Celebrating Lent at St. Luke's



Turn the Service Christian Year with the Imposition of Ashes

The Christian year tells the story of Jesus in two cycles of time. The year begins with the Christmas cycle of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany as we celebrate Jesus' birth. The story culminates in the Easter cycle of Lent, Easter, and Pentecost with the wonder of resurrection. The turning of the year from one cycle to the next is marked by the tension of two very different holidays... just 24 hours apart.

The Bible tells us that before Jesus began to teach the people he prepared himself by spending forty days praying in the wilderness. We call these forty days Lent, and Lent is the time when Christians prepare for the celebration of Easter. Some people still give up a favorite food during Lent, but in the Middle Ages, everyone had to go without eating meat or butter or eggs for the whole forty days.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, so on Tuesday everyone makes a good start by confessing their sins and having them shriven – in other words, forgiven. That is why the day is called Shrove Tuesday. They cook a meal of pancakes, using up all the eggs and butter in the house. Shrove Tuesday is still called, "mardi gras", which means "greasy Tuesday", when, traditionally, all the fat in the house has to be used up.

After the family feasts on pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, February 12 from 5:30 to 7:00pm, our church family will mark the first day of Lent with the observation of Ash Wednesday, February 13, at 7:00pm. Everyone will be invited to write or draw a confession or a commitment to growth and give it to the flash of the fire! Then, we will receive the mark of the ashes and oil on the hand or forehead. This is a 45-minute family-friendly service in which school-age children can participate fully. Very young children will enjoy the help of a parent.

Join us as we observe the turning of the Christian year! —*Rev. Janet*

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

Who is Jesus? Following the Way

Who is Jesus? The question seems simple and straightforward. But the answer is complex and subtle because it concerns the present identity of a person who lived in the ever more distant past. Whereas the question, Who was Jesus?, requests information that would identify him in his own time and place by referring to his date and place of birth, parents, occupation, social status, and time of death, asking, "Who IS Jesus?" signals an interest in his current identity.

One of my favorite books about Jesus is by Leander E. Keck, Professor of Biblical

Theology at the Yale Divinity School. Keck is a frequent scholar in the Disciple Bible Study Series, Jesus in the Gospels. In his book, *Who is Jesus? History in Perfect Tense*, he writes about the "is-ness" of the Jesus that was. Did you catch that distinction?

Keck remembers that the ancient Greeks used the perfect tense of a verb to distinguish the ongoing impact of a completed action from its occurrence in the past. "The door was opened" asserts that a past action caused the door to be no longer shut, though it might have been closed later. "The door

is opened," on the other hand, asserts that it still remains open as the result of past action. So, to speak of history in perfect tense is to consider the ongoing-ness of something from the past, namely Jesus.

Our Lenten Series from Sunday, February 17 through Easter, March 31, *Who Is Jesus? Following the Way,* is the invitation to explore the ongoing meaning—the perfect tense—of Jesus. What does it mean to be a follower, a disciple, of Jesus? How does he always seem to meet us in new and fresh ways in each season of our spiritual journey?

In listening to persons who are seeking the spiritual life, I have learned that many people are skeptical about "organized religion", but are compelled by what it means to follow Jesus! The exploration of that hunger leads people to communities of persons who share the friendship, the convictions, the transformation, the hope of the Christian life.

The season of Epiphany ends with the family party of Fat Tuesday on February 12 at 5:30pm with pancakes, games, and masquerading. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, 7:00pm on February 13, with the flashing of our Lenten hopes in the fire!

Join us in worship as we seek a holy Lent by following the Way.

The discussion that followed was fascinating... I wish you all could have been there!

I want to stick with the first question for just a moment. What is it that I love about this church? My love for St. Luke's has little to do with the actual building. We have a beautiful sanctuary, but I'm not exactly the type to get warm, fuzzy feelings when I enter a sanctuary. I enjoy reading and studying in my office, but truth be told, just as many of my "office hours" are spent at Tattered Cover, Stella's, and other local coffee shops and eateries. So what is it about St. Luke's? Well, for me, it's the people who make up this community. Yes, it's the peopleit's you all. When I walk through the doors of St. Luke's, I reminded of what's sacred. God is sacred. People are sacred. Not buildings. And that describes this church for me: a community of people wrestling together to know God and to be in relationship with God.

During the season of Epiphany we did a sermon series on making sense of God's will. Complex theological issues were discussed. Deep doubts expressed. Serious questions raised... and often times these questions defined us more than the answers. We wrestled together. There were various viewpoints on particular issues, but you all were gracious with one another. So many of you put love and relationship over belief and doctrine. I loved seeing this (through emails, phone calls, and other informal conversations.) One thing is clear: we will continue to wrestle together... because let's face it, none of us really has it all figured out. We simply demonstrate a willingness to journey together. We wrestle together. We encounter God together. And this is one of the reasons why I love being a part of St. Luke's.

