The Advent Adventure

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." (Matthew 3:1-3)

When Christmas calls, John the Baptist is one of the biblical voices that we hear! He stalks through the wilderness of his time on the trail of the messiah. He's the original hellfire-and-brimstone preacher, but he also offers hope to the community he rakes over the coals. A willingness to hope is a willingness to enter the wilderness, to seek the message in the midst of the mess. Hope is not a domesticated state of mind. It seems to camp out in odd places, crops up at the worst possible times. Just as we resign ourselves to the minimum wages of life with no benefits, hope whispers that we shouldn't settle for that bottom line. Hope thrives in the barren places of our lives.

As an Advent proponent, I love John the Baptist – at least from afar. (I'm not sure I would have been comfortable hanging out with a locust-eating, camel-hair-wearing prophet.) But John the Baptist's message to us during this frantic season of the year draws me in. I mean, here's this guy out in the wilderness proclaiming God's word, "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." Who wants to hear the word, repent? And who wants the extra work of making paths straight and all?

Yet we Advent journeyers also find ourselves in a sort of wilderness, a wilderness of excess, of noise and clutter and busyness, a wilderness of secular, consumer culture giving us the message that Christmas will be perfect if we buy the right presents — and do it now! We Advent people are crying out in this wilderness, trying to prepare the way in our own lives, trying to make a place, a holy space for the coming of the Christ child. We are called to prepare the way in the wilderness of pre-Christmas chaos, where rushed schedules and commercial chatter drown out silence and prayers.

And hope goes with us, is with us, in this wilderness of chaos. Hope becomes a critical part of our Advent survival kit, guiding us through the distractions, reminding us of our single task: to prepare the way, the let the message find use wherever we are!

God of hope, help me prepare the way for you in the wilderness of chaos. Give me strength, wisdom, and patience to clear a path for you through my cluttered heart and life. Amen.

Offer Assistance to Those Who Ask

On Sunday mornings, persons frequently come to the church seeking assistance: gasoline, food, lodging, bus fare. It is usually not timely for the pastors to speak with these persons until 12:00 noon, following the morning services of worship. Please invite those who make such requests to attend worship and fellowship. Be hospitable. If a pastor (or staff person) is not available, you may respond to the need on behalf of the congregation. During the season of Advent and Lent every year, we receive a special offering to assist persons in these ways. "The Benevolence Fund" is a source of support for you so that you may respond to the request for help. You may take persons to the grocery store and purchase a gift certificate for groceries. You can take the family to the gas station and fill their tank. You may offer to buy a meal. You may direct persons to Interfaith Community Services. You may assist with bus fare. You may pay a cab fare in advance, if necessary. THE BENEVOLENCE FUND CAN REIMBURSE YOU FOR ANY EXPENSES YOU MAY INCUR WHILE OFFERING ASSISTANCE. Please do not feel that you need to use your own resources. The congregation has planned well for the giving of this kind of assistance. However, we recommend that you do not give cash, unless there are no other alternatives for assistance. Thank you for your care of persons in need.

St. Luke's offers many ministries to support your emotional, mental, and spiritual health. I believe we can become more aware of God's healing and transforming grace through

Pastoral Counseling and Care – Rev. Sallie, Rev. Janet, and Rev. Ryan offer short-term, faith-based counseling, pastoral care, and referrals for individuals, couples, and families seeking support.

Stephen Ministry – provides confidential, one-on-one care to individuals in our congregation and community. Stephen Ministers are lay persons who have specialized training in listening and providing emotional and spiritual care.

The Caring Connection – provides support to members of St. Luke's and the community by making companion visits, taking meals to families in need, running errands or providing transportation. Contact Maryellen Davis if you have a need that the Caring Connection may provide.

Care/Prayer Team – gathers regularly to pray for concerns of individuals, the congregation, and the community. Requests for prayers may be sent through the website, written on a prayer request card or shared with a member of the pastoral and staff team.

