Kirkpatrick), a former circus performer Sister Mary Hubert (Dyani Galligan), Mistress of the Novices a streetwise nun from Brooklyn named Sister Robert Anne (Sandy Larson), Sister Mary Leo (Colleen Herskovits) a novice who is also a wannabe ballerina; and the delightfully wacky Sister Mary Amnesia (Erynn Shyrack), the nun who lost her memory when a crucifix fell on her head. They are joined by fellow nuns NancyLee Manus, Cathy Collins and Sam Collinsworth to feature star turns, tap and ballet dancing, an audience quiz and comic surprises. 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Story: The Heart of the Matter from Rev. Dr. Janet Forbes

Paul was the church-planting

missionary of the early Christian movement throughout the Mediterranean region. We have several of his letters to the fledgling congregations in the Christian scriptures. In one of his letters, he reminds the people of the deep connections that are gifts of spirited community. He asks everyone to attune to the Holy Spirit and live in partnership with God and each other.

"I implore you to lead a life worthy of your call. Bear with one another in love, in complete selflessness, gentleness, and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by



the peace that binds you together. There is one body, there is one Spirit, just as you were called into the one and same hope. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God who is Father of all, over all, through all, and within all. And each one of us has been given his own share of this grace" (Ephesians 4:1-7).

This is such amazing good news! Once we profess that there is one God, we begin to see the activity of that one Pattern, one Center, one Source, and one Grace, and that it is, at its heart, a very coherent world.

One of the joys of my renewal leave was time for extended periods of prayer, especially in the solo days near the ocean. There is a new kind of knowing that settles into the bones when we pause and ponder the beauty of creation. The sunrises and sunsets, the beat of the waves on the shore, the colonies of shore birds, the powdery-quartz sand, and the diverse, laughing families flowed in and out of my breath prayers. Then, while learning about the convergence of Judaism, Islam, and Christianity in the history of Spain, I wondered and, sadly, came to understand why this new sense of connection is so hard to sustain in the midst of magical, cultural, and rational religion.

The **HEART OF THE MATTER** that blossomed in me is that we are participating in something much bigger than we are. According to writer, Richard Rohr, Spirit, as Paul uses the term in his letters, is this realm of shared knowing, a new consciousness about being together in community (con-scire to know with). Our life is first, last, and foremost a participation in this one larger reality, called Ruach, called Shalom, called Story, called God.

In my prayer time, the message that kept bringing me back to my heart was this simple statement: Janet, your life is not about you. You are about life.

St. Luke's, each of us is an instance of the one pattern that, for Paul, was uncovered, made clear, validated, and made available to all in the life of Jesus. That's why Jesus is called the Christ, the Messiah, the Anointed One who reveals this way of being in his birth, teaching, and passion. Jesus shows us that we are more a "we" that we are an "I."

So, our stories matter because they open us more fully to new kind of knowing and being together! They shape the persons who tell them and the communities who dwell in them.

As we celebrate our stories, we will remember that we are greater than the sum of our parts. When we put our stories, our gifts, and our passion together with glad and generous hearts, grace and love can't help but overflow into the world. Our storied lives become living letters... inspiring, transforming, and important.

You are our letter, written on our hearts, known and read by everyone.



The Importance of Our Stories

We just wrapped up a worship series on "Story: The Deepest Things We Know." Our current series continues the story theme, "Story: The Heart of the Matter." In fact, in worship on Sunday mornings

we'll stay with the theme of "story" for the entire year. Several Storyline groups have launched this Fall–small groups of people meeting to share their story and find themselves in God's bigger story. Why all this talk about story? Simple: we understand things better through story. We make sense of God, ourselves, and the

world through story, more so than we do lists or bullet points.



During our 5-week series of "Story: The Deepest Things We Know," we had Conversations with **Courageous Storytellers** during the sermon time. These storytellers modeled for us vulnerability, authenticity, and courage. I am so grateful for their willingness to share a piece of their story with the St. Luke's congregation. It was moving. Good stories are the ones where you and I say: "hmm, that's me." We find ourselves in them. Many of us found ourselves in the stories of our Courageous Storytellers. It convinced us that we are not alone—in both our positive and negative story turns—we are not alone. And when we catch that—when we truly grab onto that message—life all of the sudden becomes more beautiful, more meaningful.

