There are some things that can only be accomplished when people come

together in love. This phrase has never been more true to me as 60,000 pounds of food is certainly a thing that cannot be accomplished any other way. Let me give you context to help make this number as big as it is—not only is 60,000 pounds the estimated lifetime food consumption of the average American, it is also the weight of 6 full grown male elephants. Now let me give you context to help make this number as small as it is— Denver Urban Ministries (DenUM) will use all 60,000 pounds in less than two months. So let me make that seem big again—in those two months DenUM will give that food to over 2,500 families (around 10,000 people). The idea that we could collect

Sometimes our lives feel like a race from one goal to the next as we pursue that ephemeral sense of Happiness: If I could just get that job...

If I could just find that special relationship... If I could just lose those 10 pounds... Then, I will be happy! How does all of this relate to our spiritual journey? As we race along, we often miss the meaningful moments along the way. The ancient Hebrews celebrated **Dayeinu**, roughly translated, it is enough. We can perhaps imagine that, as they wandered in the wilderness, God gave them water, and manna, and the concept of Dayeinu: "If God never gives us any other gifts, what has come before was enough."

We invite our community to join us for the 2011/2012 Spirituality and Wellness series to explore strategies for finding the peace and contentment we seek in the moment. Our three sessions will take an honest look at what drives human beings to pursue happiness, which is usually slightly

beyond our reach at any given moment. Life often surprises us; we don't expect to be where we are. How do we find peace in the moment. How can we celebrate "Dayeinu" in our lives? Nonty's Nethodism Ausings: 3 Affirmations by Monty Hoffman

United Methodism is a non creedal faith. I can't write something on the blackboard and say that if you want to be a United Methodist, you need to believe all of these things. Within a broad range of Christian thought, you are free to believe what your study of scripture, understanding of tradition, application of reason, and experience of God in your life have led you to believe.

Because we do not have a set doctrinal statement, some people think we have nothing in common with each other in our beliefs. Nothing could be further from the truth. In fact the idea that we can differ in our beliefs and still be called to live together in a Christian community is one of the things that defines us.

As John Wesley started the Methodist movement, there were many doctrinal issues which separated us from the mainstream of the Church of England and helped define us. Wesley told the people that he preached to in the fields that they were also loved by God and that God's Grace was a part of their lives also. This did not set well with the mainstream who thought that they were a privileged class because God had placed them there and that the poor suffered because God had predetermined that fate for the poor. They thought that if the working class poor listened to Wesley, they would "forget their place in society" and they strongly opposed Wesley. Wesley not only changed the theology of the Church of England, he changed the social landscape of England.

The defining ideas that separated us from the Church of England mainstream still define us today. They are the ideas that have drawn millions of people to the movement over the last 250 years and the ideas that we build our core values as a denomination around. These ideas can be summed up in three affirmations.

- I. God loves all people.
- 2. God's Grace is a part of all people's lives, even when they are unaware of it and even when they feel unworthy of it.
- 3. We have the freedom to accept or reject God's Grace and we have the freedom to determine how we will live our lives. God challenges us to use that freedom to make the world a better place for all of his children.

These affirmations still warm my heart when I hear them and make me proud to be a part of the Methodist Movement.

More from Les: Transformation #2 The Palmer United Methodist Fellowship

This is the second installment of a three-part series of the story of transformation during the three years I served as pastor of a very small, rural United Methodist congregation in Alaska. I believe this story has an important message about how we recognize a "call" in our own lives, whatever it may be, how we respond to that call, and how God uses people around us to affirm and support us as we move forward. I hope you enjoy the story. It's not just mine, but a story of the people who traveled with me and helped me on this sometimes confusing and circuitous path.

In early 1989, Keith and Lea Bryan, Elana Shiflea and other members of a Sunday school class at the Wasilla, Alaska, United Methodist Church decided it was time to do something. They lived 30 miles to the east in Palmer. Sometimes it took over an hour to get to the church.

One day, Keith asked, "Could we start our own church and get our own minister in Palmer?" With encouragement from their pastor, Rev. Linda Meyer, the class members decided they would explore the idea. They arranged a meeting with the Conference Superintendent, Rev. Carol Sekel, and made their request. "We need a minister and worship location in Palmer," said Keith. "We live too far from Wasilla and while there are other churches in Palmer but they don't really meet our own worship and fellowship needs."

"But Palmer only has a population of about 4,000," replied Carol, "The chances of getting enough members to allow a new church to be self sufficient are practically zero!

"But we must have a place to worship in Palmer," replied Lea, "and we want our kids to have a good Sunday school experience."

