Parables: Stories that Surprise, Provoke and Inspire

Jesus was a first-century Jewish Rabbi and he was a master storyteller. Jesus told stories. It's how he taught. It's how he related to his people. It's how he asked questions. These short stories carried the element of

surprise—"I know you thought the Kingdom of God was like this, but it's actually more like this..." These short stories were meant to provoke deeper conversations about life and faith and everything else that mattered in the world. These short stories would inspire the hearers towards a new hope not only of the Kingdom of God, but how to find it here on earth. These short stories are called parables and Jesus often spoke in parables.

During this Epiphany season-the season when we proclaim who Jesus was and who Jesus is in the worldwe will explore some of Jesus' parables as reported in



the Gospels. The PARABLES worship series will begin on Sunday January 15 and we'll be there for seven weeks.

How do we hear the parables through an imagined set of first-century ears, and how can we translate them so that they can be heard still speaking? It is not enough for us to ask, "what do these parables mean?" We can't reduce parables to a single meaning, we would miss so much! The best stories function on multiple levels and provide multiple meanings—we read them differently at different times. And Jesus' parables will often times challenge us and make us uncomfortable, turning things a bit upside while calling us to ask the deepest questions of ourselves. The best kinds of stories do exactly this, don't they? So we must also ask, "what do we do with these stories and what do they do to us?"

My prayer is that we hear and re-hear Jesus' parables together, that we hear them anew. May we approach these stories with an openness. And when it comes to these stories, may we find surprise, provocation, and inspiration. Let's together join the conversation that's been happening for nearly 2,000 years.

On another note: This worship series will align beautifully with the arts as The Wesley Players present *Godspell* this Spring. The story of this show hinges on the parables. How fun... you won't want to miss it!

Welcome to the parables, my friends. Let's explore!

St. Luke's individual donors and Seasoned Voyagers have been very generous in providing funds for gift cards for families at Sedalia. During November and December we donated \$1800 worth of Walmart and King Soopers gift cards to the school. We have received emphatic thank-yous from the principal and office staff for these gift cards. They are very important because 52% of the students are on the free/reduced cost meal program.

Guatemala Mission Trips 2017

St. Luke's will sponsor two mission trips to Guatemala in 2017: March 18-26 and May 26-June 4. Currently, we have 3 spaces open for the March trip. If you would like to go and have any questions, please contact Ron Miller (720-381-9452, ronmiller74@gmail.com) for March, or Dave Laurvick (303-791-0659 x114, davel@stlukeshr.com).



Cost for the March trip is \$1,850. Cost for the SLY trip is \$1,650 and has a waiting list, so please see Dave before applying. Team is limited to SLY 11th and 12th grade students and their parents. During our trips our construction projects will cost a total of \$11,000 which the teams will raise, however, prior construction experience is not required. We will also spend time helping at the school in the village.

Fundraisers for the trip will be our Annual Guatemala Burrito Breakfast that will be held on January 8, and a Guatemala crafts sale on December 11. Burritos will sell for \$4 for pre-sales and \$5 on the day of the breakfast, and pre-sales will be available in the Fellowship Hall between services during early-to-mid December.

Guatemala Alternative Christmas Gift Options

The Guatemala Mission teams will be offering a variety of alternative Christmas gifts this year. Tags with more information can be found on the Giving Tree in the Fellowship Hall in December including:

- Supplying milk to the families in Lemoa, Guatemala. The cost is only \$12.50 for a can of this enriched powered milk, which can last up to 3 months. This makes a wonderful gift to these families, who are not able to afford this luxury for their family.
- Water Filter Project. Most rural families do not have access to clean water which causes a multitude of health issues. A \$40 filtration system will provide a family with fresh water for a year. Our SLY team will distribute the filters in May. Donations in any amount are appreciated.

Members of St. Luke's recently traveled to Guatemala to help select new students to be sponsored through the Pura Vida scholarship program. In Guatemala rural children are only able to complete up to 6th grade at the most, with many dropping out by 3rd grade to work for their families. A sponsorship allows these students to continue on in school and be supported in their education. We have a table in the Fellowship Hall where you can learn more about the sponsorships and select a student to sponsor.

The SLY team has Estate Reserve Fair Trade coffee beans in 1 pound bags they are selling at the MT Cup coffee cart or the youth office. All proceeds go to the Water Filtration Project.

What's Up With Our Bus?



You may be surprised to learn that the St. Luke's bus is approximately 13 years old, seats 24 people, and has only been used on Sundays. Given that it only tallies 66,000 miles, this could be true. However I'm not to try to sell it to you; I'm framing why we should keep it. Here's the issue - repairs have

cost St. Luke's \$25K over the last 4 years leading to a concern the bus is a money pit. As a result, the trustees met in November with other interested parties to review a usage and cost analysis Sandi Miyaki had pulled together from data collected over the last 4 years.

Regarding usage, the bus is driven around 100 days/year. Youth groups and the Wind Crest crew split 85 of those days. Nine other groups capture the remaining 15. While all groups are trending up, the fact remains this asset sits unused 250+ days/year. Part of the challenge of increasing its usage is that drivers must possess a Commercial Driver's License (CDL). We have 6 such individuals. Scheduling the bus takes, well "scheduling", which means advance notice is required without a guarantee that one of the six will be available.

The data shows total costs for insurance, maintenance, repairs, fuel, and supplemental rentals run \$11K/year. We incurred some large repair bills over the last two years. However the cup can be viewed as half-full. We switched to a different shop for maintenance and repair. Unlike the previous shop, "fixes" now stay fixed and the charges are more reasonable. Sandi also learned our model year was a lemon - the primary culprit being a poor electrical system and computer. The fact we've experienced a lot of electrical issues isn't surprising but ever since our new shop replaced the wiring harness the electrical system has been solid.

So, what if we sold it you ask? It's worth around \$5K. These things depreciate faster than a Jim *cont. on page 5*

Bus continued from page 4... Ramsey sports coat. A new one like ours would cost \$133K. Rentals? Prohibitively expensive. Even a smaller van that doesn't require a CDL would be \$65K. In bus-terms, 66K miles is very low mileage and we're optimistic the bus is now in better hands so we concluded we should keep it for the near term. Should we lose the transmission or get hit with something equally expensive we'll reconsider.

Finally, it may make sense to purchase a second, "non-CDL" bus if we could find one just a few years old. The trustees will study whether this is feasible. There is a bus fund in our church financial portfolio which contains \$23K. \$5K was raised in 2016 via Dan and Cindy Raap's fund-raising tribute to our beloved Dean Conklin. The annual golf tournament raises roughly \$7K/year and the trustees have an annual budget of \$5K. Wind Crest riders provide an annual donation of a few thousand, too. Finally, the youth are considering ways they can contribute - perhaps via a fundraiser of their own. We're not in a bind and have the luxury of time to find a good one. Given the rate of depreciation buses experience, we may find something very reasonable.

So, in summary the strategy is to retain the current bus, continuing to stay on top of preventative maintenance and safety inspections thank you James Bacon and Dave Laurvick! With fingers-crossed we will learn and listen by participating in ongoing conversations with teams and individuals, whether a 2nd, non-CDL bus, is desirable and financially feasible. 

Planning for Cold Weather Closures
