



Come to the Manger: A Cribbing We Will Go

It is mid-December of the year 1223. In a natural cave, the monk, Francis, prepares a manger filled with hay. There is a mother and a

father. Alongside is an ox and a donkey. After the lighting of candles and much singing, Francis speaks about the nativity of Jesus in Bethlehem.

Thanks to St. Francis, the crèche has become a family activity. Children like to arrange the figures of Mary and



Make sure that your family has a nativity set on the coffee table or under the tree. If you have small children, make sure they have a nativity set to play with, even if Jesus gets lost under the sofa, or the donkey loses an ear, or Elsa, Anna, and Olaf join the shepherd visitors.

Everyone comes to the manger at Christmas. This is the portrayal of a human family. And somehow, in the mystery of Emmanuel, God-with-us, our lives are illumined. "The true light, which enlightens everyone, is coming into the world." –John 1: 9

O God, prepare our hearts to receive the Grace found in a Christmas crib. Amen.



The word, Epiphany, means the appearance of light. In Christian thought, the appearance of light reached its peak in the life and teachings of Jesus.

Nowhere else in the New Testament is there a clearer picture of the radical nature of how to follow the light of Jesus than the Sermon on the Mount. This collection of Jesus' teachings is found in the first book of the New Testament, Matthew, chapters 5-7.

During the season after Christmas, Revs. Ryan, Janet, and Sarah will explore the more challenging invitations of these teachings: What is true happiness? Can I really love my enemies and pray for them? What about judging and forgiveness? What did Jesus mean when he taught us to pray his prayer?

When we dig deeply into these learnings, we discover the root images, convictions, and commitments of the stories that we live and tell. What are the spiritual practices that enhance my ability to live in harmony with my deepest self? Is there a spiritual resolution for my New Year?

What Kind of Story Will You Live in 2015?

2015 is coming! What would it mean for you to live a good story in the new year? What would it look like? What hopes do have? What do you long for? What are the things that might be worth letting go? What things in your life

might need to change in order to live a more meaningful story?

While sitting with a group of friends the other night around the table, we discussed the joys and difficulties of marriage and relationships. In our relationships we experience heartache and disappointment, but in these same relationships we also experience profound joy and deep satisfaction. When it comes to my relationship with my wife, Tami, I am thankful for lots of things. Perhaps the thing I am most grateful for is this: I know Tami is for me. Now, before going on I should make clear: this relationship is not absent of conflict-real conflict. We don't always see the world the same way. We miscommunicate. We argue. We say things to each other that we later regret. We don't always get it right... and we're becoming better at acknowledging this. But in all of this I still know beyond a shadow of a doubt that Tami is for me. It's not just that she's for me, she's for us! She wants our marriage to thrive. She wants us to love together, hurt together, make decisions together, make mistakes together, parent together... to be in IT together. Plain and simple: Tami has my back.

Do you have people like this in your life? It doesn't have to be a marital relationship. Life-giving relationships can be found in friends, family members, colleagues, mentors, and others. They are the people who at the end of the day you can say: "He has my back. She wants me to thrive. He is for me." Surround yourself with these people. They will be your greatest cheerleaders. They will celebrate in the deepest ways with you. They will also be the ones who will challenge you, who will ask you the hard questions. But you'll be able to hear it because you trust them... because you know they are for you, that they are fighting for you to live a good story. And this is huge! Because there are lots of people who aren't for you. They're the ones who cut and critique, belittle you and quietly smirk when you stumble. They love to watch you fail, and are filled with envy when you succeed. These people are not for you. They likely aren't for themselves (which is really sad...and also an entirely separate article.)

Maybe living a good story in 2015 means that we choose wisely the relationships in which we invest. And engaging in some tough self-reflection regarding some of the ways in which we behave in our relationships, and some of the ways in which we respond in our world.

For some of us, living a good story in 2015 will mean clinging to a God who we know is for us. Yes, God is for humanity! God is for us! I am constantly amazed at the number of people I encounter who fundamentally believe that God is against them, that God takes some kind of delight when they fall, that God secretly wants them to be unhappy and miserable—that they actually deserve it. No! God is for you! God is for me! God is for us! This is what the birth of Jesus is about. As author and theologian Richard Rohr reminds us: "The Incarnation was already the redemption, because in Jesus' birth God was already saying that it was good to be human, and God was on our side."

So take heart friends. God is for you. Rest in that and surround yourself with others who are for you. This might just help you live the most meaningful story possible. Now if I may take a moment and remind myself... because I need the constant reminder as much as you do. Ryan, take heart. God is for you. Rest in that and surround yourself with others who are for you. This might just help you live the most meaningful story possible.

St. Luke's Care & Spiritual Formation Ministries

Pastoral Counseling and Care – Rev. Sallie, Rev. Janet, Rev. Ryan, and Rev. Pat offer short-term, faith-based counseling, pastoral care, and referrals for individuals, couples, and families seeking support.

Stephen Ministry – provides confidential, one-to-one care to individuals in our congregation and community. Stephen Ministers are lay persons who have specialized training in listening and providing emotional and spiritual care. The Caring Connection – provides support to members of St. Luke's and the community by making companion visits, taking meals to families in need, running errands or providing transportation. Contact Maryellen Davis if you have a need that the Caring Connection may provide.

