
Summer Worship Series:

Travels With Paul-A Portable Spirituality!

This is an exciting time to be a part of the St. Luke's community. Together, we have woven a net that is strong enough, healthy enough, and flexible enough to catch God's dream for our future. So this summer as we prepare for a season of visioning in the fall, I want to travel beside

the apostle, Paul and learn from him.

He is second only to Jesus as the most important person in the origins of Christianity. There are twenty-seven books in the New Testament, though to



So, we are going on the road with Paul. And we'll need to embrace, like his companions, a rather portable spirituality. In addition to a sack of food, a change of clothes, and the tools of their trade, they carried what might be called, the essentials of abundant life.

They all carried a story, the same essential story about the birth, life, death, and resurrection of a unique person whose mere existence changed everything. It was a story in which Jesus' life, their lives, and the life of the world were inextricably bound together.

When first we meet Saul of Tarsus on the road to Damascus, we know him to be an almost fanatical persecutor of those of the Way, a name applied to Christ-followers before the word, Christian, was used. Often it was a slur against the believer in Christ, for the priests were convinced that the Christian way was a way of heresy. But the term certainly was not always uncomplimentary, for it did say that Christians had a special walk, or manner, or life. How wonderful to be accused of walking after a certain way so that your detractors would be reminded of Jesus... so closely did they pattern their lives after Christ that they could be distinguished by it.

We know that Paul witnessed the stoning of the disciple, Stephen, and then went on a personal crusade against Christians in Jerusalem, invading the privacy of their homes and hauling them away to prison. After

ravaging Jerusalem, he looked for more ways to vent his anger against this new sect.

So, learning that many of the Jesus people had scattered to Damascus, Saul obtained orders from the chief priest to continue his mission there. As Paul recounted the story himself, he was on his way, almost there, when suddenly, a bright light flashed, so brilliant in intensity that he and his companions were thrown to the ground. The light was followed by a voice telling him that he was an enemy of God, engaged in warfare against God's own people. When Saul asked for the voice's ID, the speaker identified himself as Jesus. Then the Lord instructed Saul to go into the city where he would be told what to do.

Saul proceeded to obey the voice, but when he opened his eyes he found that he could not see. He was blind. Who knew that before he would see again he would have the eye of his soul enlightened and that was the best illumination of all. Saul of Tarsus was about to become Paul the Apostle, planting new Jesus communities throughout the Mediterranean.

As we journey with Paul, we'll be listening for the stories, some appealing and some appalling, according to Marcus J. Borg and John Dominic Crossan in their new book, *The First Paul: Reclaiming the Radical Visionary Behind the Church's Conservative Icon.*

Join me for summer worship as we get to know this missionary of the Way, seeding our discernment about God's dream for St. Luke's.

Weighing my Stole

Just over a decade ago, I was given a stole. A close friend and mentor of mine, who himself was a United Methodist

Pastor, gave me one of the stoles he regularly wore. As he gave it to me, he said "I want you to keep this. And every time the process doesn't seem worth it, every time you think you'll never get there, every time you find yourself lost, I

want you to take this out and remember why you are doing this." I was so excited to receive such a gift. His words didn't mean as much to me that day as they would in the years to come.

See, I have been in the process of being ordained for half my life. It doesn't really take that long, unless you begin as young as I did. The process for ordination is only a matter of years, if you don't count education requirements, but if you hear a call to Ordained Ministry when you are a freshman in high school, there is a lot of time in front of you.

I took that stole home and I put it on a special shelf. Every once and

a while I would take it out and look at it. It was a beautiful, traditional, red on one side and white on the other stole. On the red side, the pentecost side, it had a gold embroidered dove. On the white side, the Easter side, it bore a crown and cross. I thought about what it would be like to wear it one day. It would lay atop my robe and I would be an Ordained Minister. As I looked at that stole, I thought of it as a reward. I looked at that stole and saw the prize for completing a long journey toward ordination. I knew nothing of its history, I only knew its future- my future.

