#### Old Concepts for a New Day

"You shall go there, bringing... your tithes and your donations, your votive gifts, your freewill offering..."

-Deuteronomy 12:5-6

When we have conversations about investing in the ways that St. Luke's is making a difference, Revs. Sallie, Ryan, and I are often asked about the origin of the biblical phrase "tithes and offerings". Even though these biblical images have been celebrated in Christian community for centuries, they still name the vibrant ways we grow our faith journey and our life together.

The **TITHE** represents 10% of the bounty with which God blesses us. It is also the symbol that Paul uses when he writes to the young churches of the first century. He calls for "PROPORTIONAL GIVING". We are to give in proportion to what we have earned, in *continued on page 4*

## Draw the Circle Wide in Astonishing Ways

God can pour on the blessings in astonishing ways so that you're ready for anything and everything, more than just ready to do what needs to be done. -2 Corinthians 9:8 (The Message)

### No one stands alone. Standing side by side, Draw the circle, Draw the circle wide!

You know Mark Miller as the composer of our 30th anniversary song, *The Justice Suite*, premiered at our birthday party last April. When Mark was here for the celebration, he taught many of us this song.

Jim and I thought that the song might have come out of Mark's growing up in a family of twelve adopted children of diverse racial backgrounds. However, it was actually composed for a Yale University chapel service, remembering the death of a student. Since that time, the song has become a **RALLYING CRY FOR A MORE INCLUSIVE**, **GENEROUS WORLD**, saying that God's love is much wider than we can ever imagine!



At the heart of the song is a commitment to relationship...**THAT NO ONE STANDS ALONE.** Susan was a high school senior, serving as president of the Youth Council at the Methodist church. She fell in love with a young man of the Mormon faith. She began to attend both churches, asking questions about the different beliefs. She met with me, the Associate Minister, the youth sponsors, and with friends and parents. We talked about Mormonism and Methodism and about the role of women. We reminded her that if she married in the Temple, her family and friends could not attend. So, when Susan was baptized into the Mormon faith, she didn't invite any of us to the celebration.

Sweet Susan, dear disciple of Christ and daughter of my heart, did not know how much I loved her, no matter her choice. Instead of telling her what I loved about my expression of the Christian faith, I told her what was wrong with hers. In asserting my perspective, I lost Susan. It broke my heart.

On that day, I decided to **VALUE RELATIONSHIP OVER BELIEF**, to **ACT WITH COMPASSION** and **REFRAIN FROM JUDGMENT**, to **PRACTICE RADICAL HOSPITALITY**, to **DRAW THE CIRCLE WIDE**. The way to save the world is not through more rules to live by, but through right relationships to live for.

When we see what God is already doing among us, fueling our future, opening doors to deeper friendships, compassion, and welcome, I want to jump into that energy!

#### **GOD'S ASTONISHING LOVE FOR US!**

- Celebrate what is already happening with fulltime ministry in Spiritual Care and Youth Ministries. We are hungry for vibrant communities in which to grow our spiritual journeys, during times of trauma, vocational change, and grief and as our young people navigate adolescence. ## Vine: Bearing Fruit

Big things have been happening on our Sunday evening gatherings! We've been doing some visioning together, asking questions like: What is "church?" Who are we? Where is God leading us? We've been meeting a local park all summer. It's been a great experience and it taught us that "church" can happen in some pretty cool ways even outside

of the walls of a church building. Long story short, we're moving in a new direction and we have tons of excitement and passion about this...and we want to keep you in the loop because the truth is, we need your connection and support.

After doing some work in John's Gospel, we came across John chapter 15. It's all about the vine and branches and when they work together, all kinds of fruit is born. When we bear fruit, we are being disciples of Jesus. What does this fruit look like? It's going out into the world, doing life together and loving people (John 15:12-17.) Simple. But sometimes we do a great job at complicating the simple.



So, we've decided to go with the name **Vine. We're no longer Revolution, but Vine.** And

Vine intends to be a mobile faith community that gathers throughout the South Denver area. Ideally, several and various Branches will become part of the Vine (and we've already got some really cool ideas). A vine can exist on its own but its branches cause it to thrive. These Branches can be described as small, intentional communities, led by the people. Some of these Branches will climb from within St. Luke's, while others will climb from within the broader South Denver/ Highlands Ranch community. You may be interested in a Branch... let's talk!