Faithful Friends – The Faithful Friends ministry offers care and friendship to individuals in care centers, those who may be dealing with long term health challenges, and individuals who may have difficulty getting to St. Luke's on a regular basis. The Samaritan Fund – provides financial support and assistance for those who are part of our St. Luke's family. If you or someone you love is in need of extra financial support to make it through a difficult stretch, please contact one of the pastors.

Storyline: Going Deeper by Stephanie Kirk

Rev. Ryan has been talking about this "Storyline" phenomenon for a while now, and I'm so excited to see it catching on in our community! I was excited, if not a bit nervous, to explore my own story in a deeper way. The 8-week series of conversation and exploration gave me an opportunity to look at my own history and identify some of the defining moments that I hadn't put words to previously. Not only did I look back over my story to see how God had helped author it this far, but it really gave me some "perspecticles" to look through as I dream and plan for the next chapters. I believe that this process is inviting our entire congregation into deeper relationships; with ourselves, our spouses, our kids, our families, our friends, our community, and especially, our God. I encourage and invite you to join in and participate in this experience as you are ready and able. We have new groups starting this spring and will continue to offer this opportunity as long as we have facilitators who are excited to lead and participants who are excited to explore. Take this chance to re-read your story and open yourself to the chapters that are still being drafted!

Here's how you can go deeper:

- 1. Join a Group! We'll have at least six new groups starting between January and March and want to invite you to find a group that works for you! These rolling starts allow for people to pick a day and time that works best for their schedule, and the eight-week commitment gives a great time frame for people to plan within. Sign up sheets will be available in the Fellowship Hall until the groups are filled.
- 2. Baby sit for a Group! While we will offer a few groups that coincide with nursery availability at St. Luke's, there are some groups that will be meeting at times that are not covered by childcare at the church. We want Storyline to be accessible to ALL members and don't want childcare to be a prohibitive cost. If you are interested in volunteering two hours of your time each week for eight weeks to babysit for a group as they meet, please contact Rev. Ryan and he'll get you in touch with our small group leaders.
- 3. Let us know you're interested! Are you excited about the idea of Storyline, but none of the meeting times work for you? Or maybe you're not in a place to make the time commitment at the moment? No worries! Shoot Rev. Ryan an e-mail and he will add you to our "interested parties" list. As new groups form, Ryan will e-mail this list of folks to let them know and keep them appraised of the added times/dates so they can sign up when a group works for them. Please contact Rev. Ryan if you are thinking about possibly joining a group, but you'd like to talk to a facilitator or former participant first to get a first hand account of the work and how it impacted them we have LOTS of folks who have been touched by this experience and are happy to share what they've learned about themselves through the process!

Planning for Cold Weather Closures

In the event of inclement weather, the pastors and staff of St. Luke's have adopted these procedures:

During the week:

- When North Douglas County cancels school, St. Luke's will close the church office and cancel all classes, meetings, and events in the building. All childcare for the day will be cancelled.
- When North Douglas County schools announce an early dismissal, St. Luke's will close the office and cancel all afternoon and evening classes, meetings, and events.
- If there is no school closure, but weather conditions are becoming severe, staff and group leaders will determine by 4:00pm if evening classes, meetings, and events will be cancelled.
- When North Douglas County delays the start of the school day, St. Luke's will open at the normal time (8:00am). All classes, meetings, and events will continue as scheduled.

On weekends and holidays:

 The church staff and group leaders will determine whether classes, meetings, and events will be held.

All closures will be posted on the St. Luke's website (www.stlukeshr.com) as soon as a decision is made. The closure of the St. Luke's Little School will also be given to local television and radio stations.

Remembering Silas Soule by Betsy Keyack

It was cold at dawn today, Dec. 3, at the grave site of Captain Silas Soule. Ken and I were at a vigil, led by Native Americans, recognizing Captain Soule for his courage. Soule was a young man in his 20's serving in the US Army in 1864. He was ordered by his superior, Col. John Chivington, to participate in the massacre of peaceful Native Americans at Sand Creek in southeastern Colorado. Captain Soule refused to let his men participate in the killing. Later Soule wrote a letter to a higher superior telling the story of what happened on that fateful day. Less than a year later, after giving testimony at a military investigation, he was assassinated in Denver. At the vigil, participants in the annual Sand Creek Healing Run were anointed as they prepared to run or walk the last leg of the Healing Run from Riverside Cemetery to the Capitol steps. Native Americans of the Cheyenne, Arapaho and other tribes sang in their languages accompanied by drums and expressed their deep appreciation for Silas Soule. One Native American performed a special blessing on us all. As we celebrate the birth of Jesus, Silas Soule reminds me of the One who came and showed us how to live. He had the courage to tell the truth - not just tell the truth when asked, but having the courage to speak up with the truth contrary to the prevailing views at the time. What an example!

