Motown Memories

None of us quite new what to expect having seen pictures of crime ridden streets on the news and heard stories of a forgotten town. The adult sponsors remember when Motown was about recording artists and manufactures of automobiles, both long gone.

We were fortunate enough to be part of a group called Motown Missions and housed in an incredibly beautiful church built in the early 1900's. In the library we found some fun sermons written in 1938 and a personal journal from the pastor at that time. We where told that at the time that the church was built it was the community center for the neighborhood.

continued from page 1 Our new intern from the Iliff School of Theology, Angie Steinhauer, will lead us in a Children's Sabbath service on October 9 as the Soul Purpose Youth Choir sings the theme song, For Good. We will premiere our first of two brand new video celebrations on Sunday, Oct. 16 as we launch the campaign. Commitment Sunday is Nov. 6 as we celebrate a Service of Holy Communion.

Our Executive Team is asking each of us to consider disciplined, proportional giving. For those that give a percentage of their income now, take another step to two this year toward the biblical goal of the tithe or 10% of the household income for God's work.

Stewardship is not about money, it's about what we do with our money. Rev. Brad and I will be sharing what God has to say about the vital role of stewardship in our personal lives.

Author Rich Cunningham has described the four purposes of giving.

*Give to honor God—Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. 2 Corinthians 9:7

*Give to serve the needs of others—A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, as I have loved you. *Matthew 35:40*

*Give so that you may deepen your spiritual journey—Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries. *I Corinthians 4:1*

*Give out of gratitude to support the leadership, life, ministry, and mission of St. Luke's—Remember the Lord your God for it is the Lord who is giving you power to make wealth that God may confirm a covenant. *Deuteronomy 8:18*

Our giving and our sharing of our money is a deeply spiritual, devotional act. Giving is a spiritual exercise, a spiritual discipline just like prayer is a spiritual discipline. Prayer is not something optional if we have decided to follow Jesus' teachings. It comes with the job description. Serving other people is not something optional. It is one of the spiritual practices. Worshipping God is not something we vote on. It is one of the spiritual practices. It is the same with giving. It is an act of devotion. It is a spiritual discipline for all Christians just like praying or serving or worshipping. And that is why we call the act of bringing a portion or our resources forward to dedicate to God's work an offering, instead of a collection. It is an offering of our lives and ourselves and our treasure. The money symbolizes our lives and our work. It is a very spiritual thing. We are not balancing the budget here in this act, we're balancing our lives.

We continue in anxious, uncertain times. At St. Luke's, we are called hold one another in prayer and substance as many of our families struggle with unemployment. These times require much faithfulness, deeper relationships, and vigilant hope!

We are all changing lives for good!

There are some things that can only be accomplished when people come together in love.

That has been our "Feeding of the 5000" motto for the last three years,

and it has never been more true. As we prepare for this years event, to be held October 1st and 2nd, we are hoping to raise 100,000 pounds of food for Denver Urban Ministries (DenUM). This is a 66% increase over last years total. It will be a stretch, but if we don't believe it possible, we will never achieve it!

To help us grow we will be expanding our presence at local grocery stores. We will be making more bags available in local businesses, and

asking you to be very active in asking your friends and neighbors to be involved.

Here is a quick checklist of how you can help us make a difference in the lives of thousands of hungry families.

- 1- Make a personal food donation the weekend of October 1st and 2nd.
- 2- Take home bags, available at St. Luke's starting September 23rd, to hand out to as many neighbors as you can and ask them to donate. (You can hand out 100 bags in less than two hours, and you'll feel great after a nice walk!)
- 3- Sign up for shifts at our grocery store locations, and encourage friends and neighbors to do so as well. Sign ups will be available at St. Luke's throughout September or simply visit www.StLukesHR.com and click on the "Feeding of the 5000" logo.
- 4- Sign up to work the food trucks we will have at the church as we sort, box, and prepare the food for delivery. Signup at church or online.
- 5- Use Facebook to invite others to participate and donate. We need to reach every willing person we can!

In addition, there is a very exciting addition to the Feeding of the 5000— "Under a Blood Red Sky: the U2 Tribute" will be performing for our evening services on Saturday and Sunday at 6:34pm. This is Denver's premier U2 cover band and it will be an amazing experience you won't want to miss.

Sometimes our lives feel like a race from one goal to the next as we pursue that ephemeral sense of Happiness:

If I could just get that job... If I could just find that special relationship... If I could just lose those 10 pounds...

Then, I will be happy! How does all of this relate to our spiritual journey?

