It's that time of year when St. Luke's goes beyond to help our community with the annual food drive. This year we are partnering with St. Andrew UMC to assist in our efforts. Mark your calendars for the following dates:

September 26 – Training potluck:

This year we will host a potluck dinner to train people in the art of collecting food at the grocery stores. Come to hone your skills and to get to know our neighbors from St. Andrew who will be helping with the food drive. Bring a dish to share because who doesn't love food and fellowship.

October 3-5 – Feeding of the 5000:

Volunteer to collect, pick-up, sort or deliver food for our annual food drive in support of Food Exchange Resource Network (FERN). With the assistance of St. Andrew, we will also be collecting food for the St. Andrew Market. FERN is a food resource collaborative serving the South metro area, feeding an estimated 800 families each week. St. Andrew Market is located at the East Community Center and helps bridge the hunger gap and offers everyday household necessities in a free, safe, and low-barrier market. Donations collected during the event will be delivered to FERN and St. Andrew Market on October 5th. Look for volunteer sign-ups soon.

October 11 – Feeding of the 5k:

A celebration of our accomplishments and hard work for the food drive. Come join in the fun for this 5k run/walk that supports our Feeding of the 5000 event. All are welcome to participate. Adults, kids, teenagers, parents, grandparents, kids, dogs, you name it, you are welcome. After the 5k, refuel with a breakfast to be provided for all.

St. Luke's Solar Campaign Underway

St. Luke's is taking a big step toward caring for creation — and saving on our electric bills — with a rooftop solar project that will provide about 159.5 kilowatts of clean, renewable energy for our church.

This project will:

- Reduce our electric bills by about \$21,000 every year.
- Reach net cash flow positive in year 3 — meaning annual savings will exceed annual loan payments starting then.
- Lower our carbon footprint, preventing over 3,254 metric tons of CO² emissions over 25 years — the equivalent of planting 4,800 trees.
- Serve as a visible expression of our commitment to environmental stewardship.

We've displayed an aerial photo of our church roof in the Narthex. As donations and pledges come in, we're marking the sponsored panels in green. Already, several panels have turned green thanks to generous supporters

— and we're just getting started! The total project cost is about \$500,000. Our goal is to raise \$250,000 in donations and pledges and finance the rest with a loan, which we'll repay from the energy savings. You can sponsor a solar panel for \$750, but gifts of any size will make a difference.

How to Give: Make a donation — scan the QR code, visit the solar table in the Narthex on Sundays, or send a check to the church office (mark "Solar Project" in the memo).

Make a pledge — you'll have up to one year to fulfill your pledge, making it easier to spread your support over time. Online or pledge cards available.

Let's keep turning our roof green — and power our church with the sun for decades to come.

...and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. - Roman 5:4-5

The apostle Paul wrote those words to the earliest followers of Jesus in the imperial capital city of Rome. Those words of endurance, character, and hope were sent to a people who lived at the center of a system of power built on force and control. And the power of the empire was embodied in the person and office of the emperor. But the earliest followers of Jesus were choosing to embrace the way of life centered in the life, death, resurrection, and grace of Christ. And in this way of Jesus, Paul states that they have a hope that will outlast any emperor and any empire.

This fall at St. Luke's, as we begin a new season in the life of the church, we are focused on this same hope. For like those people 2,000 years ago in Rome, it can seem that we live in a time where power, force, and control are increasing. And this makes our role as the church all the more important. When we gather for worship, we proclaim hope. When we are together in small groups, we are building hope in each other. When we are out serving in the community, we are living out hope for the wider world. When we listen and pray with one another, we are placing our hope in God's love that has been poured into our hearts, as Paul says.




Journeys of Hope: Exodus and Land

We'll talk about stories from the Bible where hope is prominent, stories from the world about hope, and we'll talk about hope in our own lives.

It means we pay attention. We mark time not just with calendars, but with intention. We ask: What is God doing in me this season? What am I being invited to release, to embrace, to learn?






Mission Lunch Program

Our weekly lunch program for friends without homes has partnered with Denver Public Library. DPL actively assists individuals experiencing homelessness through their community resource program. This program focuses on connecting people with various city and county resources, including housing, shelter, and other essential services. DPL also provides a welcoming space for individuals to access resources, participate in educational programs, and seek support from staff with lived experience in homelessness. We deliver 50 sack lunches each week to the library and another 30 lunches to Network Coffee House. Kind acts may encourage others to repeat the good deeds they've experienced themselves. The Book of the 12: Prophets Call to the People

During June and the first Sunday of July, our messages during worship focused on wisdom from what are commonly called The Minor Prophets. These are twelve relatively short books of the Bible from Hosea to Malachi. Each of these twelve books were written for different times and purposes, but each communicates a message that God had for a community. Hosea called the people to return to God's mercy. Joel wrote about days to come when God's Holy Spirit would empower the people. Micah implores us to seek justice. And Jonah was tasked with proclaiming the grace of God, even when that grace was much bigger than Jonah wanted it to be. The Means of Grace

In July and August, the founder of the Methodist movement, John Wesley, has been a part of our Sunday morning worship. The message series for these two months was focused on Wesley's Means of Grace. These are practices that help fill our souls, ground us in God's goodness, and sustain us in serving the world. Some means of grace are about piety, such as prayer, fasting, devotion, and the sacraments. Other means of grace are described as mercy, meaning how we treat other people and seek justice in the world.



COMING IN NOVEMBER: Sacred Moments

During the four Sundays of November, our Sunday morning worship will be all about sacred occasions in the year. All Saints Day, when we remember those who have passed from this life to the life that is to come, is November 2nd. The next Sunday we will mark Christ The King, and remember that Jesus is a king in a completely opposite way of what we expect. November 16th is when we will mark Veterans Day. And November 23rd is the Sunday of Thanksgiving. And Advent begins on November 30th!

SHORT-TERM CLASSES WITH REV. CALOB

Prayer workshop: How are we do pray?

Have you ever been asked to pray for a person or a group? Is there a model for prayer? To learn more about these questions, you're invited to one of the prayer workshops on **Sunday September 21** in the Chapel after both worship services. We'll learn how the Lord's Prayer is a step-by-step, part-by-part model of how to pray in any situation, and then we'll practice praying with the model.



A huge thanks to everyone who helped support our summer youth mission trips this year with your prayers and donations. It was a transformative summer.

Six middle school youth ventured to Rapid City South Dakota, July 7-12, to work alongside Feeding South Dakota, Canyon Lake UMC, and the Humane Society of the Black Hills. They gathered over 490lbs of nonperishable food donations, and \$350 for Feeding South Dakota, then helped pack over 400 boxes of food for families, and sort pallets of produce

into family size portions. They also prayed over the animals and workers of the Human Society after some upkeep projects and visiting with the animals. Canyon Lake UMC was so grateful for the help moving their children's ministry supplies over to their new building, and because of their relationship with the community were able to get us early access to the new Tuwahe memorial in Rapid City. The youth also got to visit Mt. Rushmore, Bear Country USA, and the Cosmos Mystery Area.

Twelve high school youth headed to Billings Montana, July 27 - August 2. They worked alongside Montana Rescue Mission, the HER Campaign, St. John's United, the Audubon Center, Parks & Rec., and ZooMontana - with work ranging from playing outside with kids, to digging, to painting a garage, to visiting compassionately with folks losing their memory. At the end of the week, they had the opportunity to white water raft in Cody, WY.


Here are some mission trip thoughts and highlights from the youth:




