The patients at the clinic, their families and the Camanchaj community have showed us boundless grace by their gratefulness, trusting that we could heal their pains and improve their lives. Wednesday, September 3, in Guatemala, was pretty much an ordinary day. I was running our Surgical Mission at Camanchaj, screening gynecologic and obstetric needs, and performing much-needed gynecologic surgery for women in this remote district of Guatemala. Our 30-member team had put in about 9 hours work and was preparing to wind down and go back to our hotel for the night.

Suddenly, our Pura Vida liaison ran into the room and told me that the local fire/rescue team, the Bomberos, were on the radio with an urgent problem. They were inbound with a young woman in the process of childbirth. There seemed to be a possible problem with the umbilical cord, and the bombers knew that there were obstetric doctors at the Salud y Paz clinic. The wanted to know if we would be willing

## Hearts for Ministry: What Do I Really Care About?

*For where your treasure  
is, there your heart will  
be also.* (Matthew 6: 21)

"Hearts for Ministry" is the theme of our upcoming campaign to encourage us to be faithful in ministries envisioned for 2009. It is more than a theme—it's an effort to show how our congregation can make a lasting difference in the lives of children, youth, adults, and families.

Stewardship always asks the question: What do I really care about? In what will I invest my life and my resources? I would like for more and more families to enter into the joy of investing in St. Luke's and spiritual formation. Commitment Sunday is November 16 – With Glad and Generous Hearts.

Our Hearts for Ministry Team is asking each of us to consider disciplined, proportional giving. For those that give a percentage of their income now; take another step to two this year toward the biblical goal of the tithe or 10% of the household income for God's work.

Stewardship is not about money, it's about what we do with our money. Our pastoral team will be sharing what God has to say about the vital role of stewardship in our personal lives.

Author Rich Cunningham has described the four purposes of giving.

- Give to honor God. Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. -2 Corinthians 9:7

- Give to serve the needs of others. A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, as I have loved you. -Matthew 35:40
- Give so that you may deepen your spiritual journey. Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries. -1 Corinthians 4:1
- Give out of gratitude to support the life, ministry, and mission of St. Luke's. Remember the Lord your God for it is the Lord who is giving you power to make wealth that God may confirm a covenant. -Deuteronomy 8:18

Our giving and our sharing of our money is a deeply spiritual, devotional act. Giving is a spiritual exercise, a spiritual discipline just like prayer is a spiritual discipline. Prayer is not something optional if we have decided to follow Christ. It comes with the job description. Serving other people is not something optional. It is one of the spiritual practices. Worshipping God is not something we vote on. It is one of the spiritual practices. It is the same with giving. It is an act of devotion. It is a spiritual discipline for all Christians just like praying or serving or worshipping. And that is why we call the act of bringing a portion or our resources forward to dedicate to God's work an offering, instead of a collection. It is an offering of our lives and ourselves and our treasure. The money symbolizes our lives and our work. It is a very spiritual thing. We are not balancing the budget here in this act, we're balancing our lives.

As we seek to live by three simple rules to do no harm, to do good, and to love God, let us do so with

"Miracle" continued from page 1 to see this woman, or if they should continue down the mountain to Chichicostanago where the district hospital would be able to care for her. The only problem was, that was another 40 minutes away, on a good day! Since the other two doctors were in surgery, it fell to me to make the call... sure, go ahead and bring her here.

Until they arrived, about 15 minutes later, I could only guess what disaster we might be getting into. When they arrived, I quickly jumped into the ambulance and examined the mother-to-be. Fortunately, there was no cord problem. But she was in hard labor, and 9 centimeters dilated.

We took her into the clinic and she was immediately surrounded by 8 excited nurses, doctors, and supporters, including her own personal Chaplain (Pastor Pam). The woman's name was Juana, and she only spoke K'che. Fortunately, we had Juan Toj, local translator, who is fluent in K'che, Spanish, and English. We passed information to him and he to her—and vice-versa. We made her as comfortable as possible on an exam table. It was a chilly day, and no heat, so we found extra blankets for her and started an IV. We used the portable Ultrasound machine to monitor the baby—head first with good heart beat—everything was good!