Carol paused for a moment, "Well," she said, "if you're willing to operate as a 'Fellowship,' without being chartered or having a vote in Annual Conference, you could begin operating right now if I could find a Part-Time Licensed Local Pastor for you. But don't expect any help from the denomination."

Keith smiled, "Then could you find a pastor for us?"

Carol faced a dilemma. There was no money to support the planting of a new church in Palmer, but the Palmer families had a legitimate need and she was unwilling to tell them to go to another denomination. She felt a responsibility to respond to their need but had no resources to support any action. While she had serious doubts that the well-established community of Palmer could support any new church at all, Carol wanted to do something. "I'll see what can be done," she replied.

Later, Carol looked over a list of local ministry candidates prepared by the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry and noted the candidacy file on Les Ludlam.

There were questions about Les. She knew he worked as an engineer for an oil company, but she knew nothing beyond his candidacy papers and the results from a few meetings with the Board of Ordained Ministry and his meetings with Rev. Billy Still, the mentor assigned to him.

"Les seems to have the business background to help him understand the challenges in trying to get a new church planted," she thought, and the Board believes he's ready for Certification. But could he be an effective pastor for the congregation? Would he be a good fit with the Palmer folks? Would he stick with them? Can an engineer be an effective minister? He's working full time in Anchorage."

Carol decided to talk to me.

"Will you do it?" she had asked me, and I said "yes."

After my affirmative reply, Carol said, "The next step is to meet with the folks at Palmer and then you and the congregation will decide what to do.

I'll depend on you to keep me informed on how they're doing and what you are doing to help them face some of the hard facts about starting a new church. When do you want to meet with them?"

"As soon as they are ready," I replied.

I had only a general idea about what this might lead to for Betty and me.

The meeting with the parishioners went as expected. I agreed to meet with them the following Sunday evening for their regular evening Bible study meeting and to work with them to begin the process of planning for the future. From then on, things began developing very quickly.

By December, we had located an affordable place on the Palmer/Wasilla Highway; it was in a bankrupt shopping mall, Colony Plaza (also known as "The Barn" because of the shape of the building).

A local ELCA Lutheran congregation had purchased the mall. They used part of it for their worship space and rented the remainder of the space. There was a small room in the back, on the second level where we could meet, the Lutherans could not take rent from other church organizations, and so we proposed to give them a monthly "love-offering."

We canvassed neighborhoods, borrowed a piano and a small electric organ from St. John UMC. We recruited a piano player from the congregation,





had a sign made by a local painter and put it up next to the highway. We borrowed a small table and a cross and bought some candle -holders to set up an altar. We were given surplus old bulletin covers from St. John's UMC to use for our Sunday morning order of worship. Betty, bless her heart, offered to lead the children's Sunday school!

We called ourselves "Palmer United Methodist Fellowship;" we were a church in every way that counted.

We were optimistic, and excited! On the first Sunday following New Year's day, 1990, we began regular Sunday morning worship for the Palmer United Methodist

Fellowship upstairs in "The Barn." Betty and I began driving to Palmer every Sunday; I would preach, Betty would teach the children's Sunday school. I would continue meeting, as a Certified candidate, with Rev. Billy Still and would report regularly to the Conference Superintendent.

Then, came the common experience of struggle and learning and change, for me and for the congregation. And it all happened because of the vision and commitment of many, not just the appointed pastor.

Luck happens when preparation meets opportunity—and then God's work gets going!

Attention Parents! Good stuff you should know...

The Children's Ministry staff team conducted two servant training sessions at the beginning of September where around 40 servants were in

attendance. We reviewed the Sunday School schedule, curriculum, and the Children's Ministry "Safe Sanctuary" Procedures. Below are some highlights for all of our parents to remember about the Sunday School program. We hold ourselves to a high standard of safety to help ensure we conduct a program that is not only educational and fun but also very safe! We need your help to make this happen.

- All servants complete a background check and volunteer application. The staff will be following up and collecting completed forms throughout the fall.
- A parent/adult guardian must sign their child in and out of class. Please register your child for Sunday School each year. It's easy to do on online or at the Superintendent's Station. Registering gives your child a permanent name tag and family number and adds their name to the class sign in sheet, it also provides us with emergency contact info and allergy info and puts you on the list to receive emails with children's programming info. Visitors and children not yet registered for Sunday School check in with the Superintendent first, then sign in at the child's class.
- Each child in Sunday School has a family number on their name tag, as well as on their sign in sheet. If a parent/guardian is needed for any reason you will be paged by that number in the Sanctuary near the large screen.
- All children have 2 name tags. One of them goes on the child (please pin it on the back of your preschool child for safety reasons and the front of your elementary-aged child) and the other name tag is for you to use as a claim check for retrieving your child after service.
- Teachers/Shepherds are indicated by their white name tag so you will know that this person is an authorized adult serving in our Sunday School program.
- We follow a rule of two adults for each class of children.
 Ms. Sharon, Ms. Dawn, Ms. Sam and the Superintendent also act as an additional adult for classrooms as needed.
- In the case of an emergency, such as a fire drill, please remember to sign your child out and show your name tag claim check. The teacher will release your child to you as soon as all of the children from the class have been accounted for at the evacuation area.