On a final note: perhaps some of you have felt a stirring deep inside your bones, the Spirit moving in the depths of your soul. Maybe you've felt called, persuaded, or whatever word fits, to take a leap a faith in order to live a better and more meaningful story. When these kinds of stirrings happen we don't want to miss them or ignore them. I encourage you to stroll through the Sanctuary, grab a pencil from one of the baskets, and write a couple sentences on our "What If" posters. What if... I did this or we did that? Dream big!

The next chapter is blank. Turn the page in the coloring book, it's empty. Maybe God is waiting for us to join the divine in creating something better, something new, something beautiful. Maybe the story has just begun. What kind of story are you going to live?

When Pam told us she hoped to begin a Stephen Ministry in her congregation, our St. Luke's Stephen Leaders immediately saw an opportunity! The Stephen Ministry Team offered a generous gift to St. Paul's UMC to encircle another community and to extend this gift of care "in the desert" as Rev. Pam says.

Pam said she was reminded of the verse from the Prophet Isaiah, "I am about to do a new thing, now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert" (Isaiah 43:19). It is one of my favorite songs for worship!

Open the eyes of my heart, Lord.

I want to see you.

While on renewal leave, this song became a prayer, inviting me to a more generous world, saying that God's love is much wider than we can ever imagine!

At the heart of the song is a commitment to connection. Many of you know that my brother, Joe Forbes, just received the gift of life, a new heart. We don't know much about the donor, except that he was a tall man, like my brother, and a young man. In the first days in Intensive Care at Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark, New Jersey, wondrous revelations emerged. Since my brother has been living on an LVAD (Left Ventricular Assist Device) for 16 months, he had been used to the sound of that machine, a swooshing movement. Now, he speaks of the un-nerving sound of a beating heart and the deafening rhythm of a pulse! That new sensation has become thanksgiving prayers without ceasing!

And he hears music! Sometimes the tunes are jazz-like, or simple children's nursery rhymes, or symphonic creations. But the rhythm is always in harmony with the beating of the new heart. So my niece and I are speculating about the donor and his love of music and whether or not the heart has a deep memory of the man who gave so much. I hope so! Thanks be to God.

When the eyes of our hearts open, when we see what God is doing, fueling the future, opening doors to deeper gratitude, compassion, and connection,

I want to jump into that energy!

On CONSECRATION SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 9, Bob and I will join you in bringing gifts to grow our life together and respond to what God is already doing in those connections.

NEW! HOLY LISTENING DURING SUNDAY SCHOOL

To further our mission of caring for the spiritual lives of our children, St. Luke's is now offering the opportunity for a child to meet with a Holy Listener during 9:30am Sunday School. A Holy Listener (HL), through our recently acquired First Steps program, is a St. Luke's adult volunteer who has been trained in the First Steps methodology. This methodology is not professional counseling but is the spiritual gift of listening to a child in a special way using tools that allow them to feel God's presence and comfort. A sign will be out on those Sunday mornings to indicate that a HL is available to meet with a child who might be experiencing a crisis of any sort (divorce of parents, loss of a loved one, moving to a new school/ home, illness, bullying, transition, death of a pet, family financial or health difficulties, etc.) in their life. The short meeting could be a one time event or ongoing. (Our Safe Sanctuary policy would apply to make sure all parties are meeting in a secure, safe and welcoming environment.) Parents can request that a HL meet with their child through our Staff or the Superintendent and will be informed if a meeting occurs. Any information shared will be held in confidence within our Holy Listening Team.

Biblical Generosity: Old Concepts for a New Day

"You shall go there, bringing... your tithes and your donations, your votive gifts, your freewill offering..."

—Deuteronomy 12:5-6

When we have conversations about investing in the ways that St. Luke's is making a difference, Revs. Sallie, Ryan, and I are often asked about the origin of the biblical phrase "tithes and offerings". Even though these biblical images have been celebrated in Christian community for centuries, they still name the vibrant ways we grow our faith journey and our life together.

