October 4 and 5: Bring non-perishable food. Help us fill DenUM's shelves and feed the hungry! Throughout the weekend of October 4 and 5, St. Luke's will be concluding its 25th anniversary year with the *Feeding of the 5,000: We Need U2.* Thanks to everyone who participated in 2007, we exceeded our goal and actually gathered enough food and donations to feed 7,000 people for Denver Urban Ministries. An incredible miracle! Because there are some things that can only be accomplished when people come together, we are proposing an audacious goal to conclude our 25th anniversary celebration and to engage a broader participation from the entire Highlands Ranch

Community. Through the help of local churches including St. Andrew and Christ Lutheran, our goal is to raise enough food for 1,000 meals per day from October until the end of December or 90,000 pounds of non-perishable food. Monetary donations are also accepted (\$1 approximately = 1 pound of food). All monetary donations are used by DenUM to purchase food at cost.

To top off the weekend, join us for a special worship experience featuring the music of U2 led by our Fusion Band and other members of the community as we celebrate this amazing event at 7:34pm on Saturday, October 4th and at 7:34pm on Sunday, October 5th.

Highlands Ranch and the surrounding community have the capacity and the heart to make this kind of a difference in the lives of so many. Join the *Feeding of the 5,000: We Need U2* campaign by participating and engaging friends, family and co-workers to be part of this miracle and let's make a difference now!



Planting Hope

The Hayman Fire began June 8, 2002 and burned many acres over the next few days. On the Junior High Mission trip, we worked with C.U.S.P. (Collation for the Upper South Platte) to rehabilitate the Hayman Burn area.

The first day of the mission trip, we set off in the bus to a Methodist church near Woodland Park where we'd be staying. When we arrived, we were invited to stay for their youth group meeting where we learned more about Psalm 23 and played a sheep and shepherd game.

The next day, we started working. We helped plant grass seed, watered aspens, and laid out straw to help stop erosion. At the end of the day during our devotion we drew a campfire and wrote what each part represented.

From Rev. Brad... We sure had a lot of rain in August. Sure, the meteorologists are

giving measurements and comparing historical averages, but it doesn't any of that to know that we sure had a lot of rain. I can tell because on my walk with our dog Jack we wander along a creek. The creek is usually six inches deep. When I walked this morning I saw something completely different... the water line was two feet above where it usually was. In fact in some places, you could see where it had crested the bank two feet on each side.

That's a lot of water.

What was interesting was looking at the edge of that water line. It was covered with debris. Sticks, trash, plants, dirt... all sorts of stuff that had been flushed out of the stream. In the overwhelming rush of water, the little stream had been emptied of all of the things that didn't belong.

That's a lot of meaning.

What does it mean for us to be washed of all debris. What kind of things lie in our lives and souls that only impede the flow of our daily lives? And what would it take to see those things washed away? Well, for me that answer can only be God. I try. I really do try to get rid of all the debris that collects in my life – the mistakes, the shortcomings, the feelings of failure, the ups and downs that leave me feeling like a little creek with a lot to overcome. And yet, there are some debris that I can't eliminate.

And then it happens... a giant downpour. A rush beyond any forecast that fills my life.

It is God's grace. And like we sing at Fusion, "Hallelujah! Grace like rain falls down on me." And suddenly in that rush I am made new, the debris is washed away, and I am changed. And like that little creek near my house, I believe the evidence can be seen by those who see me.

As God's people, we are deeply blessed by a God who will pour out grace on us in such life changing ways. It is my prayer that we – as individuals and as a church family – will experience and cherish this flow of grace every day. God's grace is constantly outpouring, may our prayer together be to enjoy it and all that will come because of it.

Letter to St. Luke's

St. Lukés gave Katie a grant toward her participation in Come Let's Dance. Here's her recount of the experience.

Dear family and friends:

You will all be relieved to know that I have safely returned from my adventure to Uganda! I am in one piece and beyond a few bumps, bruises and possible stomach parasite, I am nothing but better off.

I'm sure you're all curious about our projects and experiences, and although this letter barely even scratches the surface, here is a basic idea of our projects in Nanasana. Come Let's Dance has 4 main projects at the moment. First is the kids' house. A man named Wilfred runs the orphanage and as a 23-year-old newlywed, he needs as much financial and physical help as he can get to support his 30 plus kids. Beyond that, Come Let's Dance recently bought farmland (well, more like jungle right now) to grow food and maybe raise livestock for the kids' house. This will not only provide food for the kids at the house, but could potentially act as a source of income as well. The third main project helps a slum called Katonga near Kampala. Many parents can't afford to send their kids to school so volunteers keep the kids out of trouble through a makeshift daycare during the week. And the final project tries to provide the women of Katonga with a source of income. This entire concept sparked the establishment of a sewing and bead-making shop five minutes from the slum itself.

As I said, this cannot even begin to describe the absolutely amazing people I got to know, the horrendous poverty I experienced, or the indescribable love I felt from these people, but logistically, that's what we did. I focused was on the kids' house and the slums. We performed general maintenance on the house, held babies who rarely get touched, and helped the house moms with their duties at the kids' house among other things. In the slums, we played with kids who never get the opportunity to learn, got to know their mothers, helped financially support businesses in an effort to provide a hand up rather than a hand out, pay medical bills for patients who would otherwise (and still sometimes do) die at Mulago Hospital, and get to know the street kids in an attempt to one day send them from the streets of Kampala back to the village they came from looking for work.

I just want to make sure you all know how incredible you have been through my journey. I have found my purpose in life and it's all thanks to you. I could never have taken this trip without your continuing support and I cannot thank you enough. I know I will one day (hopefully soon) return to Uganda to continue the relationships I have built and continue serving the greater purpose for which I am meant.

Thank you all for changing my life and the lives of the destitute in Uganda. You have forever made the world a better place so thank you so incredibly much!!! Food Bank - As a result of our special "Fill the Truck" food drive for DenUM's food bank in May and June, we delivered about 2000 pounds of food to DenUM. Yes, we all really did donate a ton of food! On Thursday morning, July 24, DenUM ran out of food (despite our 1 ton donation) and had to turn people away. They went out and purchased some food for the afternoon. The last time DenUM ran out was last January. In June 2008, 1129 families were served with emergency food compared with 555 families in June 2007 - a 100% increase! DenUM and their clients really appreciate the food we donate!

Pop Cans for Milk!

Let's get going on raising money by turning soda cans into milk money! There is a place called Can Land in north Denver that pays \$0.70 for each pound of cans brought to them. They are open on Saturdays and we could meet one or two Saturdays this Summer and have a caravan of cans and kids to this place. One giant can of powdered milk only costs \$12.00 and will provide enough milk for a family for 2 months. Let's make a difference in the life of a kid!

As a kid, I was a sucker for these radio ads. Anything that represented itself as scientific or technical was something I just had to have! I finally cajoled my mother into letting me mail a dollar to Professor Marvelous. But first, she had these standard questions for me:

"What are you going to do with it?" "How long will it last?" "What will you throw away to make room for it in your room?"

I thought, "When would my mother learn that my science collection might one day hold the cure for some terrible illness or offer the solution of some difficult scientific question?" My mom lived too much for today, she had no vision for tomorrow, no desire to explore the unknown! But, she gave me the dollar anyway and told me to wrap it in paper so the money wouldn't show through the envelope.

After two weeks, the advertisement for Professor Marvelous advertisement was no longer on the radio. Then I began to worry, "Could someone have stolen my dollar from the mail? Had they sold out of the kits and didn't have any more to mail out?" What was taking so long? My agony and anticipation continued for three more excruciating weeks. I had all but given up hope and then one afternoon, I arrived home from school to find my self-addressed envelope lying on the kitchen table. My kit had arrived! With trembling hands, I tore open the envelope to get at the treasures inside.

From the envelope fell three sheets of paper, a balloon, a small plastic magnifying glass, and two small iron magnets. "Congratulations," said the top of the first page, "you are the proud owner of the Professor Marvelous Science Kit, please follow the instructions carefully to get the most out of your kit.

"1. For the lesson on Newton's second law, find two billiard balls."

What is this? They didn't say anything about buying something else!

"2. For the lesson on Newton's third law, blow up the balloon, then let it go."

What? Like I've never done that before!

"3. For the lesson on the power of the sun, hold the magnifying glass in the sunlight, above a small piece of paper." This was getting complicated, and anyway, it was a cloudy day!

I looked at the meager contents of the envelope with disdain and disappointment. "Is that all there is? What's so amazing about this stuff? I can't impress any of my friends with a balloon or this cheap magnifying lens!" My anticipation had gone far beyond the reality of that one-dollar Science Kit. I had gotten so wrapped up in the preparations that I had lost sight of the kit's purpose. I was disappointed because I had built up expectations that the kit was never designed to fulfill.

Just as the Professor Marvelous Science Kit failed to live up to my 9-year old expectations, I believe we all have, at times, tended to generate higher than realistic expectations for a particular anticipated event or place, and allowed us to stray far from reality.

Think about some new thing that may be coming into your life. It may be a long-anticipated vacation trip, a new car, a new pet in the home, a planned visit from a friend you haven't seen for a long time, a new business venture, or perhaps, a new class you will be starting soon.

We approach these things with anticipation and anticipation is good, it means we have hope. Without hope, life cannot be lived to it's fullest. And anticipation is so much fun! Anticipation, by itself, can be as romantic as desired; we can fantasize at will, but it does not necessarily force us to deal with reality. Each new thing or situation in our lives contains certain realities that we may have conveniently ignored or forgotten in our anticipation. The glossy advertisements, the sales person's words or our own expectations may have distorted reality. We may overlook the potential new demands on us or increases in the commitments we must make. Balance is needed! We must allow ourselves to be open to the "Professor Marvelous Science Kits" of today and our expectations must be balanced by the facts of the situation before we proceed. 



I want to *thank all of you* for all of your support, love and prayers throught this entire journey. You have all been the hands and arms of Christ for me in sharing your time (taking me to radiation and home again), talents (knited shawls and hats, cooked meals, kind hand made cards) and gifts (we have been so blessed with gifts of money, restaurant cards and grocery cards.) I can't imagine a more compassionate group of people anywhere on earth.