We need you! There are plenty of opportunities to serve within the Children's Ministry program and we welcome all of you to join us. Serving our children not only can help you along your spiritual journey and be a fun and meaningful experience, it means the world to our children that you are there for them. The servant schedule is kept updated and is on the St. Luke's website under the children's tab, so you can see when you are serving.

Please let Sharon or Dawn or Sam know if you have any questions about Sunday School procedures or volunteering within the program. *Your child's safety is our top priority and within a safe environment, learning can thrive!*

How do United **Methodist Congregations** Get their Pastors? by Janet Forbes

The United Methodist Church has a unique way of matching pastors and congregations. Rather than local churches hiring and firing their own pastors-as in some denominations-United Methodist bishops appoint pastors to serve in local churches and other ministry settings.

One advantage to this process is that a local church never has to go without a pastor. Likewise, a pastor (specifically, a full member of an annual conference in good standing) never goes without a setting for ministry. The primary goal of the appointment system is to match the gifts and graces of a particular pastor to the ministry needs of a particular congregation at a particular time.

This itinerant system, where pastors move from one appointment to another, dates back to American frontier days when circuit riding preachers traveled on horseback from town to town. At that time, bishops matched preachers to circuits four times a year. Now bishops typically fix appointments once a year at the meeting of the annual conference in June. Most clergy move to their new appointment on July 1 each year.

To understand the appointive process, it helps to know a little about how the United Methodist Church is organized. We are a connectional church. That means individual congregations are part of a larger network known as an annual conference under the leadership of a bishop. Most annual conferences consist of several districts. Ordained clergy are members of an annual conference rather than a local church. Our St. Luke's clergy are members of the Rocky Mountain Conference, which includes Colorado, Utah, and the southeastern half of Wyoming.

Bishops are responsible for assigning pastors to churches. Ordinarily, district superintendents assist the bishop in prayerfully making appointments. They generally meet with pastors and representatives of local churches every year to assess the effectiveness of ministry there. The superintendent of the Mile High -Pikes Peak District is Rev. Dr. Melanie Rosa.

The staff-parish relations team represents the congregation officially in this process. Usually, when everyone agrees that a current pastor's gifts and graces are a good match for the specific needs of a ministry setting, the pastor is assigned to remain for another year. Sometimes, however, a particular pastor is needed elsewhere or a local church requires someone with a new set of gifts and graces. In that case, the pastor will move and the church will receive someone new. The process always involves consultation.

Trustees Corner: Safety Reminders

A couple of quick reminders – we have an **Automatic Electronic Defibrillator** in the Narthex near the coat rack, and another downstairs next to the base of the main stairway that ends at the Sunday School / Little School office. If you suspect someone is having trouble with their heart or breathing, those machines will make a diagnosis and then operate as needed while someone dials 911.

More likely 'emergency' — one of our young people needs a trip to the bathroom. Please follow the leads of our teachers and advice many of us learned in scouting — always go with a buddy, a parent or other family. It's a great habit to build with children — start it here.

Evacuations – this fall we'll have another fire drill, and complete a variety of training sessions with our Usher, Sunday School, Little School, and Staff team members. One of the topics that will be reviewed has to do with managing evacuations. Before we have our fire drill, to include a full evacuation during one of our Sunday services, we want to make sure you all know what you should do.

The Sanctuary has 3 exits. If you use one of the two on either of the front (north) corners, you'll need to be able to walk down stairs. For this reason, our Ushers will be reminded to assist those needing a hand to exit through the main front entrance. Basically we'll want anyone sitting in the the front NW quarter (nearest the Sunrise band) to head out that passage, down the stairs behind the altar, and out the NW entrance door. Those who sit in the NE corner (nearest the chancel choir), will head out that exit immediately to the exit door and down the North stairs. For those of you that like the back half - please head out through the Narthex - if you're comfortable with stairs, go down the west stairs. These are nearest the hallway to the Chapel and the Fellowship Hall.

Downstairs, our teachers will be rounding up their students, doing a headcount, and moving out of the classroom areas to the back yard along the farthest western perimeter. Families with students in any of our classes should plan to exit first, meet the teachers and reconnect with your family members. Teachers will be responsible to make sure their students are reconnected with the person who dropped them at class. Your patience is much appreciated with this process — just as it is after class every Sunday!