The **TITHE** represents 10% of the bounty with which God blesses us. It is also the symbol that Paul uses when he writes to the young churches of the first century. He calls for "**PROPORTIONAL GIVING**". We are to give in proportion to what we have earned, in proportion to what we have accumulated, in proportion to what we possess. We are to give in proportion to how we have prospered under the grace of God. So, "tithing" is a symbol for planned giving. Tithing helps us give significantly in a systematic way. It is a planned share in the purposes of God. Tithing reminds us that we are all **STEWARDS** and not owners. A tithe is a guide toward responsible, healthy, significant faith-promise giving.

A **TITHE** represents what you plan to give to the ministries and future of St. Luke's. It is your plan – freely decided upon and cheerfully given. The tithe is the amount we bring weekly or monthly. Whether given by electronic funds transfer, or by a rewards card, or by check in the offering plate, it is an investment in our community and an act of worship. Next we are enjoined to bring our **OFFERINGS**. The Bible knows at least two kinds of offerings which have connection with our lives today.

First, there are the "votive offerings". Votive offerings are part of a vow or promise, or they represent a specific act of thanksgiving to God, or a personal act of devotion. Seasonal offerings, missional giving, bequests, and memorials are in the category of votive offerings. We dedicate new bequests on the Tree of Life in the hallway beside the Chapel, celebrating the many families who have dedicated gifts in honor of loved ones.

The biblical witness also speaks of "freewill offerings." It is an unplanned, unstructured, unexpected out-of-pocket offering on the spur of the moment. The freewill offering is giving out of a sudden impulse of love, out of a felt need. It is the envelope in your worship bulletin when you arrive on a Sunday morning that invites a response for a special cause. It is the call for a special disaster relief offering due to flood, or hurricane. It is the spontaneous gift to the pastor's relief fund for homeless persons. It is a breakfast burrito to support a Guatemala Mission Team, or the Sand Creek Healing Run to honor 25 years of ministry, or our Boy Scout Troop.

Bring your tithes and your votive offerings and your freewill offerings! The text is an amazing ancient writing with a high level of contemporary relevance. It all adds up to a single central truth: As we give of any monetary amount, we are primarily receivers and transmitters of the love of God in the world. This is the Heart of the Matter! Ultimately, that's what any giving is all about.

The One That Didn't Get Away

The sun had been up for 2 hours and the clouds had lifted. The day was bright even though it was only 5:00

a.m. Bob and I arrived at Smitty's Salmon Safari in Soldotna, Alaska and found that the parking lot was already filled with cars and trucks! The place had the look of some major sporting event! People were standing in small groups, the talk was rather quiet but intense. The air was heavy with expectation.

At Smitty's office trailer we were told to go immediately to Mike's boat at dock seven and be ready to go out on the river. High tide had just occurred and the salmon riding in with the flood tide would be in the river. We quickly found the boat and got in.

Mike turned to me, "You fished for King Salmon before?"



"First time," I answered,

"But I've done a lot of trout fishing in Colorado,"

Mike rolled his eyes, "Forget all about what you know about catching fish! This isn't anything like trout fishing! There are some things you need to know before we go out, once you hook one these guys, there won't be time to talk about what to do."

He continued with a quick lesson. "The Kings in the river now are 'five cycle' salmon meaning they have been in the Gulf of Alaska for five seasons and on average will have grown to 50 to 90 lbs! When they come into the Kenai, they are headed to the fresh water spawning grounds upstream to reproduce. They are not eating but they have become very territorial.

When a fish encounters your lure, it doesn't attack it to eat it, it sees the lure as an invasion of its territory and interference to its movement upstream.

So, when you feel a, strong, steady pull on the line, hold tight and count 'one, two' then yank back as hard as you can to set the hook and brace yourself.

