Time for our spring clean-up – this year's efforts are being bolstered by our benefactors! We hope you all like the new front concrete! This one was on our wish list for a while. We are very grateful for the donations to our wish list items that have made completion of this project possible.

Last weekend along with many Youth Team volunteers, we successfully painted our Youth Room and two of their smaller classrooms. Before we started, Dave Laurvick did some terrific work to secure feedback from youth on what they'd like to see, a designer worked with them and we're on our way to themes of Earth, Wind, Fire, and Water. After a lot of clean up there's finally space for their favorite set up - 64 bean bag chairs!

Keeping with this effort, we've also given attention to all of the adult classrooms, and after the preschool is done for the season, we'll get underway there with floor refinishing. Although we do have 'assigned' spaces, we're a really busy place – and, with Brenda's help, we try to flex to accommodate requests for space as creatively as we can. We'll ask that as you and your team use the spaces, you return them as you find them in the photos soon to appear in each space. We're theming this as "Without a Trace". With a little advance warning, Brenda works with Barry, our Facilities Manager, to set up spaces for larger group events, and they make a plan working with the event leader, to return the space without a trace of a special event that took place.

There's another big project that we've been hoping to complete for a couple of years – never more obvious than it is now. *Our parking lot.* We plan to address critical repair items in the next few weeks. We appreciate your patience with our Cone Zones! Long term, we need to complete a full renovation of our parking lot. Over the last 30 years between worship, preschool, music, arts, and education program traffic, we've simply worn it out – estimates are for about \$170,000 we can completely repair, roto mill, seal and stripe it. We can do it all at once, or in thirds – we appreciate any and all donations to help us complete the project.

Last but not least, our next Service Saturday is scheduled for Saturday, June 6 from 8:00am-Noon. We'll be focused on refreshing our outdoor spaces, and can really use your help. 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### Rev. B. James (Jim) George is Sky Ridge Medical Center's Volunteer of the Year

**Rev. Janet Forbes** Senior Pastor St. Luke's clergy Wind Crest retirement community resident Rev. B. James (Jim) George is the 2015 recipient of Sky Ridge Medical Center's Volunteer of the Year award.

This award recognizes Rev. Jim's 12 years of service as a volunteer chaplain in which he has offered pastoral care, support, and resources to patients, families, and staff at least three afternoons each week, and often more, when his schedule permits.

And, not to be hindered by holidays, he has also taken time to volunteer on these days, often commenting, "I think the staff and patients need some extra encouragement on the holidays."

Rev. Jim has led the Sky Ridge chaplaincy department in developing routine Emergency Department rounds to ease this anxious time for the patient and family. He especially loves the pediatric patients and has an especially tender heart for their suffering.

Staff remark repeatedly how grateful they are for his presence. He is also a mentor for the other chaplains. He also serves as a valuable member of Clinical Ethics committee, as well as on Clinical Ethics committees at two other area hospitals. He has offered invaluable assistance in crafting Patient Rights policies that are concise, clear, and true to current legal code.

Rev. Jim is continuing a lifetime of care, commitment and service for his community and the world. As a young man, he completed three years of military service in Europe with the 100th Infantry Division, receiving a bronze star for his service. He then went on to earn a law degree and began an impressive career in law, as an attorney, professor and Dean of schools such as New York Law School, Wayne State and the University of Michigan.

When Rev. Jim retired he went back to seminary and received a Master of Divinity so he could help congregations and individuals in need of spiritual support. He then served as an ordained elder in congregations in New Jersey and in Colorado. This gift in retirement was generous to society, but this too, is only a piece of his service.

Jim and his wife, Grace, are donors in the construction of an elementary school in a rural area of Guatemala. Children who attend the school need financial support to stay in school. They currently support four students who attend the John Wesley School.

### Reclaiming Soul from Stress Symposium

**Rev. Dr. Sallie Suby-Long** Associate Minister A couple of weeks ago, I had the opportunity to attend an excellent symposium sponsored by the Institute for Life and Care. The focus was

"Reclaiming Soul from Stress". Rev. Schawn Kellogg, who is part of our St. Luke's community, is on faculty at the Institute and graciously invited me to attend. Since one of my passions is wellness, I naturally thought others might appreciate a few of the things that were shared at the event.

