Epiphany Worship Series: 'Spiritual Journeys" by Rev. Janet Forbes

There is a spiritual hunger abroad in our time, haunting us. Like an empty stomach aching beneath the sleek coat of the well-fed, it reveals that something is missing. The diet of secular culture does not satisfy. A hunger for spiritual food is gaining momentum.

During the season of Epiphany, I am inviting us to share a spiritual journey. We want to name our spiritual yearnings, so we can set the table with food for the soul. We are going to explore the nature of spirituality as it is practiced within this community of faith.

What is spirituality? I prefer to use a more biblical phrase, "the spiritual journey." According to scripture, the spiritual life is simply the increasing vitality of God's Spirit in us. It is the choreography of the Holy Spirit in the human spirit, moving us toward communion with both Creator and creation. It has to do with God's way of relating to us, and our way of responding to God.

Using the Spirituality Wheel, we will assess our spiritual type: head, heart, mystic, and kingdom. This simple approach delineates differences among us and answers two questions:

- Who am I as a spiritual person?
- What is the best way for me to grow in my spiritual life?

Knowing how we are spiritually different from or the same as other people can help us understand where our strengths are and possibly acknowledge the strengths of others. Such knowledge may suggest new ways in which we can grow so that spiritual experience becomes richer.

After the holidays, the Spirituality Wheel will be available on the website so that we can each plot our spiritual style. Our worship planning team will be designing experiences (January 10-February 14) that will reflect the nature of each form of spirituality. Plan to enjoy the experience of both immersing and stretching ourselves in spirituality.

The Journey to Ordination in the United Methodist Church

In the life of a congregation, there are persons who experience a call from God to explore a vocation in the ordained ministry of The United Methodist Church, as a licensed local pastor, deacon or elder. The 2008 Book of Discipline outlines the steps that congregations follow to support these persons.

Persons inquire about candidacy with their pastor, or another ordained minister, or Rev. Olon Lindemood, District Superintendent of the Mile High/Piles Peak District. The inquiring candidate will be asked to read The Christian as Minister, which outlines the varieties of vocational options: missionary, chaplain, community organizer, pastor, educator, musician, administrator, counselor, teacher. As pastor of St. Luke's, I usually meet with our inquiring candidates over a period of months.

To start the candidacy process, the inquiring candidate writes to the district superintendent requesting admission into the candidacy process. They always include a statement of their call. Rev. Olon listens for how God has been working in their lives and community to compel them to pursue this vocation.

If the candidate has been a member of the United Methodist Church for at least one year, they register with the denomination (General Board of Higher Education and Ministry – www.gbhem.org) and receive a mentor and candidacy guidelines. The candidacy mentor helps the candidate examine the call of God in light of the scripture, the role and function of United Methodist clergy, personal gifts and grace, and evidence of leadership.

If encouraged to move forward, the candidate consults with me and the chairperson of our Staff Parish Relations Team to request a meeting to declare their intent and seek a recommendation. The SPRT interviews the candidate and makes a recommendation to a Church Conference. At the Church Conference, members of St. Luke's must confirm the recommendation by a two-thirds majority vote. Stephen Collins recently joined Laura Hehner as declared candidates from St. Luke's.

Usually, declared candidates are already in seminary. A declaration of candidacy does not mean that St. Luke's pays the tuition for a graduate degree. All educational requirements are at the expense of the candidate, though there are scholarships and loans available through the United Methodist Church. I would love to see a scholarship program established at St. Luke's to help our candidates.

In order to be certified, the candidate meets with the district committee for an interview and approval as a certified candidate. The following must be completed prior to certification: a written response to questions regarding God's call and the role of the church in the call, formative Christian experiences,

beliefs as a Christian, gifts for ministry and present understanding of the call to ministry as deacon, elder, or licensed ministry; required psychological reports, credit checks, criminal background check. A certified candidate may apply for license as a local pastor. Rev. Dave Money is a certified candidate from St. Luke's who has been licensed for pastoral ministry.

Following the completion of seminary and one year of certification, the candidate is commissioned and appointed to serve in a congregation or ministry as a provisional clergy for several years. Rev. Sallie Suby-Long is a provisional deacon serving as Associate Minister of Pastoral Care and Counseling at St. Luke's.

