

An Exciting Learning Opportunity in January


On Sunday, January 22, St. Luke's welcomes the Rev. Dr. James R. Ryan, Council Executive of the Colorado Council of Churches, as our guest preacher. Jim's guiding scripture for ministry is Micah 6:8: "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with your God."

Serving under the mission, Living in Unity, Working for Justice, Dr. Ryan has given leadership to the Colorado Council of Churches and state-wide ecumenical and interfaith

relationships since February 1, 2000. He will be sharing a message on the unity of the Christian Church. He stands in spiritual contrast to the polarization that seems to characterize communities of faith:

Do you believe we are related? That is the essential question! Do you believe that we are blood relations—that is, related to one another by the blood of Christ? The ecumenical expression of Christ's Church is not dependent on membership or agreement, but rather it is built upon the God-given relationship that we share one with another. No one denomination can legitimately stand apart from the rest of the body. No one part of the body can say to another, "I have no need of you." There is one body. "There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism."

We do not work for Christian unity. We do not strive for Christian unity. We do not achieve Christian unity any more than we achieve our own salvation. Christian unity is the already present gift of God through the love and grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ. We choose either to live out that present reality, or to stand in its way. When we hear the words of Christ, "This is my Body broken for you," they are words of blessing! When we hear the words of Christ, "This is my Body broken by you," they are words of judgment.



On Sundays, Jan. 29, Feb. 5, & 12, Dr. Jim Ryan will be teaching his book, Doing Justice in a Purple Congregation at 11:00am.

Born and raised in Akron, Ohio, Jim served as Senior Minister of First Christian Church, Des Moines, Iowa and then as Executive Director of the Ecumenical Ministries of Iowa before moving to Colorado. He received his Master of Divinity from Lexington Theological Seminary, Lexington, Kentucky and his Doctor of Ministry from Saint Paul School of Theology, Kansas City, Missouri. In the Denver community, Jim has served on the Board of Directors of Samaritan Counseling Center, Housing Justice! and as President of the Board of Eco-Justice Ministries. He presently serves on the Board of Voices for Justice. Jim is married to Kristin Ryan, MSW who is an elementary school principal in Littleton, Colorado. He has two adult children and their families living in Iowa, and two step-children in Colorado. His interests are golf and travel.

On Sundays, January 29, February 5, and 12, Jim will be teaching his book, *Doing Justice in a Purple Congregation* at 11:00am. In his book and class discussions, he asks, "Why is the prophetic voice of Christianity so silent? Why do mainline Protestant congregations become so uneasy when justice issues are raised? Why are we so bold with charity (meeting short-term needs) and so timid with justice (systemic change)?"

As a part of a politically and theologically purple (mixing red and blue creates purple) congregation, the class will explore the biblical and social challenges of leading in ministries of mercy and justice. Jim brings his humor, compassion, and pastoral experience together in framing the essentials for "speaking the truth in love" in theologically, politically, and culturally diverse congregations. All are welcome to participate.

Monty's Methodism Musings: Changing the World by Proclaiming Grace and Freedom by Monty Hoffman

As 21st century Methodists, we share the belief in God's love for all people and the freedom to choose how we live our lives with the Methodists that have come before us. Despite having this perspective, it is difficult to understand how this Wesleyan viewpoint on our relationship with God not only changed the religious landscape of 18th century England, but also changed the social landscape.

To understand what changed, first we need to understand how things were at the start of the 18th century. England was emerging from several hundred years of feudalism into the industrial age. During the feudal age, society was very structured and static. Most people had the jobs that their fathers and their father's fathers had. You were born into your place in society and lived and died very near the place you were born.

The theology of the time explained this social structure by predetermination. God determined people's lives before their birth and also determined their worthiness to receive God's love and grace. As people lived their lives, they were merely fulfilling the destiny assigned to them.

As society transitioned from the static feudal society to the industrial society, people's lives changed dramatically as they were displaced from the feudal estates. Their choice was emigrate overseas or to go to work in factories in England. The life that they thought was their predetermined destiny disappeared and their new lives were harsh and bewildering. This dramatic change left them in difficult situations with no idea how to change things for the better. The church continued to tell them that this was their predetermined destiny, as harsh and difficult as it was.

The people who had benefited from the start of the industrial age and accumulated wealth did little to help these displaced people. It was after all their fate, as determined by God's will, to endure this hardship and the intervention of the well off could not change God's will.

