A MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR



Faithfulness in Anxious Times For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. -Matthew 6:21

Rev. Janet Forbes Senior Pastor "Hearts for Ministry" is the theme of our upcoming campaign to encourage us to be faithful in ministries envisioned for 2010. It is more than a theme – it's an effort to show how our congregation can make a lasting different in the lives of children, youth, adults, and families.

Stewardship always asks the question: What do I really care about? In what will I invest my life and my resources? I would like for more and more families to enter into the joy of investing in St. Luke's and spiritual formation. Commitment Sunday is November 1 as we celebrate All Saints Day.

Our Hearts for Ministry Team is asking each of us to consider disciplined, proportional giving. For those that give a percentage of their income now, take another step to two this year toward the biblical goal of the tithe or 10% of the household income for God's work.

Stewardship is not about money, it's about what we do with our money. Rev. Brad and I will be sharing what God has to say about the vital role of stewardship in our personal lives.

Author Rich Cunningham has described the four purposes of giving.

*Give to honor God. Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. -2 Corinthians 9:7

***Give to serve the needs of others.** A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, as I have loved you. –Matthew 35:40

*Give so that you may deepen your spiritual journey. Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries. –I Corinthians 4:1

*Give out of gratitude to support the life, ministry, and mission of St. Luke's.

Remember the Lord your God for it is the Lord who is giving you power to make wealth that God may confirm a covenant. –Deuteronomy 8:18

Our giving and our sharing of our money is a deeply spiritual, devotional act. Giving is a spiritual exercise, a spiritual discipline just like prayer is a spiritual discipline. Prayer is not something optional if we have decided to follow Jesus' teachings. It comes with the job description. Serving other people is not something optional. It is one of the spiritual practices. Worshipping God is not something we vote on. It is one of the spiritual practices. It is the same with giving. It is an act of devotion. It is a spiritual discipline for all Christians just like praying or serving or worshipping. And that is why we call the act of bringing a portion or our resources forward to dedicate to God's work an offering, instead of a collection. It is an offering of our lives and ourselves and our treasure. The money symbolizes our lives and our work. It is a very spiritual thing. We are not balancing the budget here in this act, we're balancing our lives.

We continue in anxious, uncertain times. At St. Luke's, we are called hold one another in prayer and substance as many of our families struggle with unemployment. These times require much faithfulness, deeper relationships, and vigilant hope!

St. Luke's is living into a new model of organic organization called the Common Table – a model in which relationships are the ties that bind us together as a congregation, not our denominational heritage, or our doctrine, or our beliefs. We are a people who live "tied together" by our belonging to the body of Christ at St. Luke's.

Our congregational governance will now reflect the flexibility of our decision-making and ministry oversight. The image of a net provides the symbol of persons of different ages, meeting in groups and classes of differing interests, worshiping in different services, gathering from different backgrounds, longing for different spiritual journeys who are all linked together in the fullness of Christ's body.

Certain persons will have the responsibility to keep the net strong, connected, and repaired if there is a lapse in communication. The Executive Team and the St. Luke's staff carry this primary task. The Common Table will be an open gathering of the Executive Team, ministry team leaders, and persons from the congregation to share a meal, and to learn and discern, and to communicate and calendar our life together.

A Milieu of Adventure

As I sit and write this, the Feeding of the 5,000 is just days from taking place. When you read this, the event will either

be in full swing, or just have finished. We will of course share the totals as soon as they come in. Since I can't tell you how the event went yet, I would love to tell you about how things have been in the planning and preparation.

There is a great team of people who have poured a great deal of time and energy into preparations for this event. In addition to the planning team, the entire congregation has offered a tremendous amount of support and energy. Our theme and focus for this event has been,

"There are some things that can only be accomplished when people come together." This has been evident to me in the amazing response to sign-ups, bag distribution, and the invitation for others to participate. The sign-up sheets are remarkably full, and I continue to be asked how people can do more to help. Our youth distributed over 5,000 bags to the neighborhood. Our Sunday morning worship community took 2,000 bags with them back into their neighborhoods, workplaces, and schools. Our Preschool and Scout Troops have connected their communities to the effort. Local businesses continue to step up to meet our needs.

As we continue examine "Rethink Church" as a congregational theme, it is our community response to opportunities to serve, and work together as community that help me define this idea.

My new favorite phrase from the Rethink Church campaign has to be, *"what if church were a milieu of adventure"*. Having verified that milieu means what I thought it means (a person's social environment), I love the idea of church being an environment of adventure. That is certainly what we have embarked on once again as we seek to raise 60,000 pounds of food. Whatever the total, we are embarking on this adventure together, being the church in action, not just rethinking, but redefining church for the world around us.

But, when I am honest with myself, I recognize that I don't always behave as if I believed these truths. I confess. I tend to be impatient; and sometimes it gets me into trouble.

A few years ago, I was staying at a place in Montana that I had not visited before. It was an old farmhouse that had been converted to a Bed & Breakfast.

My room in this B & B had a shower with a hand-controlled valve that mixed hot and cold water to provide the desired temperature at the showerhead. The mixing valve, however, was several feet below the showerhead.

And, as I also learned, later, that the hot water was very hot and the cold water near freezing!

The first morning, I turned on the shower; I waited a few moments then stepped in.

The water was freezing! I quickly reached to the mixing valve and moved it toward hot. Nothing happened, so I moved it again; then, suddenly, the water was nearly scalding!

I jumped back, reached down to the valve, and turned it toward cold. When nothing happened, I turned it further to cold.

Suddenly the water was nearly freezing again!

Through this rather painful process of trial and error, I learned that I was making changes too quickly; I wasn't letting the new mixture of hot and cold water reach the showerhead before making a second adjustment.

