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
Our Empty Bowl Event

Make a Difference

Next March 2013, St. Luke's will celebrate thirty years as a congregation. We'll start that observance this fall, at the heart of who we are, affirming our commitment to making a difference in the world. As I like to say it, our commitment to make the world different.

We know that we live interdependently. We cannot escape each other's problems.

Amidst all the affluence of Highlands Ranch, Lone Tree, Centennial, Littleton, and

Castle Rock, there are people who are hungry, homeless, jobless, ill, disabled, desperate, isolated, and ignored. Our world, for all its blessings, is unequal, unstable, and unsustainable.

And so, the great mission of our lives is to move our neighborhood, our nation, and the world toward creating communities of care.

We'll be grounded again this season by the banner on the side of the truck in our parking lot. We are telling our community a story about caring... a story about Jesus and about us... a story about the feeding of five thousand families in the Galilee in the first century and in Denver in the twenty-first.

This mosaic graces the altar in the Church of the Multiplication, located on the north shore of the Sea of Galilee in Israel. St. Luke's will be asking our community to replicate that mosaic... to act against hunger in our own backyard. It's that simple.

The story began with bad news. John the Baptist had been killed by King Herod. Everyone was stunned by this tragedy, by the loss of this great prophet, including Jesus, who was John's cousin and protégé. Jesus wanted to get away by himself to grieve. So he got into a boat to sail across the lake. The crowds followed along the shoreline, keeping an eye on his boat. When Jesus landed, many people had already arrived. Jesus looked on the crowd with compassion. And so he taught and healed. The day quickly passed.

It got to be late, long into the day, and one of the disciples said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat."

In John's version of this story, the disciple Andrew found a young boy with five loaves of bread and two fish, and brought the boy to Jesus. Jesus invited everyone to be seated on the grass. He took the bread and fish, looked up into heaven, gave thanks, broke the bread, and gave it his disciples who gave it to the crowds. They all ate and were satisfied. And there were twelve baskets of bread left over. Five thousand families were fed.

The feeding shows that Jesus, God's messiah, invites all people to a great banquet where everything is shared and no one goes hungry... ever! The feeding of the five thousand is about more than the sharing of food. It is about sharing a vision of wholeness for all people. In unambiguous language, Jesus commands the disciples, "You give them something to eat!"

St. Luke's is living the commitment to be a part of what God wants to bless. Whether you are bringing non-perishable groceries to help fill the pantry of DenUM, or gleaning after the Broncos games at Mile High stadium, or sorting clothing for resale at Renewed Treasures, or providing fall break food for students at our partner school in Sedalia, or buying pumpkins to sustain youth in mission, or serving homeless youth at Urban Peak, you make a difference and make the world different by living the teachings of Jesus.

Give out of gratitude to support the leadership, life, ministry, and mission of St. Luke's: Remember the Lord your God for it is the Lord who is giving you power to make wealth that God may confirm a covenant.

—Deuteronomy 8:18

Our giving and our sharing of our money is a deeply spiritual, devotional act. Giving is a spiritual exercise, a spiritual discipline just like prayer is a spiritual discipline. Prayer is not something optional if we have decided to follow Jesus' teachings. It comes with the job description. Serving other people is not something optional. It is one of the spiritual practices. Worshipping God is not something we vote on. It is one of the spiritual practices. It is the same with giving. It is an act of devotion. It is a spiritual discipline for all Christians just like praying or serving or worshipping. And that is why we call the act of bringing a portion or our resources forward to dedicate to God's work an offering, instead of a collection. It is an offering of our lives and ourselves and our treasure. The money symbolizes our lives and our work. It is a very spiritual thing. We are not balancing the budget here in this act, we're balancing our lives.

We continue in uncertain times. At St. Luke's, we are called to hold one another in prayer and substance. These times require much faithfulness, deeper relationships, and vigilant hope! We are all changing lives for good!

It's a Revolution! Fusion is now Revolution -Sundays at 6:30pm

Throughout the Gospels and the book of Acts, we see those among the early Christian movement doing some pretty wild things. Caesar was the emperor, the son of god, and if you lived in the Roman Empire,

you were to proclaim him king and lord. Peace was to be found in himpeace through victory. Life was to be found in him. But these early Christians were proclaiming a very different message: "Jesus, the son of God, is king! Jesus, the one who gave up his life, is Lord! Real life is found not in serving yourselves, but in serving others. Peace is found not in victory, but in reaching out to the margins-the least, the last, and the forgotten in the 1st century Roman Empire." A revolution was beginning. Many of the religious authorities were also disturbed by some of these early Christians. The religious folks were good at determining who was in, who was out-who was worthy of God's love, and who wasn't. But these early Jesus followers said "no" to this system, again proclaiming a very different message: God's love and grace is for all people-the poor, the sick, the powerful, the wounded, the sinner, the prostitute, the tax collector... God's love extended even to those who couldn't possibly fit inside the religious box [as demonstrated in Acts ch. 8-the story of the Ethiopian Eunuch being baptized, not circumcised]. For God so loved the world... yeah, these early Christians took this idea pretty seriously as they as the followed in the way of Jesus, a 1st century Jewish Rabbi. A revolution was happening. Love was changing the world.

