

Time Change to Our Worship Services - Coming SOON!

Dear St. Luke's Family and Friends, I wanted to let you know about some discussions we've been having here at St. Luke's about a possible time change to our worship services, moving them from their current times of 9:00 and 10:30am, back to the pre-pandemic times of 9:30 and 11:00am.

The origin of having 9:00 and 10:30am services stemmed from the

need in the spring of 2020 to go from three services to two. In that process before Rev. Liza and I arrived at St. Luke's, it was decided that to be fair to everyone, one service would be eliminated and the remaining two services would adjust their times so the entire community would absorb the changes and not just one group of worshipers.

And then the pandemic hit Colorado, and shortly after, everything shut down. Then Rev. Liza and I came onboard in July, and thankfully, we are now out of the worst of the pandemic, but

The weekend was full of good food and great conversation. We spent intentional time reflecting on what commitments in our lives get the best parts of us, what important things (or people) get whatever is left, and most importantly remembering what fills our cups and restores our souls.

As I have reflected back on the retreat weekend and the hike specifically, I have loved identifying the Spirit of God at work. In the time of stillness and beauty, in the time of rest and

On a beautiful crisp evening in mid-September, the CSE Team hosted a very memorable Movie Night. Hidden Figures is an outstanding movie, highlighting the remarkable contributions of three black women scientists working for NASA in the 60s and 70s. The movie invited deeper thinking regarding the space race, NASA, the

civil-rights movement, and the significant racial and gender issues of that time. The experience embraced the themes from the movie through a silent auction, NASA-related Launch Boxes for guests, displays of NASA memorabilia from our own St. Luke's rocket scientists. Families, couples and individuals gathered for this very special community event under twinkling lights and an early autumn sky in our St. Luke's backyard. Thanks to everyone's

generosity, the event raised over \$1,500 and the CSE team contributed an additional \$500 bringing the total contribution for this St. Luke's Community Raiser to \$2,000. Thank you, all!

As an added bonus, some members of the CSE team led a follow-up discussion about our movie selection, Hidden Figures, where those who had seen the movie were invited into deeper conversations about racism, discrimination, and the remarkable women who were highly instrumental to the successful work of NASA.

what we realized is that we never really had time to live into the 9:00 and 10:30am worship times. And now that we are back full swing, we are seeing how worshiping at 9:00 and 10:30am are impacting us, especially those in our community with younger children.

Over the summer, some of our families with children were expressing their desire to go back to the 9:30 and 11:00am worship times as it would allow them more time on Sunday mornings to make it to church. We heard them, and I specifically reached out to these families and asked them three things:

- What are the key reasons you desire to change worship times?
- Would changing back to these times result in more frequent and consistent attendance for your family?
- Do you know other families who would benefit from changing back to

I learned from their responses that the key reason they would like a 9:30 or 11:00am service is that they rush every other morning to have their kids ready for school, so having a more calm morning on Sundays would be welcomed. They also said this time change would result in more frequent and consistent attendance for them, and they all said they knew other families who would love this time change too.

I then reached out to staff, various groups and classes, key leaders and folks who don't have children at home to see how they would feel about a possible time change, and overwhelmingly they were supportive, some even saying it would help out their mornings as well.

I also want you to let you know the next steps. I gathered the feedback and brought this information to our Exec Team on December 4 where they voted and approved moving from 9:00 and 10:30am to 9:30 and 11:00am. The Exec Team has already had two meetings where we discussed this, we just wanted to make sure we heard as many voices as possible to help with the decision.

We will begin this time change on Christmas day, and since Christmas is on a Sunday this year, we would only have one service at 9:30am. Christmas day is an easy day to remember the start of something new, so it makes sense to begin this time change then.

Thank you so much St. Luke's for your dedication to our worship services. I am truly honored to be your pastor.

As we were driving to an early morning soccer game in downtown Denver, there was a mile's long line of cars. Was it a funeral procession? Was there an accident? No, this was a line of folks waiting to receive food from a local church. Food scarcity right in our area is real.

Gardening and seeing things grow fills my cup. St. Luke's provided over 80 lbs. of fresh fruits and veggies to the Integrated Family Community Services food bank this summer. We partner with Grow Local Colorado, a local non-profit, whose mission is to turn unused land into food havens. As you are dropping off food, folks are coming and taking the food. It is a really cool fresh outdoor grocery store.



In other news, we added two new gardens to St. Luke's this year partnering with Centennial Water's Garden in a Box. There is a new garden right by the front entrance using all CO native low water plants and a shade garden outside Ms. Sharon's office on the front porch of the church.

We also are working to revitalize the backyard behind the stage. We added loads of new mulch and are cleaning up the fountains. I hope come spring you will take advantage of these outdoor off the beaten path spaces to reflect and enjoy God's beauty and bounty.



Miracles Because of Us!

St. Luke's Feeding of the 5000 Community Food Drive was in full swing from Sept. 23-25. With six King Soopers stores participating on Friday and Saturday, and drop-offs continuing at St. Luke's on Sunday, our community exceeded last year's mark, donating nearly 12,000 pounds of food valued at about \$23,000 dollars, as well as cash donations of about \$5,000. All food and cash benefited the Food Exchange Resource Network (FERN), a food resource collaborative that serves



an estimated 800 families each week.

Feeding of the 5000 has a long history at St. Luke's, and is a premier food drive in the South Metro area. While this year's food donations were lower than all-time highs, we are rebuilding nicely from pandemic

times when access to stores was limited or prohibited.