In 1738, John Wesley started preaching a different message. He went to the fields and preached to the working poor of industrial England. He told them that God did not pick favorites and that God loved them also. He told them that God's grace was a part of their lives even if they had not been aware of it. He told them that they had the freedom to accept or reject that grace and the freedom to determine how to live their lives because nothing was predetermined. Wesley gave hope to the hopeless and encouraged them to make a better world for themselves and their families. Methodist societies were organized to provide help and support for the working poor. Most of this help and support came from each other, but

Wesley also encouraged the better off to help the less fortunate.

This different theology helped people transition from a feudal society to an industrial society without the violence that was prevalent in most of Europe. It provided a social framework that allowed people to improve their lives and the lives of their families. It changed the world for the better.

Introduction to Spiritual Direction in February by Leigh Ramsey

"Don't ask yourself what the world needs. Ask yourself what makes you come alive and go do that. What the world needs is people who have come alive." This quote by Howard Thurman, a theologian and mystic is one of my favorites as it relates to spiritual direction. I believe spiritual direction is one way to help people "come alive."

You may wish to explore spiritual direction if:

- · You find yourself wondering, where is God in all of this?
- You want to be about God's work but aren't exactly sure what that is for you or your group...
- You have lost sight of God's desire for you in the "busy-ness" of life.
- You seek a "soul friend" to share your faith journey with.

St. Luke's spiritual directors are leading two Introduction to Spiritual Direction sessions in February: Sunday, February 5 and Sunday, February 12 from 4:00-5:30pm.

All are welcome and the only requirement is an open heart. Both sessions will introduce you to spiritual direction through modeling, discussion, handouts, suggested readings, and a time for questions and answers. We will talk about individual and group spiritual direction experiences and opportunities. For those interested in exploring group spiritual direction we will offer two sessions in March and two more in April.

From Rev. Sallie God is Up to Something

When I first heard about "Spiritual Direction" several years ago, I was very curious. I wondered just what Spiritual Direction was and I imagined many possible

explanations. My curiosity led me to further exploration and within a short time, I surprisingly and happily found myself in the midst of a Spiritual Director preparation program. I learned that the practice is sometimes called spiritual companioning, spiritual mentoring, or spiritual guidance and takes place one-on-one or in a small group. However, even now, after years as a Spiritual Director and Spiritual Directee, I have not found a clear, concise description of Spiritual Direction. I can tell you, though, some of the things I believe this sacred practice does:

- Helps people tell and honor their sacred stories
- Explores a deeper relationship with the spiritual aspects of being human
- Encourages peacefulness, compassion and justice
- Enhances self-awareness, invites healing and forgiveness
- Fosters deep spiritual formation
- Provides a safe place to be listened to attentively
- Integrates "being" with "doing" and aligns values, purpose and actions
- Supports people in finding new perspectives on life situations, moving through change, negotiating challenges, and claiming important insights.

But Jerry will tell you that his personal history has prepared him perfectly for his ministry to the homeless through the AfterHours Denver "church." Jerry meets his congregants where they are: in Congress Park, The Irish Snug pub on Colfax, The Uptown Tavern (coming soon), and on the park benches of the downtown Denver Mall.

As our workshop leader, Jerry will continue to explore and expand upon the themes introduced by Dr. Andi Pusavat, who spoke about "Chasing Happiness" on October 4. Jerry will share with us how his own experiences in chasing happiness proved elusive, and how he found both happiness and wellness through service to others. The motto of AfterHours Denver is "More love, more laughter, Less Judgment," and he will tell you that "Making peanut butter and jelly sandwiches [for feeding the homeless] is our call to worship."

If you'd like to explore new places and new ways of meeting up with God; if you are not always comfortable with what is inside church walls, we invite you to join us for an evening of dialogue with Jerry Herships. We will laugh a lot; we'll try on some new lenses to look at our lives and pursuits in a different way; and we might even see Jerry juggle.

Thank you to everyone who responded to our feedback survey following our October workshop. Your thoughtful comments will continue to guide our team as we plan for future Spirituality and Wellness activities.

And, we have many other ministries to support to encourage your emotional, mental, and spiritual health. Often we become more aware of God's healing and transforming grace through intentional connection with others. Pastoral Counseling and Care – Rev. Sallie, Rev. Janet and Rev. Brad offer short-term, faith-based counseling, pastoral care, and referrals for individuals, couples, and families seeking support.