As we race along, we often miss the meaningful moments along the way. The ancient Hebrews celebrated "Dayeinu, "roughly translated, "it is enough." We can perhaps imagine that, as they wandered in the wilderness, God gave them water, and manna, and the concept of Dayeinu: "If God never gives us any other gifts, what has come before was enough."

We invite the St Luke's community and all interested others to join us for the 2011/2012 Spirituality and Wellness series to explore strategies for finding the peace and contentment we seek in the moment. Our three sessions will take an honest look at what drives human beings to pursue happiness, which is usually slightly beyond our reach at any given moment. More from Les: Transformation #1 "Luck is what happens when preparation meets opportunity."

This is my first installment of a three-part series of the story of transformation during the three years I served as pastor of a very small, rural United Methodist congregation in Alaska. I believe this story has an important message about how we recognize a "call" in our own lives, whatever it may be, how we respond to that call, and how God uses people around us to affirm and support us as we move forward. I hope you enjoy the story. It's not just mine, but a story of the people who traveled with me and helped me on this sometimes confusing and circuitous path.

When my employer, ARCO, transferred me to Alaska in 1988, I was fairly sure that I would not continue to work for the company all the way to my retirement. With some encouragement and support from Tony and Paul, my local United Methodist pastors, I had started the candidacy process. So, when the transfer came, I decided to continue the process in Alaska and "see what develops." I filed a request for transfer of my candidacy to the Alaska Missionary Conference. I had no specific plans of how this was to happen; I would be working full time in my new position as Manager of the ARCO Pipeline Alaska Field Office and did not intend to leave that job for a long time.

Betty, our daughter, Cindy, and I settled into Anchorage quickly in late winter. We really liked the area and joined St. John UMC near our home.

Meanwhile, the Alaska Missionary Conference Board of Ordained Ministry and Conference Superintendent Carol Sekel agreed to affirm and continue my candidacy. Carol and the Board of Ordained Ministry were not about to let me sit idle! Rev. Billy Still, the Senior Minister at Anchor Park UM church in Anchorage, was assigned as my Supervising Elder. We started meeting monthly for me to explore the nature of serving as a minister of a congregation.

"This is a big change!" Billy asked me one day, "What makes you think that your engineering background would make you a good minister? Are you prepared for a dramatic change from dealing with things to dealing with people?" Over and over, Billy would ask, "What, do you think will be the greatest demand on you?" Billy asked some hard questions, but these were questions that needed to be answered. And at that time, I had only mediocre answers for him. I was ill prepared to be the spiritual leader of a congregation, but I didn't know it.

The preparation would come, and it came soon. One evening, I was pondering over the questions that Billy had posed to me. I began having doubts. Was my seeking ordination as a United Methodist

minister a good idea? Maybe I was moving too soon and had gone too far. I had no clear idea of just how or when I would do something to put my declaration of candidacy into action. But, there was this sense in me that something else was needed... I prayed about it. "This process is likely to take several years," I prayed "and I feel I need to do something more than just talking about it."

"Luck is what happens when preparation meets opportunity." The very next day, I received a call from Superintendent Sekel. "Les, could you come by the conference office sometime soon, I have something I'd like to talk over with you." We made an appointment for the next day. I hung up, wondering what she wanted to talk to me about. The following day I went to her office. She invited me to come in and sit down. I did and said, "What's up?" "Billy Still tells me that he believes you are ready for something beyond the candidacy book, perhaps some practical experiences," said Carol. "Well," I replied, "I have been thinking about doing something more than just talking about my candidacy."

"Would you consider working as a part-time licensed local pastor?" she asked. The Board tells me that you are close to being ready for Certification and a license to preach. "There is a group in Palmer that wants to start a United Methodist Church worship location there. Appointing you as a part-time local pastor, seems to me to be a workable way to help them. They don't have any money; the best you could expect to receive would be some cash to pay for your gas, since Palmer is about 50 miles north of here."

Carol paused a moment to let what she had said sink in. Then she looked me straight in the eye. "Could you help? We'll send you to Local Pastor's Licensing School and approve you for entering the Local Pastor's Course of Study. You would need to take one or two special summer classes each year for about a 5-year period."

Carol paused to read my non-verbal reactions to her proposal and then continued. "I would expect you to work with the Palmer folks to help them establish a worship location and begin regular Sunday morning worship as soon as practical." Wow! My vague dream was on the verge of reality! Scary! All this was coming pretty fast and I think my face showed it! Can I balance a job at ARCO with this?

