the Nuba Mountains is water – more than doctors, more than jobs, more than education. So, the three of us founded Nuba Water Project – "Bringing Water and Life" to the Nuba Mountains!

We travel to the Nuba Mountains in February to begin working on two projects: the Miri Reservoir Pipeline Project and the Bilo Village Dam. The Miri Pipeline will serve two villages with approximately 3,000 people through a water pipeline drawing from an existing reservoir. The Bilo Village Dam is a small earth, rock and concrete dam built to capture rainwater for a village that currently has no water supply whatsoever.

Thanks to the generosity of the St. Luke's family and others who attended the Jazz Benefit Concert on November 15th, Nuba Water Project received over \$2,000 in donations! We estimate the cost of constructing the Miri Pipeline is \$27 per meter so the money we received will purchase at least 70 meters, nearly 245 feet, of much needed water pipeline.

We are so grateful for the opportunity to share our story and our hope for the future of Sudan!

Thank You! Thank You for Making 2007 a Winning Year!

Thank You!.... It appears we have completed another year of spending no more than we collected. I'm in the process of verifying, checking and making year end adjustment before I will know for sure exactly how the year ended. However, I'm not expecting any surprises. Your generosity and the prudent spending and attention to the budget by those in charge of spending funds truly created a winning team. Let's do it again in 2008.

Looking Ahead to the Remainder of 2008

of Finance Income: Our Hearts for Ministry Stewardship Campaign for 2008 was very successful. We now have more pledged dollars than we did at this time last year. Also, we had a good number of pledges indicating an increase over 2007. Considering the positive results from the stewardship campaign and the positive program changes such as the addition of the Fusion worship service taking place, the 2008 budget includes a nominal 5% increase in income from collections.

Expenses: The budget for 2008 is very similar to 2007 with a few minor changes. It is structured for us to have another break even year. Of special note is the fact that the 2008 budget includes monies to pay 100% of our tithe to the Rocky Mountain Conference. As far as I know, this will be the first time this has happened in the life of St Luke's.

The program for giving beyond St Luke's is new for 2008. This has been know as apportionments with the Annual Conference apportioning the costs to the local churches based upon some complicated formulas. This year we are asked to tithe our income plus 1%. We are to determine our income for the month and forward 11% to the Conference after adjusting the income for such things as designated giving, capital expenditures and our debt service. This is a fair way of accomplishing the goal and easy to administer. It was approved by an over whelming majority of delegates at our 2007 Annual Conference. Your delegates voted in favor of the much needed change. The fact that we can adjust our income by deducting the debt service places this

amount at around \$100,000 which is much more doable than the \$135,000 asking for 2007 of which we gave \$72,000. I think it is great that we can now be recognized as a true partner in the work of our church in the rocky mountain region, nationally and around the world just as our neighboring churches. The Conference will typically collect around 95% of the anticipated income while we've been giving under 60%.

Does Your Place of Employment Have a Charitable Matching Fund?

There are many companies which have a fund setup specifically for giving back to the community in which they are located. This may be in the form of matching gifts made by their employees to charitable organizations or merely funds for which employees and/or charitable organizations may apply to for donations (community grants).

We are a registered 501(c) (3) corporation eligible to receive such gifts. I will be happy to assist you if you have the opportunity to take advantage of one of these opportunities. In 2007 we had one member apply for and receive a matching donation of \$5,000 from a major corporation where they work and another applied to a major local retailer and received a \$1,000 donation to our mission program.

Don't Forget We Have Many Choices to Make Your Giving to SLUMC Easy And Convenient.

We currently have over \$490,000 of our general fund and bold venture capital campaign fund donations coming from the electric funds transfer (eft) and online methods—over 100 transactions per month. You may want to consider one of these convenient methods for 2008.

In addition to cash and checks, we offer credit card transactions (either in person or online), stock transfers and scheduled automatic withdrawals from checking or credit card accounts for you to use in doing your transactions with St Luke's. The following is a general summary:

- *General Fund and Capital Campaign:* All methods. However, you need to call ahead to use your credit card in person here at the office to make sure I'm here to process the transaction.
- Grocery Cards: Cash, Check, Scheduled automatic withdrawal from checking accounts.
- Special Events: Depending on the type of event may include cash, check, card present credit card and credit card online transactions. The method(s) available at each event will be announced at the time of the event and are at the discretion of the sponsor. i.e., The Music Man methods included cash, check, online credit card reservations and credit cards for the silent auction. It appears about 40% of the reservations were made online.
