Dear St. Luke's,

have going on — with all our world has going on — I invite you to come back to your inner peace this Advent and Christmas with our new worship series Calm and Bright.

Now before you think this is a simple and pleasant invitation, I believe it is actually a challenge for a lot of us.



Many of us have gotten used to not having peace and calm on a daily basis. In fact, living with a certain amount of anxiety, anger or fear is almost a norm in our society. And even if we aren't living with a certain level of tension, we might worry that if we do go inward to find our peace, we're not sure what else we might find lurking in our souls. Perhaps grief or pain is buried in there that we'd really rather not deal with.

Another reason we may avoid the soothing feeling of our inner peace is because we feel guilty that so many other people don't have calm or peace because of their circumstances. We have wars, hunger, injustice, violence and hardship, so how can we justify soothing ourselves when so many people are hurting?

And sometimes we don't stay attuned to our divine peace simply because we are so distracted by the busy-ness of life and work. And life is definitely busy, especially at this time of year. But if we allow ourselves to stay distracted by everything that is going on outside of us, we can effectively avoid going inside of ourselves where the peace of God resides.

But this Advent, we are going to set aside all of our reasons, worries and distractions so we can truly come into all the peace, hope, love and joy that came down on Christmas just for us. Yes, for us – and for all. No one exempt. And we need some Calm and Bright right about now. The world needs some Calm and Bright right now. So let's reclaim it and share it so our calm can brighten up the world. Because that's what happens when we invoke our Calm and Bright. God takes it, multiplies it and imparts it to those who need it the most. And as John Dear, in *Living Peace: A Spirituality of Contemplation and Action*, says:

To live a life of peace, we must practice peace with all we meet, indeed, with the whole world....

Once we make that choice, a whole new journey begins....and we can change the world....

Whether we radiate quiet peace like a Buddhist monk or capture the world's imagination like Mahatma Gandhi, a life of peace bears fruit for humanity.

St. Luke's, I invite you to radiate a deep sense of Calm and Bright for the world this Advent.

Pondering How to Be Present, Mindful & Thriving

We are on the cusp of a seasonal shift as we celebrate Advent and Christmas, wrap up 2023 and begin to think about what opportunities 2024 will bring.

It can be hard to catch our breath when it feels like we are constantly being propelled forward and onto the next thing.

Our incredible St. Luke's staff has been so mindful about offering events and opportunities that will provide time to be present in the moment so that we can truly

enjoy all that this season has to offer. I invite you to look at St. Luke's offerings in the next few weeks, especially our Cantata (December 10) and CSE's Believe: Reflection, Music, and Prayers (December 12).

I am particularly attuned to how I want to be present and mindful in this season after finishing a seven-week book study on the topic of thriving. Fourteen brilliant and devoted women came together on Wednesday nights this fall to discuss *Thrivers: Why Some Kids Struggle and Others Shine* by Dr. Michelle Borba. We appreciated the insights the author shared and offered our own critical reflections on how we personally experience the challenges of shepherding young people in the world today.

The resounding theme from the book and our group is that kids are busy, they enjoy their extracurricular pursuits, they thrive when they face challenges and experience growth but they increasingly don't know how to relax or enjoy free time. I know that I found myself fitting into this category as well. Especially when we ask ourselves how often is that free time spent with a screen? And the book was clear in its challenge to parents and care-givers: we must be the ones to model the values, behaviors, and qualities we hope to see in the next generations.

The study and the conversation has continued to circulate in my mind, especially as I ponder the ways St. Luke's, as a community of faith, can lead the way for opportunities for belonging, mindfulness, and thriving for all ages. I am excited to see where this conversation leads us!

Fall Sermon Series Recap A Place at the Table

Hospitality, Abundance & Grace

In this sermon series, we find Jesus at the table. Jesus clearly loves the gathering at the table, when all kinds of different folks are gathered around as they talk, laugh, and share stories. This is well documented in the Gospel of Luke, where there are more references to eating, banquets, feasting, and tables than in any of the other Gospels. But it is here, at the table, where we really



get real with Jesus – a rabbi, a teacher, and a friend who has much to teach us about Hospitality, Abundance, and Grace, when we sit down, break bread, and go deep.

Part I - Hospitality: Key Take-Away - Jesus teaches that life is richer, and more full when our tables are filled. Sermon Quotes - "We are so good at hospitality. But radical hospitality asks more of us, and this is the brand of welcome that Jesus is all about." "The Radical hospitality of Christ pushes us to think how more people can find themselves seated at the table, present and welcomed in spaces that practice unbelievable acts of radical hospitality."