When I went to CU Boulder, my stole went with me. I kept it in the top drawer of my desk. Over the next four years I would take it out and think about what it would be like to be down with school and to be in a church. While in college, I began weekly preaching in my role as a student pastor at the Wesley Chapel. Though I didn't wear a stole, I began to experience what it was to share the Word of God in worship. I remember the day my campus pastor called me and asked if I wanted to spend the day with her and "experience a day of being a pastor". I was thrilled. I grabbed my Bible and ran over to the Wesley Chapel. I walked in the door, and there was my campus pastor- a plunger in one hand and a rag in the other. We spent the day unclogging toilets, reorganizing the kitchen,

getting wax out of the carpet, and sorting files in the office. I didn't even get to use my Bible.

I returned to my dorm room that night and opened my desk drawer. Could my vision of being ordained and wearing that stole include all of the "non-stole" moments? Was the prize for all of the years of education, the countless meetings, the psychological evaluations, and the novels worth of paperwork a plunger and a rag? How was that supposed to inspire me? I certainly had more questions than answers as I pulled my stole out of its drawer.

When I finished college, married Meghan,

started seminary at Iliff, and moved to our first apartment my stole found its way into my nightstand next to my devotional book and Bible. After long days of challenging class work, late nights writing papers, in addition to all of the church papers I was still writing, I would crawl into bed and as I sat to read my devotional, I would see my stole and think about all of those questions. I still had my dream and vision of what it would look like atop my robe, but that dream was now accompanied by that long nagging list of questions.

As I finished my work at Iliff, I spent a year as a pastoral intern at Trinity UMC in Denver. At Trinity they wear robes every Sunday, and I was expected

to as well. I went to Cokesbury and picked out my robe. But there would be no stole atop it. Trinity, being a very traditional congregation, only allowed fully ordained clergy to wear stoles. Even though I was in the process of ordination, my robe would be adorned only with a cross necklace. Week after week of blank robe with stole-less shoulders I began to feel an exclusivity to the stoles I saw my colleagues wearing. It was like a merit-badge I hadn't earned. With only one year left of seminary, I could see the finish line in sight and on the other side, was that stole.

Upon graduation from Iliff, successful completion of my interviews and theological papers, and the blessing of the Bishop, I was commissioned as a Provisional Elder in the United Methodist Church. The Church uses a two step ordination process to allow more growth, supervision, and development of its pastors. As a commissioned Provisional Elder, I was then appointed to St. Luke's.

In St. Luke's tradition, I was allowed to begin wearing my stole–many of my colleagues in other churches still cannot until their full ordination. I anticipated those first few Sundays with robes and stoles and even the ones with our stoles over our regular attire. I had crossed that finish line and would wear my stole just like I had been dreaming about for so many years. But I

experienced something different as I placed the stole around my neck and shoulders.

There was a weight to it.

All of those years, half my life, I had been looking at that stole as a prize for finishing something. Had I spent enough time thinking about what it was the beginning of? As I contemplated my new beginning I found myself thinking of how wearing stoles began.

There are two main theories of how stoles became a part of the wardrobe of clergy. One theory is that it is to serve as a visual representation of "the yoke of Christ" (Mt 11:29). The yoke offered to all people by Christ to guide us in life- a yoke that is not heavy with burden, but gently and lightly guides us in our learning to walk like Christ. Another theory is that it is a representation of the cloth Jesus used to wash and wipe the disciples feet (Jn 13). A symbol of humble service, leadership based in serving others first.

This is what I was beginning. This was the weight I was feeling. A commitment to Christ, to His Church, to all God's people to humbly serve as I seek to live a life like Jesus. How had it taken me so long to realize this! My stole is representation of my call! I chose to go into Ordained Ministry for that very reason. This long process I am finishing is a process of going right back to where I started. In fact my friend's encouragement to "take this stole out and remember why you are doing this" carried in it another piece of implied wisdom- 'take this stole out and realize why you are doing this'.

On June 20 at 2:00pm, after a vote by the other clergy of our conference, I will be fully ordained as an Elder in the United Methodist Church. It is at this special worship service, that will be held in Grand Junction, that I will officially be ordained. While the Bishop's hands rest on my head that gift from all those years ago, my stole, my calling, will be placed on my shoulders. And instead of finishing something I started half my life ago, I will be beginning something that is all my life to come.

More from Les. It's not what you do to celebrate, but why you do it that is important

BOOM! I sat up in bed, blinked and tried to remember where I was. I fumbled for the light switch on the bedside lamp.