It wasn't too long until she was completely dilated and ready for pushing. Since this was her first baby, we needed to coach her a bit on just how to push the baby out. I told Juan, he told Juana, and she pushed like a trooper! The surrounding team members became a cheering squad that would make the Denver Broncos proud!

After nearly 3 hours of pushing, with Kam Boles and Lisa Hajek helping, I began to worry if Juana would have the strength to deliver normally. I began to think we might have to do cesarean section for delivery. We had the means to do to this, but hopefully it would not be needed. When I expressed my concerns aloud, it got very quiet in the room, then Pastor Pam spoke up and said "Let's all pray for Juana." Then she led us in a beautiful prayer, asking for strength for her to be able to push her baby out. And... in a few more minutes she did!

I helped guide Stephen, one of our team members who is a pre-med student, to deliver his first baby! And it was a beautiful baby girl! And you can imagine the cheering then!! Juana had a smile from ear to ear, but she was exhausted. In fact, we were all exhausted.

At this point, I was under the impression that we would safely transport Juana and her newborn down to the hospital for routine post-partum care. But, I was informed that the care that she would expect from the hospital would be minimal, and in fact they would likely send her back home immediately! So we decided to keep Juana and her daughter until we were sure they were stable and safe. Fortunately, one of our nurses, Karin Wesson, had newborn nursery experience. We found a set of blankets and "ski cap" for the baby to keep her warm. Juana was so grateful for the care she received, she named the baby Karin, after the nurse that cared for her during that first night.

By the time the team left the clinic and arrived back in Chichicostango, it was very late and we were starving! But we all felt the satisfaction of a job well done. The next morning, Juana and baby Karin were doing great and were sent back home with their family. What a story the child will have to tell when she grows up! How many of her friends will be able to say they were born surrounded by 8 crazy gringos??

It is our belief that we should give a helping hand to all of God's children without passing judgment. He is determined to go to school and become a productive member of society.

## More from Les: Power in Forgiveness

College students are known for some of the rather bizarre and often poorly thought out stunts they perform. I confess that I was no different.

During my Sophomore year at the Colorado School of Mines, my two best friends, Bob and Russ, were dating two girls, Sue and Patty, who were attending Loretto Heights College, a Jesuit all-girl college in southeast Denver. I would regularly join the four or them because I had the car. I would go as a single because my girlfriend, Betty Hoback, lived about 250 miles away in Grand Junction.

Sue and Patty had a classmate, Jill, who had a reputation as a creative practical joker, and they suspected that Jill was the one who had short-sheeted their beds the weekend before. They wanted to get even. Jill had been complaining recently about her lack of success with meeting nice boys and this generated an idea! Sue and Patty would line her up with a blind date, but in this case the date would really be blind! They'd love to see how she might squirm in that awkward situation!

Since I wasn't known on their campus, I agreed to play the blind date. Sunglasses with side guards, so my eyes couldn't be easily seen, were painted black. I practiced with them a bit to learn how to get around without seeing. This wasn't hard because my eyesight was so poor, I could barely see with out my glasses on. Then the girls arranged the date. To add a little twist to the scam, we decided to go to the Egyptian movie theater on Colfax boulevard!

We arrived to pick up the girls; Russ drove my car since I was "blind." Sue and Patty went to get Jill while we waited in the car. As they approached the car, too late for Jill to back out, they explained my "condition" to her. I was told later that Jill stiffened a bit, and then continued on as if nothing were out of the ordinary.

We drove to the movie: Jill led me to my seat by the hand and then explained the scenes that had no dialogue. She was an angel! Afterward we went to the White Spot Coffee shop for a Coke. While there she turned to Patty and said, "I just wish people wouldn't stare so much! It's really unkind!"

The date finally came to an end, I was exhausted, I had played the charade and it seemed that Jill had bought it. But somehow I didn't feel all that great. I didn't sleep very well that night. I tossed and turned. I thought, "She was really nice, we took advantage of her!" I decided I had to call Jill and tell her the truth if I was going to have any rest.

I called the next afternoon after classes. "Jill, the date last night was a practical joke, I'm not really blind!" After a painfully long, silent moment, She spoke. "You jerk!" Then she hung up. Boy! Did I ever feel great! But, I knew I had done what I had to do.

