St. Luke's Observes Black History Month

February has long been designated Black History Month in the United States, a monthlong celebration of the triumphs, achievements, and adversities of Black Americans who have

influenced our great nation. Black History Month has been officially recognized every year since 1976. However in 1915 Harvard-trained historian Carter Woodson and Rev. Jesse Moorland founded an organization specifically focused on researching and promoting the achievements of Black Americans and people of African descent. The work of this organization laid the groundwork for what we now recognize as Black History Month.

I find great value in celebrating our diversities and I believe it is valuable to do

so as a faith community. As a person of faith, a central tenet of my beliefs is that all humanity is beautifully and wonderfully made in God's image (Genesis 1:27). It is also central to my Christian faith that we follow the teachings of Jesus to love God with all your heart, soul, and mind - and to love your neighbor as yourself (Matthew 22:37-39). As a result of these scriptures and the values of my faith, knowing that discrimination, biases, violence, and systemic systems of injustice are still causing great harm in our communities based on difference in culture, race, and ethnicity is deeply troubling to me.

It is exciting to me to witness the good work St. Luke's has been committed to through the engagements with Brave Spaces that has expanded into many vital opportunities. *See Sallie's article on Brave Spaces and the Center for Spiritual Engagement's Legislative Action information in this issue.*

Anti-Racism & Allyship: Initiatives & Partnerships of St. Luke's CSE & Community

"The time is always right to do what it right" - MARTIN LUTHER KING

As we continue to learn through our study of anti-racism, which we

began in 2020, we are called to be good Allies (and Good Ancestors) in the work of dismantling systemic racism in our communities.

Being a good Ally requires those of us who have privilege and power to engage in self-reflection, learning, and action to support and to stand in



solidarity with those who are experiencing racism. Our community continues to collaborate in learning together and engaging in action.

The urgent work of healing takes all of us. We are guided by God's presence and St. Luke's foundational commitment to Micah 6:8 "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." Everyone's engagement to dismantle systemic racism in our communities is strongly encouraged. If you would like to talk further about where and how you can become more involved, I welcome a conversation with you. Here are a few of the ways our community has been taking action together.

Brave Spaces – Began weekly gatherings with the St. Luke's community for learning, listening, creating awareness and anti-racism/allyship actions in response to the murder of George Floyd. Formation of CSE Anti-Racism Leadership Team- JUNE 2020 – PRESENT

"We Cannot Walk Alone": Anti-Racism and Allyship Livestream - with Rev. Ken Brown, Jordan Lee, Garlinda Burton, and Rev. Janet Forbes, moderator. MARCH 2021. Over 600 people viewed the event & partnerships were begun.

Each of our teams have nine members: three members who roll off each year, three members who roll on each year, and three members who stay on for consistency. Have you ever wondered what these teams do? Here is a brief run-down of their primary responsibilities. If participation on any of these teams interests you or if you have, please let me know.

Staff Parish Relations - Evaluates clergy and clergy candidates; liaisons with staff regarding workplace issues; participates in interview and hiring process, budget management for salary and benefits. Ensure that employment laws are followed.

Missions - Provide support and advice to the various mission activities of St. Luke's.

Equipping Ministry - Identify potential members for teams at St. Luke's. Match spiritual gifts and passions, and skills to the needs of St. Luke's. Make individual contacts to invite people to be a part of our Ministry Teams. Support healthy transitions of leadership at St. Luke's.

Finance - Support St. Luke's Director of Finance in overseeing the church budget, general fund and expenses. Maintain "transparency" of SLUMC General Fund finances to congregation.

Trustees - Oversee maintenance, repair, or installation of church property: building, landscaping, bus, security and contents (such as audio/ visual equipment).

Family Ministry Team - Discusses, plans, and helps support our family ministry programs at St. Luke's. This team meets quarterly and communicates via email throughout the year. Others interested are welcome to attend.

Lay Leadership - Grow faith through support of congregational integrity. Lay leaders connect to our clergy and staff as representatives of the congregational community.

Golf Event Volunteers

St. Luke's Annual Golf Event is Saturday, August 13, 2022 at Red Hawk Ridge Golf Course in Castle Rock



Like other Fundraiser events, it requires volunteers to make the day successful. We need between 7-10 volunteers to help with both pre-event and day-off event activities. This will include reaching out to our local neighborhood businesses for donations. Also, making phone calls and driving to businesses. Both adults and children are highly encouraged to volunteer for this event.

Pre-Event Volunteers:

• **Donations and Event Sponsorships:** This team assists staff with acquiring in-kind donation items from businesses and outside vendors for our live auction and other event needs. They will also help reach out to businesses to present event sponsorship opportunities. This process begins at least four months prior to the tournament.

Day-of Volunteers:

- Check-in & Registration: This team sets up the check-in and registration area before the event begins. They then help manage the two-hour check-in process for both golfers and other event volunteers, directing people to their assigned areas, handing out golfer gifts, and communicating any important information for the day.
- **Tear Down & Clean-up:** This team helps collect all event materials at the conclusion of the day and helps with clean-up. General venue clean-up is a top priority in order to keep good-standing relationships with our venue partners and be good stewards of what we've been allowed to use. This process typically lasts about an hour after the event ends.

Trustees Corner: Lift Station Replacement

St. Luke's has 2 Sewage Ejector Systems, or "lift stations." These are needed because the bathrooms in our basement are BELOW the sewer line. Sewage from those bathrooms drains to a large basin, and then it needs to be periodically pumped up and out of the basin to the sewer line.

Late last year, the lift station adjacent to the Asbury Music Room began failing; it would not automatically turn on the pump to empty the sewage out of the basin. The system had to be constantly monitored and run manually to empty the basin. If the basin overflowed, raw sewage would flow onto the Music Room floor and damage the room's contents.

Barry Curtis (our Facilities Maintenance / Custodian) quickly diagnosed the problem: the float switches and pumps were all aging and failing. Working with the Trustees, we contracted to have the system replaced, but it took several months to get the needed parts. Everything was finally repaired in mid-January, at a cost of approximately \$12,000. The Music Room is now safe. *–Ken Fong*

Because of generous donations by a Seasoned Voyagers member, the school has purchased programmable robots to teach the students critical thinking and programming skills. The photo shows kindergarten students trying to program a bot to go around objects lying down and



knock over the ones standing up. Principal Jeff Johnson says, "So much collaboration, problem solving and perseverance happening!"

This year the Seasoned Voyagers donations will be used to purchase early literacy books for grades K-2; sturdy stools for classroom reading groups; books for each student at the Book Fair; Chromebook charging stations (teachers currently using dish draining racks); desk chair packs for supplies and texts.

A shout-out also goes to the Performing Arts Academy for bringing a production of *Lion King Kids* to Sedalia Elementary. Participating in a performance of any kind was a first-time experience for all but one student. Principal Jeff said that the students were singing *Lion King* songs in the halls and he'd never seen that much energy and genuine excitement at the school since he'd been there. Many parents were in tears of gratitude. Way to go, PAA!

HAAT Force Helping People Experiencing Homelessness

Thank you, St. Luke's for your ongoing generous support of HAAT Force -Homelessness Awareness and Action Task Force! HAAT Force provides severe weather motel shelter to families, people with disabilities or medical issues, older adults and people with pets. Through February 1, we have provided 44 motel vouchers for 486 person-nights of shelter. Motel stays have been from 1 to 13 nights. Children have

ranged in age from 6 months to 15 years old. People we are serving include families with young children living in a car, older adults living outdoors, and a person with frostbite.

While HAAT Force is providing motel shelter for severe weather, they are also connecting individuals and families with case management and housing resources through the Reciprocity Collective and Arapahoe County Housing Navigators, among other resources. Executive



Director, Sienna McGrath writes: "This has been a great start to the severe weather season, but we could not have accomplished all of this without your support, so thank-you for believing in HAAT Force."

During February HAAT received donations totaling \$6252 from St. Luke's. S t. Luke's is by far the most generous of all of HAAT Force's supporting church congregations! Also, we are up to 55 vouchers for 600 person-nights of shelter.

We appreciated reading the parables from a 1st Century Jewish perspective and we always found the final paragraph in each chapter to be meaningful, although challenging.