#### How will this thing work?

Vine will gather at various locations throughout the South Denver area weekly on Sunday afternoons at 4:00pm (YES, this indicates a time change.) We will rotate on a monthly basis. During the month of October we'll be at the Corner Bakery (1601 Mayberry Dr, Highlands Ranch.) In November we'll be at Lil Ricci's (44 Centennial Blvd, Littleton.) Each individual Branch will decide their meeting time and location (location examples: coffee shops, homes, restaurants, bars, etc.) I will provide training for Branch leaders and oversight of each Branch.

We will host our "Big Vine Gathering" on the first Sunday of each month at 4:00pm in a location in the South Denver area that is sizable enough to host Vine and Branches, or the Fellowship Hall at St. Luke's. On these Sundays, all of the Branches will gather for a shared meal, participatory worship, and storytelling (stories from the Branches about how God is moving in and through a particular Branch.)

It is essential for Vine and Branches to be engaged in some sort of service project in the community. We will refer to these Sundays as "Practical Worship" and we intend to do this with the most vulnerable in our community. We are committed to engage in practical worship on a regular basis (every 6-8 weeks.) On these Sundays we will still gather at 4:00pm but our gathering will consist of some sort of service project–serving with the least of these–the least, the last, and the forgotten. These service projects will be planned in advance.

I know this is a lot of information. You may be thinking to yourself: "Wait, you're going to be where, and doing what on what Sunday...?" I get it. So let me make this easier. You can follow us our Facebook page as well as our website. Both of these will stay up to date. God is on the move... we're just trying to keep up. What a blast of a journey! Stay tuned with more news from Vine.

# A Ministry of Presence: Spiritual Direction

Rev. Janet and I have been observing something amazing that is happening

at St. Luke's! Over the past 5 years, we have had 6 people in our community pursue specialized, intensive training to become Spiritual Directors! To have 6 people in one congregation, independent of one another, choose to follow this call is quite remarkable! It's exciting to see how God is leading us in this ministry.

Spiritual Direction is a reflective practice of intentional listening that supports people in discernment, gaining greater self-awareness, and connecting more deeply with what is sacred in life.

Often people seek spiritual direction when they are trying to make important decisions, dealing with life transitions, or looking for new ways to experience God's presence. The role of a Spiritual Director is really as a guide... to create a safe, welcoming place for you to explore questions and to engage in important inner work in a prayerful setting.

Spiritual Direction is actually an ancient spiritual practice that has become especially relevant in the midst of our busy and fast paced culture. One of my colleagues described it this way: "Spiritual Direction provides a way to slow down long enough for your soul to catch up with you!"

The process is facilitated by professionals who are trained in this ministry. The individuals in our community who have completed professional certification in the practice of Spiritual Direction include Lynda Fickling, Leigh Ramsey, Janet Johnston, Jenita Rhodes, Marshall Kuhn, and myself.

## Welcoming the Stranger

We are entering a new phase of radical hospitality (radical meaning fundamental, or the root) and have discerned with the leaders of our Hospitality Teams and Staff to revise the way we welcome folks at the beginning of the Sunday services. Everyone who enters the doors of St. Luke's, needs to feel comfortable and welcomed. We do not wish to cause anyone anxiety by asking them to point themselves out as being "new" to our community. The root of being hospitable is to offer that space in which all people feel at peace and welcomed whoever they

are and wherever they are on their journey in life.

Instead of Jim Ramsey asking folks to raise their hands, he will verbally welcome them and invite them to visit the Get Connected Center and our website for information about our community. The most important thing is that they are here with us today.

We invite you to seek those who may be a stranger to you that day, welcome them, engage in conversation and grab a purple Welcome Bag from either the Guest Service area (in the foyer) or the Get Connected Center - whichever is closest to you, and hand this gift to them. Please make this as natural and authentic to you as possible. IF you are uncomfortable doing this, you do not have to. The key is to do what God encourages you to do at that moment. The idea is to make our welcoming more personal and more relational. A gracious moment of welcome vs. a large (put me on the spot) welcome. This gives the new folks a chance to feel our hospitality and feel welcomed at a level in which they are comfortable. And this puts the welcome ministry into the hands of the community vs. just a few.

