St. Luke's new Chapel is a sacred, holy place to "Be Still and Know that I am God." God bids us welcome, no demands placed upon us, to call upon Jesus and God's Holy Spirit to be present with us in a place and time where we can experience peace, rest, and spirit food for our souls. The new Chapel is such a place!

The Chapel is also a place to worship. From Ashes to Easter: Companions on the Way

Celebrating Lent at St. Luke's

The Christian calendar tells the story of Jesus in two cycles of time. The year begins with the Christmas cycle of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany as we celebrate Jesus' birth. The story culminates in the Easter cycle of Lent, Easter, and Pentecost with the wonder of resurrection.

The turning of the year from one cycle to the next is marked by two very different holidays... just 24 hours apart. Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday) is the last day of the season of Epiphany. Another name for Mardi Gras is Shrove Tuesday, a day to confess our sins and have them shriven or forgiven. After confession, everyone eats a meal of pancakes, using up all the eggs and butter in the house.

When we wake up on Ash Wednesday, the Christian year turns 180 degrees. We turn from watching a manger in Bethlehem to a cross on Calvary. The Bible tells us that before Jesus began his ministry he prepared himself by spending forty days praying in the wilderness. We call these forty days Lent, and Lent is the time when Christians prepare for the celebration of Easter. The word, Lent, is from the Anglo-Saxon word, lencten, meaning the lengthening of the days or the coming of spring.

Some people still give up something during Lent, maybe a favorite food. In the Middle Ages, everyone had to go without eating meat or fat or eggs for the whole forty days. Other persons take on something new during Lent. They honor their bodies. They eat well. They exercise daily. They lose weight. Or they reconcile a relationship. They spend time with their children. They reconnect with their spouse. They settle an old fight. Or they decide to do something for other people. They fast one meal a week and give the money to relieve hunger. They ride a bicycle to limit global warming. They practice acts of kindness. What do I need to let go of so I may be more faithful or whole in my relationship with God? What spiritual practice might I take up to bring me closer to the person God is calling me to be? These are the questions we ask as we travel from ashes to Easter.

St. Luke's will make this six-week journey together. It is good to know we are not traveling alone. We not only go with one another, but we also travel with Jesus and his companions, both friends and enemies. Lent is a time to walk with Christ through wilderness experiences, through times of darkness, betrayal, and even death. But this walk with Christ also leads us to the triumph of an Easter morning. In so many ways Lent is the story of each of our lives. Sometimes the way is hard, but we know we are never alone. The story of Jesus' life and passion, death and resurrection, tells us that we have everything we need for this journey we call life. We have forgiveness for our mistakes and failings. We have strength in times of weakness. We have hope in time of trial. We have love that is beyond comprehension. Our faith journeys may be solitary, but no faith journey is solo. We are each becoming who we are, not just by the grace of God, but in the company of those who are on the path with us, through the wisdom of those who pointed out the way when we were lost, and by the mercy of those who helped us to our feet when we stumbled.

The Christian faith understands relationships with others to be of inestimable importance for at least three reasons. First, this is simply how we are made. We are built for relationship. We not only thrive but we become fully human only in relationship with others. Second, Jesus lived his life for others. He lived in community and he loved others so deeply as to lay down his life for them. Third, and here we tread the precincts of mystery – the God we understand in Trinitarian theology is understood not in terms of radical autonomy but in terms of relationship. If the deepest truth about God is that God is relationship, love, and communion, the implications for those who would be in relationship with such a God are stunning. To believe in such a God means that everything "of God" is that which nourishes, deepens, and sustains relationships of love, trust, communion, and intimacy. Likewise, everything that severs, demeans, trivializes, and hampers such relationship is incongruous with the very nature of God. Such things are not just disobedience of God's will, they are in disharmony with the very being of God. We who name God as Creator, Christ, and Holy Spirit are called to live in relationships of deep communion.

May God bless you and your companions on the way!

Special Note Re: Feeding of the 5000:

I wanted to share something special with you. I received word from Denver Urban Ministries mid-February that they had just used the last of the food we raised during the Feeding of the 5,000. The 40,000 pounds of food we raised lasted four months! in addition to the regular donations they receive. During those months, DenUM did not have to close their food pantry a single day, even with almost double the normal requests coming in.

I also am moved by a special fact. During the time DenUM was adding the food we raised to the bags they offer, DenUM served 5,011 families. We served 5000 and had almost 12 bags left over (if that doesn't send a shiver down your spine, check out Matthew 14:20 & 21).

We will lead our community in this event again this October. I know that the difference we made will only be multiplied this year. If you would like to be a part of this amazing weekend to raise food and hope for people throughout our community please contact me.

During the Feeding of the 5,000, we acknowledged that the food drive we shared in was a form of communion-we were sharing a meal while remembering Jesus as a community. The communion we shared lasted just over 4 months. That might possibly be the longest communion service ever.

The most remembered quotes from history seem to be the ones that were proven wrong by history. Now we laugh about what seems to us to be shortsightedness and limited thinking of those from the past. But the new can and often comes to us in unexpected ways and often brings ways of doing things we might not have thought of before. Too often our comfort with the status quo blinds us to the opportunities that may come to us to minister to others in God's name and to serve in unique, unheard of ways.

The empty tomb of Easter morning changed the world in ways that no one but God could have visualized. God had revealed God's own self to humanity through the person of His Son, Jesus Christ and now that Son had shown us that God has power even over death. Easter is God's promise of new life to each one of us. Through that promise we are offered power and strength and hope.

Lent is a wonderful time for us to reflect upon this. *God bless us all.*



Servant Spotlight: Dave Murrow

It's a rare Sunday that you don't see the Murrow family—Dave, Julia and their girls, Olivia, 16, and Natalie, 14, along with grandparents—in their "regular" seats near the front left center section of the sanctuary for worship. Dave Murrow took time out of his busy schedule that includes, rocket science, yes, rocket science, to answer a few questions about himself and how and why he serves St. Luke's.

Tell us a bit about your background. I grew up in Boulder, Colorado, and was active in a Baptist church there (imagine ... Boulder baptists!). I was in youth group, went on mission trips, etc. I also went to college in boulder at CU, where I studied Aerospace Engineering. I left Boulder for Graduate School in Austin Texas, where I studied Celestial Mechanics. *Seriously.* Julia and I met in California, as volunteers for the California Democratic Party. She called me to ask for help on the Dukakis campaign, we had dinner, and the rest is history. We started attending Pasadena Presbyterian Church while looking for a place to get married. We were active there, got married there, and saw Bill Clinton there when he came to visit fire victims. My mother married us, she had gone to seminary while I was in college. I have my own Aerospace Consulting business, and concentrate on business development for NASA missions.

When did you start attending St. Luke's? We started coming in 1995, within a month of moving to Colorado.

Why did you choose St. Luke's? It was very family friendly (the kids were 3 years, and 6 months then.)

What do you like most about St. Luke's? The inclusive theology, the friendly people, the huge variety of activities, the youth programs.

Which groups have you been involved with at St. Luke's? This is the second time that I have been an adult family group leader for confirmation. I really like the opportunity to help the youth get comfortable with their questions about faith, and I like seeing them open up to each other about church. Since youth group was a formative time in my own faith journey, I identify with our youth. I also like the ability to get to know some other adults through confirmation. The other family group leaders, the kid's parents, and prayer partners all understand each other in another context during and after confirmation. It helps to build a foundation for deeper relationships.

I have been involved in other ways also through the years. I used to be active in the Men's group (years ago) and even led it one year. I have helped out at various kinds of work days off and on. I play trumpet in the Ministers of Swing jazz band, and in the brass ensemble. I was on Staff Parish Relations Committee and helped interview Janet Forbes. That was a big transitional time for the church, and I think people on SPRC, finance, and the other administrative committees at church really deserve a round of applause.

Another important aspect of our experience at St. Luke's has been the huge support from the church during our kid's hospital stays and other health crises. When the girls were in the hospital, people brought us dinner every night. Rev. Janet and former St. Luke's pastors Dick Evans and Dave Money have all spent many hours with us at Children's Hospital. And when Julia's parents moved from California to be close to us when Olivia was sick, they were welcomed with open arms. In fact, they call St. Luke's home now (Walt and Pauline Havens).

Why do you volunteer at St. Luke's? I volunteer because I think it is important to be involved in more ways than just Sunday worship. To me, the church is defined by all the people in the community, and there are many activities that need support for them to happen. At the same time, being involved in those activites make both my experience richer. So I get something by participating, and I think I am giving something as well. As a bonus, the community is more active and inviting to others, so they may be able to get more from their experiences as well.

What do you think is the importance of being a servant? Life is a series of give and take, ups and downs for everyone. When you are up, it is important to be involved to support those who are down. When you are down, it is important to be around and receptive to the support others wish to provide to you. When you are neither up nor down, it is important to give of yourself in order to receive the richness of Christian community.

What happens when you take a couple of dozen musicians, add all of the instruments of the big bands, and tell them to make a wonderful racket? You get the St. Luke's Ministers of Swing. And just to toot their horns a bit, these talented folks are making a joyful noise in lots of venues in our community.

Carl Fitch, one of the original members said the group originated in 1989 as the "Dusty Case Band," aptly named because the passionate musicians had put their instruments away in order to get paychecks. But it didn't take too much arm-twisting to get the past musicians to pick back up their respective instruments and join the band, which was really more of a brass ensemble at the inception. Carl explains that for the group it is a fantastic opportunity for outreach, but "the reality is it's just too much fun!"

The band evolved with the gifted addition of Jim Ramsey, whose toes tap just talking about the band's mission of sharing Psalm 100 with their instruments and passion for the big band swing experience. "It's rewarding and fun and everyone makes it happen for the community," Jim said. 
- General Fund and Capital Campaign: All methods. However, you need to call ahead to use your credit card in person here at the office to make sure I'm here to process the transaction.