Support Groups and Classes – St. Luke's offers support groups and classes focused on a variety of topics including 12-step programs, divorce recovery classes, grief support groups, and parenting classes. Information about current groups is available on St. Luke's website and in the Care Ministries brochures in the church entry.

Spirituality and Wellness – interactive workshops, retreats, and classes featuring excellent facilitators, outdoor experiences, discussions etc. engage participants in learning new skills and practices that contribute to health and wholeness. Spiritual Direction — The process of spiritual direction honors each person's unique life journey and supports people in managing transitions, enhancing self-awareness, working through challenges, and growing in faith. Individual and/or Group Spiritual Direction are available at St. Luke's.

Faithful Friends – The Faithful Friends ministry has been created to offer care and friendship to individuals in care centers, those who may be dealing with long term illness and health challenges, and individuals who may have difficulty getting to St. Luke's on a regular basis. You may contact Nancy Abbott for more information.

The Samaritan Fund – provides financial support and assistance for those who are part of our St. Luke's family. If you or someone you love is in need of some extra financial support to make it through a difficult stretch, please contact one of the pastors.

Benevolence Fund – provides support for those in need who are not directly connected with the St. Luke's family.

Team invites you to spend an evening with Rev. Ryan Canady and Rev. Jerry Herships. Through laughter and stories, we will explore Authenticity & Vulnerability: Becoming Your True Self. Together, we will consider important questions:

- What would it look like if we really grasped the idea of living into our true self?
- What if we could take off the mask, stop comparing ourselves to others; stop trying to be someone who we weren't created to be?
- What if God really isn't interested in our best performance?
- What if we could do away with all the shame and guilt?

God has made each of us uniquely ourselves. What if we could discover this self, accept this self, and thrive in this self? We are ALL storytellers, and we all tell a unique story with our lives. Donald Miller, author of A Million Miles in a Thousand Years, put it this way: "A good storyteller speaks something into nothing. Where there is an absence of story, or perhaps a bad story, a good storyteller walks in and changes reality. He doesn't critique the existing story, or lament about his boredom... He just tells something different and invites other people into the new story he is telling." What kind of story are you telling?

Spiritual Direction: Our Spiritual Direction ministry at St. Luke's has had a remarkable response! Many people say the best way to understand spiritual direction is to experience it. Those who have participated in this ministry know that Spiritual Direction (sometimes called Spiritual Companioning) can help people to understand their sacred stories, learn what matters most, and experience attentive support one-on-one or in a small group. Asking questions is the heart of Spiritual Direction: "Who am I?" "How does God speak to me?" "How can I live more authentically?" "What am I called to do and be?" These questions do not have easy answers. Spiritual Direction affirms the questions and honors the importance of exploring questions. Spiritual Directors are trained to listen, guide, and create a gracious space in which participants can explore their inner selves, tap into their personal wisdom, and find life-giving perspectives. Monty's Methodism Musings: Susanna Wesley

Susanna Wesley has the mother of John and Charles Wesley and a very strong influence on both of them. Understanding the roots of the Methodist movement requires understanding her influence on it.

Susanna Annesley was born in 1669 as the 25th and last child of Dr. Samuel Annesley with his second wife. Her father was a prominent minister in the Dissenting (Puritan) movement and very involved in politics during Oliver Cromwell's rule. He was expelled from the Church of England in 1662. She decided on her own to return to the Church of England at the age of 13, displaying the independent spirit and strong sense of self that were evident throughout her life.

At the age of 19, she married Samuel Wesley. Nineteen children, ten of whom survived to adulthood, were born to this marriage. Despite difficult finances, she managed a household of ten children and educated her three boys and seven girls at the kitchen table. All three of her boys went to Oxford where John and Charles founded the Methodist movement.

During one of her husband's absences, the man appointed to preach at the parish was awful. Susanna started having afternoon services in the kitchen for her children. Some of the townspeople heard about it and asked to join. As time progressed, more asked and the kitchen quickly became too small so she moved the meeting to the front lawn. On Sunday mornings, the church was empty and on Sunday afternoons, 200 people attended Susanna's lawn meetings. I'm sure that this was a major reason why John licensed women lay preachers in the early Methodist movement.

