According to our survey results in discerning our PRIMARY SPIRITUAL STYLES, 47% of St. Luke's relate to God our of a **HEART** spirituality, which embraces the "affect" of worship, feeling the presence of God through word, music, and community. The second strength of St. Luke's congregation is **HEAD** spirituality at 30%. This is a thinking spirituality that values study, reflection, and living the faith congruently with one's vocation, beliefs, and values. Both of these spiritual styles experience God as immanent and personal. In 2005, the survey results were Head (38%) and Heart (26%).

The third spiritual strength of St. Luke's is **MYSTIC** spirituality at 18%. Mystics enjoy contemplative worship with a blending of prayer, silence, ritual, music, and scripture. The fourth spiritual strength of our congregation is **KINGDOM** *continued on page 3*

A MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR



Easter Wonder: The Broken Chrysalis

Rev. Janet Forbes Senior Pastor Very early in the morning, as soon as the sun came out and they dared go outside, they hastened to the tomb.

The first ones who came were the women, those who had loved him so very much. They were loaded with linen, oil, and perfumes, because they came to bury him properly.

The men only came afterwards, when the news about the empty grave reached them. They were running very fast, as fast as they could. John,

being the younger, overtook Peter, but, being the younger, he waited for Peter to enter the tomb. They all gazed into the tomb before entering it, full of hesitation. They were all surprised, very surprised.

The story is, of course, about what happened to Jesus, and yet when you read it, it is all about them. First, it happened to Mary; then it happened to the other women; then it happened to John and Peter; then to the others; and finally to Thomas. They believed; something happened to them!

Certainly something had happened to Jesus. No doubt, he rose from the dead. Yes, he overcame darkness and evil. But the story is really about what happened to them when they saw the empty tomb, when he appeared to them, a first time, a second time, in the house where they met, outside at the lake, seeing him walking over the seas, eating bread and the fish he fried for them.

The story is about them; they believed! That is how we should celebrate Easter. What happened to Jesus is, of course, the main thing. It is the beginning and the end, the foundation and the pinnacle. But what we are asked to celebrate is what overcame them and what should overcome us.

Recently, I talked with a my great-aunt, a woman of wisdom and hope. She told me: "As you know, life has its ups and its downs. The older you become, the better you know: it is light and darkness, sun and shadow, sweet and bitter, good and evil, sickness and health, virtue and vice, progress and regress, falling and rising, life and death, Good Friday and Easter!"

This is all true, but what the witnesses started to believe at that empty tomb, as they ran home, when they saw him – is that good will overcome, that death will disappear,

that light will triumph, that up will prevail over down, the up of the resurrection over the down of the cross.

They were not only willing to believe, they were willing to live that belief in their lives, themselves risen from all death!

When my brother was a sophomore in high school, he has a live caterpillar collection. Their home was a shoe box, covered with screen wire. When he traveled to play football, I fed them faithfully with leaves from our willow tree. I hated it!

Finally the caterpillars stopped their incessant crawling and chewing, attached their tails firmly to a stick and lay still, sheathed with a shiny leather-like case. For weeks they seemed to be dead, unmoving in their tiny gray wrappings. My brother removed the screen and waited.

One by one, the gray cases began to twist and turn violently, and suddenly split open. A beautiful butterfly emerged. It stood for hours gently moving its wings, pumping fluids into them to extend them fully. Then the butterfly soared gracefully away on the breezes of summer, leaving nothing behind but a broken chrysalis to indicate its former bondage.

The chrysalis and butterfly suggest the empty grave clothes of our risen Lord. When Peter and John heard the news that the Lord's body was gone from the garden tomb, they ran all the way from their lodging. Peter entered the tomb and "he saw the strips of linen lying there, as well as the burial cloth that had been around Jesus' head. The cloth was folded up by itself, separate from the linen" (John 20:6-7, NIV). The graveclothes once wrapped continuously around the body now lay collapsed, mute testimony that the corpse they had once shrouded had now emerged in life.

The bondage of death is broken. We can face tomorrow with the assurance that Jesus is in fact alive to help us, to guide us, to give us hope for the future. And since he is living, our problems are not insolvable. The broken chrysalis of his grave clothes proclaims that Christ is triumphant even over death. Because he lives, nothing is impossible. Join us this year for the Holy Week journey: Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday Communion, Good Friday Tenebrae, and the Easter Festival.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! —Rev. Janet

OUR TRADITIONS

The Good Friday Tenebrae

April 2 is "God's Friday" on which Christians remember the death of Jesus on a cross outside Jerusalem. In many churches there is a service at or before three o'clock, when it is thought he died. In some countries, believing Christians spend the rest of the day quietly. But, Seville, a city in the south of Spain, is crowded on Good Friday by thousands of people, all hoping to see the spectacular processions which wind through the streets when darkness falls. By the light of hundreds of flickering candles, richly dressed statues which portray scenes from the last days of Jesus' life are carried aloft.