So now I throw the question to you: Why do you love your church?

Authenticity, Vulnerability, & Courage

Over the past few months, I have, surprisingly, heard the topics of courage, authenticity, and vulnerability

come up numerous times in many different settings. Sometimes at St. Luke's and a couple of times at conferences I have attended, but mostly, the topics have come up in everyday events; talking with my daughters, in a magazine article, at lunch with friends, on YouTube, at the dinner table, and even in some of my research. And, speaking of research, several studies suggest that practicing vulnerability is essential for connection and authentic relationships. Often, authentic relationships are where we experience deep joy and fulfillment in our lives. So, maybe it is not so surprising after all that authenticity, vulnerability and courage are topics that continue to surface in a high expectation, fast-paced culture that can sometimes feel void of meaningful experiences and connections.

As I mentioned in an earlier *Chronicle* article, I have been fascinated by these topics. I'm curious about how to create welcoming experiences where people are encouraged to be authentic, vulnerable, and courageous. For most of us, continued growth toward wholeness happens more easily when we have opportunities to share our stories, raise questions, reflect on our experiences, and allow ourselves to truly be seen as we are. This type of authentic connection is the very way we gather courage, see hope-filled possibilities, learn to live our faith more fully, experience transformation, and see God's grace more clearly.

If this topic is compelling to you as it has been for me and several others, or if you are just intrigued by the topic of courage, authenticity and vulnerability and what it may mean in your life, there are a couple of great opportunities coming up this month:

- First, on February 12 at 6:30pm, Rev. Ryan Canaday and Rev. Jerry Herships are facilitating a conversation called The Authentic Self. The event will be hosted by the Spirituality and Wellness Team and it promises to be an engaging and meaningful evening!
- And, beginning on Sunday February 24 at noon (and for the following 3 Sundays, March 3, 10, & 17) I will be facilitating a brown bag lunch discussion on the topic of Vulnerability, Authenticity and Courage. We'll base our conversations on Brené Brown's book Daring Greatly: How the Courage to Be Vulnerable Transforms the Way We Live, Love, Parent, and Lead. Monty's Methodism Musings: Hannah Ball and the Sunday School Movement

Following his mother's example and sometimes her advice when his contemporaries spoke against it, John Wesley licensed women to be Methodist lay ministers. They, like the men who were lay ministers, were not ordained and could not perform the sacraments of the Church of England. They could preach the good news of God's love and grace and help their fellow Methodists to make the world a better place. Hannah Ball was a licensed Methodist lay minister appointed by John Wesley. The story of her ministry is not what she preached, but what she did. She founded the Sunday School Movement.

In the factories of 18th century England, most people worked 7 days a week. In deference to their age, children worked only 6 days a week. Since their parents worked on the children's Sunday off, they were not supervised and got involved in crime. To provide supervision, give the children a Christian education, and teach them to read and write, the Sunday School movement was started. It had its origins when Hannah Ball, a Methodist lay minister and a native of High Wycombe in England, founded a school within the town in 1769. Hannah was a woman in 18th century England and had limited resources and influence and could not expand the Sunday School beyond her town. Her school did provide the model and inspiration for an expanded movement. In 1780, Robert Raikes, editor of the Gloucester Journal, saw the need to prevent children in the slums from descending into crime. He put his influence and money behind the establishment of a nationwide Sunday School movement and it greatly expanded. In 1784, John Wesley endorsed the movement and the Methodist societies became more deeply involved. In 1790, the first American Sunday School was established in Philadelphia. By 1831, 25 percent of the population was attending Sunday School classes in England. The value provided by these classes was recognized and they proved to be the model for universal publically paid education for the children of England and America. One Methodist lay woman, doing what she could, provided the inspiration on which our public school system was built. You and I have had the opportunity for a free public education because Hannah Ball answered a call to be of service to others.

As you look out on a world that has needs that sometimes seem overwhelming, it is instructive to remember John Wesley's instructions to us on what we are called to do. Wesley said, "Do all the good you can, By all the means you can, In all the ways you can, In all the places you can, At all the times you can, To all the people you can, As long as ever you can." We are not called to solve all the problems of the world. We are called to do what we can. When Hannah Ball started

her Sunday School Program, she was doing what she could do. She had no thought that she would impact of the lives of people for generations to come, but she did. Do what you can. You don't have to transform the world, but you might.