Throughout their lives, John and Charles sought their mother's counsel and many of the letters survive. In addition to letters, she wrote meditations and scriptural commentaries. Her writings were published in the book "Susanna Wesley, Her Collected Writings". She continued to advise them until her death in 1742.

When her life and writings are examined, we see many influences on her sons and their guidance of the Methodist movement. Susanna Wesley was the mother of John and Charles, but she was also the mother of the Methodist movement.






the homeless. In all over 300 items, cookies, Communion and a whole lot of love was shared with those who go without. We were reminded what matters most are the simple human connections and the hope on this day that all will be fed. Whether your Thanksgiving meal was in your home with a lively family gathering or on the ground under a large oak tree in the park, when we share a meal with one another we are filled. My family came to the realization that a true and meaningful thanksgiving lies within us and all we need to do is open our eyes to find it.

Burrito Breakfast January 6, 2013 Proceeds go to Guatemalan Mission Tribs

THE BURRITOS ARE BACK! You can

enjoy a hearty Burrito Breakfast January 6th, after our Epiphany Sunday service with the Three Kings. Burritos will be served from 8:30 -12:30 that morning. Not only do you get a hearty breakfast, but you are helping support St. Luke's Missions. The proceeds go to the projects for the March Adult and May Young Adult Guatemalan Mission Trips. Both groups will be working on additional school rooms for a school in Lemoa as well as two cement block homes for families in need.

Burritos are only \$5 each. These are going to be served HOT in the Narthex. If you want some to take home you can order them prior to Jan. 4th. Burritos TO GO are \$4 each ready for pick up on Sunday, January 6th. These are cold and packaged ready for take home. You may place your pre-orders at a table in the fellowship hall or by calling the church. Join us for breakfast and order your burritos to take home for a microwaveable breakfast to heat and eat later.

Students in Guatemala

Students in rural Guatemala are only able to complete up to the 6th grade at the most, with many dropping out by the 3rd grade to

help support their family, by going to work. When these students obtain a sponsor they are able to continue their education. Starting December 9th, there will be a table in the Fellowship Hall where you can learn more about the sponsorships and select a student to sponsor.

There will also be an opportunity for you to

help out families in Lemoa, Guatemala, by giving \$12.50 to buy a can of enriched powered milk. These cans of milk can last up to 3 months. Tags will be available on the Giving Tree. This would be a wonderful gift for a needy family who is unable to afford this luxury.

Also, on the Giving Tree will be tags for you to donate construction supplies for the mission trips that the adults will take in March 2013 and SLY, in June 2013 to Guatemala. The mission teams will build cinderblock homes in the outskirts of Lemoa, Guatemala for two needy families who can't afford homes of their own. Each home costs \$5000 to build. Donors of \$250 or more will receive a picture of the family and may send a picture of their family to be given to the homeowner. They will also be building two additional classrooms to the current school in the village of Pacho. These classrooms would accommodate all the children who would like to attend school. All donations towards the school of \$2000 or more may have a honor/memorial name

inscribed on a plaque that will be placed on the school. When you can't come up with a gift for someone, this would be a wonderful alternative way to give.

A few members of St. Luke's mission's team recently traveled to Guatemala to select new students to be sponsored through the Pura Vida scholarship program. In Guatemala rural children are only able to complete up to 6th grade at the most, with many dropping out by 3rd grade to work for their families. A sponsorship allows these students to continue on in school and be supported in their education. Sponsorships cost \$450 a year and will cover all school expenses for a needy child. Sponsors will receive biannual



letters from their students. In addition, sponsors who travel on one of our Guatemala Mission Trips will be able to meet with their sponsor child while in Guatemala. Throughout December, there will be a table in the Fellowship Hall where you can learn more about the scholarships and select a student to sponsor.