Part II - Abundance: *Key Take-Away -* When we sit down at a meal table, it is different than sitting down at any other table. A meal table is different. We pay attention differently. All our senses are engaged. We might be prepared to feast, or simply to have our most basic of needs met - to satisfy a hunger that might be in our belly, or it might be in our soul. *Sermon Quote - "The economics at the table of God, work like this: There is always more. There is always room. There is always enough. Abundant forgiveness for others, does not mean less forgiveness for you."*

Part III - Grace: Key Take-Away - Jesus prioritizes where the need is, where the hurt it, where healing is needed and where it will be received with deep gratitude and thanksgiving. Sermon Quote - "Again and again, Jesus makes it plain. He is all about what happens around a table. When hungry people come together, so much else fades away. When we accept the invitation – when we accept the welcome, we realize how hungry we are for what will nourish and sustain us, and ready to receive grace as it is shared with us."

On the day he arrived in Vietnam, he was notified by the Red Cross that his first daughter was born. While in Vietnam he was the Commander of B Company that built and maintained roads, airstrips and bridges and helped 350 local families with better housing. At St. Luke's Steve helps with the Blue Bins that helps collect food for our local Veterans.

And that wisdom can be applied to our lives today because God's wisdom endures through all generations, regardless of how our dysfunction and drama show up.

So the next time you read a scripture passage, see if you can find the timeless wisdom within it, so its spiritual relevance can be applied to your everyday life.

Executive Team Affirms Significance of Fundraising to St. Luke's

At its November 12, 2023 meeting, the Exec Team approved the following **Statement of Guiding Philosophy on Fundraising**

The St. Luke's Executive Team recognizes that fundraising is vital to the life of our church. These opportunities not only raise revenues toward the church's budget and its programs, but also foster community spirit.

It has been the intent of St. Luke's for several years to actively transition to year-round fundraising and to provide events and activities to support the ministries and operations of St. Luke's. Multiple fundraisers will be held throughout the year, both to supplement the congregation's planned regular giving as well as to continue engaging the church and the broader community.

For the church's fundraising events conducted each year, it is essential that St. Luke's ensures that it will continue to meet budget goals and prevent any compromise of its 501(c) status. All fundraisers should support a specific mission. After operating expenses are allocated from each fundraising event, the net amount remaining will go to the specific fundraising purpose, or to the general fund, as appropriate.

Opportunities will arise where outside organizations wish to sponsor fundraising events that benefit St. Luke's ministries. The St. Luke's Board of Trustees will approve these activities to ensure they are compatible with St. Luke's mission, values and ministries.

The Executive Team is grateful to the congregation for its spirit of giving and its ongoing support of fundraising events and activities during the program year. The planning for and participation in these activities must continue to be a priority for the various program teams and the St. Luke's community. We support the efforts of the various operational and program teams; specifically, Stewardship, Finance, and Missions as they work to increase transparency and accountability to fundraising and the budget process, working in conjunction with the Director of Finance at St. Luke's.

Florence Crittenton is a Denver non-profit that educates, prepares, and empowers teen moms and their children through education, health and wellness, post-secondary preparedness, and basic/emergency needs support. Fifty ornaments were hung on the tree and St. Luke's stepped up once again and snatched up all 50 the first day they were available. One could choose to purchase gifts for a teen mom or a child, whose ages ranged from newborn through 6 years. The ask for a mom was a gift card to a store of their choice. There were three items to buy for each child, a requested toy, an item of clothing, and underwear or diapers.

After the tree was picked bare during phase one of the Giving Tree, it was replenished with tags for various mission projects to support. In lieu of a gift for a loved one, church members can select one of the tags from the tree to donate to one of these worthy projects. Supported missions include Giving Heart, Pura Vida Construction Projects, Guatemala Milk Program, Christmas in the Park, HAAT Force, Honduras Abundant Life Christian School, Warren Village, and Field Elementary. It meets basic needs by providing breakfast, a hot lunch, laundry service, showers, clothing, hygiene items, blankets and sleeping bags. By being a hub in a

community-wide network, Giving Heart also connects its guests to a variety of resources, such as HAAT Force and Arapahoe County Housing Navigators, to help meet greater needs. Giving Heart's focus is to be a relational ministry. I volunteer at Giving Heart and I am blessed by the warm interactions I have with our guests and joy of being helpful!

There are three ways you can help Giving Heart and its guests:

Will the St. Luke's Pilgrimage to the Holy Land be **Canceled or Delayed?**

A bucket list item for many travelers around the world is to pay a visit to the religious sites in Israel and Palestine, otherwise known as the Holy Land. But since the war between Israel and Hamas started on Oct. 7, it's fair to wonder how those who have planned tours in the region will be affected.

St. Luke's is currently preparing for a pilgrimage, "A Holy Land, A Holy People," next October 2024, with leaders, Rev. Janet Forbes and Bob Davis. The schedule is for travel in Israel and Palestine, October 1-11, 2024 with the choice of an extension, The Wonders of Petra, in Jordan, October 11-15, 2024.

