






Were You There? A Life That Meets You Where You Are... CELEBRATING LENT AND EASTER AT ST. LUKE'S

Rev. Janet Forbes Senior Pastor Who is Jesus? The question seems simple and straightforward. But the answer is complex and subtle because it concerns the present identity of a person who lived in the ever more distant past. Whereas the question, Who was Jesus?, requests information that would identify him in his own time and place by referring to his date and place of birth, parents, occupation, social

status, and time of death, asking, "Who IS Jesus?" signals an interest in his current identity.

One of my favorite books about Jesus is by Leander E. Keck, Professor of Biblical Theology at the Yale Divinity School. Keck is a frequent scholar in the Disciple Bible Study Series, Jesus in the Gospels. In his book, *Who is Jesus? History in Perfect Tense*, he writes about the "is-ness" of the Jesus that was. Did you catch that distinction?



Keck remembers that the ancient Greeks used the perfect tense of a verb to distinguish the ongoing impact of a completed action from its occurrence in the past. "The door was opened" asserts that a past action caused the door to be no longer shut, though it might have been closed later. "The door is opened," on the other hand, asserts that it still remains open as the result of past action. So, to speak of history in perfect tense is to consider the ongoing-ness of something from the past, namely Jesus.

Our Lenten Series from Sunday,

March 13 through Easter, April 24, Were You There? A Life that Meets You Where You Are..., is the invitation to explore the ongoing meaning-the perfect tense-of Jesus. What does it mean to be a follower, a disciple, of Jesus? How does he always seem to meet us in new and fresh ways in each season of our spiritual journey?

In listening to persons who are seeking the spiritual life, I have learned that many people are skeptical about "organized religion", but are compelled by what it means to follow Jesus! The exploration of that hunger leads people to communities of persons who share the friendship, the convictions, the transformation, the hope of the Christian life.

Our Spiritual Formation Team will offer a Lenten study based on the book, *The Meaning of Jesus: Two Visions*, by scholars (Marcus J. Borg and N.T. Wright) who write from opposite ends of the theological perspective.

The season of Epiphany ended with the family party of Fat Tuesday on March 8 with pancakes, games, and masquerading. Lent began with Ash Wednesday with the flashing of our Lenten hopes in the fire!

Join us in worship as we seek a holy Lent by exploring the life that meets us where we are.

In *"The Meaning of Jesus"* N.T. Wright and Marcus Borg, leading Jesus scholars conservative and liberal respectively, each offer their perspective on some of the most important, exciting, and confusing issues of who Jesus is: his life, teachings, death, resurrection, and divinity.

St. Luke's to Develop Relationship with a Local School

Do you want to find new ways to engage in serving our local community? The Missions Committee and other interested people are working with the Douglas County School District to develop a partnership between St. Luke's and a school in our local community. As you know, we already have a close relationship with the John Wesley School in Guatemala and it will be great to help a school close to home as well. Just Faith - Just "Get Out There" by Betsy Keyack

You may have seen the commercials for a cruise line that urges people to "get out there." That is what we do as part of the educational process in our Just Faith classes. We embark on field trips called "Border Crossings" in order to have personal contact with people who are poor and marginalized in our local community. We have interacted with homeless people and their advocates; senior citizens in a Latino neighborhood; people with HIV; prisoners who are seeking to connect with God; day laborers who are vulnerable to exploitation; and women who are being empowered through their micro-businesses. We learn a great deal from these people about what God is calling us to do to live our faith.

One of our most powerful Border Crossings has been with Randle Loeb. Randle is a well-known and respected advocate for homeless people in Denver. He, himself, is homeless. Currently he lives at St. Paul UMC in Denver, serving as custodian. Randle is on the board of Colorado Coalition for the Homeless and is a member of numerous committees dealing with the issues of homeless people. Randle conducts educational walking tours in downtown Denver. From these tours, we have learned about the needs of senior citizens, education of homeless children; what it's like to be in a shelter like sardines on a cold night; affordable housing and gentrification of downtown neighborhoods; the Catholic Worker house model; the impact of drug addition and mental illness; the needs of homeless teenagers; health care for homeless people and the effect of city laws.

The HAAT Force, a community-wide group led by Peter Reif and others, to address homelessness in the south Denver suburbs, grew out of a Border Crossing in 2009. This winter, HAAT volunteers have distributed a large number of cold-weather hotel vouchers to homeless people in our local area. St. Luke's has been very supportive of this effort.

A key thing I learned from Randle and the Border Crossings is that in order to understand the needs in the community it is essential to go out and talk with people and listen to them. In order to take action, it is very effective to join with people who are interested in the same needs and are in fact already working to address those needs. Finally, it is okay to try different things in order to figure out how you want to make a contribution. According to scholar and educator Myles Horton, "We make the road by walking!"