WHAM! KABOOM! I finally found the switch and turned on the light and noted that the clock read 6:00am. POW! I got up shaved and washed

my face and began to get dressed. And during I this time the loud explosions kept coming. CRACK, BANG, POP-POP-POP!

Betty and I had traveled from our home in Anchorage to Fairbanks, Alaska, to spend the 4th of July weekend with my cousin, Mel and his wife, Andrea. The drive the day before had been long and we had talked long into the evening and finally retired at almost midnight. At this latitude, bedrooms there are fitted with blackout blinds to darken the room and make sleeping easier since it stays so light for so long.

"Mel, what's all the noise about?" I asked, as I stumbled into the kitchen to get a cup of coffee that Andrea, Mel's wife, had already poured. "It's the Fourth," he replied, "And with Fort Wainwright Army Base and Eielson Air Force Base close by and Fort Greeley just down the Richardson Highway near Delta Junction, the military is well involved in any local celebrations, especially Independence Day." He smiled, "All this is pretty typical, but just wait till noon!"

"I wonder what he's not telling me," I thought. We continued to get ready for the Fairbanks Independence Day celebration to be held at the park near downtown. We all rode in Mel's van to the park, looking forward to participating in the holiday festivities. There was a carnival with the usual rides. There were all sorts of food booths offering local delicacies such as grilled and smoked salmon, wild berry dishes, and reindeer sausage. There was also the standard fare of hamburgers and hot dogs, potato salad, watermelon, ice cream, caramel popcorn and cotton candy. (I really liked the reindeer sausage!)

Fairbanks' Mayor climbed the steps to the podium at the large band shell in the center of the park and welcomed all of us. He then introduced the commanding officers of Eielson and Wainwright. Each took his turn to give a patriotic speech. We were reminded of the need to maintain our sense of readiness to defend ourselves from anything that might threaten us from offshore.

As the speeches began to drone on, I decided to go get another sample of the reindeer sausage. As I walked to the vendor's stand, I could hear the Mayor's words, "And now...," and the band began playing the Star Spangled Banner. We all came to attention and sang along as best we could. Then, as the words, "the land of the free- and the home of the brave," brought the song to a close, a bank of howitzers on the left began firing. Boom, Boom, Boom!

Then a wing of jet interceptors appeared out of seemingly nowhere, flew low over the park, hit their afterburners, and roared upward. The sound was deafening! You could literally feel the roar! For the next five minutes, the air was filled with aerial bombs exploding over the crowd. The band struck up "Stars and Stripes Forever!"

Then the Air Force commander spoke, "let us remember those who have made the supreme sacrifice for this country!" The planes had circled back and came in again, flying in the "missing man" formation. Then everything was silent. Two military wives, holding the hands of small children, were crying. Then Mel turned to me and said, "It's a lot more fun when you don't know what's coming!" He went on, "We don't have fireworks on the 4th because of our latitude. We are only 100 miles below the Arctic Circle and in July the sun is nearly always above the horizon so the colors of traditional fireworks couldn't be seen very well. So the Military celebrates using noise. A lot of it!

Denver's Road Home - Progress Report

by Susan McIntosh In 2006, I talked to the congregation about a new initiative, Denver's Road Home, created to help reduce homelessness in ten years. Part of that initiative includes a program called "One Congregation, One Family" where Mayor Hickenlooper asked congregations in the metro area to help reduce homelessness by sponsoring families in need. Four years into the 10 year project, Denver's Road Home has made some incredible progress, and I wanted to share that information with you.

According to a May 23 article in the *Denver Post*, organizers of Denver's Road Home have created more than 1,500 housing units in four years, making the goal of 3,000 units within 10 years seem very attainable.

While providing housing for the homeless is by no means cheap, it reduces the need for additional services, such as emergency hospital visits, jail time, and drug and alcohol detox visits, which can be much more expensive to provide. According to Jamie Van Leeuwen, Executive Director for Denver's Road Home, detox admissions for homeless substance abusers fall 84 percent when they are targeted for housing and services, and jail intakes of Denver homeless have dropped 22 percent over the past two years (*Denver Post* article, May 23, 2009).