Carol leaned forward, "Les, I need someone with your administrative background to help them get things off the ground or to help them understand why they can't, and stop trying! "Frankly," she continued, "I'm not sure the town of Palmer is big enough to support a new UM church, but I need someone to help the United Methodists there understand what it's really going to take to establish a new United Methodist Church there."

She smiled, "Will you do it?" "Luck is what happens when preparation meets opportunity." The realization of the benefits of luck, however, means that one must act on an opportunity and take it toward completion. This takes faith, a belief in something not yet seen, and being willing to act without knowing just how the results of the action might turn out. And it takes trust in those people who support you as you take those steps.

I trusted Billy and Carol and knew that I would have their support. I would quickly find that there was also strong support from my local church, St. John. And today I see that same thing here at St. Luke's for those ministry Candidates we have guided and are now supporting. I said "yes." Carol smiled again. And much more would develop from then on.



Children's book by St. Luke's member to be published



Kirk Hall and his wife, Linda, have been members here at St. Luke's for two years. Kirk is an active member of our choir. He also has Parkinson's, a disease that afflicts 1 million people in the U.S. and 5-7 million worldwide.

Kirk has written a children's book, CARSON & HIS SHAKY PAWS GRAMPA, that shares the relationship he and his seven year-old grandson have developed. Written in Carson's words,

the book tells about the experiences they have shared since he was an infant and then talks about how "Grampa" changed and developed "shaky paws" and then had a "special procedure" (deep brain stimulation surgery-like a pacemaker for the brain) that stopped the shaking. It is a story about love, relationships, and how Kirk chose to communicate with Carson about his illness and the operation that has had such a positive impact.

The book will be published by Innovo Publishing, a small Christian publisher in Memphis, in 8x10 laminated hardback and will retail for \$19.99. It will be available in October 2011. The book features 16 ink and watercolor sketches by illustrator Alison Paolini (who also has Parkinson's) in a 34-page format. Information on Parkinson's and relevant resources is included.

A press release including a video trailer about the book will be printed on the church website when it is available, and will allow readers to place an order if they are interested.

Mean People by Jim Wolff, Vision Team

Walking down the Sixteen Street Mall in Denver yesterday after several weeks away, I was surprised once again by the diversity of people: young adults with backpacks traveling for the summer, homeless men chatting in the shade, handicapped individuals dodging traffic in their wheelchairs, black, yellow, brown, red and white, street musicians, people talking to themselves about experiences they never had, suited bankers and lawyers, khakis and sandals, coifed and shaved. It seems like every corner of the world is represented downtown on a sunny summer day! I can tell you it is refreshing to talk to a homeless street vendor in the morning or the cleaning crew late in the day, getting out of my comfortable suburban cocoon!

Despite the outer differences, it occurred to me that we have one thing in common: we are each moving through our individual life. I can respect that. Each of us has different experiences, dreams and opportunities. We each make choices about how we will live.

Which brings me to the point of this writing: mean men earn more than nice guys. You heard that report on the news. It rings true to me. Why would that be? The news report said that half of our disposition is genetic. (I inherited my Dad's nice genes.) And the other half? We become what we are rewarded to become. If you remember the bullies in your school yard, you can likely see that same behavior in their current environment. They demand and get your lunch money. Is it a bad thing that mean men earn more? I think it is neutral. I think it is sad that there are people who continue to reward meanness by continuing to work for the mean person, validating that behavior as acceptable. (Now, do not quit your job tomorrow if you are now working for a mean person, wait until you find another job!)

One of the items of note when people-watching on the Sixteen Street Mall is the confidence they express in their eye contact and posture. Many have been subdued by life or other people and expect to be treated badly. If we were all self-confident there would be no place for mean people in any walk of life except with a bunch of other mean people. Where does that self-confidence come from? It starts inside, is nourished outside ourselves, and is maintained within.

To regain self-confidence and remove the power from mean people, I think we need to believe in our own value. Easy enough to say, but hard to achieve? Think of it this way: if God is grace and God made you, and God intends good things for you, are not you equal to everyone else? Everyone on the mall was made in God's image and is loved the same. It is small-spirited people who attempt to diminish others. These are the bullies and the mean ones.

If you are a mean person, check it at the door and expand your respect to include everyone. The world becomes much more colorful and fulfilling. If you lack confidence, trust in God. Look at the variety of creation and realize you are just as valuable as anyone else. Let self-confidence grow from inside, confident that you are loved! If you need nourishment for your spirit, you are in the right place. St. Luke's does not tolerate meanness, we nurture self-awareness and have a place for you to practice confidently accepting God's challenges for you. Participate in some activity to reduce the meanness in your life (inside or out) and grow your inner spirit.

