Remembering the Hope of Advent & Epiphany



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

Who are You? And Why are You Here?

In our worship series, we've been going deep into the parables of Jesus. These short stories are meant to surprise, provoke, and inspire. We have been asking questions of these parables: What do we do with them? How do we interpret them? What do they do to us? How are they moving within us, within the community? Yes, we ask the hard questions. But these parables also ask hard questions of us, the hearers and interpreters.

There's an old story told by Jewish Rabbi's. It's a story that's been passed down through the generations. It's a story about Rabbi Akiva.

On this particular day, Rabbi Akiva was in a distant village gathering supplies. He noticed the sun



was starting to set. It was getting darker. Walking back to his home, he absentmindedly took the wrong path. By this time the sun had completely set. Instead of arriving at the city gates of Capernaum, he arrived at the gates of a Roman fortress. Suddenly, a booming voice came through the darkness: "Who are you, and why are you here?" Rabbi Akiva stopped, looked up, and noticed the Roman guard standing atop the fortress. The voiced sounded again: "Who are you, and why are you here?" Being a good, faithful rabbi, he answered the question with a question: "How

much do they pay you to stand guard and those questions of all who approach?"

The guard, now seeing that this was not an intruder but a rabbi, answered meekly, "Five drachmas a week, sir." At that point the Rabbi Akiva offered, "Young man, I will double your pay if you come with me, stand in front of my cottage, and ask me those same questions each morning as I begin my day: 'Who are you, and why are you here?'"

St. Luke's, let's continue to allow the parables to ask us the hardest, the deepest, the most transforming questions: *Who are you, and why are you here?*

Speaking Christian

Have you ever questioned the origin of certain Christian words, especially those words which seem irrelevant or outdated in today's culture and religious climate? Or words that historically have been used for control, power, guilt and shame? Words like sin, righteousness, repentance, hell, salvation, or rapture. What does it mean to speak of being 'born again' in our current time,

and what did it mean for the earliest followers of Jesus? How can we talk of sin without eliciting feelings of guilt and shame? How does our Christian language

attract people to church, or push them away?

Our Christian language is important, and yet we often take for granted that we understand that language. During Lent, we'll explore the history, meaning, and significance of our Christian language using Marcus Borg's book, Speaking Christian: Why Christian Words Have Lost Their Meaning and Power — and How They Can Be Restored.

Marcus Borg writes this about the book, "Speaking Christian' is in a state of crisis. For many, Christianity has become an unfamiliar language. Even for those who think they speak 'Christian' fluently, the faith itself is often misunderstood and distorted. They think they are speaking the language like it

has always been understood, but what they mean by the words and concepts is very different from what these things meant originally. The book's purpose is to redeem or re-claim Christian language in all of its richness and wisdom."

The class will meet on Wednesday evenings, March 8-April 12 (the time is still to be determined), and sign-ups will begin in February.

Seasoned Voyagers Update

Tuesday Jan. 17 was the kickoff luncheon

for our Seasoned Voyagers this year. Theme was "Down Memory Lane" and people shared various family recipes from main dishes through breads, cookies and other desserts.

In addition to the food treats, Linda Holloway from "Bessie's Hope", which focuses on those living in nursing homes and assisted living and children in crisis, spoke about the services of that group. Bessie was Linda's grandmother who developed Alzheimer's and received poor treatment in a nursing home in Texas. She was taken from there and brought to Denver. Linda's heart was flooded with love for her late grandmother and 23 years ago Bessie's Hope was born.

I had never heard of Bessie's Hope prior to yesterday. Linda said 60% of those in homes receive no visitation. In crisis children and young adults are trained to interact with the elderly – to touch, hug, listen, and lead activities. Linda said Bessie's Hope is the only such organization within the United States. But from it an organization was founded in Germany called "Generation Bridges."

Linda is a music therapist. She shared with us a song she wrote in memory of her grandmother. "Remember me the way I was and love me the way I am." The song is amazingly beautiful and touched all our hearts.

More from Les: Prepare for the Worst but Hope for the Best

1," my boss, Ken told me; "You were assigned to the llation and Thermal Cracking units when you worked

"Les, they're asking for you," my boss, Ken told me; "You were assigned to the Combination Crude Distillation and Thermal Cracking units when you worked at the engineering group at our Carson refinery. Contract negotiations between the OCAW Union and the Southern California refiners have stalled and the

Union is on the verge of calling for a strike by the refinery workers. The company is preparing for the worst by bringing in all their salaried employees who are familiar with the refinery units to operate them in case the hourly workers walk out. Any reason you can't go to help?"

"Not that I can think of," I replied, wondering how much I had learned about the combination units was still applicable to keeping the units running smoothly. I had transferred from the refinery to the company's research center about five years before. But I responded, "Put me on the list of volunteers." Uncertainty tends to breed fear in our minds and I was nervous, having never worked during a strike before. My mind recalled images of turmoil during past strikes in other industries but I resolved to go work as asked.

