A State-of-the-Church Report for the Church Conference

St. Luke's United Methodist Church continues to set the pace for dynamic ministries in Highlands Ranch and the surrounding neighborhoods. As God leads the congregation forward into the next season of life, we remain true to our mission to be an inclusive community that lives the teachings of Jesus.

Our staff provides excellence in ministry! A change in staffing for Children's Ministry launched a new team when Sharon Oliver joined Joely Maddux as Co-Directors of Children's Ministry. We thank Kristina Linn for nine years of serving our youngest disciples with care. Kay Swanson celebrates fifteen years as Director of the St. Luke's Little School! What joy to watch the innovation and energy of Chris Wilterdink, Director of Youth Ministry, and Susan Johnson, Assistant Director of Youth Ministry. We celebrate the vision and passion of our music team: Jim Ramsey, Kay Coryell, Ken Mervine. Angela Alderson and Suzanne Sharpe share a passion for music with our children. Josh Carr and Carrie Mallery lead the Fusion Band. Bonnie Funk graciously manages our administrative life and public voice. Dave Cupp and Lisé Takayama care for our fiscal life with integrity. Lynda Fickling, Director of Servant Ministry, who is passionate about membership, serving, and hospitality, has helped to launch a dynamic lay leadership system. Barry Curtis manages the logistical challenges of ministry with grace as Facilities Manager. We thanked Laura Hehner, pastoral intern and recipient of the Schlessman Parish Fellowship from the Iliff School of Theology, for her year of service to St. Luke's as she became the Associate Minister of Grace United Methodist Church in Denver.

Associate Minister, *Rev. Pam Rowley*, was commissioned toward Elders Orders and transferred her membership to the Northwest Texas Conference in June. We celebrated her compassionate presence in pastoral care and prayed Godspeed as she moved to serve as Associate Pastor at St. Paul United Methodist Church in Abilene, Texas.

We welcomed *Rev. Sallie Suby-Long* as Associate Minister of Pastoral Care and Spiritual Direction in July after her commissioning toward Deacon's Orders. She has created a new pastoral care tracking system that keeps the clergy team connected to the needs of the congregation. She is practicing spiritual direction and has launched a wellness initiative in partnership with Centus Education and Counseling for 2010. Rev. Brad Laurvick, Associate Minister, was ordained an Elder at Annual Conference in June and continues responsibilities in spiritual formation, young adult and men's ministries. Our fourth worship experience, Fusion, every Sunday evening at 6:34pm moved to Fellowship Hall after the installation of sound panels. Brad gave both leadership and passion to the collection of 55,000 of food for Denver Urban Ministries in the Feeding of the 5,000 and U2Charist. He has also taken a supervisory role with Children's Ministry in harmony with a seminary emphasis in ministries with young people.

Under the leadership of Ken Fong, the Board of Trustees worked diligently to keep our church home warm, safe, and inviting. Sandi Miyaki led the First Impressions Team to coordinate the welcoming touches in the Bold Venture addition. The Staff Parish Relations Team, under the leadership of Michelle Mallory, gave oversight to significant staff transitions.

Marty Davidson, chair of the Executive Team, and Audrey Elling, facilitator of the new Common Table, launched our new organic governance model, the Net. Lay Leader, Karin Wesson, gave direction and coaching to the new Lay Leadership Team as it invited new leaders to serve in eight foundational teams with term responsibilities. Laura Richards and Debbie Miller led a new Mission Team of members and specialists through local, national, and international outreach with two Guatemala Mission Teams, surgical and construction, and a visit by Amilcar Solorzano, Director of the John Wesley School.

At Easter, we were honored to provide music leadership and preaching for the 10,000 persons attending the Sunrise Service at Red Rocks Amphitheater.

With the transparency and oversight of our Director of Finance, we celebrated the commitment to a fourth year of a balanced budget. The fiscal uncertainty of the recession called us to keep our spending cautionary; but, we can celebrate the growing generosity of our families and the financial strength to keep our staff employed.

I am confident in God's goodness and prevenient grace! The Spirit has flourished in this dynamic congregation for 26 years! The prophecy that centers our hope is from Isaiah: "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (43:19)

Turn the Christian Year with the Imposition of Ashes

The Christian year tells the story of Jesus in two cycles of time. The year begins with the Christmas cycle of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany as we celebrate Jesus' birth. The story culminates in the Easter cycle of Lent, Easter, and Pentecost with the wonder of resurrection. The turning of the year from one cycle to the next is marked by the tension of two very different holidays... just 24 hours apart.

The Bible tells us that before Jesus began to teach the people he prepared himself by spending forty days praying in the wilderness. We call these forty days Lent, and Lent is the time when Christians prepare for the celebration of Easter. Some people still give up a favorite food during Lent, but in the Middle Ages, everyone had to go without eating meat or lard or eggs for the whole forty days.

In the Bible, Jesus is identified as "the Way" to a new relationship with God, which issues in a new quality of life and a new way of living in the new community of companions. Our Lenten worship will celebrate the community of people that Jesus gathers and the relationship that we share. We will explore what it means to be a spiritual friend of Jesus and a follower of the Way.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, so on Tuesday everyone makes a good start by confessing their sins and having them shriven or shrove – in other words, forgiven. That is why the day is called Shrove Tuesday. After confession, they cook a meal of pancakes, using up all the eggs and lard in the house. Shrove Tuesday is still called, "mardi gras", which means "greasy Tuesday", when all the grease and fat in the house have to be used up.

After your family feasts on pancakes on Shove Tuesday, February 16 5:30-7:00 pm, our church family will mark the first day of Lent with the observation of Ash Wednesday, February 17, at 7:00pm. All Shrovetide jollity is now over, and people show their sorrow for their past sins by putting ashes on their heads. We prepare ourselves to journey with Jesus through Holy Week to the crucifixion. *Come and worship... observe the turning of the Christian year.*

Vision or Long Range Planning?

"Vision" can mean different things. My eyes have naturally poor vision, so everything is very blurry without glasses: that is poor vision. My wife Cheryl is a vision: I always feel joy when I look at her with or without my glasses. And we can have a vision of who we want to be, where we want to go or what we want to do.

St. Luke's has seriously started its efforts at intentional visioning, or in a business sense, long range planning. I have spent much of my adult life involved in long range planning, budgeting and forecasting, and I believe that the business sense falls far short of the reality of what your Long Range Planning Team is doing.

St. Luke's has a dynamic personality that impacts all who enter its doors. We are cumulatively St. Luke's. This dynamic personality reflects a part of each of us. It is our variety of philosophies, our cornucopia of experience and our innate desire to share that builds this personality anew each day. If we like who we are it is necessary to deliberately encourage this persona, to nourish the body, so to speak.

And that brings us back to intentional visioning. How will we continue to nourish the greatness that is St. Luke's? Your Long Range Planning Team is gathering demographic data to identify gaps between the St. Luke's constituency and the larger neighborhood. We have data from our church surveys of the past several years that identify our favorite things. We know who we are and what we want today and we will know how we differ from the larger neighborhood. This gives us the starting point—who we are. I think we are like Joseph's coat of many colors! The next step is to evaluate, with the help of all of you, who we will be down the road.

This is an important endeavor for two reasons:

- 1. Our growth options within our current physical facility are now extremely limited
- The pace of change in communications and social interaction means we must anticipate the integration of these changes into our fabric (yes, there must be an application!)

Rather than play catch up or make decisions for only the short-term, we are attempting to create a studied, continuous process to identify and monitor the factors that precede change. For instance, the larger Highlands Ranch community profile is changing as the baby-boomers move into retirement homes here, and all of us discover that we have aged 10 years in the last decade! These changes reflect on what we need and ask of St. Luke's. At the same time our toddlers are now teenagers, our middle-school kids have become young adults. This is not the end of change! Stick around and stream sermons, or watch pod casts of special events. The Holy Spirit is among us, preparing us for great things.

Our process is much like an annual eye exam. We look into the eyes of the future and map the veins inside and check the tear dusts, monitoring the health and anticipating changes that naturally result from age or environmental factor. Each year this team will present to

the annual church conference the vision that has emerged from this checkup of who we likely will be in 5, 10, 15 or 20 years. Offer your thoughts to your team: Dave Rhodes, Brad Ash, Martha Boon, Rich Krenning, Danny McIntosh, Ann Smith, Erin Laurvick, Roberta Hamilton-Griggs, Bob Oliver

during the three-hour flight from Chicago to Los Angeles.