The Family and Senior Homeless Initiative (the piece of Denver's Road Home plan that asks for help from faith communities) has provided housing to 141 families – almost 500 people.

For the St. Luke's community, these numbers can be made more personal – two families have been helped into homes because of our willingness to help. And a third is also receiving assistance to remain in their home as a layoff looms for the husband. In addition to the specific families that St. Luke's has helped, our continuing support for organizations such as DenUM, the Gathering Place, and Urban Peak also support this initiative. Even in times of economic crisis, St. Luke's UMC continues to reach out to the community, providing assistance and comfort.

Monty's Methodism Musings: Moving Towards Christian Perfection

Many Christian denominations define themselves by agreement of their members on common points of doctrine. They are bound together by right belief, orthodoxy, on those points of doctrine. Many people who are members of those denominations have a hard time understanding what binds us together as Methodists.

John Wesley was less concerned with right belief and more concerned with right practice, orthopraxy. His direction to the people called Methodists was to live a life that was concerned with moving towards Christian perfection. Wesley felt that the perfect life was one where are all our actions were motivated by our love of God and that this love was reflected in all of our relationships with other people. Love God with all of your heart and love your neighbor as yourself.

This is not a mistake-free life. We are expected to be people of action in the world and if you do things, you make mistakes. Rather, it is a life that is perfect in motivation. We are able to put God and put other people's needs before our own needs. It is an unselfish approach to life and a difficult one to live all of the time.

There have been movements with in Methodism who have tried to define Christian perfection by "writing it down". My complaint with this approach is that they end up with lists of things not to do. I think that creates a negative style of Christianity. My sense of Christian perfection is that it is proactive. Wesley not only wanted Methodists to do no harm, he wanted them to do all of the good they could. To me Christian perfection is about living the positive example that Christ set for us. If there is no list, how do you tell how you are doing? I think you look in your heart and ask if you are putting others first.

Listen to John Wesley's words at the age of 63. "I do not love God. I never did. Therefore I never believed, in the Christian sense of the word. Therefore I am only an honest heathen... And yet, to be so employed of God!" I think that what he was trying to say in his theatrical and self critical way is that he still hadn't reached Christian perfection and he probably wouldn't. In spite of that, look at all the good that God had done through him as he tried to move towards perfection.

I'm with John, I don't think I'll reach Christian perfection. Yet, hopefully good things will come from my attempt and my sense of the abundance of God's grace encourages me to keep trying.

Support Income continues to meet our budgeted expectations. For that, we continue to be very grateful to you for your part in making this happen and insure we're able to continue our basic ministry programs.

Considering the condition of our economy, this news is good news. However, I must point

out that our level of collections for this year will not be enough to meet our budget needs for 2010 and 2011. Refinancing our loan with the Bold Venture funds in late 2011 won't provide much budget relief until calendar year 2012.

When we started the budgeting process, the recession was really getting started and we had no idea how it would affect our giving. We decided to go with the idea that we would collect in 2009 what we collected in 2008 with some minor know variances. Your giving during the first few months has validated that this was a reasonable assumption.

With some hard work from your finance staff, finance team and the executive team, we were able to develop a spending program for 2009 that will keep our spending within the amount of projected collections. To do that, we obviously had to make some adjustments that were not comfortable to make but would allow us to maintain our basic programs and work our way through what will prove to be a troublesome year for many of our families and St Luke's.

Some of the budget adjustments will work for this year but will require reinstatement in following years. Among them will be the need to pay for any major repairs that may occur that will no longer be covered by the Bold Venture program, making adjustments to the staff compensation and benefit plan to make sure we stay appropriately competitive in that area—no adjustments made for 2009, making sure we pay our tithe to the Rocky Mountain Conference in full each year, etc.

I urge you to continue your faithfulness in giving and begin to think about how you and your family can make sure we continue strong in the following years. We will have our annual emphasis on stewardship this fall. That will be a time for reflection upon the needs of our church and our personal call to be good stewards.

Also, if you have not been able to be a regular giver, I encourage you to make this a priority as your individual situation improves. It takes over a million dollars each year to keep our program strong. The only way we can accomplish our goal is by everyone participating at the level they are able. A very high percentage of our income comes from collections given by our members and constituents. We have very few secondary sources of income that make up a very small portion of our total income.
