Imagine a 50ish woman, having birthed a dozen children, living with debilitating pain and misplaced body parts, blinking herself into unconsciousness as masked figures utter unintelligible sounds..."ten... nine... eight... zzzzzz." She then wakes to... fog... more pain... those people again, with their strange utterances. Finally, familiar words as a K'iche' speaker begins translating."Drink this; take that. Lie back. Colorado congregation's food drive puts "Rethink church" into practice

The folks at St. Luke's United Methodist Church had a great weekend. For three beautiful October days, they stood in the Colorado sunshine directing the coming of carloads and the going of truckloads filled with food for the local food bank. Associate Minister Brad Laurvick, organized this year's food-raising event called "The Feeding of 5,000... We Need U2!" On the Monday morning following the long weekend, he and others in the

congregation were still reeling with the success of collecting more than 55,000 pounds of food for Denver Urban Ministries (DenUM). A food bank that originated out of the basements of local United Methodist churches, DenUM now serves more than 66,000 clients a year. Laurvick is on the board of directors. This is the third year the 2,000 St. Luke's members have been the doers behind the

community-wide event event to gather food for Denver Urban Ministries.

"I'm still floating about three feet off the ground thinking about this past weekend," Laurvick said. "As a congregation and a community, we experienced some things that can only be accomplished when people come together." *continued on page 3*

Giving Thanks from the Underside

Millions parents will pause this Thanksgiving to do what the day was originally created for—give thanks for the many blessings that exist in their lives. Turkey, pumpkin pie, and the presence of loved ones will receive their fair share of gratitude during this annual ritual of appreciation. The bounty of the table, opportunities for meaningful work, and the laughter of children will be

acknowledged with gratitude by loving parents as they thank the Creator for their blessings. Indeed, this traditional day calls for a traditional thank-you.

But what if your appreciation this Thanksgiving took on a new look? What if the blessings you count this year included situations that aren't usually regarded as helpful, useful or valuable?

Why not be thankful that your child is two years behind grade level in his reading ability? This struggling reader is giving you the opportunity to read to him regularly at night. This evening ritual will help build connectedness between you and your child while at the same time modeling your love for the printed word. This opportunity is an incredible blessing. Appreciate it.

Why not be thankful that your daughter's soccer team lost their last game? It is important that your children have experiences of both winning and losing. By losing, children have the opportunity to learn to handle defeat and bounce back next time. With your help, they can learn that winning or losing is not the measure of who and what they are as human beings. Appreciate the opportunity the loss brings and be grateful for it.

Why not be thankful that your teenager received a speeding ticked for going 45 mph in a 25 mph speed zone? Getting a ticket is not a bad thing. Not if your teen learns from it and slows her driving for the next year. If she takes personal responsibility, pays the ticket, and is more cautious about her driving, the ticket may well save her life in the future. Bless the ticket and give thanks for its blessings.

Why not be thankful that your 8-year-old shoplifted in the grocery store? This is the perfect time to teach your child about shoplifting. Better now than when he helps himself to someone else's car when he is 18. Teach him how to make amends. Teach him what to say as he returns the candy bars to the storeowner. Help him learn to articulate what he learned and what he intends to do differently next time. Be grateful for the opportunity.

Why not be thankful that your youngsters track mud and snow into the garage and house? The next time you stand in the garage furiously sweeping snow and wishing that your children were better behaved, quietly remind yourself that one day you'll wish you had snow to sweep out of the garage. Love the mud. Love the slush. Be grateful for the signs of the presence of children in your life.

Why not be thankful for sibling rivalry? "He got more than I did" and "It isn't fair" are common childhood refrains. Bless these opportunities to help your children learn how to get along with each other. Sibling rivalry is a call for help, a signal that your children need lessons on how to interact positively with each other. Bless their unskillful way of asking for help. Be grateful that you recognize it and help them grow in working and playing cooperatively.

Why not be thankful that you got to stay home with a sick child last week? You didn't have to stay home. You got to stay home. You didn't have to take him to the doctor. You got to show him you care enough to drive all over town to the doctors, the pharmacists and back home again. You got to be with your boy while he was sick. Chalk it up as a blessing. Celebrate it this Thanksgiving.

Why not give thanks that your child is spilling milk, talking with his mouth full, wiping cranberry sauce on his new pants, refusing to eat his vegetables, and interrupting his grandmother at the dinner table this day? It means you have more work to do as a parent. This is a blessing. You are still needed to help your child learn to pour milk more carefully, improve his table manners, learn to eat nutritiously, and show respect for elders. Give thanks for these opportunities.

