The Highlands neighborhood is a tightly knit community, where I am being asked to connect with local businesses and community organizations. Much like our community, it is filled with people who are a little skeptical of "religion" and are finding the Methodist church to be a welcoming place to be who you are and ask important questions of life and faith. Knowing I can no longer be here at St. Luke's, there is no where better for me to be going.

So as this transition begins I ask for your prayers. Please pray for my family as we adjust to several new life changes, all in a matter of weeks. Please pray for the congregation where I will be serving. I also ask that you join me in praying for St. Luke's, the cabinet, the Bishop, and whatever new pastor will be coming to join you here. I sincerely hope they will receive as many blessings, and opportunities to bless others, as I have.

How do United Methodist Congregations Get their Pastors? by Janet Forbes

The United Methodist Church has a unique way of matching pastors and congregations. Rather than local churches hiring and firing their own pastors—as in some denominations—United Methodist bishops appoint pastors to serve in local churches and other ministry settings.

One advantage to this process is that a local church never has to go without a pastor. Likewise, a pastor (specifically, a full member of an annual conference in good standing) never goes without a setting for ministry. The primary goal of the appointment system is to match the gifts and graces of a particular pastor to the ministry needs of a particular congregation at a particular time.

This itinerant system, where pastors move from one appointment to another, dates back to American frontier days when circuit riding preachers traveled on horseback from town to town. At that time, bishops matched preachers to circuits four times a year. Now bishops typically fix appointments once a year at the meeting of the annual conference in June. Most clergy move to their new appointment on July 1 each year.

To understand the appointive process, it helps to know a little about how the United Methodist Church is organized. We are a connectional church. That means individual congregations are part of a larger network known as an annual conference under the leadership of a bishop. Most annual conferences consist of several districts. Ordained clergy are members of an annual conference rather than a local church. Our St. Luke's clergy are members of the Rocky Mountain Conference, which includes Colorado, Utah, and the southeastern half of Wyoming.

Bishops are responsible for assigning pastors to churches. Ordinarily, district superintendents assist the bishop in prayerfully making appointments. They generally meet with pastors and representatives of local churches every year to assess the effectiveness of ministry there. The superintendent of the Mile High – Pikes Peak District is Rev. Dr. Melanie Rosa.

The staff-parish relations team represents the congregation officially in this process. Usually, when everyone agrees that a current pastor's gifts and graces are a good match for the specific needs of a ministry setting, the pastor is assigned to remain for another year. Sometimes, however, a particular pastor is needed elsewhere or a local church requires someone with a new set of gifts and graces. In that case, the pastor will move and the church will receive someone new. The process always involves consultation.

More from Les: Everybody's Gotta Love Somebody!

With our Lent theme of "Tell Me the Stories," I offer a story of another member of my family who had a significant influence on my life.

Ruth Ludlam, the youngest of my aunts, only 11 years older than me, was more like an older sister. She became my confidant, the one in whom I could trust my most sensitive thoughts. Advice about how to behave around girls, admonitions on keeping things neat and organized, and suggestions on what to wear to a school dance were invaluable as I grew.

I was a junior in college; Betty Hoback and I had been dating, "going steady," since my senior year in high school. We decided it was time to marry. "I can get a job in Golden," she had commented, "and with your scholarships we could get along with expenses just fine."

I told my parents of my plans to buy an engagement and wedding ring set and Mom showed me a catalog from one of their wholesale suppliers in Denver who also happened to sell jewelry. I scrimped and saved my college expense money, bought used books, skipped movies and bowling on weekends in Golden, and eating only what was offered at Mrs. Herren's boarding house.

Finally I had enough to buy a set of rings! The wholesaler was very helpful. The diamond was of very good quality while the bands were sort of average. I bought them. The rings came with me when I traveled back to Grand Junction for the Christmas break. The Ludlam family would gather on my father's birthday, Dec. 21.

I planned to give Betty the engagement ring after my father's birthday party.

We were all having a good time at the party and then, for no logical reason, I suddenly decided that this would be a good time to show off the rings to the family. I went to my car, took the small box from the glove compartment, and returned to the family. Then I offered the box to be handed around the room for all to admire.

But, when the ring box was handed to my aunt Ruth, she frowned, closed the lid and set it down on the chair next to her. Then she

turned toward me with a frown on her face. She spoke sternly "I'm not going to look at them!" she announced, "They'll look a lot nicer on Betty's hand, so I'll wait to see this engagement ring on her finger!"

"She should be showing it off, not you!"

Shamefaced, I picked up the box and pocketed it.

When I gave Betty the engagement ring later, I told her what Ruth had said at the birthday party. She smiled knowingly shook her head and said, "How can you be so smart and still be so dumb!"

Betty came with me to the next family gathering, proudly wearing the engagement ring on her finger. Everyone enjoyed admiring it, especially aunt Ruth, perhaps even more so now that Betty was displaying it.

This incident was pure Ruth! Practical, sensitive to the relationships between people, a romantic, and, for me, a reliable source of wisdom! "Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God."—1 John 4:7-8

Ruth had a congenital heart defect that kept

her from being too active. She didn't talk about it much, but would tell others she had to "sit down a bit" when things became too strenuous. She died in her sleep as she was taking a nap one afternoon in 1992.

My aunt Ruth lived a full life because she gave it away, gave it away through love for those she came in contact with.

"Everybody's gotta' love somebody, I need somebody to love!" is a line from some rock and roll song from my dim and distant teenage past. The tune sticks in my head but those are all the words I can remember.

They're important words, however, we do need someone to love.

The Spirituality and Wellness team concluded its three-part series on The Journey to Wholeness with a workshop facilitated by both Rev. Jerry Herships

and Dr. Andi Pusavat. They have both been well-received at past events and they did not disappoint for their return visit. They continued talking on the themes of happiness and wholeness which were discussed at earlier sessions this year. Dr. Andi highlighted concrete strategies for bringing more fulfillment into everyday life and Rev. Jerry followed up each point with a personal story, tale or joke that complimented each idea and gave the real life perspective that we so often need to hear.

Following are a few of the more important points highlighted throughout the evening.

- Identify your sense of purpose and know what energizes you;
- Practice being optimistic/choose the lens you look through
- Focus on positive language; focus on what you can change, not what you cannot
- Have an attitude of gratitude; stop comparing yourself to others; write down things you are grateful for every day
- Know that a faith community can enrich your life and provide you a place of safety and comfort
- Practice mindfulness; try to focus your attention on one thing at a time
- While grieving a loss, ask yourself each day what one thing you could do that day to make you feel one step better
- Be intentional in what you choose to do
- Engage a support system (quality, not quantity) of people around whom you can be your authentic self
- Don't worry about your age or how old you "will be"; you are going to age regardless. So, don't let age be an excuse to not start something new
- Do things you enjoy... simply because you enjoy them