Seasoned Voyagers View the Past

The Nov. 18 gathering in Fellowship Hall focused on the topic of the Sand Creek Massacre in which a 700-man volunteer regiment under the command of Col. John Chivington, an ordained Methodist minister attacked an Indian encampment near Fort Lyons killing 170 Cheyenne and Arapaho in November 1864.

Col. Chivington wrote his superiors of a surprise morning attack on a village with 900 to 1000 warriors, which ended in a great victory killing 400 to 500 Indians and almost annihilating the entire tribe. Capt. Silas Soule saw a betrayal of peaceful Indians and refused to fire a shot or order his men into action. He wrote in chilling detail about the deaths of women and children. Our own professor Steve Collins led us through documents of the resulting investigation to help us make our decisions about the reports. The details of the trophy taking among the 160 or more who were killed were hard to read aloud. Rev. Janet Forbes spoke of her learning curve about the Massacre. She was assigned to be the speaker at a meeting in 1995 with representatives of the Cheyenne and Arapaho nations and the Methodist Church. In spite of being well prepared through research, she was humbled and moved by how small her words seemed in the presence of the survivors of people whose land and family and way of live had been taken away by this event.

Methodists are among those that participated in a healing march from Sand Creek to the Capitol steps from Nov. 29 to Dec. 3. The run commemorated the victims and survivors of the massacre and the healing of those involved. This dark side of the rapid development of the Colorado Territory, that justified displacement and death of "hostile" Native Americans is not history to be proud of 150 years later.

WOW! What an amazing event. It was so inspiring to see the number of volunteers that filled the Colorado Convention Center on November 17 with the intention of helping individuals



in our community who are homeless or at-risk of becoming homeless. This year was a record breaking year in terms of volunteer attendance with 1,079 individuals ready to lend a hand and help a stranger and folks from St. Luke's were among that number! They had 949 clients access resources that they need to help become self-sufficient and get off the streets. We'd like to share with you how this experience changed us...

"Jon and I can honestly say the PHC-14 experience was extremely fulfilling. Seeing how those who have so very little are quite unafraid to express their belief in God and gratefulness for what they have (or don't) was impressive to me. One significant moment of joy came when we witnessed our client get fitted for his very own eye glasses. He told us how he could not see the face of another volunteer standing 3 feet away, and he did not believe anyone had the ability to see an eye chart 15-20 feet away. Another fulfilling moment was having our clients' parking tickets adjusted from \$1400 to \$200. Many of us don't understand what it is like to not have the money to pay for street, lot or garage parking. This is not to mention that having a personal garage for parking is another luxury we often accept as a necessity."—Linda Streaty

Prepaying Future Pledges:

If you need additional tax deductions for 2014, consider prepaying your 2015 pledge. The amounts we receive for future year(s) are recorded as prepaids and applied to the year you designate. Please mark your checks accordingly.

If you haven't finished your 2014 giving, please do so before Dec. 31.

All contributions received during 2014 are posted as 2014 contributions unless you instruct us to apply them to a future year. Contributions received in the mail after Dec. 31 will be posted to 2014 only if they are postmarked on or before Dec. 31 and we are not instructed to apply them as a prepayment of your 2015 giving. You can make an online credit card transaction as late as 2:00pm, MT, on Dec. 31 and it will still be applied to your 2014 giving record.

The Common Table

Sunday, January 25, from 11:00am-noon

Please bring a dish to share. We'll break bread together, and share the journey of our community.

Managers and supervisors in the business world are often trained to hold "fearless conversations" with their employees and co-workers. These conversations typically revolve around a subject that may be unpleasant—such a performance problem for an employee—or one that may be uncomfortable for a co-worker—such as a failure to follow established office protocol or policy. The training focuses on strategies such as active listening, positive body language, and the use of supportive and reinforcing language.

Guess what? Members of a church need to have similar "fearless conversations" with each other from time to time. We don't always agree on a given subject or see eye-to-eye on matters important to the church.

But, how do we have those conversations in such a way that we honor and respect the opinions of everyone at the table? How do we convey to someone with whom we may disagree that we still value him or her as a person? St. Luke's tradition of diversity of theology provides a wonderful foundation from which a rich diversity of thought and opinion can flourish and be shared with the larger community—in a way that is appropriate and supportive.

Our Common Table meetings for 2015 will be organized as a series of meetings built around the "fearless conversations" that we need to have with each other as we decide what role St. Luke's will play in some of the most important social issues facing our society. The issues of death with dignity & marriage equality are two that readily come to mind—there are many others.

Before we have these "fearless conversations" with one another, however, we need to learn first how to have them in such a way that everyone feels safe to share their viewpoints, to listen to and respect what others on the opposing side of the issue think and feel, and most importantly, to continue to value the relationships that we have at St. Luke's. Rev. Janet has said it many times... there is no single issue at St. Luke's that is more important than the relationships with one another that we nurture and sustain.

We will kick off our 2015 Common Table series on January 25 with facilitators who will teach us the important communication skills that we need to master in order to have our "fearless conversations" in the most productive way we can. Who knows? With 2016 being a presidential election year, maybe we will find that there are secular applications to what we will learn as well!

Please plan to join us on January 25—and at future Common Tables—as we face our future together first by learning how to communicate with one another.