We want to be part of that revolution. We want to struggle together in loving the world, in proclaiming a different kind of king, a different kind of lord. We too believe that God's love and grace is for all people—the homeless, the hurting, the single mother, the big family, the addict, the straight-edged, the inked, the non-inked, churchy people, and the not-so-churchy people... God's love extends even to those who don't really fit inside the 'church' box, those who may never really feel comfortable inside the doors of a church building. God's love is BIG... big enough to change the world, big enough to create a revolution. God's love calls us to proclaim a message of love not just inside the walls of a church building, but also to the suffering places in our community, city, and world.

Some early Christians traveled throughout the cities, towns, and villages, spreading a message of God's love for all people. At one point in their journey, they arrived to Thessalonica. Soon after their arrival, they were charged with creating a disturbance. The city authorities shouted, "These people who have been turning the world upside down have come here also..." [Acts 17:6]. What if we were 'these people'? What would it look like for us to go out into the world together and follow in the way of Jesus? What would it look like to participate in the revolution?

Come find out! A new thing is happening! We want to be part of something bigger... we want to change the world through love!

More from Les: Church Camp by Rev. Les Ludlam, St. Luke's Lay Associate Pastor 1993-1997



Summertime church camps were enjoyable experiences for me and probably had some influence on my early spiritual development. In my pre-teens, however, I saw the weeklong experience as a way to get away from the summer heat of Grand Junction and the supervision of my parents! (This is a picture of the worship area of the church camp I attended.)

"OK, they will take you as a kitchen worker. You can attend church camp without paying tuition. Your duties will be washing dishes, cleaning tables and taking out the trash after each meal." I was thrilled! This was probably the only way I could go to church camp at Baron Lake on Grand Mesa this year! On arrival at camp, I learned that my partner for the work, Loren, had worked kitchen duty before and he could "show me the ropes." "The best part," Loren told me, "is that since meal cleanup takes some time, we get excused from attending morning vespers! We can do what ever we want after our breakfast chores are done!"

On Monday morning, our chores were completed so we decided to walk to the nearby rowboat rental place and get a boat and maybe do some fishing. "The cooks told me that if we clean the trout, they'll cook the them for us for dinner," exclaimed Loren, "and the lake's just been stocked!" The boat rental clerk pointed out some likely spots to catch some fish and we were on our way. The trout dinner that night was especially delicious, with envious glances from our fellow campers. But, on Wednesday, Loren wasn't feeling well after breakfast. I wanted to try some more fishing, so I decided to rent a rowboat on my own and fish in another spot. This time I had little success.

The morning was warm there was a light breeze blowing. I was tired. I rowed to a spot not far from the camp and decided to relax a bit. I rolled up the extra life jacket in the boat to use as a pillow. Then I wedged the fishing pole against one of the oarlocks to hold it in place. I pulled my hat down over my eyes, leaned back on the pillow and enjoyed the mountain aromas and sounds...

Rev. Jim was the leader for morning vespers (worship) at the camp. An area on the shore of the lake had been set up to serve as a worship area. There was a cross, made from two medium-sized logs, set up on the shore and slightly uphill from it was seating, made from larger logs. As the campers began to file in, Jim thought of the years he had spent at the camp and how many of the young people who had attended had experienced a meaningful experience with God. He was enjoying himself!

Jim began the service with a song, sung with guitar accompaniment, "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so..." The young congregation listened with mixed attentiveness as Jim began a prayer thanking God for the beauty of the mountains and silent grandeur of the forest around them. But then, a laugh and whispering interrupted him. The campers were looking past Jim, out toward the lake, and not paying much attention to his solemn prayer. "What's distracting them?" he wondered, as he turned toward the lake. There, he saw a rowboat floating by, driven by the light breeze, and there was someone lying in the boat! The passenger appeared to be sound asleep!

"That's a guy from our cabin!" exclaimed one of the boys. Laughter and chatter filled the air as the worshippers discussed the scene. Jim failed to see the humor of the situation. I had slowly drifted off to sleep, gently rocked by the boat driven by the breeze. Then suddenly, my dreams were interrupted by the sound of laughter and talking! I sat up slowly and realized I was just off shore from the morning vespers group! Then I saw Rev. Jim and he did not look very happy!

I gathered my wits, reeled in my fishing line and proceeded to row as quickly as I could to the boat rental dock. I turned in the oars and hastily walked back to my cabin. When I arrived, I saw a note on the message board by the door. "Ludlam, see the camp director immediately!" Both Loren and I met with the camp director that afternoon. The conversation was short and to the point. We were not being sent home. It was too far to travel to Clifton. We would attend morning vespers as soon as our kitchen chores were done each day, for the rest of the week, even if we arrived late. No camper would be allowed to leave the camp without checking in at the camp counselor's office. And, no camper could go out in a boat alone. Our parents were told about our indiscretion and advised that any sporting equipment we might bring to camp in the future had to be checked in at the recreation desk and checked out only during designated recreation periods. We learn more from our mistakes than our successes. We grow as we struggle to overcome the consequences of our actions. I was lucky, I could have suffered more than embarrassment after falling asleep in the boat, but I didn't realize that until much later in life. Does God watch over the foolish? Maybe so... Monty's Methodism Musings: **George Whitefield**

by Monty Hoffman In the beginning, the term Methodist did not have any denominational or theological connotations; it simply meant that the person who it was applied to was a member of the Holy Club at Oxford University. I want to hold up another member of that club who was as influential in the Great Awakening of the 18th century as John Wesley. His name was George Whitefield (pronounced Whit-field) and he was a dear friend of the Wesley brothers despite major theological differences.