In England, most people, whether Christian or not, like to eat hot cross buns: spicy buns decorated with an egg paste cross, which is a reminder of the cross of Jesus. But the custom of making cakes with crosses is even older. Two were found, still with their crosses on them, in the remains of the Roman town of Herculaneum, which was buried under mud when the volcano Vesuvius erupted in A.D. 79. The custom – perhaps even the recipe – was brought by the Romans to Britain, and bakers are still producing them by the million every Holy Week.

At St. Luke's, we are planning to observe Good Friday with a service of Tenebrae, or "shadows". As the events of Holy Week unfold, there is a gradual extinguishing of the lights and candles in the Sanctuary. The Chancel Choir will flavor our remembrance with songs of hope. The Wesley Players will tell the story.

> A very personal, very public story Of a friend who died, the friends who didn't understand Didn't comprehend who he was, What his personage meant, The power he had Over life, over death, over our lives.

You will want to plan your observance of Holy Week – from the palm procession to the celebration of the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday, from the Good Friday Tenebrae to Easter Sunrise Service at Shea Stadium or Red Rocks. We culminate our journey in a celebration of new life on Resurrection morning in the Sanctuary.

continued from page 1 spirituality. At 5%, this spirituality reflects our deep commitment to missions and social justice. Many Kingdom seekers live their spirituality in the world, acting as prophets and change agents so that the Kingdom of God many be realized in the social structures of the culture. Our Kingdom people push us, teach us, and lead us into the world to make a difference. In 2005, the survey results were Mystic (23%) and Kingdom (13%).

Our secondary leanings as a congregation affirm a pattern which reveals a congregational leaning toward both Head and Heart, but name our growing edges toward mysticism and justice ministries. The secondary strengths were 36% HEART, 29% HEAD, 16% MYSTIC, and 19% KINGDOM.

Again, these percentages reflect our diversity and our commitments, our richness and our depth. What an exciting opportunity we have as a community of faith to learn from one another, to engage God from the multiple facts of the Holy One, and to stretch our experience to invite growth. The statements of feedback affirm a variety of worship experiences, the giftedness of our music and drama ministers, the hope of incorporating more mystical elements in worship, the use to worship elements from our Christian tradition, the desire for reasoned engagement with theological thought and social issues, and the hope that worship connects in relevant ways to daily life.

Growing our spiritual life as a congregation is the hope of increasing the vitality of God's Spirit in us, as individuals and as a community of faith. The work of the Holy Spirit is to conform us to the image of Christ. Our worship leadership will continue to listen to the congregation and to God so that we might grow into full humanity by living the life of Christ.

Hospitality: Just what does that term mean?

Hospitality means helping

Rev. Les Ludlam St. Luke's Lay Associate Pastor 1993-1997 someone else feel "at home," safe, comfortable, secure. It is the act of intentionally creating a winsome atmosphere that leads someone to say, "I think

I'd like to come back here!"

Hospitality is more than just being friendly, it is longer and deeper than a brief encounter; it is welcoming someone into our home, into our lives, and giving something of ourselves for another. For me, years ago, hospitality was the We Ask U Inn.

Driving home from Golden to Grand Junction for the Thanksgiving break in 1960, I had driven westward across Vail pass and had just passed the Minturn turnoff, heading toward Eagle. I was in a hurry to get home, to see my girlfriend, Betty, and my folks and had apparently pushed the old '50 Chevrolet 6-cylinder engine a bit too much, for as I approached the small community of Avon, I heard an ominous knocking from deep in the engine.

Sunset was approaching, I looked for a place to stop, and then saw a lighted sign on the highway about a half-mile ahead. The sign was for a gas station, restaurant and motel that I had passed dozens of times before without taking second notice. But now, it seemed to be a haven in the twilight.

As I got there, the neon lights at the edge of the highway proudly declared, "We-Ask-U-Inn."

I slowed and steered into the driveway; I pulled up to the front of the restaurant, and walked to the door just at the proprietor was preparing to lock up.

"Sorry, we're closing," she said.

"But I just need to use your telephone to call my Dad," I said, "my car just broke down and I don't know what to do!" Her face softened and she exclaimed, "Oh, my! Well come in and get warmed up, you can call from the office."

I thanked her, went to the telephone and called my father; collect of course.

I can imagine what might have been going on in my dad's mind as he accepted the charges on my phone call that night. "Are you, OK?" was his first question. "Yes, but the Chevy engine's knocking really bad, I'm afraid it might not make it all the way home that way," I said.

"Probably not," he replied, "Sounds like it might be a rod bearing.—I warned you about trying to hot rod that car!" Dad went on, "Stay there, if you can, I'll come get you with a tow bar."

I turned to the proprietor, asked, and she nodded, "Yes you can stay back at the motel office with us till your dad gets here."

"OK" I said to Dad. "See you in a couple of hours." He replied, "Just relax."

The owners of the We-Ask-U-Inn, Roxanne and

William, had operated this motel/restaurant/service station business for over 15 years. They had raised three children, now grown and gone to careers and lives of their own. None of the children had wanted to take over the business, but kept in touch with their parents on a regular basis.