Various tour companies have either canceled or delayed tours for the remainder of 2023, with further assessment taking place for tours scheduled in early 2024. In a conversation with Rev. Peter Miano, United Methodist minister and Executive Director of The Society for Biblical Studies (who will be the tour operator for St. Luke's), Rev. Janet has learned that Rev. Peter is currently planning to resume travel to the Holy Land in March 2024. His company has multiple groups scheduled through the spring and early summer. St. Luke's will continue to monitor the situation and stay in conversation with local clergy who are still planning their 2024 travel.



Lenten Study:

In order to deepen understanding of "the holy people" of the Holy Land, the St. Luke's community is invited to a learning opportunity. Rev. Janet Forbes will be leading a Lenten study, "The 5th Gospel: The Land of Jesus, Now and Then," on Wednesday evenings, February 21 through March 20, 6:30-8:00pm, focusing on the current and historic dynamics within this land of three faiths.

CSE's Bountiful Fall

Our Fall Wellbeing Series introduced participants to practical, well researched resources for everyday people. We explored topics with a holistic lens honoring intellectual, emotional and spiritual wellbeing. In October, we had a lively discussion on setting boundaries called **Clear is Kind:**

Create Healthy Boundaries, Find Peace. We focused on how to live compassionately, respectfully, and kindly in our relationships. Together, we explored simple and powerful ways to practice healthy boundaries that honor ourselves and others and contribute to trustworthy relationships in all aspects of our lives. In November, 15 people engaged in another energized conversation about Atomic Habits - Tiny Changes,

Meaningful Results - based on James Clear's popular book. When we know the kind of person we choose to be, we can connect small habits to that bigger intention rather than just to a goal. We thoughtfully considered the people we each wish to

be and the value of tiny changes that lead us in that direction.

We have had a full Fall of *Outdoor Adventures.* In September we hiked a variation of the **Rawhide Trail** (5 miles) on the western edge of Jefferson County's White Ranch Open Space. It was a beautiful fall morning, and we were delighted (and surprised) by the variety and abundance of

The creative observation talents of our hiking group kept us all laughing about the animal and human shapes we spotted among the rocks and trees along the way. We enjoyed additional time in community over our tailgate picnic. In October we visited the recently discovered (by us) **Lincoln Mountain Open Space** in Southeastern Douglas County. The views of Pikes Peak and the front range from the top of

the Lincoln Mesa were breathtaking. We had a gentle breeze which felt fabulous on a hot day, and the gambol oaks were displaying lush fall colors. The morning was exceptional for dreamers, believers and hikers. We were



joined by our youngest hiker ever, 3 week old Wesley Spangler, whose parents, Liz and Cody have hiked with us many times. Brave Spaces continues our work for greater

racial and social justice as we follow Dr. Jemar Tisby's model of the ARC of Racial Justice: Awareness, Relationships, and Commitment (to action). During October and November Brave Spaces offered a six-week video study "How to Fight Racism: Courageous Christianity and the Journey toward Racial Justice" by Jemar Tisby. We gathered to continue our journey for racial justice and work toward our goals to be part of the solution. This experience was designed to offer practical ways to answer the question, "What do we do?" – as a church, as a community, as an individual. As we became deeply engaged in this conversation and experienced a greater sense of awareness and understanding, we left with many specific actions to take and goals to reach in our commitment to racial justice. On October 6, St. Luke's joined the screening of the documentary, This Is [Not] Who we Are, sponsored by the UMC Mountain Sky Conference's Racial Justice Movement and Ministries. The documentary was filmed in Boulder, "overwhelmingly white, wealthy, and conflicted about issues of diversity, inclusion, and equity." We observed powerful scenes in which students and residents of color are challenged, without cause, by armed white police officers. A 12-year-old girl spoke tearfully of her fear of police, based on what she sees/hears happening to people of color in the community. Following the movie, the Director/Producer Videographer, Katrina Miller, joined the virtual gathering for a Q&A about issues of racial equity and strategies for change.

St. Luke's Feeding of the **5000 Community Food** Drive was in Full Swing again this Year - Oct. 6-8

With seven King Soopers stores participating on Friday and Saturday, and drop-offs continuing at St. Luke's on Sunday, our community exceeded last year's mark, donating nearly 12,222 pounds of food valued at over \$24,000 dollars, as well as cash donations of about \$8,340. The Feeding of the 5K race raised an additional \$1,619 totaling an incredible total of almost \$10,000 dollars for the Food Exchange Resource Network (FERN)! FERN is a food resource collaborative that serves an estimated 1000 families each week. Feeding of the 5000 has a long history at St. Luke's, and is a premier food drive in the South Metro area. Each year sees dozens of committed volunteers working hard all weekend to alleviate food insecurity. We are grateful to everyone from St. Luke's who donated their time to volunteer at store fronts, drive the pick-up vehicles, sort, and pack the donations at St. Luke's, and deliver them to FERN. And of course, we're grateful to everyone who contributed food and cash!