George was born in 1714 and was the son of an inn keeper. He had a gift for oration that was recognized early on in his life and he was sent to Oxford University. While he was there, John Wesley returned to carry out his duties as a fellow and the two became fast friends despite their 11 year age difference. Both became well known preachers of the First Great Awakening.

George was short, pudgy, and cross eyed. He was also gifted with a voice that let him be heard by thousands in the days before sound systems. After being denied access to the pulpit at many of the Anglican Churches because his preaching style was too emotional, he went to the fields and started preaching to thousands at a time.

In 1740, he made the second of his seven voyages to North America. He landed in New England and then made the unheard of trip of riding by horseback to Charleston SC. Along the way, he preached the Gospel several times a day, sometimes to groups of thousands. This trip established him as the most famous evangelist of his day in North America.

Despite their friendship, George and John disagreed on predeterminism. George stayed with the Calvinist idea that God's grace was available only to the predetermined elect. John adopted the Arminian idea that God's grace was available to all. They never overcame this difference in theology and never tried to make light of their differences. They still had great affection and admiration for each other regardless of their differences.

George did not use predeterminism to dismiss in the inequalities of the world as "God's will". He agreed with Wesley that we were called to make the world a better place. He established an orphanage as the first charity in North America. He called all into relationship with Christ, not just those who considered themselves the elect. Despite his views on slavery, he was the first to preach the Gospel to the African slaves in North America.

On his 7th trip to North America, George died in Newburyport, MA and was buried there. Back in England, John Wesley preached his funeral sermon, as George had asked him to do if he failed to return from one of his voyages. People on both sides of the issue wanted to make a fuss about the theological differences. Wesley would have none of it. The message of his sermon was that George was a man of God and the evidence of God's grace in his life was present in all parts of his life.

Wesley's message of grace for all people has prevailed in the American Methodist movement. Whitefield did not leave a church or even a group of writings to carry on his message. He did leave us an example of a life lived in the presence of God's grace and a way to live the catholic spirit in the face of differences with other people of faith. 



continued from page 1 were approaching even those who looked "less than inclined to donate" and talking to them about what we were doing, and then seeing the joy when that person came back with a bag of groceries for us. All together we were able to collect about 2500 pounds of food and almost \$5000 dollars in donations.

One of the most special things about helping at the food bank happened to us at a Walmart one evening. The

whole group ventured to the local Walmart, split into our prayer groups and each group was given \$50 to spend to feed a family of 4 for a week, all of which we would donate to the food bank. After we all had done our shopping and were loading all of the groceries into the cars, a man also loading his groceries up asked Edee Worth what was going on. She explained what we were doing and he handed us a few things from his bag. We thought that was awesome! But then, he came back and asked to speak to a couple of adults inside the store. Once inside, he grabbed a cart and said that we should fill it full of groceries that he would buy for the food bank! And mind you, it was well after 8:00pm, he had his two young kids and wife with him, and they still had quite a drive back to their house. He donated over \$160 of groceries to the food bank, which we took the next day. He told us that he was working at a restaurant now, but he had gone to the food bank before for groceries when times were even harder, so even though he didn't have much, they still had more than some people and wanted to donate. It was truly an amazing thing to see someone being so spontaneously selfless!

For two days of the week we worked with Companeros at two trailer parks. We sorted clothes, and had a giant yard sale for all the residents. We also worked in the trailer park doing jobs for some of the residents such as



tree trimming and trash removal. The kids really showed their strength, especially when met with the task of lifting big couches and armchairs into the trailer. But nevertheless, we prevailed, and made a huge difference for the residents of the park. Nicole, who runs the organization Companeros also came and spoke to the

kids about immigration and the struggles people go through as immigrants to the U.S, which was a great learning experience for all.

A couple of the youth were able to go volunteer at the local soup kitchen as well. They cooked and served lunch for the homeless, and were able to sit and visit for a short while with some of them. There was also a group every day that worked to unpack and sort all of the donations we collected at the Food Bank.

We had such a great variety of work to do and all of the kids were very impressive with how hard they worked as well as how kind they were to everyone on the trip and everyone they met! We celebrated the trip with a rafting expedition on Saturday in Durango, which was full of laughs and smiles! The kids enjoyed swimming in the water and going over the rapids so much, that the ride home right after was pretty quiet!

Overall, I'd say our mission trip was definitely a huge success! I enjoyed getting to meet and know all of the great kids that were along, and having the experience of being a leader on a trip that I have enjoyed as a youth for so many years. I hope that they will invite me to come back as a leader again next year!
