
St. Luke's Celebrates the 20th Anniversary of our Little School


Fearless Conversations

Conflict, debate, and disagreement throw many people into a tizzy out of fear or intense feelings. In most situations such reactions come from a simple fact- people have not practiced the skills necessary to engage in topics that hold a spectrum of opinions and wide range of emotions. However, practice and experience can give people confidence to engage with these subjects.

The hope of the Gospel goes beyond comfort in possible conflict and invites us to healthy dialog so we can and will continue to gather at the table of the resurrected Christ. Coming back to the table speaks to the possibility of disagreeing and still respecting. Returning to the table reminds us of our commonalities of hopes, fears, needs, and blessings. Engaging at the table creates a space of sharing at the deepest level through listening, affirming, and holding each other in the light.

Fearless conversations are crucial to the well being of any community for in our diversity we experience the Kingdom of God. The timing of fearless conversations also seems pertinent to current cultural situations and in light of the upcoming UM General Conference and presidential election of 2016. Church can be a safe place to model such conversations, to engage with tough issues, and to practice preparing and living into the sacred space of a shared table with friends and enemies.

Africa from May 21-30. This trip is organized through a non-profit organization, Project Humanity. Their mission is to identify and develop sustainable projects that emphasize women's empowerment, with a focus on health care, literacy, and micro-financing. You can check them out at projecthumanity.com. Darren Tipton is the Founder & CEO and he has become a good friend of mine. His work with PH is motivated by his deep Christian faith. His faith is inspiring! Hanging around this guy has caused me to be more aware of the ways in which God is moving ALL AROUND THE WORLD!

Darren heard about what we were doing with Storyline at

St. Luke's, and he caught wind of our Fall worship series "Story: The Deepest Things We Know." He had a vision of a team of people sharing some of these concepts with the pastors and people of Rusinga Island, where they have established meaningful, long term relationships. So... we will be on an island of 20,000 impoverished people, working with local churches to share the Storyline concepts. As you may know, it is my deepest passion to join others in living better, more meaningful stories! My life theme is simple: "To help others find God and beauty in their mess and brokenness." In addition, we will be working in schools, furthering the work of women's empowerment & literacy programs, as well as helping to establish drug/alcohol abuse support groups. This is going to be intense... and beautiful! I'm even told that at any moment we could be called to the local clinic in Rusinga to help deliver a baby. Wow! Scary and sacred! I am expecting God to move in some incredible ways: in me, in the team, and in and through the people of Rusinga. To be honest, I'm a bit fearful about the unknown and I'm also really excited to be a part of this project. Fear and excitement so often walk side-by-side, don't they? I hope you will be praying for our team while we travel. May our eyes be opened, may we become more aware of the God of life who is moving and breathing all around us and ALL AROUND THE WORLD!

Wholehearted Living

FROM REV. SALLIE

Over the past two years, I have continued to have a deep interest in the concept of wholehearted living as researched and described so beautifully by author Brené Brown in her book "The Gifts of Imperfection". I have been especially grateful in these past weeks to have many people join in the discussion that Julie Polikoff and I have been

facilitating. Apparently the concept of wholehearted living resonates with others, too!

Our conversations have been transparent, honest and illuminating. Brown states that wholehearted living

"is about engaging in our lives from a place of worthiness. It means cultivating the courage, compassion and connection to wake up in the morning and think, no matter what gets done and how much is left undone, I am enough...yes, I am imperfect and vulnerable and sometimes afraid, but that doesn't change the truth that I am also brave and worthy of love and belonging" (Brown, 2010, p. 1).

In our culture of extremely high expectations for achievement and success, the idea of "being enough" feels like a breath of fresh air. To me, it feels like grace; the very core of faith and spirituality. The gift that God freely gives us.

Several of us who are engaged in conversation about wholehearted living have been fascinated by a profound question that Brown raises; "What's the greater risk? Letting go of what people think or letting go of how I feel, what I believe, and who I am?" (p. 125). The risk of losing ourselves is perhaps much more dangerous than the risk of letting people fully see who we are; our stories matter because we matter.

Together, we're learning that fully embracing wholehearted living and "being enough" is a process and a practice. And, it is nurtured in relationships of trust with people who have earned the right to hear our stories. Some of the practices of wholehearted living that we have been working to understand and hoping to put into practice are:

Authenticity – Letting go of what people think

Self-Compassion – Letting go of perfectionism

Resilient Spirit – Letting go of powerlessness

Gratitude and Joy – Letting go of scarcity and fear

Intuition and Trusting Faith – Letting go of the need for certainty

Creativity - Letting go of comparison

Play and Rest – Letting go of exhaustion as a status symbol and productivity as self-worth

Calm and Stillness – Letting go of anxiety as a lifestyle

Meaningful Work – Letting go of "self-doubt and supposed to"

Laughter, Song and Dance – Letting go of being cool and "always in control"

In the months ahead, we hope to facilitate many more conversations through the Center for Spiritual Engagement. We would love to have you join us!






Guatemala Musings from our Spring Mission Trip

The voices and faces of Guatemala hold fast in our memories as we return to everyday life in America. St. Luke's has been participating with Pura Vida in Guatemala since 2005 and this year's trip included the beginning construction efforts on two homes in Lemoa, visits with sponsor students, a fun-filled morning of VBS at the old "Cornstalk School," inspiring conversations with Sister Helen and Sister Connie who serve the community of Lemoa, shopping in the market, and daily devotions. While the group experiences most activities together, each person has a unique perspective so here are reflections from a few of the 23 travelers on the March Guatemala Mission.