Stephen Ministry - provides confidential, one-on-one care to individuals in our congregation and community who are experiencing difficulties

in their lives. Stephen Ministers are lay persons who have specialized training in providing emotional and spiritual care.

The Caring Connection – provides support to members of St. Luke's and the community by making companion visits, taking meals to families in need, running errands or providing transportation.

Care/Prayer Team – gathers regularly to pray for concerns of individuals, the congregation and the community. Requests for prayers may be sent through the website, written on a prayer request card or shared with a member of the staff team.

Support Groups and Classes – including 12-step programs, divorce recovery classes, grief support groups, and parenting classes. Information about current groups is available on St. Luke's website and in the Care Ministries brochures in the church entry.

Spirituality and Wellness Series – interactive workshops, featuring excellent guest facilitators, engage participants in learning new skills and practices that contribute to health and wholeness.

The Samaritan Fund – provides financial support and assistance for those who are part of our St. Luke's family. If you or someone you love is in need of some extra financial support to make it through a difficult stretch, please contact one of the pastors.

Benevolence Fund – provides support for those in need outside of the St. Luke's family. If St. Luke's does not offer what you need, the pastoral team will make every effort to connect you to resources, support networks, and care providers within our community.

More from Les: Rescues

I was attending college in Golden and had invited my college roommate, Bob Kaiser, to join me for the 1959 Thanksgiving holiday at my family's home in Grand Junction. He was from Illinois, this was his first Thanksgiving away from his home and Illinois was too far away for a quick auto trip. Bob had not spent much time in the mountains so I thought this would be a good time to introduce him to a spectacular part of the Rocky Mountains.

The weather had been warm over the holiday; we had enjoyed a great Thanksgiving, and now we were on our way back to school. There had been a sudden snowstorm in the mountains on Saturday, and by the time we started driving back to Golden on Sunday evening, the roads were plowed and icy, passable, but dangerous. Rounding the corner, going downhill off Loveland Pass, approaching the Seven Sisters snow-slide area, I suddenly saw a jack-knifed truck immediately ahead. Without thinking, I hit the brakes and the Chevrolet began to spin, waltzing slowly down the slick road, moving steadily toward the edge.

A major concern for travelers driving through this snow slide area is that there are no guardrails on the drop-off side of the roadway! The Chevrolet lurched to a stop, just before going off the edge of the road, high-centered on the ridge of snow left behind by the snowplows. I turned to Bob, "Are you OK?" I asked. "Yes," he said, and then looked over his right shoulder and out the window. There was a sheer drop just below!

As he turned back, the look on his blood-drained face answered my question. Bob said quietly, "I think I'll get out on your side of the car." We both carefully climbed out of the car and surveyed the situation. The snow bank had saved us, but we were really stuck! We pondered on what to do next.

A few minutes later, an old Dodge Power Wagon with a heavy-duty winch slowed to a stop and the driver leaned out. "You boys need any help?" he called. "Yes," I said, "I don't think the snow plows are out any more and we can't get any traction to back out of this snow bank!" "Let me try to give you a pull," said the Power Wagon driver. After nearly half an hour of digging, winching and struggling, the Chevrolet finally slipped loose from the snow bank, pulled by the Power Wagon and it's winch.

I went up to he driver, "Thanks, I don't know what we would have done! What's your name? Can I have my dad pay you something? He has a garage on the Western Slope." "Naw," was the reply, "Name's Brownlee, I got a kid of my own up at CU and would want somebody else to do the same for him. Just you drive carefully, OK?"

"OK, and thanks a lot!" And then, cold but relieved, Bob and I climbed back into the Chevrolet and started cautiously on down the mountain.

FAST FORWARD ...

One day 1975, as I was crossing a downtown Denver street, I noticed an elderly couple trying to cross the intersection before the light changed. The man could hardly walk; he was staggering and looked ready to fall!

I couldn't avoid them! They were right beside me, the light was about to change and the rather slight lady with him was no match for her rather tall husband. Without thinking, I took his arm, held him up and helped him get to the curb. There was a bus bench close by and his wife and I were able to help him get to it and sit down. By this time, he could barely move his legs at all!

I learned that they were residents of an active-elderly residence center in Littleton, and had joined a group of their friends in a tour of downtown Denver. The bus had dropped them off on 15th street, near Larimer Square, and they had been walking around the area for most of the morning.