Join us as we continue to celebrate our delicious homemade breads, baked with care by our Bread Team and expand our hospitality ministry into the body of our community.

Thank you St. Luke's, for continuing to amaze me at your openness to welcome the stranger among us.

proportion to what we have accumulated, in proportion to what we possess. We are to give in proportion to how we have prospered under the grace of God. So, "tithing" is a symbol for planned giving. Tithing helps us give significantly in a systematic way. It is a planned share in the purposes of God. Tithing reminds us that we are all **STEWARDS** and not owners. A tithe is a guide toward responsible, healthy, significant faith-promise giving.

A **TITHE** represents what you plan to give to the ministries and future of St. Luke's. It is your plan – freely decided upon. It is promised out of your financial means, and cheerfully given. The tithe is the amount we bring weekly or monthly. Whether given by electronic funds transfer, or by a rewards card, or by check in the offering plate on Sunday, it is an investment in our community and an act of worship.

Next we are enjoined to bring our **OFFERINGS.** The Bible knows at least two kinds of offerings which have connection with our lives today.

First, there are the "votive offerings". Votive offerings are part of a vow or promise, or they represent a specific act of thanksgiving to God, or a personal act of devotion. Seasonal offerings, missional giving, bequests, and memorials are in the category of votive offerings. On Sunday, Nov. 3, we dedicate new bequests on the Tree of Life in the hallway beside the Chapel, celebrating the many families who have dedicated gifts in honor of loved ones.

The biblical witness also speaks of "freewill offerings." It is an unplanned, unstructured, unexpected out-of-pocket offering on the spur of the moment. The freewill offering is giving out of a sudden impulse of love, out of a felt need. It is the envelope in your worship bulletin when you arrive on a Sunday morning that invites a response for a special cause. It is the call for a special disaster relief offering due to flood, or hurricane. It is the spontaneous gift to the pastor's relief fund for homeless persons. It is a breakfast burrito to support a Guatemala Mission Team, or a college student planning to be a missionary, or our Boy Scout Troop.

Bring your tithes and your votive offerings and your freewill offerings! The text is an amazing ancient writing with a high level of contemporary relevance. It all adds up to a single central truth: As we give of any monetary amount, we are primarily receivers and transmitters of the love of God in the world. We draw the circle wide! Ultimately, that's what any giving is all about.

#### Monty's Methodism Musings: A Different Methodist Church, A Traditionally Wesleyan Church - pt. /

In 2012, the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church did a survey of vital congregations. At the recommendation of our District Superintendant, St Luke's was included. The interviews were conducted by Rev Tom Barlow. The preliminary report that we received back suggested that we were a different type of Methodist church from our peers, that we were an outlier. It also stated that we were the most traditionally Wesleyan United Methodist church that was surveyed.

At first look, this would seem to be a contradictory statement. After all, the Wesley brothers were the founders of the Methodist movement and much of the guidance on what it means to be Methodist comes from the preaching and writings of John Wesley. How we are different from our peers and a very traditionally Wesleyan church is something I am going to try and explain. It is important because the guidance that the Wesleyan tradition gives us and how we use it at St Luke's to help us understand what it means to be a Christian in the 21st century goes to the heart of who we are as a church.

The Methodist movement is unique in that it was planted and prospered in two entirely different social settings, the working class slums of industrializing England and the frontier of an expanding America. Different groups of Methodists in both places have interpreted the Wesleyan message in different ways, but there are some common themes that run through those interpretations.

21st century America provides yet another setting. We at St Luke's UMC look again to the Wesleyan tradition for guidance. As we do so, we need to try and understand what the common themes are and what they tell us about being Methodist and Christian in Colorado today. First of all, it is important to understand what John Wesley did and did not tell us about being Methodists and Christians. We are a non creedal or non doctrinal church. There is not a doctrinal statement that we all have to agree to if we want to call ourselves Methodists. Within a broad range of Christian thought, we are free to agree or disagree with each other on our beliefs. Rather, we are all called upon to use scripture, the experience of God in our lives, reason, and the traditions of all of the Christians that have come before us to help us develop a set of beliefs that helps us understand our relationship with God. Despite our differences in beliefs, we are called to live together in a Christian community together.