Ordination is only one of the ways that persons are exploring vocational options in ministry. We have members who are exploring seminary classes as well as certification in missions, evangelism, spiritual direction, and Christian education. God continues to speak to us in ways that are life transforming and vocationally enriching. My ears and heart are always open to explore the ways that God might be calling you!

Out On the Streets and Homeless

Our own Rev. Doug McKinney, who facilitates the St. Luke's Just Faith Class, spent Friday evening, December 4, out on the streets in order to raise awareness of the needs of the homeless in Denver.

Rev. Doug is the Executive Director of Love INC (Love in the Name of Christ) of Littleton, Colorado. Love INC makes regular referrals to twenty-two shelters in the Denver area where people in a variety of life situations may stay. However, there are many homeless that don't meet the stipulations set by many shelters. It is a disturbing statistic that 45% of the homeless in Denver are women and children. None of them want to be living on the streets, especially in the cold. Each day, the homeless have to look for meals, carrying everything they own and find a place to stay until a shelter opens. Without shelter, they are vulnerable and fear for their safety. When shelters are full at night, they must fine a location to stay, coats and blankets to stay warm, and still they will fear that they may be robbed or beaten.

Friday night, December 4th, was cold -12 degrees. The experience began with a worship service and a time of learning as several homeless people shared what it was like to be on the streets. In the midst of the sparkle of the Parade of Lights, Doug's eyes were attuned to the invisible population that faced a night of uncertainty.

About midnight, with others who were joining in the immersion learning, Doug crawled into the refrigerator box that would be his shelter for the night. Even with three layers of clothing, a mummy sleeping bag, and two blankets, he was quite cold. He closed up his box and slept, knowing that others were staying awake throughout the night to ensure a safe environment. The box was frosted over at 6:00am when Doug awoke. The organizers had prepared coffee and the group was debriefed until 7:30am when they tore up their boxes and headed home.

The homeless people who shared the experience were grateful for the good night of sleep as they knew the police wouldn't be coming by and asking them to move one, nor did they have to worry about people robbing them. The homeless shared how invisible they feel. People who walk down the street typically don't acknowledge them by looking the other way. As Doug walked to the parade, he spoke with several people who were walking the street and all of them lit up as he made eye contact.

Doug reflects on the learning: The theme for the gathering centered around how much we have to learn from the poor, how much Jesus valued the poor, and how vacant and shallow we are when we ignore the poor. In just twelve hours, it became evident to me. I wondered what I'd do if I had a cold – where I'd go and how I'd get well.

The experience reminded me of the passion with which I entered the ministry and my care and concern for victims, and the systems that perpetuate poverty. I recalled times when I had been an advocate, times at the three downtown churches I've served where I met face to face more often with the down and out and homeless, and how I saw Christ in them. I also reflected on recent years in ministry where I've been insulated from these realities and the effect that has had on me. I felt revived and renewed in my work with Love INC and in St. Luke's with the Just Faith Class. I was reminded that we need each other — the haves and the have-nots, the rich and the poor, the independent and the dependant. I was wonderfully encouraged by the interest and participation of young people in their twenties and thirties.

More from Les: The Christmas Bells



Rev. Les Ludlam St. Luke's Lay Associate Pástor 1993-1997

If you are a long-time member of St. Luke's, you may recall seeing the lighted bells that adorned the chimney on the south-east corner of the original church building in the early to

mid-1990's. During the Advent season one could see an image of bells outlined in red lights switching back and forth as if they were ringing out a message of joy!

Church member Ralph Roth, a retired jewelry store owner and clockmaker, had made the lighted bells in the late 1980's and he had given them to the church. Both he and his wife Bertha were in their eighties. Bertha had helped in the business when they were younger but now spent a lot of her time caring for two young grandchildren.

Ralph had had a stroke a few years before and his mobility was limited. But he loved to tinker; building gadgets from discarded motors, electrical switches and miscellaneous mechanical devices.

For several years, at the beginning of each advent season, the bells had been put up with the rest of the church decorations. Ralph would supervise the installation of his lights and since he lived close by, would come down to make any repairs or adjustments. There always seemed to be a switch that would stick or a timer that would stop or a electrical connection that loosened. He would drive by the church each evening and if he saw something that was not right, Ralph would insist that he go immediately to the church to fix the problem.

But by 1993 Ralph was experiencing more physical limitation. During the previous advent season, he had been upset when he couldn't get to the church to fix the Christmas lights when they stopped working properly. Bertha was concerned about his well-being and didn't want him climbing on ladders and working so high above the ground.