100 People, 100 Trees

by Betsy Keyack It was a cool October day in 2010 with light rain falling. We were at the Sand Creek Greenway, a natural area being restored where the Stapleton airport runways used to be. There were 100 of us. We were people of all faiths, including Jews, Christians and Muslims. We gathered for prayer led by leaders of the different faith traditions. Then we set about our task - to nurture the environment by planting 100 trees. We wanted to show solidarity in our



common value of caring for Creation. Our work was called the "Peace Forest."

The Peace Forest project was initiated by Rev.Rebekah Simon-Peter of Bridgeworks, a non-profit that creates bridges of understanding among faith traditions in the context of the care of creation. The effort was co-sponsored by the Denver-area Abrahamic Initiative and the non-profit Colorado Interfaith Power and Light (see http://www.coloradoipl.org/).

Lise Takayama and Edee Worth from St. Luke's were among the volunteers planting trees. In addition, Nancy Abbot, Lise Takayama and Betsy Keyack donated trees in memory of loved ones.

Another Peace Forest planting in the Denver area is planned for this year. Stay tuned for information if you would like to participate. In addition, Rebekah plans to start a Peace Forest in every state. What a wonderful way to express our values!

prenuptial counseling meetings, the rehearsal had gone pretty much as expected, and it seemed there was nothing else for me to do in preparation.

Betty was getting ready at her parents home; I was with my family, fidgeting as much as anything else. "It seems," I foolishly thought, "that grooms don't have so much to do to prepare for the wedding."

I was dressed and would get a boutonniere later at the church. The Buick was serviced and washed, all my clothes were packed and ready, the books for school were in the back of the car, so I could be ready for classes that started the following week. I needed something to help burn off the nervous energy, so I began to worry.

Betty's brothers, Roger and Dick had been teasing me earlier about kidnapping her after the ceremony and holding her hostage for a while. "They wouldn't do that!" I thought, "Or would they?" The horrible possibility began to wear on my mind, unlikely as it was. "Don't worry, we'll get you and Betty to our Edsel after the wedding and you can use it on your honeymoon trip," said my father, "we will drive your Buick till you get back." The Edsel was barely a year old and was certainly more elegant than the '55 Buick, so I enthusiastically agreed to the plan.

The wedding began at about 2:00pm, after the church had been cleared following Sunday worship. I waited nervously in the small room just off the main church sanctuary with my best man, Jim, and the groomsmen, Billy and my brother, Jerry. Rev. Bob offered a short prayer and then, as the organ music began, he said, "Let's go," and then turning to me with a mischievous smile, continued, "Unless you want to back out..."

We started in... I walked to the altar area with the Rev. Bob and the groom's men and watched the back of the church for the arrival of the bride. The music swelled and the stains of the wedding march filled my brain. Betty and her dad appeared and I caught my breath.

There was the love of my life, looking more beautiful then I had ever seen before! She was looking at me and smiling as she walked down the aisle on her father's arm. I took a deep breath and fought back the tears that were trying to well up in my eyes. I still get a lump in my throat when I recall that moment!

In what seemed an instant, Betty was standing beside me; we had said our vows, we had exchanged rings and the minister had declared us husband and wife. We had kneeled for a prayer at the end of the ceremony. When the prayer was over, we stood and kissed and then prepared to recess up the center aisle.

But as we stood up to begin our recession up the aisle, Betty discovered that she was standing on one of the underskirts of her wedding dress! She began to lean forward. I quickly caught her, steadied her and in split-second, she was able to free her foot. Just as a picture was being taken, we straightened up and then walked together up the aisle. I felt that disaster had been narrowly avoided.

Immediately following the ceremony, we proceeded to go downstairs to the fellowship hall in the church basement. There was the usual reception line, guest book, or eand refreshments. We had mints, nuts, cake, ice cream, coffee and tea. There were hugs and kisses and tears of joy; then the wedding presents were opened. I kept my eyes on Betty's brothers, but nothing out of the ordinary seemed to be happening; it appeared that their threat had been just that, something to have fun with my mind.

Betty disappeared to change from her wedding dress into her "going away" outfit and my father slipped the keys to the Edsel into my pocket and I gave him my keys to the Buick. As the reception began to wind down and Betty and I went upstairs and out of the church and through a shower of rice. We quickly walked to the side of the church where the Edsel was parked, our bags discreetly hidden in the trunk, and got in. As we drove away, we saw the '55 Buick sitting in front of the church, elegantly decorated with crepe paper and soap for the windows. (Mom would tell us later that they received quite a response of honking and cheering as they drove the Buick to their home.)