We are using Marcus Borg's book *Evolution of the Word* which presents the New Testament books in the chronological order they were written, which is not the way they are ordered in our Bibles. Remembering Eden Class And Hashem Elohim said, 'See, HaAdam is become like one of US' – Genesis 3:22 OJB



The passage referenced above is among many from Genesis that are entangled in scholarly controversy. The conventional reading as found in the New International Version is: *And the Lord God said*, *"The man has now become like one of us, knowing good and evil. He must not be allowed to reach out his hand and take also from the tree of life and eat, and live forever." – Genesis 3:22 NIV*

This is the basis for the concept of expulsion of Adam and Eve and Original Sin a fundamental element in the Western Christian tradition. The Expulsion is dependent on the failure of Adam and Eve to obey god's commands. However as B.D Sommer points out in his book The Bodies of God and The World of Ancient Israel "the Hebrew language has many words for 'sin' and 'disobedience,' but none of these words appear in Genesis 3."

So what was meant by the ancient authors? Did they intend as Sommer wonders if the Expulsion narrative was an instance of subsequent banishment or rather a return to the world?

To complicate matters, historians and Biblical scholars generally agree that the book is likely a compilation of several stories, edited, redacted and transcribed many times with modifications and many reinterpretations even up to modern times.

LATEST COVID POLICY UPDATE: I have some exciting news!

Masks at St. Luke's are now recommended for worship, but not required, and we are no longer requiring waivers. This is wonderful progress and beautiful timing, as many of us like to make a practice of being in worship during Lent.

Our staff and Board of Trustees will continue to watch case count numbers in our county and will also be mindful of the new CDC guidelines that have set Low, Medium and High Community Levels based on the ability of hospitals to handle cases. If our Community Level moves to High, we will require masks again to be supportive of our local hospitals. If cases are 200 or more per week, we will also mask up again as needed in order to minimize the risk of new infections. Masks will also be recommended, but not required, for most meetings and events outside of Sunday worship, but a few activities, such as singing, may still require masks.

More from Les: Betty, LaVerne and the Airplane

What we do can change attitudes more than what we say.

When Betty and I started dating, my father tended to act aloof toward her. He had someone else in mind, the daughter of his friend. But we had other plans, we married while I was still in college, against his wishes.

Shortly after graduation. Betty and I moved to California. With my new job, we decided to buy a new car through a dealer we knew in Grand Junction. We sold our old car and my father, LaVerne, offered to fly to Long Beach in his Piper Tri-Pacer and take us back to Grand Junction to take delivery.

About 9:00am, LaVerne was flying at about 12,000 ft elevation over the California/Nevada border. Suddenly, the engine started making loud, nasty noises. The propeller shuddered to a stop! Later, Dad would say that he really likes Tri-Pacers

"because they tend to glide slowly, almost like parachutes." He landed safely on a deserted county road near I-15 and the California/ Nevada state line.

Three hours later, Betty and I had been waiting long enough in the airport that we were beginning to worry. Our growing anxiety was shot into orbit when an announcement came over the Long Beach public address system: "Mr. Leslie Ludlam, please call the FAA." I quickly called and heard, "Your father's airplane went down, but He is OK; he wants you to rent a car and drive to meet him.

By that evening, we arrived at the Searchlight Road exit and saw the Tri-Pacer. Dad was waiting at the plane and told us, "I'm staying with the plane tonight; you go on to Las Vegas and come back tomorrow. I'll need your help getting the plane ready to be loaded onto a flat-bed trailer and hauled to Las Vegas."

We spent a short night at my uncle's home, then drove back out to the plane early the next morning. Most of the day was spent removing the wings from of the Tri-Pacer so it would fit on the trailer. Betty would hold the end of one wing as Dad pulled the connecting pins, then we would drop it to the ground. We were all tired and hot by the time the trailer arrived.

By evening, the trailer was on its way to Las Vegas. We decided to drive straight through to Grand Junction to take advantage of the cool night. Dad and I fell asleep in the car, Betty drove. At about 5:00am the next morning, as we approached Green River in eastern Utah, we were awakened by a blaring car radio and a cheery "good morning!" from Betty.

Dad almost cried that evening when we announced that we were going to have a baby. "You were out in that heat holding up the end of the wing and carrying my grandchild. Then you drove all night!"

From that time on, my father, the independent, controlling, sometimes irascible, LaVerne, displayed unexpected warmth, bragged about his daughter-in-law taking that airplane apart in the desert heat.
