

Worship Renewal and Design at St. Luke's

Leaders at St. Luke's have been watching recent trends in our patterns of worship. In fact, everywhere I go, I talk to pastors who are experiencing the same thing: *People who attend church are attending less often.*

People who used to attend every week are attending three times a month. People who were around twice a month often now show up once a month. And attenders who used to come once a month are showing up half a dozen times a year. This is true of rapidly growing churches, megachurches, mid-sized churches, Bible churches, and churches like St. Luke's where many are connecting to faith for the first time. Some church leaders I know wonder whether people will even attend physical buildings a decade from now. I believe they will, but maybe not in traditional patterns.

So what's going on? Well, culture is changing. But two of the biggest factors that used to drive attendance in the last twenty to fifty years are now reproducible online.

Two decades ago, if you wanted to hear great preaching, you had to go to church. Podcasting and online campuses have changed this. If you wanted great music, you had to go to church. Now, for \$20, all your favorite songs are on your phone wherever you go.

So what are we to do? Here are six ways that St. Luke's is choosing to respond.

- 1. We are planning an awesome online presence. Launching an online campus is a 2015 goal for us. Between Facebook, Twitter, podcasts, websites and blogs, all of us can stay connected. Even giving to the church online has never been easier. Many people tell me that when they're not physically present, they stay in touch via all of these media.
- **2.** We elevate personal relationships. Somehow facilitating a personal relationship is easier and more effective in person. Faith communities that value personal relationships will always attract people who value personal connection (which is, I think, almost all of us).
- **3. We love people!** Can you love, fully-love, people without being fully present? Do human relationships go to their deepest level in person? I think so. Two in five couples meet online today. But even those two in five couples who meet online don't stay online. They partner in face-to-face covenants. Love can be expressed online, but its deepest fulfillment happens through personal contact.
- **4. We are designing an irresistible experience.** We are re-designing worship with deep soul: sensory-rich, creative and welcoming, gathered around story, radically present to the Spirit of God. Something happens to us when we gather in that Holy Presence! A live concert is never quite the same as watching a song on YouTube or even a concert in full HD on a kicking home theater system. Church is more than the sum of its parts... between the message, music, prayer, creative elements, human interaction, and

hallway conversations. You can get some of it online, but not all of it. At least not yet.

- 5. We create a culture of serving. Online church doesn't allow many serving opportunities. When you get up early to prepare breakfast for the homeless, or shepherd a group of 2nd graders, or mentor a confirmand, or greet people with a smile, or serve as a worship leader, or drive the bus for Windcrest, somehow you find a place in service of a goal greater than yourself. St. Luke's is committed to serving outside our church house: locally, nationally, and internationally.
- 6. We prioritize children and youth. Parents can catch a podcast, but kids really miss out when parents miss. To be with their friends who are running in the same direction, and to have another voice who knows their name, favorite food and hopes and dreams saying the same thing a loving parent would say, is so far un-reproducible in cyber-community. I believe that when the parents miss church, the kids are the biggest losers. The more we prioritize families, the more families will prioritize Sundays.

Worship in the St. Luke's community is a radical endeavor...risky, daring, prophetic, centering, and counter-cultural. God's grace abounds! So let us be bold. Let us be brave. Let us be together.

Invitation to the Sand Creek Healing RunNOVEMBER 29 – DECEMBER 3

Our Bishop, Rev. Elaine Stanovsky, has invited the St. Luke's community to participate in an experience of remembrance and healing:

Dear Friends: The slow, difficult work of remembering the history, honoring those who died and healing broken communities and relationships continues. This is the work of cultivating abundant life. Nov. 29, 2014 will mark the 150th anniversary of the Sand Creek Massacre. Clint and I, along with our three sons, will be there and hope that many of you will join us. United Methodists commemorated this tragic event and its long-lasting scars during the Yellowstone and Rocky Mountain annual conference sessions. Now we have an opportunity to join descendants of the Massacre in a solemn public commemoration over five days from Saturday, Nov. 29, through Wednesday, Dec. 3. The official website, including the schedule for the Commemoration, is sandcreekmassacre150.com. Anyone intending to participate during any or all of the five days, or to volunteer, should register at this site.

To help you plan your participation, here is an overview of events scheduled:

November 29, 2014: 150th Anniversary of the Sand Creek Massacre 9:00am: Prayerful Preparation for Opening Ceremonies, Eads United Methodist Church, 110 E. 11th St., Eads, CO. Sponsored by the Rocky Mountain Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Noon: Bus departs from Eads UMC to Sand Creek Massacre Site. **1:00pm:** Opening Ceremonies, Sand Creek Massacre Site.

November 30, 2014:

Dawn: 16th Annual Spiritual Healing Run & Walk begins at Sand Creek Massacre Site.

December I & 2,2014:

Dawn: Spiritual Healing Run & Walk begins each day in a different location.

December 3, 2014:

Dawn: Color Guard at the grave of Silas Soule, Riverside Cemetery **II:00am:** Runners arrive on west steps of the Colorado State Capitol with Closing Ceremonies.

The Rocky Mountain Conference is inviting people who want to participate in the opening ceremony to a Prayerful Preparation gathering at 9:00am Saturday, Nov. 29, at Eads United Methodist Church, prior to the 16th Annual Spiritual Healing Run & Walk. All are invited to attend, reflect and learn more about the Sand Creek Massacre before heading to the opening ceremony of the run, which begins at 1:00pm at the Sand Creek National Historic Site. Parking will be very limited at the Sand Creek Massacre site, so the Conference has arranged for boxed lunches and a charter bus to carry people from Eads to the site. If you can contribute \$35 to cover the cost that would be great. If you can't, then ride anyway to reduce the number of cars at the site. Please register online for the Saturday Prayerful Preparation at Eads UMC and to ride the bus.

The Spiritual Healing Run & Walk itself begins at sunrise on Sunday, November 30. This is not a race. You can run or walk as far as you choose any or all days from Sunday through Wednesday. Or you can encourage the runners along the way with your prayers and cheers. Surely God, known to us in Jesus Christ, is leading us into these rare and precious relationships and this holy, healing work. —*Elaine J. W. Stanovsky*

Open the Eyes of My Heart: Consecration Sunday, Nov. 16

It is one of my favorite songs for worship!

Open the eyes of my heart, Lord.
Open the eyes of my heart.
I want to see you.
I want to see you.

While on renewal leave, this song became a prayer, inviting me to a more generous world, saying that God's love is much wider than we can ever imagine!

At the heart of the song is a commitment to connection. Many of you know that my brother, Joe Forbes, just received the gift of life, a new heart. We don't know much about the donor, except that he was a tall man, like my brother, and a young man. In the first days in Intensive Care at Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark, New Jersey, wondrous revelations emerged. Since my brother has been living on an LVAD (Left Ventricular Assist Device) for 16 months, he had been used to the sound of that machine, a swooshing movement. Now, he speaks of the un-nerving sound of a beating heart and the deafening rhythm of a pulse! That new sensation has become thanksgiving prayers without ceasing!

And he hears music! Sometimes the tunes are jazz-like, or simple children's nursery rhymes, or symphonic creations. But the rhythm is always in harmony with the beating of the new heart. So my niece and I are speculating about the donor and his love of music and whether or not the heart has a deep memory of the man who gave so much. I hope so! Thanks be to God.

When the eyes of our hearts open, when we see what God is doing, fueling the future, opening doors to deeper gratitude, compassion, and connection,

I want to jump into that energy!

On CONSECRATION SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 9, Bob and I will join you in bringing gifts to grow our life together and respond to what God is already doing in those connections.

- We will respond to the tremendous growth in our children, youth, and young adult ministries, especially as our young people double their days of mission response. We must expand our capacity to receive the families who are coming!

- Launch worship re-design, deepening our experience of God's presence.



Dancing Trees

It was a particularly windy day, with gusts of more than 75 miles per hour in the foothills. It



on to other things that seemed more important to me at that time. Before retiring that evening, however, the sound of the wind outside reminded me of what I had watched earlier in the day. Perhaps that's what influenced my dream that night...

I was walking through the forest, I saw tree limbs swinging in cadence to an unheard melody, the rhythm seemed joyous. They seemed to be dancing! I marveled at the sight! Suddenly I heard, a very quiet, very old voice.

"We are dancing! We were created without muscles and tendons so our only movement is the growth of our roots and limbs. When the wind comes it refreshes us and brings dramatic movement to our limbs that lifts our spirits. Through the movement we are celebrating our being!" It didn't seem odd to me that trees could talk. Dreams are not limited by rationality! The voice continued as I dreamt.