As we talked, the man's wife explained that he suffered from a circulatory problem. "He doesn't get enough blood flow to the legs to provide the strength and energy for prolonged exercise," she said. They were almost twelve blocks from where they were to meet the group's bus when his legs began to give out.

I quickly determined that he would need more help that I could provide by myself. They were both scared, far from their apartment and seemingly unable to get back to the bus that would take them to home and safety. They needed reassurance as much as anything.

I told the husband to take it easy, just rest. They both sat down on bench close by and I hurried into a nearby fast-food restaurant and asked to use their phone for an emergency call. Calling 911 works! In a couple of minutes, there were an ambulance and a fire department emergency van next to us! The situation was not critical, so the van crew offered to take the couple to their bus stop. It was on the way back to their station and they were happy to do it..

As the couple prepared to get in the van, the wife turned to me, "We didn't get your name;" I introduced myself and then she said, "Thank you, Les, We're Wilma and Fred Brownlee.

I thought, "Brownlee!" Was the same Brownlee from Loveland Pass? I felt strangely good about the whole thing. Thanks, Lord!

Youth in Action (YIA) on Oct. 30 was a wonderful connection between 17 local youth groups in Littleton and Highlands Ranch and the community leaders who serve those in poverty and experiencing homelessness. Shea Stadium was the host site for YIA and we had 259 youth, 79 volunteers, 17 church youth groups and 9 community speakers and amazing musical

performances. Jerry Herships, Pastor of AfterHours Denver was our opening speaker who shared his calling to serve the homeless in Denver. Randle Loeb, Denver's Homeless Advocate shared his personal journey and call to advocate for those in poverty.

Our youth brought tents and boxes for their evening shelter. *Cold...* the low was 32 degrees and the wind added to the element. What

an amazing group of students who were willing to experience the elements and learn how to connect their gifts to the community!

The youth created 100 meals that were used to serve the homeless on Sunday. They assembled 212 survival bags that will be given to homeless families who receive motel vouchers through HAATForce and Jefferson County's Heading Home. These hygiene products

were donated by churches and community sponsors. The youth also packed 140 food boxes that were delivered to 6 local churches to distribute through their food pantries. Thanks to Cindy Raap for her tireless efforts to make this event happen and to HAATForce, Heading Home and Love INC for the work that these organizations offer in the community.

This information is vital for the preparation of a budget that will allow St. Luke's to continue "Changing Lives for GOOD" and do so within a balanced budget. You Still Have Time For Year-End Tax Planning. To give you credit for your donations in 2011, we must receive them on or before December 31 or they must be postmarked on or before December 31. Keep in mind that some of the methods you may choose to use for your donations may take a considerable amount of time for processing and getting them to the church before the December 31 deadline.

If you need assistance or information for getting your transaction processed, please give Lisé or me a call. We will be glad to assist you.

IRA Charitable Rollover Reminder. The IRA Charitable Rollover expires on December 31, 2011, unless congress acts to change the law. If you own an IRA and are over age 70 ½, you may transfer any amount up to \$100,000 directly from your IRA as a donation to St. Luke's because we are a qualified 501 (c) (3) charity. This gift will count toward your 2011 Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) and will not count toward taxable income on the IRA RMD.

In the past, some of our members have elected to take advantage of this opportunity to pay their current year pledge and to prepay one or more future years at the same time—before the law expires. We're happy to receive your prepay for future years. We hold those funds in reserve and apply them to the income for the applicable future year(s).

Keep in mind that Financial Advisors get very busy near the end of the year. It would be a good idea to get the process started now to avoid missing the December 31 cutoff date.

Free King Soopers Grocery Cards Available at Grocery Card Table.

Yep-FREE. If you are a King's shopper and do not currently participate in our grocery card program, it's easy to get started. Just stop by the grocery card table on Sunday mornings and pick-up your free Kings Soopers \$5.00 reloadable gift card. St. Luke's will receive a 5% rebate for every purchase you do with this reloadable card. You can load the card at Kings with any dollar amount you need and as often as you like by going to the Kings service desk or at the cashier using cash, check or your regular credit card. What a great way to build up points on your credit card.

The grocery card rebates from Kings, Safeway and Tony's contribute approximately \$12,000 to our general budget each year. This is a considerable amount that can grow significantly if more of our members and constituents will use the Kings reloadable cards that you obtain at our grocery card table. Give it a try.

You may want to consider one of these convenient methods for your contributions.