When Bob and Russ left for a moment to get a couple of Cokes, she walked up. "Hi," she said, "I'm Jill. Glad to see you got your sight back!" I recognized her voice and I could feel my face beginning to glow cherry red. I stammered something incomprehensible, dropped my pool cue and began looking for the door. "Oh, It's OK," Jill said with a smile, "after you called me that afternoon Patty and Sue explained that they had put you up to it." Then she added, with a gleam in her eye, "But you'd just better not leave your car parked on campus or I'll let all the air out of your tires!" Jill could have brooded about it, but she didn't. She could have gotten even by calling my girlfriend, Betty, but she didn't. That is a rare quality. It says something about Jill. I wish her well, wherever she is today.

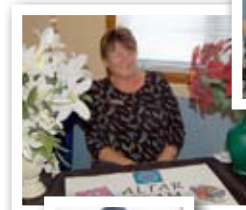

Faith Like a Child... something of very high value in the Kingdom of God, something that Jesus took the time to emphasize as a critical attribute to full and abundant life. One of the beautiful things about Children is their childlike faith. They have not been burned or burdened by the world yet. They have not had the chance to learn so much about God that they lose their spiritual innocence. One of the ways that this childlike faith expresses itself the best is in the art of

play. For a child, everything is magical. The value placed on creation by children is something we can all learn from. One of my favorite memories as a kid growing up in Upstate New York was the fall. Picking apples, watching the leaves turn, and most of all the big leaf pile. There is nothing like jumping in a leaf pile. We now have the privilege as a family with our own kids of living in a very old neighborhood with a lot of land and trees. Fall is both beautiful and over whelming as we are inundated with leaves. My favorite moment each fall is when I gather the leaves in the front yard (if I did it in the back yard we would lose the children) and jump for hours with the kids. It is a beautiful moment with my kids, but it also reminds me of the untainted innocence that comes with being a child, the innocence that Jesus was talking about when he challenged all the onlookers to have faith like a child. There have been many articles, shows, books, and specials talking about how critical play is to a child, and how it has become a lost art. Our Little School emphasizes that as a key part of their education model. Our workshop rotation allows for many creative outlets. When was the last time you played? Not just with your kids, but played yourself. Have you ever played hide and seek with your 8 year old... your 3 year old, or better yet your 15 year old? When was the last time you played in the leaves or built a snowman? In the midst of our busy, crazy, driven lives; take some time to play—you might just find God in your play! —Marcus

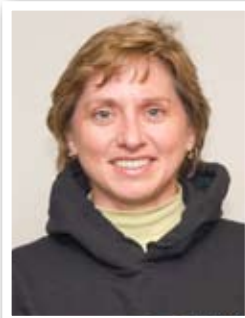
Are you are ready? Great things are going to happen among us as we open ourselves to the wild winds of the Holy Spirit in new and unexpected ways.

## Servant Spotlight: Sandi Miyaki

Sandi Miyaki and her husband Mike have been members of St. Luke's for nearly twenty years. Throughout those years Sandi has served in a variety of different capacities, I recently had the chance to chat with her about what brought her here and why she volunteers:

### Why did you chose St. Luke's?

I grew up as one of seven kids on a farm in a Methodist Church in a tiny community in central Illinois that had a fly-in pastor. It was

one of those places where everyone comes together in times of joy, concern or just a break in the long winters for a casserole supper. In 1990, when I moved to Highlands Ranch I waddled (pregnant with her son Joey) into a couple of different church services with then 2 year-old Ben in tow to differing reactions—but when we came to St. Luke's the welcome we got was just like showing up at my childhood church. The welcome was sincere and warm—a terrific first impression. Then we heard Bill Fethke's chancel choir and left with a hug from Bill Selby and we were hooked. Our music programs are incredible, and although St. Luke's continues to grow, we still have a close community here.

### What do you like most about St. Luke's?

When we say there's a place for you here it's a heartfelt message that is shared. It's very much like the small town church I grew up in—amazing support is here in the form of outreach. Joey suffered a Traumatic Brain Injury in the spring of 2006 and we learned first hand how this church responds to care for someone who's hurting. It was truly awesome—from pastoral care, and staff, to Trustees, the Caring Connection, members from Stephen Ministries, nursery staff, prayer chain, and many St. Luke's friends were there for us throughout our surgeries, rehab at Craig Hospital, and outpatient therapies. It was an incredible feeling to have so much steady support.