After everything was locked up at the gas station, we went back to the motel office. Roxy, as she preferred to be called, turned to me. "You hungry, son?"

"Well, yes, I haven't eaten since lunch. I was planning on getting something at my folks' house this evening."

"Well, come on back here, we have some of today's soup left from the restaurant. And William and I can't clean it all up. There's plenty, try some."

After two bowls of soup and a slice of pie, "that just happened to be lying around," we began to talk about families, Colorado weather, my school, and my girlfriend. We looked at pictures of their kids and grandkids, of the deer and elk that would come by their place in the winter. The two and a half hours it took my dad to drive to the We-Ask-U-Inn went like a blink of an eye.

William had left the roadside sign lights on so Dad could see the place, and when he arrived, Roxy had a fresh pot of coffee going. Before Dad could hook up my car to the tow bar, she insisted that he come in and have something warm.

"You take care now!" said William as he filled Dad's gas tank and made sure the windows were clean, "It's already ten o'clock and you won't get home till well past midnight!" "Stop by on your way back, said Roxy; "Let us know how things went."

A hearty "thank you" and handshakes somehow didn't seem to be quite enough as we prepared to leave, but I couldn't think of what else I could say or do at the moment.

We left Avon and arrived in Grand Junction at about 1:00am. I spent most of my Thanksgiving break working on the Chevrolet engine!

On my drive back to school the weekend after Thanksgiving, I stopped at the We-Ask-U-Inn to see Roxy and William. We talked for nearly an hour. I told them about repairing the burned out rod bearings on the Chevrolet, my plans to marry Betty next year, and my studies at school. They told me about what their children were doing, of their plans to eventually sell the business and move to somewhere a little warmer.

From that time on, till I graduated from college, the We-Ask-U-Inn was a haven and I would regularly stop to say "hello." They sent us a card when Betty and I were married, and a short note of congratulations on my graduation.

Hospitality can build lasting relationships.

Missions Progress in Guatemala:

Pura Vida's Second Annual Benefit Dinner & Celebration April 16 Amilcar Solórzano & Fausto Natareno to Visit St. Luke's April 18

Significant progress continues to be made in the Guatemala mission work that St. Luke's does with Pura Vida Ministries. There will be two opportunities to hear more about that progress in April.



Pura Vida will hold its Second Annual Benefit Dinner and Celebration on Friday, April 16, in downtown Denver. The dinner will provide an opportunity to celebrate the success of Pura Vida's many programs in Guatemala. St. Luke's has been instrumental in that success through mission

trips, financial and prayer support for several years. The program at the dinner event will include comments from the leadership of the John Wesley School, visiting from Guatemala. Amilcar Solórzano and Fausto Natareno, Co-Directors of the John Wesley School, will discuss the challenges facing the people in the western highlands region of that country. Janet Forbes will also be on hand to share her thoughts about how St. Luke's and Pura Vida Ministries are creating a brighter future for children in Guatemala. For more details about the event and ticketing information, go to www.puravida.org/ dinner, or call 303-215-0994. Proceeds from the evening's event will benefit Pura Vida's ongoing programs in Guatemala.

If you miss them at the dinner event, Amilcar Solórzano and Fausto Natareno, Co-Directors of the John Wesley School in Guatemala, will be at St. Luke's on Sunday, April 18, to share their gratitude for our support and offer their insights regarding education in the western highlands of Guatemala. They will be introduced and thank the congregation for our ongoing support at all three morning worship services and will be available to answer questions between services.

Pura Vida's programs include 167 scholarships for children in rural Guatemalan villages, many of whom wouldn't otherwise have the opportunity to attend school. Many of these scholarship students are sponsored by families from St. Luke's. In addition, St. Luke's mission teams have worked to provide new housing for 9 widows and orphans of the civil war in the 1980s; two of these homes were built during the March, 2010, mission trip. St. Luke's mission groups have also provided much needed medical care through several medical mission trips, worked on an addition to the orphanage in the village of Lemoa and assisted in construction projects at the Methodist Retreat Center in Lemoa. Our mission teams also take school supplies, shoes and love to share with the children of these rural villages in the western highlands of Guatemala.

Pura Vida and St. Luke's have also been critical to the success of the John Wesley School in Santa Cruz del Quiché, Guatemala. Currently in its sixth year, this school is an official project of the Methodist Church of Guatemala (Iglesia Evangélica Nacional Metodista Primitiva de Guatemala) and is the first school to be built by that church. The school has been rated by an independent survey as the second best school in Santa Cruz del Quiché, and it has grown tremendously during its 5 plus years in existence. This growth has resulted in a need to expand the school building, which is where Pura Vida and St. Luke's have stepped in. Three phases of construction have been completed in the past 3 years, providing the additional space to offer a career track option (high school), and kindergarten for 30 new students. We're fortunate that the leadership from the John Wesley School, will be here to tell us firsthand how our efforts in ministry are impacting the lives of children in rural Guatemala.

Spring Cleaning Reminders