Only by making a small change in the valve position and testing the shower after equilibrium had been reached before making another change, could I reach the comfortable mixture of hot and cold water. By waiting a couple of seconds after each change, I could reach any desired temperature very quickly.

Patience was the key!

My remaining mornings at the Bed & Breakfast were much more comfortable.

More from Les: God's Time or Our Time

Things happen in God's own good time. Many of the things we try to control in our own lives are like that.

We are called to be patient; we are called to have hope, we are called to be prepared. own lives are like that. When we want something, we want it now.

But, is that our time or God's time?

I think the words from Ecclesiastes, "*There is a season and a time for every matter under heaven*," give us the obvious answer.

We often let our time devour God's time. And by doing so, we fail to see some notable change or improvement. In our impatience, we presume that our efforts have been too weak or have been wasted.

Our children and others we care for, provide an example of something that we all have known for a long time. Desired outcomes can take a long time.

We want the kids to have a full, good life, with spiritual wholeness and self-confidence, with good health, morals and faith. Also, and most important, we want these things because we love them!

So, we enroll them in preschool and youth activities, we join the parent-teacher association, we volunteer to help with little league, soccer, and other activities. We gladly spend fortunes on weddings, take on debt for their college education; we don't want them to be denied any of the "advantages" of living in this world of opportunity. We want them to be "all that they can be," as the US Army would put it!

But, if we take one snapshot of our kids and their world one day, and take another one about a week or maybe even a few months later, we will likely see no change.

Even if our efforts have been significant over that period of time, any perceptible difference may be hard to see.

What may seem like a year's worth of work on our part yields no measurable change.

They still won't clean up their room, they still watch too much TV and their homework isn't done! They still have bizarre tastes in clothes, they talk back, tell you that you really don't understand how life is, and they just must absolutely have the latest X-Box game! The older ones continually insist on forgetting to let you know that they're going to be out later that they originally promised.

They may grow taller, but they do not appear to be any more communicative.



"For everything, there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven."


In God's time; not our time.

Duke Ellington Sacred Concerts



by Katie Newell Duke Ellington was a man who was not only one of the most influential artists in the history of recorded music; he was also a man whose genius transcended an extremely tumultuous time in American history. Born Edward Kennedy Ellington (April 29, 1899-May 24, 1974), Ellington's childhood friends noticed his easy grace and gave him a name to suit his noble personality. A pianist from the age of seven, he actually preferred baseball early on, and President Roosevelt (Teddy) would come by on his horse and watch young Duke play. But soon enough his incredible talent would begin coming out

on the piano and it became clear that he was in fact a true musical prodigy.

Although he is best known as one of the greatest figures of jazz of all time, Ellington's career over five decades stretched into various genres, including blues, gospel, movie soundtracks, popular and classical. A man of extraordinary charisma and possessing a well known refined public manner, Ellington elevated the perception of jazz music to the level of classical music–largely through his inventive use of the big band. Amongst numerous other awards, Ellington was awarded the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 1966, and was one of only five jazz musicians ever to have been featured on the cover of *Time Magazine*. In the last decade of his life, Duke Ellington wrote three somewhat controversial Sacred Concerts, a fusion of his jazz music with Christian liturgy. He has called these concerts, "The most important thing I have ever done."

It is in the spirit of this great man that on Saturday, November 14 at 7:00pm, St. Luke's United Methodist Church will be presenting The Best of Sacred Concerts by Duke Ellington, a truly unique concert experience that welcomes everyone in the community. James Ramsey, Director of Music Ministry and the Arts, explains that this type of concert is rarely done and will feature the Chancel Choir, Ministers of Swing Jazz Band, Tap Dancer Alexis Dear, and several soloists. Eileen Law, Chancel Choir member said her favorite song is *Come Sunday*. "I really like it, it's off-beat, off-rhythm, so it's very challenging, but so rewarding when it all comes together."

That sentiment is echoed by Alan Babcock, who plays the tenor saxophone for the Ministers of Swing and has been a fan of both jazz music and Duke Ellington for many years. "It's not just hymns that can express your faith," Alan explains. He also said working together with the other musical groups has been a very rewarding experience. Everyone is invited to be a part of this extraordinary musical experience, honoring a man who not only went down in history as bringing the Cotton Club revue to the church, but whose bands were able to thrive performing for both African-American and white Americans, a rarity during racially divided times.

Admission to *The Best of Sacred Concerts* by Duke Ellington is by donation and everyone in the community who enjoys jazz, compositions by a true genius, and the sounds of history in a piano ticklin', toe tappin', horn blowin' style are welcome.

Not Too Early To Begin Year-End Tax Planning. For the church to give you credit for you donations in 2009, the church must receive your donation on or before December 31or it must be postmarked on or before December 31. Some of the methods you may choose to use for your donation take a considerable amount of time for you to get it processed and to the church before the December 31 deadline.

If you need assistance in getting your transaction processed, please give us a call. We will be glad to assist you.

Special IRA Charitable Rollover Program Extended For 2009 Taxes. The Tax Extenders and Alternative Minimum Tax Relief Act of 2008 extended the provision for those who are over 70 ½ to make a donation to their church to be included on their 2009 tax returns. This provision allows eligible taxpayers to donate up to \$100,000 without it being taxable income and at the same time the donation will apply to your required IRA minimum distribution. Keep in mind that the distribution must come direct to the church from the institution holding your IRA funds. It cannot be a personal check from your checking account.

If you are interested in using this program for your donation, you should check with your tax adviser to review the process and make sure that your timing is correct for it to reach the church on or before December 31or at least get postmarked on or before December 31.