This Thanksgiving remember that parenting is a sacred role that you are being called to perform. Give thanks that you have been called. Give thanks that you are willing to step forward and accept that call. Celebrate yourself and your contribution to healing the planet by helping your children evolve into the people they were meant to be.

You are a blessing to the world. Give thanks that you are up to the task. I certainly will!



The Sunday before the food drive, the mission-minded congregation took home more than 2,000 brown collection bags. In all, volunteers distributed some 12,000 bags on doorsteps, to office buildings and from neighbor to neighbor in Highland's Ranch, a Denver suburb. On Friday, Saturday and Sunday, St. Luke's "servants" not only sorted, boxed, loaded, palletized and delivered the fruits of their labor; they also stood outside the doors of local King Sooper's grocery stores personally meeting and greeting food donors who stopped by to pick up a brown bag.

Much to everyone's surprise, the store manager came outside to tell the group from St. Luke's that because of their efforts, the canned goods section of the grocery store had sold out and had to have out-of-stock labels posted.



Laurvick has no shortage of "God moments" that describe just how "The Feeding of 5,000" transformed participants. "We had a seven-year-old helper whose parents came to get her to go to a birthday party, but she didn't want to go," recounted Laurvick. "In tears, she told her mom and dad, 'I want to stay here and help,'"

Another of Laurvick's "God moments" occurred when a couple of teenagers showed

up with their parents to donate food. They were not St. Luke's members, but asked if they could stay to help. The 12- and 17-year-olds helped and attended worship that evening.

"We had people at worship Sunday morning who told me, 'We got the bag and just wanted to come and see what kind of church does this,'" Laurvick said.



Another heartwarming moment occurred after a woman who had stopped by seeking assistance asked if she could stay and help. The woman, who had come to St. Luke's Church in need of rent and utilities assistance, collected and packaged food for more than 10 hours.

"I told her our ability to help her was not contingent on her working for it," Laurvick said. "But she wanted to be a part of what we were doing anyway."

Since September, St. Luke's has been on board with the "Rethink Church" movement gaining popularity throughout The United Methodist Church. Though his church has long been mission- and service-oriented, Laurvick said "Rethink Church" has given the congregation language to describe the church they already know and love.

"It gives us encouragement to live up to the question, 'What if we rethink church not in terms of what it is but what it could be—and what if we can convince the world to do the same?" Laurvick said.

"The Feeding of 5,000 was 'Rethink Church' put into practice," Laurvick said. "In fact, 'Rethink Church' talks a lot about 'church' being a verb and not just a noun, so you can imagine how great it was when one of our volunteers came up to me at the food drive and said, 'You know how we're trying to make 'church' a verb? I've been churching all day!"

gets up and leaves the next day under her own power.

Our team consisted of 4 doctors (two surgeons and two anesthesiologists), 10 nurses, 11 non-medical assistants, and a team of local translators. Surgery, in the

best of conditions, is not easy. We, of course, had more than the basic challenges-small hot rooms, limited supplies and medicines, old equipment, and unfamiliar surroundings.

A basic obstacle was the language barrier. The clinic where we spent the week is located in the town of Camanchaj, about 3 hours north of Guatemala City in the country's "Highlands," significantly off the beaten path. Of course, none of the patients spoke English, but few even spoke Spanish. The women, who rarely attend past the second grade in the area, speak only a Mayan language called K'iche'. To give you an idea of how a simple conversation might go.. *Saqarik (K'iche'). Buenos Dias (Spanish). Good morning.* And back.

Another challenge was accommodating all of the family that traveled with the patient. In the middle of the week, I observed a lady as she completed her pre-op paperwork. She sat at the center of about fifteen members of her family, husband, children, grandchildren. One of our nurses explained, in English, that her surgery would take about 2 hours and her gaze moved back and forth between the patient and one of the translators. Imagine the difficulty of explaining a medical procedure – in 3 languages and to 15 relatives!

There were heartbreaks that week... a lady with (the doctor guessed) stage-3 cancer, a pair of sisters $(3\frac{1}{2} \text{ and } 4\frac{1}{2})$ with hernias were told to come back in March, a boy with a bot-fly larvae in his arm had to be sent to a hospital 30 minutes away, and a lady, scheduled for a tubal ligation the final day was instead sent home with pregnancy vitamins when her test came back positive while completing her pre-op paperwork.

But also the miracles... 23 gynecological and hernia surgeries completed and about 35 additional patients were seen (many treated with much needed pain medication and antibiotics). On our last day at the clinic, one of the families (the lady with 15 relatives) gave everyone a hand-made coin purse in token of her gratitude.