Thoughts from Row Helman: Yesterday I met with my student as well as my friend's, Craig Bartel, student. Such a wonderful and enriching experience!

Claudia brought her duck family, including Lucas (named after St. Luke's) and it was so entertaining! These are her pets, so not feasting on them! Claudia loves school, 7th grade, and wants to be a nurse someday. The family is so sweetthe time is way too short to catch up for her family.



Encouragement shared by Cindy Robinson: It's great to be part of such a wonderful team. Everyone works together so well, helps each other and is a team. Everyone does the job they feel comfortable with and somehow it all comes together.

Musings from Sarah Merchant:

We learned a lot from this trip: what it looks like to come back to a place we've seen over and over and intentionally reconnect with friends and recommit in solidarity; what the new challenges and encouragements are in a small community like Lemoa that only has school opportunities up to 6th grade but has enrolled a record number of three 1st classes this year; how commitment to sponsor students actually works and helps; how we can be pushed into new areas of risk for the benefit of growth and new discoveries; and how we share the joy of mission with friends. In many respects I saw the people of St. Luke's living from an attitude of mission that informs and transforms their lifestyles. This seems like the sweetest gift of any mission, local or global, and an enriching way to live the "everydays" no matter where.

- The flag of the United States is displayed at all times in the central gathering space of St. Luke's, the Narthex. With a sense of deep gratitude, the flag is placed in our PUBLIC SPACE to make a PUBLIC STATEMENT that we are FREE TO WORSHIP in this holy place and ALL ARE WELCOME.
- The Flag will be displayed in the sanctuary on the Sundays closest to these national holidays: Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Veterans Day.
- Our scouting groups may display the flag during their ceremonies.
- Everyone is invited to honor the flag in ways that are sensitive to the placement of competing symbols or displays near the standard.

Following that meeting, Rev. Janet Forbes visited with multiple persons who expressed some of the diverse perspectives on the appropriate display of the flag in a faith community. Everyone, without exception, wanted to display the flag in ways that are respectful and in harmony with flag etiquette.

As a sixteen year-old high school student, I probably had more enthusiasm than good sense. Dad had agreed to let me buy my own car with the money I made working at the family service station in Grand Junction. The loan, \$580.00, was payable at \$28 per month for 2 years from Mesa Federal Savings & Loan. The car was a 1950 Chevrolet Bel Air Hardtop Convertible. Wow!

I named the car "Betsy," and painted the name on the glove compartment door. I had promised upon promise to take good care of the car, not mess it up, drive carefully, etc... etc... But then, there was this one day...

It was time for the annual Colorado High School Band Tournament and Grand Junction was host city for the Western Slope competition. There would be lots of new girls in town so I decided one morning to drive a few classmates downtown before classes, to see who might be around.



Some time later I recall wondering why in the world I thought there would be any out-of-town high school students downtown that time of morning. But, such is the rationality, or lack of it, driven by raging hormones!

My friends and I didn't see any new girls but we were able to use up nearly all the time before our first hour class. Ron said, "Les, we'd better get back in a hurry, Chaves has that trig test waiting for us!" "Yeah," added Quincy," we've gotta save some time!" "Take this alley, it's a short cut!" came from another voice. I responded, without thinking.

Who needs to think? Any teenager will tell you, "It's all in the reflexes!" Twisting the steering hard to the left, I turned Betsy toward the alley. But, my judgment of distance and turning radius must not have been quite right. Instead of going down the alley, I impaled an old cement trash incinerator at the side of the driveway!

Concrete flew everywhere, Betsy's hood buckled right in the middle, and we lurched to a stop!... Quincy's knee was scratched, Ron had bump on his head, Danny was mumbling, "I never should have," ... and I just sat there, staring at the crumpled hood!

Several of us missed Mr. Chavez' trigonometry test that morning!

The city police and my father and were called, in that order. My friends were driven to school while I sat and waited... When Dad arrived, the first thing he said was "You OK?" He didn't yell; he was frighteningly quiet. But I could tell he was angry! He was all business with the tow truck and the police.

But then, the policemen who had arrived started laughing! They thought the whole thing was funny!

The incinerator just happened to be in the back yard of the aunt of the Chief of Police! And they knew my father very well; a couple of them were his stock car racing buddies. And they began kidding him unmercifully! "Hey Vern, you teach your kid that trick? Never seen such a neat job of completely destroying that incinerator!" Dad grimaced and said nothing. "And look, he hit that dead center with his hood, right on the seam! That took some kind of talent!"

Dad didn't say much to me and the ride home was long and very quiet. I knew that I had disappointed my father, and I had been the cause of his humiliation! His only comment to me was made as we pushed Betsy into our auto shop. He looked directly at me and quietly stated, "You wrecked it; you fix it before you drive again." For the next six weeks, I was grounded. When I wasn't going to school or doing homework, I was busy repairing Betsy. Dad would come by occasionally, and just watch. He didn't say much.

Then one evening, as I was finishing up attaching the new hood panels, Dad came up, stood quietly beside me and said, matter-of-factly, "It's looking pretty good! You go ahead and sand the whole body all down and we'll give the whole car a new paint job." I could feel a two-ton weight being lifted from my shoulders! I knew I was forgiven! I wanted to say something really important, but all I could think to say was "O.K."

My father was never good at open, public expressions of affection, but I knew I was forgiven. He had conquered his injured pride from the teasing by the patrolmen. His anger with me was gone. The accident was not forgotten but it was no longer of any consequence; I had learned my lesson.