The symposium featured an internationally known panel of experts on the topic of health and spirituality. They were a dynamic team all advocating the importance of the mind-body-spirit connection. While each of them offered many valuable suggestions, I'll share just a few. Wayne Muller, M. Div. speaker and author, said he belief human life has a natural rhythm and pace that we often ignore. The experience of living, connecting with people, feeling, and truly engaging, takes time. Yet, our culture rewards productivity so we often miss the meaning and the deep connection with one another that we desperately crave. He is an advocate for intentionally engaging in Sabbath time - time to literally be alive and present.

Victoria Sweet, M.D., Ph.D. professor and author had this to share about reclaiming one's soul from stress: When faced with a decision, ask yourself "Do I want to do this?" "Do I have to do this?" (and yes, sometimes we do, but not always!). She also spoke of realizing there will always be things that are "undone". She talked of her "80% Solution": Do 80% of what you believe is needed, and then allow time to relax.

Dr. Brian Luke Seaward, author and speaker on overcoming stress suggested the importance of humor and the necessity of creating time in life for the things and people that we love. Make time for our passions or if we don't know about our passions, make time to find out! I also loved his comment "to know and not to do is not to know". Truthfully, that gave me some serious pause. What a concept to actually do what we know contributes to our wellness, spiritual connection and fulfillment!

### Support Group for Family and Friends of Incarcerated Loved Ones

#### Did you know?....

From 1980 to the present, the number of persons in prisons in the U.S. has more than quadrupled from roughly 500,000 to 2.4 million.

There are 20-30 million Americans directly affected by having a loved one in correctional control (prison, jail, probation/parole).

The toll on spouses, children, and extended family of the incarcerated is staggering emotionally, financially, socially, and spiritually. Studies show that only death causes more stress on a family than the incarceration of a loved one.

Even with 20-30 million people being directly affected by having a loved one in correctional control, there are very few support groups for family and friends. St. Luke's is starting a support group to meet the needs of this population.

If you, or someone you know, are one of the 20-30 million people who has a loved one incarcerated or recently released from prison, St. Luke's is inviting you to meet with people in the same situation. Our support group meetings are on every fourth Thursday of the month, here, at the church. Our next one is on May 28. The meetings are from 5:00-6:30pm in room 210. ## Seasoned Voyagers Donates to Casa de Paz



Seasoned Voyagers' Mission Beneficiary for their recent "Taste of Mexico" lunch was the non-profit Casa de Paz (House of Peace). Casa de Paz provides a place for families to stay while they are visiting their loved ones in the Immigration Detention Center in Aurora. The Detention Center is a large, national, for-profit facility that holds undocumented immigrants until

either they are released on bond or a judge determines whether they will be deported or not. I went to visit someone there recently and there was an abundance of mothers with young children visiting with their husbands/fathers through glass barriers and a telephone. Casa de Paz also provides temporary shelter to the immigrants who are released from the Detention Center and need to arrange to get to their next destination. The Casa provides food, snacks, bedding, towels, toiletries and volunteer hosts. Their main source of income in a large Volleyball League that they have organized. We appreciate Seasoned Voyagers' contribution to this ministry and their generosity in supporting works of mercy to those in need!

What a fun experience! In honor of Earth Day and Arbor Day, Seasoned Voyagers helped plant 5 Ornamental Pear Trees in Cougar Run Park in Highlands Ranch. They can grow to 30 feet tall and 20 feet wide,

# More from Les by Rev. Les Ludlam: Puppies and Life

After considerable discussion and reflection, Betty and I decided that at age 6, our son, Jimmy, was old enough and responsible enough to have a dog to care for. (And I wanted one too!) We decided to buy a female German Shepherd puppy from a

family that lived just outside of town.

Jimmy named her "Dolly." He took responsibility of feeding and cleaning up after her and did pretty well considering that he was a first-grader. Dog and boy became very close.