I've had the privilege of reading two very special books in the past couple of months. One was written by a very dear friend and our former Missionary in Residence, Dr. Rev. Tapiwa Mucherera. It's titled, "Meet Me at the Palaver". His book is written probably more for Pastors, but I found it took me out of my comfort zone frequently and made me stretch my way of thinking. and present issues in new light with hope and possibilities for the future. In Dr. Mucherera's words, he discusses, "the destructive impact of colonial Christianity on indigenous African communities."

I also read a beautiful, yet sad and heartbreaking book by Janine Roberts, titled, "Dare to Love Completely". Janine and I have never met face to face. We've only talked online, for about 5 years now. Janine is a former student of Asbury Theological Seminary; this is where she met Dr. Mucherera. Janine not only went on a mission trip to Zimbabwe, she came home and made the decision to return and live in the Fairfield Orphanage in Old Mutare, Zimbabwe. Her book brought back memories so vivid for me that I had a hard time sleeping for a few nights. Old Mutare is one of the places St. Luke's visited; this is the place my life changed forever.

With Less Than 60 Days Remaining in 2009, It's Not Too Early To Begin Year-End Tax Planning. For the

church to give you credit for you donations in 2009, we must receive your donation on or before December 31or it must be postmarked on or before December 31. Some of the methods you may choose to use for your donation take a considerable amount of time for processing and to the church before the December 31 deadline.

Special IRA Charitable Rollover Program Extended

For 2009 Taxes. The Tax Extenders and Alternative Minimum Tax Relief Act of 2008 extended the provision for those who are over 70 1/2 to make a donation to their church to be included on their 2009 tax returns. This provision allows eligible taxpayers to donate up to \$100,000 without it being taxable income and at the same time the donation will apply to your required IRA minimum distribution. Keep in mind that the distribution must come direct to the church from the institution holding your IRA funds. It cannot be a personal check from your checking account.

If you are interested in using this program for your donation, you should check with your tax adviser to review the process and make sure that your timing is correct for it to reach the church on or before December 31or at least get postmarked on or before December 31.

Pick and Choose Your Method Of Giving to SLUMC.

We have many ways for you to make your giving to SLUMC easy and convenient. You may want to consider one of these convenient methods for your contributions.

In addition to cash and checks, we offer online credit card transactions, stock transfers and scheduled automatic withdrawals from checking or credit card accounts. The following is a general summary::

- 1. General Fund and Capital Campaign: All methods.
- 2. Grocery Cards: Cash, check, scheduled automatic withdrawal from checking accounts.
- 3. Special Events: Depending on the type of event may include cash, check, PayPal and online credit card transactions. The method(s) available at each event will be announced at the time of the event and are at the discretion of the sponsor.
- 4. Plus: We're anxious to consider any reasonable method you know about that we haven't adopted.

For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. -Matthew 6:21

"Hearts for Ministry" is the theme of our yearly conversation to encourage us to be faithful in ministries envisioned for 2010. Stewardship always asks the question: What do I really care about? In what will I invest my life and my resources? I would like for more and more families to enter into the joy of investing in St. Luke's and spiritual formation. Our Hearts for Ministry Team is asking each of us to consider disciplined, proportional giving. The tithe represents 10% of the bounty with which God blesses us. It is also the symbol that Paul uses when he writes to the young churches of the first century. He calls for "PROPORTIONAL GIVING". We are to give in proportion to what we have earned, in proportion to what we have accumulated, in proportion to what we possess. A TITHE represents what you plan to give to the ministry and mission of the church. It is your plan freely decided upon and cheerfully given. The tithe is the amount we bring weekly or monthly as an act of worship.

Next we are enjoined to bring our OFFERINGS. The Bible knows at least two kinds of offerings which have connection with our lives today. First, there are the "votive offerings". Votive offerings are part of a vow or promise, or they represent a specific act of thanksgiving to God, or a personal act of devotion. Seasonal offerings, missional giving, bequests, and memorials are in the category of votive offerings.

The biblical witness also speaks of FREE-WILL OFFERINGS. It is an unplanned, unstructured, unexpected out-of-pocket offering on the spur of the moment. The free-will offering is giving out of a sudden impulse of love, out of a felt need. It is the envelope in your worship bulletin when you arrive on a Sunday morning that invites a response for a special cause. It is the call for a special disaster relief offering due to flood, or hurricane. It is the spontaneous gift to the pastor's relief fund for homeless persons.

Bring your tithes and your votive offerings and your free-will offerings to the house of worship. The text is an amazing ancient writing with a high level of contemporary relevance. It all adds up to a single central truth: As we give of any monetary amount, we are primarily receivers and transmitters of the love of God in the world. Ultimately, that's what any giving is all about.