Rather than being defined as Methodist by a doctrinal statement, John Wesley told us that being Methodist is defined by an experience, striving to live a life of Christian perfection. Wesley's definition of Christian perfection is to live our lives for the love of God and to have that love reflected in all of our other relationships. He also tells us that perfection is defined by intent, not by action. Wesley originally thought, after his Aldersgate experience, that entering into a life of Christian perfection occurred at a moment in time through an assurance experience. As he continued living and experiencing God in his life, he viewed it as more of a journey filled with times of imperfection and doubt, but that there also times of Christian perfection in his life

#### Common Table - Planning with God

This September's Common Table discussion focused on looking forward. How do we, as a church in the 21st century, plan for the needs and desires of our community, when information now flows so freely and richly that we can hardly keep up? The answer comes in the concept of "Casting a Vision." Gone are the days when our church pastors would retreat to envision what the church would look like in 30 years. Now, they are asking for input from the congregation, and seeking information for shorter time frames (next year, next month). Rev. Janet shared how this feels like the community is standing on the threshold, holding hands, listening for God's guidance in our next step. That step is taken and we evaluate how it went. This process is quite similar to agile project management, a newer process taking place in IT-heavy organizations. In fact, one of the founders of the agile movement is married to a Unitarian minister, who uses agile practices in managing staff and volunteer activities. Some examples of Casting the Vision were provided by a variety of teams from within the church, all also seeking to "Draw the Circle Wide" (our fall theme).

- SLY is focusing on mission opportunities, large and small, including some as immediate responses to the recent flooding in Colorado
- Revolution, now "Vine", is in responding to the needs of the community, focusing on smaller communities with missional opportunities allowing multiple groups to find support and nourishment within the larger structure.
- Feeding of the 5000 continues to learn ways to improve processes and increase its reach.
- PAA is seeking larger space and more ways to provide opportunities throughout the school year as they are bursting at the seams.
- Hospitality While we'll still supply purple bags and fresh-baked bread to visitors, we will be providing it in less noticeable ways. And all members of the congregation are encouraged to introduce themselves to people they don't recognize during fellowship times.
- Spirituality and Wellness Team discussed many of the upcoming activities including starting a Center for Spiritual Engagement.
- Children's Ministry is focused on fostering children's spirituality throughout all of thier programs.
- Morning Worship environment is changing slightly as we seek to ensure that worship opens people to the presence of God, striving to maintain a balance between stimulation and centering, gravity and levity, traditional and new.

#### **Creating Connections**

Last week Nancy and Brian Jackson, Michael Streevy and Lynda Fickling volunteered at United Way's Project Homeless Connect. Twice a year, United Way of Metro Denver coordinates a day where any and all of Denver's homeless can come to the Denver Convention

Center and volunteers help them on a one-on-one basis to navigate through an incredible array of support services to get the help they need. Housing, legal advice, Colorado ID's, health check-ups, clothing assistance, food assistance, job help, haircuts, vision and dental check-ups-you name it, the referral or support was there. About 1,800 homeless folks spent a day with a 1,000 volunteers getting assistance and being heard. Here are our stories:

Nancy & Brian Jackson: Nancy has done this for a few years and I thought I would follow her lead this year and volunteer. Though I have been very involved with United Way, this was a real and different hands-on experience for me to see the face of poverty and homelessness in Denver, up close and personal. Nancy worked with three "guests" to get what they needed and at the very end, helped a newly homeless mother with two young boys to get some motel vouchers to tide her over until she could find a more permanent housing solution. I spent all day with one homeless couple, who basically had given up hope. We eventually got them temporary housing, clothes, medical attention, food assistance and a lot more. I was profoundly impacted by the day!