Just then an announcement came over the public address system on the plane, "Ladies and Gentlemen, This is your Captain. We have a mechanical problem in one of the aircraft engines. We can get it fixed, but it will take about two hours before we can be airborne. We sincerely regret this delay and if any of you have connections to make out of Los Angeles, please notify our passenger service agent."

The mood on the plane suddenly went very sour. And the flight attendants looked tense and unwilling to put up with any passenger complaints!

For some reason I was moved to say something, so I called an attendant and asked for some writing paper. She probably expected the worst, but reluctantly gave me some stationery.

This is the note I wrote: *Dear flight creu*, you probably think this delay is due to some random mechanical failure that occasionally occurs to disrupt airline schedules and make life difficult for passengers and airline personnel alike. Well, It's not and I think you should know.

I have been traveling for four days, from Los Angeles to Dallas to Schenectady and then back to Los Angeles. During this trip I have come to realize that there must be some sort of gremlin or dark cloud following me and it appears that you and my fellow passengers have been caught up by it. Let me explain:

On Monday, when I arrived at the hotel, there was no record of my reservation. My name had been inadvertently removed from the class registration list. I could attend the class but would have to share a course book and educational materials with another student.

Wednesday afternoon after the class, on the way to the airport, I was stopped in a traffic radar trap. Not only did I get a ticket, I missed my scheduled flight.

Children's Dinner Theater - Auditions Feb. 28!



Save the date for the Annual Children's Dinner Theater auditions -Sunday, February 28 at 11:00! THis year we will be performing "The Tale of Snow White." Children's Ministry has three goals for each performance we do. To show the children God's love for them, to support a mission and to have fun. Each year, we choose a play that is in line with the Methodist Global Board of Discipleship's yearly Family Christian Home theme, which is carried over into the other programming for Children's Ministry. We choose missions that the

kids can relate to and spend a portion of all rehearsals making sure the children and families understand the mission and why we support them.

The Family Christian Home program has four rotating themes: Love, Peace, Justice and Hope. For "Love", in 2005, we performed the play "The Selfish Giant", which told the story of a giant who learned about the love of Jesus through the children he was first annoyed with and then grew to love. The mission we supported was our own St. Luke's Little School (our on-site preschool) with the purchase of new playground equipment. For "Peace", in 2006, we performed "Just Like Us" which was a "West Side Story"-type of play about two groups of people who didn't get along and learned that we all have things in common even if we don't look alike. Our mission was the Big Brother's/Big Sister's of America program. For "Justice", in 2007, we performed "Big Bad" which is a courtroom version of "Little Red Riding Hood" with the Wolf on trial. The children learned about mistakes and forgiveness and we supported the St. Luke's Bold Venture construction expansion that will provide more room and resources for our children and youth. For "Hope", in 2008, we performed the musical "The Magic in Me" which showed the children that everyone has a special magic inside. You just have to find that magic. We supported The Kids Mobility Network, which is a program that pairs gently used, refurbished equipment for children with special needs who may not be able to afford the tools that can help them lead a more fulfilling life. For "Love", in 2009, we performed "A Hairy Tale". The children learned to express love by treating everyone with kindness and thinking of others before yourself. Our mission was The Denver Dumb Friends League. We showed love to the animals by donating new and used items the league uses and learning to care for them. For "Peace", this year, we will perform "The Tale of Snow White". This is more than your usual Snow White with bickering children, forest animals, huntsmen, government representatives and an environmental group who must find a way to get along in order to reach their common goal.

Auditions for children in 1st through 6th grade will be held on Sunday, February 28, at 11:00am. Auditions will be in the church lower level in room 128 which is off the big open area. Rehearsals will be on Wednesday evenings in the Sanctuary from 5:30-6:30pm, March 10-April 21 plus April 26, 28 and 29 from 5:30-8:30pm. The performance will be on Friday, April 30, with our traditional Mexican dinner at 6:00pm and the play at 7:00pm with a pre-show performance by our Cherubs Choir. Puppeteering with the Pros by Janet Johnston



I would like to share with you my reflections as a first time puppeteer in the St. Luke's Christmas puppet show, The Littlest Gifts.

When Steve Collins invited me to read through the puppet show script I had no idea what was in store, for I had never attended The Littlest Gifts message nor did I have any puppeteering skills under my belt. The driving

force behind my interest in puppets was curiosity and the desire to create a new Christmas memory with my church family. After reading and laughing through the script and especially singing really cool Christmas songs adapted from popular tunes in Top Gun, The Sound of Music and from the group Herman's Hermits, I immediately knew that my search for a unique Christmas memory was complete, and I wanted to be a St. Luke's puppeteer.

My training in learning basic puppeteering skills was unique as well. After reading through the script I attended an introductory puppeteering workshop, led by Steve and Cathy, tailored for a group of boy scouts and interested folks from church new to puppets. The class consisted of learning techniques on how to design a puppet stage, write a meaningful and entertaining script and practice essential skills in making one's puppet communicate with the audience. In addition to all this learning taking place it was so much fun interacting with my classmates' imaginations as we practiced our newly acquired skills and anticipated a fun performance on stage.

What I appreciated most about my training was the way I received instructions on how to motivate my puppet for the results needed to reach my audience. And some of those instructions came through lots of personal and funny stories told by Steve, Cathy, Ann Smith and Doug Johnson. Last but not least my additional instructors were the pros, the younger youth, full of puppeteering wisdom and playful advice that left me inspired and energized to duplicate their fine puppetering skills and enthusiasm.

Of course it was exciting learning a different kind of theatrical skill, breaking through personal barriers of all sorts (yes, puppets have a strange way of doing that), making fabulous new friends of all ages, and being part of our church award winning puppet team in delivering a contemporary/spiritual Christmas message, but something else wonderfully happened. That magnificent moment for me occurred right at the beginning of the finale, "I'm Gettin Somethin Good". I was kneeled (on comfortable knee blocks) behind the black curtain on stage with arm in position waiting for my "black light" chorus puppet to make its entrance, and all of a sudden I heard rhythmic clapping in beat to the music. At that precise moment I felt my heart skip a beat and at once I knew I was one with my fellow puppeteers; I was one with my audience; and I was one with the clapping. It was very cool to be in sync with so much Christmas joy, simply delivered through a cloth puppet; a Christmas memory worth sharing and remembering.

extremely happy to share with you that we have just finished another successful financial year. It was successful because we were able to do a good job of forecasting what our income for the year would be and then managing our spending to stay within that forecast.

The income for the year was about ½% MORE than we had projected at the beginning of the year and our expenses were a little less than planned. A huge thank you to you and all our leadership teams for doing a fantastic job during some trying times. We are anticipating that we will collect about the same amount of money in 2010 as we did in 2009 and with a few final adjustments we will have a spending budget that will give us another break even or better year. Our goal for every year is to keep our expenses within the limits of our income.

New Planned Giving Program Approved by Church Conference. A

resolution to establish a Planned Giving Program for St Luke's was approved at our Annual Church Conference on January 7. This is a great step forward in providing our members more ways to make donations that will support the programs of our church. The team is in the formation process of establishing policies and guidelines and getting prepared to announce details of this new program and how you can get involved.

Haiti Donations Made On or Before February 28, 2010, May Be

Claimed On Your 2009 Tax Return. The House and Senate passed a new bill which will allow those donating to the Haiti earthquake victims to claim those donations as a deduction on their 2009 tax return provided the donation is made on or before February 28, 2010. You should check with your tax adviser regarding this new opportunity.

Let me know if you need proof of giving and I will email you a current copy of your giving record. We record all donations for regular giving and special giving such as the Haiti giving if we can identify the donor and the amount at the time we receive the gift. I.e., If we receive the gift in the form of a check with the purpose identified in the memo line of the check or a cash offering using an offering envelope with the donor's name, purpose and amount identified on the envelope. Our Vanco Services EFT service also provides the opportunity for you to make your donation to St Luke's for the Haiti fund by going online to stlukeshr.com and selecting the Haiti Relief button for your contribution from your bank account or credit card. These donations will be forwarded to the United Methodist Church Committee On Relief for their work in Haiti. Our first check in the amount of \$10,000 was forwarded on January 21 which represented collections as of that date. We will continue forwarding weekly until the donations cease.