Homelessness Awareness Action Task Force and the Giving Tree

H.A.A.T. Force will have tags on the Giving Tree to purchase motel vouchers. We provide motel vouchers for homeless individuals on severe weather nights in the winter. Please help us to provide shelter to these people. Last year we provided well over 600 nights of shelter, more than doubling our total of 300 from the year before. Shelter costs have risen this year. It now costs \$40 for a single, \$45 for 2 people and \$52 for 3 or more. Our Christmas Offerings to the Benevolence Fund

Through our Benevolence Fund, we have the opportunity to share with those less fortunate. These funds also provide our partnership with Love In the Name of Christ, a coalition of 23 churches in the Littleton and Highlands Ranch area which connects neighbors in need with existing resources, mobilizes church volunteers when helping hands are needed, and brings groups together to create solutions. Thank You For **Your Continued** Financial Support.

Our financial performance so far this year indicates we will finish another year where we have managed to keep our

spending within limits of the funds we will collect.

Changing Lives For GOOD Stewardship Campaign.

The response has been very strong. At this point, there are very strong indications that our total pledged amount for 2013 will be slightly more than for 2012. More *from Les*: A Roadrunner's Story – part two by Rev. Les Ludlam, St. Luke's Lay Associate Pastor 1993-1997

I had been the symbol of a bright new life of Chuck and Geri in 1969, then, years later I became a different symbol for my next owner, Jim.



With my performance at the local drag strip, I became a symbol of Jim's status among his high school peers. The photo on the left is of me and Jim at Bandimere Drag Strip.

Later, I would become a symbol of Jim's special bond with his grandfather, LaVerne.

Jim returned to school in 1986 and continued his work toward a degree in engineering from the University of Denver. Jim and his girlfriend were married and following his graduation from D.U. He was accepted into the MIT graduate school of engineering and so we all moved from Denver to Massachusetts. I shared an old carriage house with cats, mice and crickets for two more years. In the years following Jim's graduation, I traveled by auto carrier to Houston and then to Minneapolis.

There was a moment of panic when I disappeared for a day in Minneapolis. It happened right after I was delivered to Jim's new home. The mover had unloaded me, and Jim had left to have some lunch. Jim returned in 45 minutes and with shock realized I was gone! A panic call to the police didn't help much.

"You need to file a stolen car report, then we will we will advise you if we turn up anything." The next morning he received a return call from the police.

"Your vehicle was taken to our impound lot. It was found illegally unlicensed and parked on a public street. You must have it licensed legally in Minnesota and there will be towing and impound fees." Jim was both relieved and angry!

He learned later that the City of Minneapolis offers a bounty for reporting any unlicensed auto parked on a city street and will impound the vehicle. A worker for the mover had apparently taken advantage of this and called a friend in the towing business. Within minutes after my leaving the moving van and while Jim was gone to lunch, I was being towed to an impound lot for the bounty.

After three days, spending \$500 and buying a new Minnesota license plate, Jim paid another towing company to pull me back to his house and push me into his garage. What an indignity for a car like me!

A few years later, another job change came for Jim, this time to an engineering firm in the Denver Tech Center, and a move to Colorado. Once again I was transported by a moving van to a storage unit, this time on Mineral Avenue in Littleton, Colorado. It waited there for two more years.

Then came Jim's transfer to St. Louis and a divorce. Jim would no longer be afford to haul me from place to place. Les told Jim, "the Roadrunner has become an albatross; you must sell it." It was painful for Jim to even consider giving me up. I had become an integral part of Jim's life, he still hoped to fully restore me but I had also become the symbol of a time that time had gone forever.

Reluctantly, Jim sold me to Willie, a member of Les' church in Wheatland, WY. Les helped Willie remove me from the garage in Littleton and load me onto a flatbed trailer for the trip to my new home in Wyoming. Willie got me running again and once again I would become a symbol to someone else. A few years ago, Willie's son, T.J. fell in love with me. Now, T.J. is using me for his paper route.

But, I'm over 40 years old and have over 200,000 miles on my odometer, my wiring is deteriorating and my paint is faded. My time may be growing short!

Les wonders, "has this cycle started to repeat, or has it ended?"