Weddings have changed dramatically in several ways since 1961. In many ways, however, they remain the same. The elegance of the location and ceremony, the money spent, the special things that may be done by bride and groom, do not change the significance of this holy event nor

affect the quality or longevity of the marriage. Commitment to the vows made and regular reinforcement that seeks none but good for your partner *do* make the difference.

A message from the Seasoned

Voyagers No, we are not well-seasoned with salt and pepper and other spices, nor are we full of recipes that we hand out to people. OUR FELLOWSHIP

Eight years ago a foresighted group of parents led by Dan Raap realized Old Blue (a 15 passenger airport van) wasn't the safest nor the most reliable transportation for our kids so they purchased the bus we have today. Fortunately credit was available. However how to pay it off? Cue the men in funny shorts.

A golf event was born (in case you're wondering, a church can't refer to it as a "tournament"). The event has been a great success. Not only has it provided us the necessary revenue, but it's provided a way to socialize with 90 of our closest parishioners. It's also been a great way for folks to expose friends and neighbors to our culture (most definitely "Invitational"). The first two years were played at Highlands Ranch GC, then three years at Fossil Trace GC where our own Jim Hajek is Head Professional, and finally returned to HRGC the last two years.

Typically \$30 per entry goes towards the fund which by itself wouldn't have paid-off the loan in my lifetime. Hence sponsorships and silent auctions were necessary. Several of our member business persons have supported us year-in and year-out. Others have solicited items for silent auctions and to support the raffle. Finally there's an anonymous benefactor who has generously contributed. The staff at St. Luke's has also been supportive with golf jokes from the pulpit and clever videos and skits. Without the support of these people and those that have served on the committee over the years we wouldn't be where we are.

So what's next? Well we need to start planning for the next one. While the current bus has been a wonderful tool, a smaller bus that doesn't require a commercial driver's license would be useful. Rather than buy a new one now, we're going to build a little equity first. Typically we have around 90 participants of which 25% are women. Given that it's possible to field 144 players, the focus for this year is on participation rather than fundraising although sponsorships will remain available.

Fortunately Arrowhead GC (http://www.arrowheadcolorado.com)

has offered us a very aggressive bid this year. This first-class venue has stunning views of natural rock formations throughout the course and is sure to be an attraction. We also hope to reduce the entry fees. The package includes complimentary non-alcoholic drinks and snacks on the carts as well as a buffet afterwards and a drink voucher. I think you'll find this to be a terrific value.



Great Turnout for 3rd Wellness Workshop

Sunday Feb. 20 at St. Luke's Dr. Dana Max, Clinical Psychologist specializing in Youth and Families, engaged more than 65 participants in learning about the Assets Building approach for nurturing competent, caring, and responsible children and youth. Initiated by the Search Institute in 1995, and based on research among 250,000 American youth grades 6-12, the Assets Building approach has defined 40 Assets that all young people need to develop in order to navigate successfully through childhood and adolescence. The 40 Assets incorporate both External Assets (for example, family support, a caring neighborhood, adult role models, creative activities, a religious community) and Internal Assets (for example, achievement motivation, integrity, planning and decision making, self-esteem). Many children and youth have fewer than half of these Assets, leaving them significantly at risk for engaging in risk-taking behaviors, including drug and alcohol abuse, depression/suicide, sexual activity, violence, and poor performance in school.

As a community of faith that already recognizes the value of intergenerational

relationships, St. Luke's is in a position to think more broadly about what we can do to promote and nurture the development of more Assets among our children and youth. Workshop participants broke into small groups to share specific ideas about how St. Luke's can develop greater capacity to help our children and youth build more Assets into their lives. In a large group closing Dr. Max summarized and concluded with the challenge that each and every member of St. Luke's can help create the Gracious Space necessary to nurture competent, caring, and responsible children and young people, by practicing the Assets Building approach. We have an opportunity to live out our congregational baptismal commitment "to be the sisters and brothers, uncles and aunts, grandfathers and grandmothers in Christ;" to help our children and youth "grow to full humanity, through living the teachings of Jesus Christ: Love, Acceptance, Justice, and Hope." It was an evening full of Gracious Space.

If you were unable to attend the Building in Gracious Space: Assets Building - A Strength Based (and Gracious) Approach to Helping Children and Youth Thrive workshop, Ken Fong videotaped the large group sessions (Thank you Ken), and you can contact Rev. Sallie to arrange to view the video.

The Spirituality and Wellness Team plans to email a follow-up survey to all participants who provided email addresses. We invite you to give us your feedback about the Assets Building workshop and provide your ideas for future Spirituality and Wellness workshops. In addition, the survey will investigate interest in a deeper exploration of the Assets Building approach, as well as what that might look like as a St. Luke's education activity. We invite your participation in planning these activities.