So, when he saw a problem, he would call our senior minister, Rev. Bill Selby, at the church.

One day in mid-November, Bill called me into his office. "Les," he said, "I would like you to start visiting one of our home-bound members, Ralph Roth and his wife, Bertha. Get to know them and hear their story."

I drove over to their home the next day. When I arrived, Bertha was watching her two young grandsons, so Ralph took the time to show me some of his creations. The clocks were beautiful! His collection of small electric motors, relays, switches and other mechanical parts was amazing! His clock-making hobby was truly an expression of who he was. As we talked, it became more and more obvious to me that the bells he had made for the church were something more than just a decoration he had created. They were a physical manifestation of the joy to be experienced at Christmas; they were a statement of his personal faith in the Savior who was born in a stable. It was his means of expressing the joy that comes when

Ralph's gift to the church was a part of him, an expression of who he was and what he believed in. I thought, "How can the church honor and affirm Ralph's statement of faith in these lights and keep them going; without placing him in jeopardy of physical injury?"

remembering that holy event.

I discussed this with St. Luke's staff and decided to ask Steve, a member of the Trustees committee, to see what could be done.

"I know a thing or two about electronic circuits," said Steve, "And we can assemble an electronic system to operate the lights with much more reliability." Then he added, "The new switching system is so small, it can't be easily seen from a distance. It'll work better, but no one will know the old switches and relays are not doing the work."

Steve made the changes and the lights worked well for the rest of the season. Bertha would bring Ralph by to see them and he was happy that they continued to work as intended. The tradition was maintained. But, I confess, I didn't tell Ralph about the circuitry change.

There are lessons from this.

- 1. Never take any gift lightly. Carefully think through what the presentation of that gift means to the contributor. Consider the giver's view of themselves and what the gift means within the context of the giver's relationship with God and the church. Then treat that gift with the same care as you would the giver.
- 2. Value and honor our traditions. Traditions are valuable when they help us celebrate and remember the things that shape the good in our lives. Regardless of how they start or what they become over time, our traditions represent the efforts and creativity of individuals who helped shape who we have become as a community.

been given our parts in the nativity play, and I'm the lobster! Mom: The lobster? Daughter: Yeah! Mom: In the nativity play? Daughter: Yeah, *first* lobster! Mom: There was more than one lobster present at the birth of Jesus? Daughter: Duh.

The truth is, there was no lobster at the first Christmas... but really, it's been so long now that none of us were physically there. Don't we all wish for the excitement that this first lobster has? With Less Than 30 Days Remaining in 2009, The Time Is Here For Year-End Tax Planning. For the church to give you credit for you donations in 2009, we must receive your donation on or before December 31 or it must be postmarked on or before December 31. Some of the methods

receive your donation on or before December 31 or it must be postmarked on or before December 31. Some of the methods you may choose to use for your donation take a considerable amount of time for processing and need to be at the church before the December 31 deadline.

Special IRA Charitable Rollover Program Extended For 2009 Taxes. The Tax Extenders and Alternative Minimum Tax Relief Act of 2008 extended the provision for those who are over 70 ½ to make a donation to their church to be included on their 2009 tax returns. This provision allows eligible taxpayers to donate up to \$100,000 without it being taxable income and at the same time the donation will apply to your required IRA minimum distribution. Keep in mind that the distribution must come direct to the church from the institution holding your IRA funds. It cannot be a personal check from your checking account.

If you are interested in using this program for your donation, you should check with your tax adviser to review the process and make sure that your timing is correct for it to reach the church on or before December 31 or at least get postmarked on or before December 31.

Pick and Choose Your Method Of Giving to SLUMC. We have many ways for you to make your giving to SLUMC easy and convenient. You may want to consider one of these convenient methods for your contributions.

In addition to cash and checks, we offer online credit card transactions, stock transfers and scheduled automatic withdrawals from checking or credit card accounts. The following is a general summary:

- General Fund and Capital Campaign: All methods.
- **2. Grocery Cards:** Cash, check, scheduled automatic withdrawal from checking accounts.
- **3. Special Events:** Depending on the type of event may include cash, check, PayPal and online credit card transactions. The method(s) available at each event will be announced at the time of the event and are at the discretion of the sponsor.
- **4. Plus:** We're anxious to consider any reasonable method you know about that we haven't adopted.