A Jim Morrison lyric has resurfaced lately: "No one here gets out alive." We all start the same and we all end the same. Let us try to make the middle part be something special by respecting and appreciating the diversity of our world.

Motown Memories continued from page 1 It had a bowling alley, a gymnasium, showers and three floors of classrooms and music rooms. There must have been 17 pianos in that church and our SLY kids found every one. The bowling alley has since been turned into a facility to aid the homeless and the basement houses a daycare program for neighborhood children. This church had something I had never seen in a church before, a 24 hour guard stationed at the only enterance. The neighborhood that we stayed in was in downtown not far from the Tigers Baseball stadium. There was a pizza joint down the street and a Burger King across the street – both became very popular with our group. They, too, offered sights we had not seen before, bullet proof plass from the courntertop to the ceiling. To talk to the employees we would talk loudly through the tiny holes at face level and then our food was placed in a turn style box that was spun around so that we could retreive our meals and then back around so that they could reload the next order.

Our days were filled with interesting work. Some of us were fortunate to work in a personally owned garden with it's caretaker, Jess. In the inner city neighborhoods just about every third or fourth home has been abandoned. In Jess' neighborhood many of the abandoned homes had been in such horrible shape that they had been knocked down and left empty lotss. There were three lots next to Jess' home and she had purchased two of the three and was in the process of trying to find the title holders to the

third so that she could farm that land as well. She has turned the properties into a large urban garden and has planned the the crops so that when they grow they will form a picture sceen of a large sunflower with a water feature at it's center and surrounded by leaves and interesting designs. She took us on a tour of her approximately 15 square block neighborhood which was completely owner lead, no association. They gather as a community to make decissions of what to do with the lots that become vaccant. Leaving them to gather weeds and trash. They band together to use what has been left behind to make a community park for gathering and sharing meals or a lot that was good for planting potatoes. Whoever felt so inclined planted a row of potatoes and they take turns a week at a time to care for the land, another lot served as a place for local school kids to plant and harvest produce engaging grades 4 through 12. Those youth that graduate are then employed during summers to teach the younger ones about horticulture. One of the most significant moments for me was getting to harvest mustard seeds and having a very tangible connection to the scripture of having the faith of a mustard seed for it was evident in this neighborhood that continued on page 11

Other days were not as encouraging as we worked in another area called the Joy Southfield community. Here there was not a strong sense of community. Our job was to go through and pick up trash and cut down over grown brush so that a large mower could come through and cut the grass without propelling glass and foreign articles around. We also boarded up the windows and doors of the homes long abandoned. We did see some of the local folk. Every once in a while there would be a couple out trimming and caring for their own yard. Every now and then we would come across a finely manicured front yard and know that someone there was making all the efforts neccesary to make the place a home for it's inhabitants but mostly we saw adults walking the streets asking if we had found any aluminum cans that they could have to turn in for money, we saw folks sitting on their front porch drinking first thing in the morning, we saw a grandmother and daughter sitting fanning themselves as they sang generation old songs, sometimes hymns. The unsettling sights were when there was a home of children contained to the front porch because the neighborhood was not safe to venture into. Every abandoned lot was rich with empty broken liquor bottles, trash, personal items left behind as if the owners were in a hurry and could only take so much. Sometimes clothes and sometimes children's items. At one point, as I stood looking at some deteriating children's books, some toys and a once white teddy bear partially covered in mud and bugs, I was lost in thought that no child should live like this, no child should see things like this and my thoughts were interupeted by a tiny nudging on my right forearm. As I looked down I found a maggot trying to nussle it's way into my flesh. A reminder that we were in a place of decay where hope was not fully shared, life was not rich and the task of renewal was large.

We played hard in our off hours. We enjoyed many devotionals, a trip to the Second Ebenezer Baptist Chruch for a Wednesday night Bible study/worship which did not disappoint anyone who expected a culturally rich, old time Baptist experience. We took a trip to the Henry Ford Museum where the original Emancipation Proclamation was on display. The lines of locals were up to an eight hour wait which only reenforced how important it was to that community to see the very papers that mean so much to them and their history. Something that many of us simply take for granted. We ended our week by going to a Tigers game in a beautiful baseball park with a very impresive fireworks show to really celebrate the end to our week.

I don't think that any one of us will ever forget the work we did there, the people we met, those that we served or the experience that will bind us together forever as God worked through us and around us and brought to life a renewed sense of SLY community and our ability to accomplish great things.