Later that year when she was barely 8 months old, Dolly became pregnant when we weren't watching her closely! After some conversations, Betty and I decided not to take her to the vet, but to let her have the puppies as a good "learning experience" for Jimmy.

It was December and Dolly would not stay outside, so Betty and Jimmy

made a bed for her in the garage, near the door to the house. "Give it plenty of padding with old towels and blankets," said Betty; "Dolly will need a soft place when she delivers her puppies." As delivery time came closer, Dolly would spend more time in her bed and Jimmy, Betty and I would take turns checking on her and spending time with Jimmy to talk about where dog babies come from, how to take care of the puppies, and what mother Dolly would need when the time came for the puppies to be born. Jimmy took it all in as best he could.

Then, early one evening we heard Dolly whimpering loudly and I checked on her.

Sure enough, the puppies were arriving! I marveled at how quickly Dolly the puppy of a few months ago had become suddenly a mother who did all the things she had to do to make sure her pups survived. There were two pups, cleaned up and struggling to find food, a third was getting its mother's wash job and there were indications that there were more to come. She growled at me, perhaps to assure me that she had things in control and certainly to let me know I should keep my distance at that moment! I did, filled her water dish, and retreated.

About an hour later, Betty and I took Jimmy with us to check on Dolly and her puppies. There were four now, but the newly born fourth wasn't breathing. Betty quickly took over and picked up Number 4 and began gently stroking its back to work the lungs. Dolly didn't protest, somehow she seemed to know what Betty was doing and was preoccupied with delivery of the fifth pup.

After a few minutes of stroking, Number 4 began breathing on its own and then began crying its puppy cry. Betty smiled and placed the pup near Dolly's abdomen and let mother dog do her thing.

Jimmy had been taking all this in silently, but suddenly he burst out loudly. "You saved him, Mom!" He had tears in his eyes.

But the last of the litter, Number 5, was less fortunate, it was still born and Dolly instinctively knew it and moved the still body away from her family. We put the deceased pup in a small trash bag, sealed it up and took it outside.



Making sure that Dolly was OK, we then left her with her puppies and since it was well after Jimmy's bedtime, went upstairs and to bed.

Next morning, Jimmy was up, bouncing into our bedroom before the alarm clock went off. "Can we go see them?"

"No, not yet, let's have breakfast and get some food ready for Dolly, she's been through a lot and needs some rest and good nourishment so she can take care of her babies." We could tell from his questions during breakfast that Jimmy had been thinking a lot about the puppies overnight.

"Are we going to keep them? Can I name them? Will Dolly have any more puppies? How does she know what to do to take care of them?" And then, a tough one, "What are we going to do for the dead one?"

We talked at length about death and dying and then Jimmy burst out, "Let's have a funeral for Number 5!" I agreed and we chose a bare spot

east of the house. A small hole was dug and Number 5's body was wrapped in an old towel and placed in its resting place. I said a few words about Number 5's spirit being with God. We filled the hole and covered it with a large flat rock. For several weeks, Jimmy would pick dandelions or other wild flowers from the nearby fields and place them on the rock.

After the puppies were old enough to be sold, an ad was put in the local paper and soon we were getting inquiries. To our amazement, Jimmy was an excellent salesman! "I call this one "Jumper" because he likes to jump and run around. This one is "Sweety" because she likes to cuddle.

And, this one is the strongest, so I call him "Hunter."

One by one the dogs went to their new owners and Jimmy seemed to enjoy the process of sending these pups on their way.

After the last one left with it's happy new owner, I sat down with Jimmy to talk about the events of the previous three months with Dolly and her puppies.

"I was happy to see how well you took care of Dolly and her puppies."

"It was fun for me, but I think it was hard for Dolly."

"It didn't bother you to see the puppies go to new owners, did it?"

Jimmy looked at with me with a look that expressed a wisdom far beyond his age.

"Having puppies was hard work for Dolly and she worked at it all the time. I think she was ready to just play with me like we did before. Now that someone else is taking care of the puppies she can have fun again."

God bless Jim, God bless our memories of time with Dolly and her set of puppies, and...