Yell out, 'Fish On!' All the other fishermen in the boat must reel in their lines to avoid entanglement and I'll be at the helm to guide the boat as the fish takes off. Your job is to keep your line taught and mine is to maneuver the boat so the fish can't break the line. Remember, these Kings are big and strong. Be prepared for a half-hour or more before the fish gets tired and we can get it to the boat."

I took the rod and reel from Mike and went my seat

in the boat wondering just what I had gotten into.

Then we pushed off from the dock and proceeded to the spot on the river where Mike had chosen to start. "Watch the other boats for signs of fish on," he called out, "if we're not getting bites, I'll move close to them." We began "back trolling" and about 10 minutes later, Bob shouted and began struggling with a fish on his line. We all reeled in and then watched the battle. An hour later, and a half-mile or downstream, the Salmon was pulled aboard to a loud cheer!

Mike repositioned the boat for another run. Time seemed to slow down as we waited for another strike. One or two brief tugs on other fishermen's lines proved fruitless.

I was beginning to think taking about a midmorning nap and prepared to put my pole in the rod lock on the side of the boat next to my seat, when suddenly my line grew taught, and I felt a strong pull that could easily taken the rod from my grasp.

I counted "one-two" and then yanked as hard as I could.

Suddenly my quiet world turned to turmoil! I shouted "fish on" and Mike jumped to the boat helm and the others in the boat began reeling in their lines.

My line slashed through the water making a water spray "rooster tail." I could tell the fish was diving to deeper water and Mike turned the tiller and gunned the motor to follow the fish as best he could. Mike shouted, "Loosen you reel drag a bit, let him run," I made the adjustment and fishing line began stripping off the reel at an amazing rate as the fish swam hard.

The battle seemed to me to be going on forever! After about 30 minutes, my arms tired; I found myself breathing hard! I smiled to myself as the phrase "are we having fun yet?" came into my mind.

But, at last, the Salmon's energy was spent and I could reel the fish up to the boat and Mike netted it.

We returned to our dock and the usual weighing was done with photographs taken of fisherman and fish. (Mine was 55 lbs!) We had King Salmon in our freezer for most of the year!

Reflecting at home a few days later, I compared the price to traveling to Soldotna, the cost of guide service and the charges for processing, packaging and freezing the catch and found it to be far beyond the \$5 per pound for Salmon purchased at our local market.

I had interfered with the natural life cycle of King Salmon! But then I remembered that hatcheries in the spawning grounds have been established to assure continued continuation of the species. Was this a throwback to the role of prehistoric human males providing food for the family? Was it an assertion of human superiority over animal?

I don't know, but the experience was priceless!



Performing Arts Academy

In 2006, inspired by their passion

for performing arts education and commitment to helping children discover their brilliance, Jim Ramsey and Roberta Hamilton Griggs founded St. Luke's Performing Arts Academy (PAA). The organization is the first 501(c)(3) non-profit to be sponsored by St. Luke's and works to fulfill a mission of providing transformative, character building experiences for PreK-12 students through music and performing arts education. PAA has flourished from 26 initial students in 2006 to more than 500 students in 2013. We anticipate serving at least 700 students in 2014.

The core values that set PAA apart and create a lasting impression on students and families are Character through leadership and integrity; Curriculum guided by educational standards; and Community extended to everyone.

During the summer months and after school during the academic year, PAA students build their skills and their sense of community through band and orchestra camps, early keyboard instruction, and acting, vocal, and technical arts training. The popular musical theater intensives offer more curriculum-driven training and opportunities for students bring to life fully staged musical productions for families and the community. So far, nearly 1,000 students from Highlands Ranch and the south metro areas have performed in PAA's 20+ musical productions.

PAA's community impact is growing because of commitment to fostering outreach and connection. For example, PAA recently piloted an offsite program at East Elementary in Littleton, a Title 1 school serving children who are considered at-risk because of socio-economic circumstances. Through this successful effort, PAA provided partial scholarships to 26 students in grades 2-6 to participate in a production of the beloved classic "Jungle Book" for family and friends. In addition, on December 18, PAA will host the second Holiday Music Festival, a community celebration featuring a unified chorus of up to 200 voices from four local high schools, under the direction of Jim Ramsey.