### Why do you volunteer at St. Luke's?

It's simple—because when we joined, we promised we would.

### What do you think is the importance of being a servant?

As a Trustee, one thing that troubled me was our general appearance—especially in our children's spaces. Most Sundays, when passing through the hallways to go find one of the boys, I'd hear parents caution their children not to touch the floor, not to pick things up—it was too dirty. In my profession (Sandi's a realtor with Keller Williams' Park Meadows office), I know first impressions count—big time. Did you know when most people enter a home they make up their minds in the first 60-90 seconds if they like it? I felt like I could make a difference, getting a shine on our spaces became a priority for me as a Trustee. My concern was if people didn't stay around long enough to find out who we are, what we do, and what we have—when they need support in their lives or want to be a part of a terrific community they should know we're here. It's a great place.

## Do Good: Don't Avoid the Scary

Yes, at the end of October comes the time of year when we are allowed to dress ourselves in the scariest threads that this world has to offer. We have license to become what we fear the most, if even for one night only.

Think back to the first Halloween you can remember as a younger child. Can you recall the frightful sense of anticipation as you suited up for trick-or-treating? The dread feeling of shyness creeping up as you approach the doors at strange new houses? The wide-eyed looks you gave to the ghosts and ghouls as they passed you by on the street? Likewise, the first time that you address the scarier topics of life the conversations can feel awkward, filled with anxiety, and can leave you staring wide-eyed into uncertainty. Suicide, Drug Use, Sex, Abuse... and yet, the more you face down these scary topics, the more confidence you gain and the less anxiety you feel about them.

This Fall SLY is facing some of these topics head on. In September we invited SPIN (Suicide Prevention and Intervention Network) along with Carrie Hugus to address the topic of suicide. This month on October 12 we will host a SLY PM session open to youth and parents to discuss faith & sexuality. Parents are invited to come with their youth at 5:30 for dinner, and then we will split into smaller groups to discuss different topics with different age groups. The issues that come up with faith and sexuality will of course take more than the normal time we allocate for our Sunday night activities, and we hope to use what we cover as a springboard to a fully dedicated weekend in the Spring on faith & sexuality open to youth and their families.

SLY wants to help get some serious topics on the table in addition to having some fun together. The reason goes back to transforming anxiety into comfort, and facing the scary instead of running away from what causes you fear. See you this month as we stare down some scary things together! *—Peace & Love, Chris*

### How Are We Doing Financially?:

Our August collections were a little less than expected by about \$7,500. This leaves us with a year-to-date shortage in collections of about \$27,000. This seems to be a continuation of the trend for the year. We have three months left to get even. Since the new fall season is in full swing, we have the ability to take care of the problem. I'm confident we will be able to do

that in the coming months.

**Don't Forget the Extra \$100 Challenge:** As you know, I've been encouraging everyone to find an extra \$100 to help bring our giving back in line with what was projected. If all our families gave an extra \$100 or so, it would go a long way toward making sure we have another break even year. The \$100 number isn't a tremendously large number. However, when you consider how many families we have and put all the \$100 together, it becomes a very significant amount—and a big problem solver.

**Don't Forget We Have Many Choices To Make Your Giving To SLUMC Easy And Convenient.** We currently have around \$500,000 of our general fund and bold venture capital campaign fund donations coming from the electric funds transfer (eft) and online methods—over 100 transactions per month. Plus, we sell about \$70,000 dollars of grocery cards each year through these methods. You may want to consider one of these convenient methods for your contributions.

In addition to cash and checks, we offer credit card transactions (either in person or online), stock transfers and scheduled automatic withdrawals from checking or credit card accounts for you to use in doing your transactions with St Luke's. The following is a general summary:

- **General Fund and Capital Campaign:** All methods. However, you need to call ahead to use your credit card in person here at the office to make sure I'm here to process the transaction.
- **Grocery Cards:** Cash, Check, Scheduled automatic withdrawal from checking accounts.
- **Special Events:** Depending on the type of event may include cash, check, card present credit card and credit card online transactions. The method(s) available at each event will be announced at the time of the event and are at the discretion of the sponsor.