\*Here is the couple's response to the event: Today I met a man named Will. He shared with me that he had lost all HOPE; he was crying, broken and on the desperate, suicidal end of his rope. He was with his girlfriend, Spring who had not one whole tooth in her mouth, skinny as a rail and trying to be positive. Their support volunteer was our board chair, Brian Jackson. Today, they left with a housing option, clothes, eyeglasses, socks and an understanding about how to get their benefits. At the end of the day, I saw them again and they both told me they had HOPE back for the first time in quite a while. Brian was beaming and they had tears in their eyes and they were smiling BIG smiles. You made that happen. Thank you for your hard work. My heart is full tonight. With much gratitude. Jerene

**Michael Streevy:** Poverty, it's complicated, you know? What does it mean to become close to 'it' even if you can go home to the normal comforts while the 'other' goes where?

Actually, I don't know where, but I do know I just want poverty to go away, far, far away. Poverty robs one of emotional energy, some would say it robs one of their 'soul'. But, we all have heard of those that go on mission trips to other countries working with those who are poor return saying 'they have such great faith/joy" or something like that. Is it because we recognize what we long for, that great joy? All I can tell you about my time at this great event (I never saw so many kind folks helping others) I came away with a mixture of emotions, hope for those who were helped and deep sadness seeing humanity in all forms of brokenness.

One point of amazement is the fact that there were 500 students that came to help, that is another first for me. I haven't asked the person (D) I spent the day with if it is okay to talk about the situation(s) that D has to face each day. All I can do is to be open to do what I can do to work in some small way to ease D's existence on the streets of Denver.

Thanks to Lynda for the invitation to go and to talk with about the effects of poverty and my feelings. May God continue to bring Hope and Justice to all without exception.

Creator God, the Giver of life, the Source of strength, and the Hope of our tomorrows, we thank You for the possibilities within this team/church. You have given us friends and colleagues, and we are grateful. Move our gratitude to become compassion for the friendless and companionship for the lonely. You have given us meaningful work, and we are grateful. Move our gratitude to become generosity toward those who are empty and patience with those who are without purpose. You have given us a bounty of food, and we are grateful. Move our gratitude to become outreach to the hungry and energy for greater service. We offer our heart to You, not to hear Your favor but to honor Your presence. We offer ourselves to You, not to claim goodness but to say thank you. And that is our word for this time: thank You. Amen.

We became partners quickly and walked through the event managing to complete the most necessary needs. Lawyers and Judges gave of their time to help with "Homeless Court," tickets that were mostly relieved by community service. We went there first and it only took... 3 hours. Next we had a 2 hour wait for medical services but it was well worth it for them. Due to the recent heavy rains their shoes and socks were soaked, causing many issues with their feet. And since they are on their feet all day – this was an issue. They received attentive care and new socks that were a necessity. We had a lot of down time waiting for services but that was okay. As they ate their lunch and we just sat together, they blessed and trusted me to share their story. And you know what, we are not so different. There is a basic need in all of us to be acknowledged, to know that others do care about us, that we have the basic needs of health insurance, food, clothing and shelter. The next time you see a homeless person walking on the street, take a moment to look into their eyes and see that they, too, are a child of God. Smile at them, recognize that they are there and then, and say a prayer for them. I urge you to continue to realize the extreme need for shelter in our city and partake in as many volunteer opportunities to help your neighbor, near or far. This is the second year I volunteered and will continue to do so every year because of the transformation my soul receives from my neighbors that allow me into their story.

"With it storming, customers went crazy, so my team offered to help in any way, as I did, one lady and I found common interests. Her story developed to fulfilling a bucket list because of need for a liver transplant which wasn't coming. Moving and inspirational, I will never forget it."

"When at the disabilities home, one person would circle around. Looking reserved, I learned his name, and then told him he looked stylish and he danced. After, he continuously snuck up and scared me with such joy."

With the constant temptation flitting in our ears to make this about us and not the people we were serving, we were put on TV and a select few interviewed. Following our being on TV and promoting the food drives we were conducting, an ordinary citizen decided to lend a helping hand. Prior to his generous donation in league with our temporary St. Luke's Organization, the man gave each of the ministry youth and adults a two dollar bill to thank us for our service.

The transition is incomparable from Monday through until Friday, with emotional baggage unpacked and sprinklers let loose. It's easy to

take communion for granted because its easily a part of Christian life, and maybe so, but on this trip it was emotionally intense and extremely