Each year sees dozens of committed volunteers working hard all weekend to alleviate food insecurity. We are grateful to everyone from St. Luke's who donated their time to volunteer at store fronts, drive the pick-up vehicles, sort and pack the donations at St. Luke's, and deliver them to FERN. And of course we're especially grateful to everyone who contributed food and cash! —*Bruce Kirchhoff*

HAAT Force Making A Difference

HAAT Force has started its 2022-2023 season, providing severe weather motel vouchers to families, people with disabilities, pregnant women, older adults and people with animals who are experiencing homelessness in the South Metro area. HAAT Force serves a unique need in the South Metro area by providing shelter to people who would not otherwise have a place to go on stormy or bitter cold nights. One of our guests sheltered from the snowstorm of November 3rd was a 61-year-old man. He was brought to us at Giving Heart in Englewood by the Mobile Response Unit, a collaboration between the Englewood Police Department and All Health Network. This man, a veteran, was found huddled in front of a store. When he was brought to Giving Heart, where we were issuing motel vouchers, he was exhausted, incoherent and starving. The night before, he had slept at a bus stop. His phone had been stolen. He was given a hot meal, which helped him immensely, and guidance on getting a SNAP (food stamps) card. We will be connecting with one of our community partners to determine how this guest can be helped moving forward and the Mobile Response Unit will be keeping an eye out for him as well.

HAAT Force is grateful to the people of St. Luke's for your support in the form of donations, silent auction bids and the hosting of our Fall Kickoff. 

Trustees Corner: Covid-19 Update

Covid-19 cases in Douglas County were at a low level during the months of September and October, but they have been rising slowly over the last few weeks. The case rate is now 15 new cases per 100,000 people. The CDC rates counties on a Low/Medium/ High scale to correspond to the level of risk for infections and hospitalizations. On November 10, Douglas County moved from Low to Medium, based on going above 100 new cases per week. At this level, masks are still *recommended* when indoors at St. Luke's. We are still well below High; when Douglas County was last at High (during the summer), wearing of masks was *strongly recommended*. Everyone is encouraged to get a Covid-19 booster, especially those who are in a high risk category, to minimize risks of severe sickness and hospitalization. *–Ken Fong*





Every three years, St. Luke's Little School proudly navigates a quality improvement rating system through Colorado Shines. This

November was our three-year mark, and we went through the rating process again. This means that Colorado Shines and their affiliate, Clayton Early Learning, rated our school in all areas. As the director, I was required to submit budgets, business practices, handbooks, curriculum maps, student assessments and progress reports, and much more that demonstrate sound business and educational practices. In addition, raters came into our school at random to assess our classrooms. They were looking for excellent teaching skills and quality materials and furnishings. We did not know which teachers the raters were coming to assess until the days they showed up, and they rated nine classrooms during the month! The process is intense, time consuming, and a lot of work. However, the process not only helps us maintain quality and current best practices in education for our preschoolers, but it also affords us significant grant opportunities. The higher we rate, the more grant money we are eligible for. At this time, Little School has received about \$200,000 in grant money over the last three years. This has allowed us to re-carpet the basement, put in touchless faucets, put in a new play structure, install bottle filler water fountains downstairs, and much more. I want to make a shout out to our teachers. They worked so incredibly hard in November, and it has significant impacts on the health of Little School and the church. In addition, Mr. Barry, our maintenance manager, and the church staff did all they could to help in the process. Stephanie in the front office even made our teachers breakfast one day in November! We greatly appreciate the relationship our staff has with the church staff.

We had a fun and chilly spirit-filled

 one indoors and one outdoors as weather permitted. The kids and staff costumes were so creative. Several superheroes were spotted!



music teachers, Ms. Laura, Ms. Sheri, and Ms. Jana work so hard on this program, and they do a fantastic job! We usually have about 600 visitors come see our Christmas programs. The best holiday tradition is watching preschoolers in Christmas outfits sing Christmas songs!

This month of December, we are also looking forward to our pancake breakfast day! Mr. Barry makes pancakes for all our preschoolers, they wear pajamas to school that day, and we even have a special visitor come visit to hear what the children want for Christmas.

I want to wish you all a wonderful advent season. I hope you are able to find peace and quality time this month and into the new year.

Miracles Recap

Have you had fun naming the miracles that happened in your week with the Mentimeter poll we did during our Miracles Among Us, Miracles Because of Us series? So many of us have expanded our view on miracles, and we've spent time each week lifting up the different ways we can experience miracles in our world.

On Oct. 16, we celebrated how miracles come from our connection to others, because when the God-in-us meets the God-in-others, so many miraculous things can happen from that connection.

On Oct. 23, we recognized how miracles come from mercy and justice, because if a sheep falls into a hole, it is merciful to help them out, and helping them can be miraculous for them and for us. We also recognized how justice is doing our part to help fill in the holes that are out there so none of God's sheep have to fall into them.

On Oct. 30, we affirmed that miracles come from **our** giving, because when we give of our time, our energy, our talents and our money, God can grow incredible things from them just like a mustard seed is able to grow into a beautiful tree.

On Nov. 6, we celebrated the fact that miracles come despite our mistakes, because even though the people we loved who have gone on before us made mistakes, we still loved them and their presence in our lives was a miracle and a blessing.

On Nov. 13, we talked about how miracles come from our wonder, because even though some miracles can be explained away, it is important to stay open to the wondrous works of God in our world.