The next morning, it began to rain in the Los Angeles area, not too intense, but a steady downpour that would continue off and on for several weeks! It was an ominous sign of coming events.

The Contract with the OCAW allowed for safe handoff or shutdown of any refinery unit if the workers were to walk out. Both sides of the contract dispute put safety above all else. So those of us who had volunteered to work in the refinery during a strike were called to report to the refinery manager and to be prepared to stay inside the refinery for at least a week.

Carpools in company cars were quickly arranged and bags were packed with at least one change of clothes. Hard hats and hard—toed shoes were issued to those who didn't already have them. Trailers had been brought into the refinery for temporary housing and the cafeteria had been stocked with an extra supply of food. A salaried unit operations supervisor briefed each volunteer on the operation of the unit to which he or she was assigned.

Then, a few mornings later, Union Pickets showed up at the refinery gates, the walkout was upon us! Our carpool joined others slowly driving through the picket line, ignoring the insults shouted at us and hoping things would not get violent. They didn't. And the rain continued as a seemingly ominous sign.

Once in the refinery, we essentially ended all contact with the world outside the refinery gate. We worked 12-hour shifts and would only see a little television during our meal breaks and just before and after our sleep periods. None of the personnel working in the refinery knew anything about the progress, or lack of it, in the labor negotiations.

Word got around that there had been a plane crash offshore west of the Los Angeles airport; somebody smugly suggested that the rain had brought some sort of curse! It was not until the strike was over that we learned the details of the crash of Scandinavian Airlines flight 933; it was caused by pilot error as it was preparing to land from the west of LAX.

Each of the volunteers was given permission to call home once a day but we were warned not to disclose any details of what was going on inside the refinery. We were well fed and were told to rest as much as possible and to be very attentive to the operation of our refinery units. In many ways, it felt to me like we were in a war! But, some of the other volunteers, who had worked during previous strikes, seemed far more casual about the situation.

In about four days, we were told that the Union and Company negotiators had agreed to begin talks again and we were relieved to hear that a new contract had been agreed upon. The walkout ended a day later; intriguingly, the rain also let up.

This had been my first time for being a part of a strike and it was a learning experience. The learning came as I reflected on how some of my fellow volunteers and the company had behaved. There was mutual respect on both sides of the negotiating table; there was a common goal, but widely differing attitudes on the path to be taken to reach that goal. But there was never a doubt that the Company would continue operating regardless of what the Union said or did. That intention was backed up by the preparations made.

British statesman, Benjamin Disraeli, said in the 1800's, "I am prepared for the worst, but hope for the best." The lesson from Proverbs applies to all of us, "Do your best, prepare for the worst - then trust God to bring victory."

God bless us all. -Les



Trustees Corner

In December our team said good bye to Buddy Key, and thanked him for his service and attention through the past 3 years with our team. Buddy has served as our primary interface for our many outside groups that regularly use St. Luke's to conduct our growing number of 12 step recovery programs hosted at St. Luke's as well as our Scout leadership.

Earlier in January, we added 3 new members to the Trustees Team – Karen Meade, Sandi Thompson, and Lee Seaman. As we start this new year, one question has been asked a few times –

What is the role of Trustees at St. Luke's?

As you might imagine, the Methodists have a handbook that answers this question nicely. Basic responsibilities for Trustees include:

- I. Oversee, maintain and supervise all local church property
- 2. Report annually to the Charge Conference on the state of the church's property, equipment, investments, and resources
- 3. Receive and administer all gifts made to the congregation; make certain that all trust funds of the congregation are invested properly (at St. Luke's we collaborate with the Finance Team and the Executive Team on these decisions)
- 4. Ensure that the articles of incorporation of the congregation are kept up-to-date, if applicable
- Be responsible, in conjunction with the pastors, for all use of the church, building, assets, and grounds
- 6. Maintain adequate insurance coverage on all church property and develop appropriate risk management policies (annual inventories we secure and document from various staff and teams help us in this area)
- 7. Submit the annual budget requests to the Finance Team for insurance, property maintenance and improvement, and new property purchases
- 8. Be accountable to Charge Conference and to the Executive Team.

Trustees act as the Agent of the Charge Conference in caring for the physical resources of the church and for all legal matters. In early January, St. Luke's annual Charge Conference was convened and St. Luke's staff and collective teams submitted annual reports for review. Working with the pastors, Brenda Schafer, our administrator, compiled the annual report that was reviewed at the meeting. Please connect with her in the office if you'd like to receive a copy of this material.

Planning for Cold Weather Closures

In the event of inclement weather, the pastors and staff of St. Luke's have adopted these procedures:
