My hope is that we in the Rocky Mountain Annual Conference will live into Beloved Community so boldly that every church will be a beacon of love and justice, whether that community is in Blue Cliff, Eagle Valley, Lakewood, Salt Lake City or Denver. That no matter what language we may speak in our churches, no matter where on the theological scale we may fall, no matter what our demographics, every church will bear the love of Christ into their communities in ways that utterly transform the neighborhood." -Bishop Karen Oliveto



Join Us for our Worship Series: "One People: From Other to Friend" through November 23.

How might we begin to see ourselves, to see God reflected in the people who seem the most unlike ourselves?

The theme for our Rocky Mountain Annual Conference, for the next four years, is Living Into Beloved Community, but what does this mean? What does it mean for a local church, and for the churches of an Annual Conference to live into beloved community? Bishop Oliveto's vision is grounded in scripture, specifically in Matthew 25: For I was hungry and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. I was a stranger a you welcomed me. I was naked and you gave me clothing. I was sick and you took care of me. I was in prison and you visited me.

This vision of beloved community based on the teachings of Jesus will guide the work of the Annual Conference in a very specific way. Here is the four-year breakdown:

2016-2017: For I was hungry and you gave me food, thirsty and you gave me drink. "What are issues related to hunger and access to clean water in our neighborhoods, states, region, and world, and how can we order our lives and ministries to respond with the hands of Jesus?"

2017-2018: I was naked and you gave me clothing.

"In what ways are people naked: whether homeless, stripped of a safe sanctuary, stripped of dignity and respect, what are ways we can seek to clothe people, work for affordable housing, safety, civil rights, justice?"

2018-2019: I was sick and you took care of me.

"How are we dealing with the epidemic of drugs in our region? What are doing about addictions? (Bishop Oliveto) came from a community that said, 'We are all in recovery from something" – how are we creating healthy pathways to recovery? How are we dealing with health issues in our region?"

2019-2020: I was in prison and you visited me.

"When there is a cradle to prison pipeline for black and brown men, what are we doing to address systemic racism? How are we offering liberation to those placed in social and economic prisons? How do we unlearn the -isms that shackle the souls of so many?"

Bishop Oliveto includes in her vision these questions, "Every community needs to consider, who is not here? Who is in our city, our village, our town, and why aren't they in our pews? How can we welcome the stranger as an honored guest, knowing that when we do, we may be entertaining angels unaware?"

What would it mean for St. Luke's to live into beloved community? Who is not here? I hope you'll join me in delving into these questions, as we work together to live into beloved community.

More *from Les:* The Desert Seed Company

The Desert Seed Company was a small division of a solar energy company acquired by my employer during the height of the company's research in the early 1980's into ways of developing renewable energy resources. One of the operations created by Desert Seed Company was a small alfalfa processing plant near El Centro, California.

The plant was designed to recover a compound called "Xanthophyll" from alfalfa. Xanthophyll (orange) is a natural chemical related to chlorophyll (Green). Commercial chicken producers add this product to their poultry feed mixture to produce a customer-pleasing golden hue in the meat of a dressed bird.

"Shall we hang on to this plant?" I was asked. "It's not part of our mainline business, but go take a look at it and if it can be profitable, we might keep it for a while."

The unsaid inference was that if the company did decide to keep it, I might become the plant manager. El Centro and surrounding area are extremely hot most of the year so the location was not that desirable for living. But the project was technically fascinating and I liked the possibility of getting back into some engineering/operations function. I agreed to look at the plant and drove to El Centro to meet the plant staff and learn as much as I could about the operation.

I approached the evaluation with enthusiasm! The mechanical equipment brought back memories of my work with the oil shale retort in Colorado years before. The plant worked well and produced a good quality animal food product; the farmers liked the premium price they were paid for the alfalfa. Things looked promising from a technical point of view.

Then we explored the market for our Xanthophyll product. The poultry production business operates on a thin profit margin. We needed to understand the implications of this, so there were talks with poultry producers.



One feed buyer told us, "You make a good product; it does what we need. The dressed chicken color is what the customer wants. But, there is a problem with your product, it's too nutritious!" The buyer continued, "We must carefully balance all the nutritional factors in the feed we give our chickens to satisfy customer expectations and maximize our profit margin. Your alfalfa-derived product is so rich

in protein that adding it the poultry feed mix forces us to adjust the total blend. Our total feed costs actually go up when we use your product."

The poultry producers had done their homework and insisted on a lower price for our Xanthophyll product. We had been focused more on the technology of producing the product and less on the marketplace. We looked carefully at how we could cut costs and lower our price.

A surprise came a when we learned that Mexican marigold growers could produce Xanthophyll without all the protein and could do so at a much lower cost. Their costs were a fraction of Desert Seed's costs and the market for our Xanthophyll suddenly disappeared! And so did the poultry producers.

The market place doomed a technically sound, efficiently run and wellmanaged plant. It couldn't make a profit! We closed the operation, paid the farmers to cancel our supply contracts, shut down and dismantled the plant, and sold it for salvage prices. Our workers took local jobs or transferred to other company locations.

Jesus said, "For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, saying, this fellow began to build and was not able to finish." –Luke 14:28-30

Planning for Cold Weather Closures

In the event of inclement weather, the pastors and staff of St. Luke's have adopted these procedures:

During the week:

- When North Douglas County cancels school, St. Luke's will close the church office and cancel all classes, meetings, and events in the building. All childcare for the day will be cancelled.

- When North Douglas County delays the start of the school day, St. Luke's will open at the normal time (8:00am). All classes, meetings, and events will continue as scheduled.

On weekends and holidays:

The church staff and group leaders will determine whether classes, meetings, and events will be held. All closures will be posted on the St. Luke's website (www.stlukeshr.com) as soon as a decision is made. The closure of the St. Luke's Little School will also be given to local television and radio stations.