"Sometimes the wind becomes so strong that our branches are broken or blown away; sometimes the older, weaker members of our community are torn from the soil. But that is part of living and life as a tree. When the winds and rain become violent and damaging, we remember that wind and rain are but part of our Creator's system for bringing life-giving water from the oceans and seas to sustain those that live on the land. So when the wind blows, we dance joyously to thank our Creator for life itself. When the rains come, our roots draw in the life giving moisture that sustains us. We grow and produce seed so that our species may continue to exist. Our time is not the time of humans and other creatures that live in and around the places where we put down our roots. During our lifetimes we see many generations of animals pass before us. Some help us, some harm us, but all benefit from our presence. We provide safety for nests and security for many; we produce food and shade from the sun's rays. We give of ourselves to those who would build dwellings and usable devices from our limbs and trunks. Our limbs are taken as fuel for cooking food and heating dwellings. But too often, those who benefit from our presence take us for granted; too often that which we offer is wasted and our role in the cycle of life on this planet is forgotten in the push to satisfy selfish desires. But we persevere and we are thankful for those who nurture our seedlings and fight the diseases that harm us.'

The voice became silent, and I perceived that I was expected to respond...

"Thank you, trees, for all that you do to sustain my life! Thank you for the food you yield, thank you for the shade and safety of your branches, thank you for homes, for tables and chairs, campfires and baseball bats. Thank you for refreshing the air I breathe!" I paused, marveling at the incongruence of having a conversation with a tree! Then the old quiet voice came again.

"You are welcome. We are all part of the Creator's system of life. Both plant and animal depend upon each other for survival. We only ask that you remember our mutual interdependence and use wisdom and care when you consume that which we have freely given you. Our Creator would have it no other way."

"Neither would I," I thought. The trees continued to dance, when suddenly a loud sound startled me from sleep. I sat up and heard the sound of hail and rain on the roof; a thunderclap must have awakened me! The dream was beginning to fade from my memory, but I thought, "Yes, I wouldn't want it any other way as well." *God bless us all, Les*

continued from page 1 For the rededication, Rev. Janet blessed the piano for its service to our congregation and ministries. Carrie Mallery played 2 songs, one of which was the first song played on the piano in the Sanctuary nearly 20 years ago. Ken Mervine, Sandy Larson, and Rev. Janet also played selections on the piano throughout the concert. It was a delightful tribute to such a beautiful instrument.

The Steinway D Grand Piano is one of the best pianos in the world, constructed by hand in 1975. St. Luke's received the piano as a gift given in memory of Nelle Ferguson in 1995 by her son Bob Ferguson, long time member of St. Luke's who now lives in Paso Robles, CA and who also attended this special concert. As the story goes, Bob invited Carrie Mallery, our accompanist at the time, to help pick out a piano as a memorial gift to St. Luke's. She was delighted and they both went to Wells Music off of Broadway and I 25 at the time. Carrie sat down at the first piano she came to and played. It was a gorgeous 9 foot long grand piano. She couldn't resist. It was the Steinway D and she turned to Bob and he said, "I think this will do." Carrie was in shock, stunned but excited beyond belief. What was found out later is this piano came to town after spending many years at Carnegie Hall. Of course you can imagine, many famous musicians played this piano during that time. The price of the piano has accrued dramatically since the day Bob bought it for St. Luke's to where it is now valued at nearly \$150,000. The work that was performed on the piano was needed for the last 5 years. After 40 years, parts just continued to slip and this was the year fix it. We needed a new pin block and replacement of hammers, pins, strings, actions plus a refinish of the entire body. The Steinway D Grand piano is essentially brand new and "good to go for another 40 years!" We're so happy to have "her" back! Soli Deo Gloria! Marshall Luke was the master artisan behind the rebuild and also attended the concert and was moved that his efforts would be used by such a worshipping community and musical outreach program.

- Everyone is invited to honor the flag in ways that are sensitive to the placement of competing symbols or displays near the standard.

Following that meeting, Rev. Janet Forbes visited with multiple persons who expressed some of the diverse perspectives on the appropriate display of the flag in a faith community. Everyone, without exception, wanted to display the flag in ways that are respectful and in harmony with flag etiquette.
